

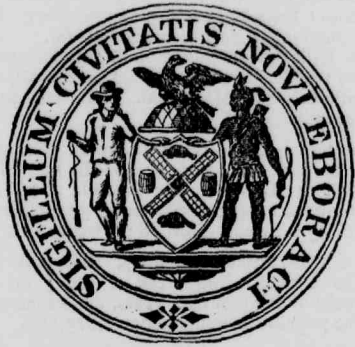

NEW YORK, August 17, 1880.

The Board of Health met this day.

Reports.

Resolutions.

Resolved, That copies of the reports of Sanitary Inspectors upon the condition of certain street pavements be forwarded to the Department of Public Works for the necessary action, as follows:

Street pavement at 101 and 103 Lewis street.
Street pavement at Ann street, between Broadway and Nassau street.
Street crossing at Lexington avenue and One Hundred and Twenty-sixth street.
Street sewer at Second avenue, between Sixty-first and Sixty-second streets.
Fire hydrant at east side Franklin avenue, 50 feet north of Third avenue.
Drinking hydrant at Seventy-third street, 150 feet east of Third avenue.

Resolved, That a copy of the report of Sanitary Inspector Roberts, upon the sanitary condition of First avenue, between Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth streets, be forwarded to the Department of Public Works, with the request that for sanitary reasons a sewer be constructed in said avenue, between Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth streets.

Resolved, That a copy of the report of Assistant Sanitary Inspector Parsons upon the condition of well for drinking-water at Grammar School No 66, at Kingsbridge, be forwarded to the Board of Education for the necessary action.

Resolved, That a copy of the report of the Sanitary Superintendent upon the dredging of slip at the foot of West Twenty-third street, be forwarded to the Department of Docks, with the consent of this Board to the postponement of the dredging until cooler weather.

Resolved, That upon the report of the Sanitary Superintendent to the effect that the apparatus of Richard Schelhorn to empty privy vaults, sinks and cesspools, meets the requirements of this Department, the Board respectfully recommends to his Honor the Mayor that a license as scavenger be granted for one year.

Whereas, It is, and is declared to be the opinion of the Board of Health of the Health Department of the City of New York, that the protection of the public health requires the drainage by means other than sewers of the lands hereinafter described; and

Whereas, The drainage of such lands is, in the opinion of said Board, in a condition or in effect dangerous to life and health; therefore

Resolved, That the report of the Sanitary Superintendent upon such lands be filed among the records of this Board, and that the said lands, situate, lying and being between and bounded on the north by Home street, on the east by Prospect avenue and Legget's lane, on the west by Boston and Cauldwell avenues, and the Port Morris Branch Railroad and on the south by Long Island Sound, in the city of New York, be and are hereby declared a public nuisance, dangerous to life and health by reason of the defective drainage thereof, and be and are hereby ordered and directed to be properly drained by the Commissioners of the Public Parks of the City of New York, and that the construction of proper drains for such purpose by said Commissioners be and is hereby directed.

Resolved, That a map be made by the Sanitary Superintendent, wherein shall be shown the location of such proposed drains, and the lands required for the construction thereof, and that such map shall be filed in this Department, and a copy thereof in the office of the Register of the City and County of New York, and that the Secretary of this Board be and is hereby directed to deliver to the said Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks another and further copy of said map, together with a copy of these resolutions, as provided by chapter 360 of the Laws of 1880.

Resolved, That leaves of absence be and are hereby granted as follows:

Frank W. Chapin, from September 4 to September 25, 1880.

James B. Taylor, from August 1 to 14, without pay.

Resolved, That the following orders be enforced by the Sanitary Superintendent:

Resolved, That the application for relief from Orders 12,613, on premises 1470 First avenue, and 12,534, on premises 1466 First avenue, be and is hereby granted, provided the owner stipulates to make the proposed changes with ten months from August 17, 1880.

Resolved, That so much of Order 8,810, on premises 159 East Twenty-eighth street, as requires the construction of a school sink, be and is hereby extended to May 1st, provided the usual stipulation is signed.

Resolved, That Order 13,661, on premises 2021 Fifth avenue, be and is hereby rescinded.

Resolved, That the following orders be and are hereby extended as follows:

Order No. 14,431, on premises 433 West Fiftieth street, two weeks.

Resolved, That all permits for moving manure now existing be cancelled, and such as the Sanitary Superintendent deems proper renewed on or before September 15, 1880; and the Sanitary Superintendent is hereby directed to notify the holders of such permits.

Resolved, That the application for modification of hours for moving manure from stables be and is hereby denied.

The Secretary was directed to write to the Public Administrator in respect to the disposition of certain moneys and other articles received from patients who have since died at Riverside Hospital.

Action of the Board on Tenement-house Plans.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 621-2) for light and ventilation of the five-story tenement-house proposed to be built at No. 332 West Sixteenth street, submitted to this Board by J. J. Campion, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, be and is hereby disapproved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 625-2) for light and ventilation of the three-story tenement-house, 25 feet by 32 feet, proposed to be built in the rear of No. 438 West Thirty-fifth street, submitted to this Board by A. Ward, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, on condition that at least 10 feet of the lot by the full width thereof be left clear in the rear of the said proposed building, and that there be at least 26 feet 9 inches in the clear between the front and the rear house, be and the said plan is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 632-2) for light and ventilation of the tenement-house No. 344 First avenue, as proposed to be altered, submitted to this Board by John Britton, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, on condition that each of the lower floors of said house be so altered as to correspond to the additional story shown on said plan, be and the same is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 635) for light and ventilation of the five-story tenement-house proposed to be built on the north side of Fifty-seventh street, 25 feet east of Tenth avenue, submitted to this Board by Joseph M. Dunn, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, be and is hereby disapproved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 639) for light and ventilation of the tenement-house, 22 feet 6 inches by 69 feet, and five stories high, proposed to be built on a lot 22 feet 6 inches by 75 feet, on the southeast corner of Henry and Montgomery streets, submitted to this Board by George Graham, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, be and is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 640) for light and ventilation of the tenement-house, 25 feet 5 inches by 63 feet 6 inches, and four stories high, with an extension 16 feet 6 inches deep by 20 feet 6 inches wide, proposed to be built on a lot 25 feet 6 inches by 102 feet, on the north side of East Eighty-first street, 295 feet west of Second avenue, submitted to this Board by John C. Burne, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, be and is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 641) for light and ventilation of two tenement-houses, each 25 feet 6 inches by 57 feet, and four stories high, with an extension 15 feet deep and 16 feet wide, proposed to be built on lots each 25 feet 6 inches by 100 feet, on the east side of Second avenue, beginning 50 feet north of Eighty-first street, submitted to this Board by William Fernschild, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, be and is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 642) for light and ventilation of the three-story tenement-house, proposed to be built in the rear of Nos. 604 and 606 Sixth avenue, submitted to this Board by Anthony Pfund, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, be and is hereby disapproved.

Plan No. 643 for light and ventilation of the tenement-house No. 75 East Fourth street, was laid on the table pending an inspection and report on the premises.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 644) for light and ventilation of the four-story tenement-house proposed to be built at No. 252 Delancey street, with the proposed four-story shop in the rear, shown on the plan, submitted to this Board by F. W. Klempt, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, be and is hereby disapproved.

Plans 645 and 646 were laid on the table pending an inspection and report on the premises.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending August 14, 1880. The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,677, as follows, viz.:

2 public buildings, 621 tenement-houses, 80 private dwellings, 127 other dwellings, 23 manufactories and workshops, 12 stores and warehouses, 54 stables, 36 slaughter-houses, 1 lime-kiln, 1 garbage dump, 4 manure dumps, 3 lodging-houses, 1 public sewer, 57 sunken and vacant lots, 1 stream, 1 railroad track, 1 uninhabitable dwelling, 86 yards, courts, and areas, 111 cellars and basements, 121 waste pipes and drains, 244 privies and water-closets, 21 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 18 dangerous stairways, 8 smoky chimneys, 5 cesspools, 1 piggery, 32 other nuisances, together with 5 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 712.

During the past week 158 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 79 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

139 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 38 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 35 houses, 35 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

The Special Disinfecting Corps have disinfected 16 3-10 miles of street gutters, 154 garbage boxes, 4,145 privies, 204 yards, and 173 cellars.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 515 births, 44 still-births, 135 marriages, and 627 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, August 14, 1880; this shows an increase of 5 births and 7 still-births, and a decrease of 4 marriages and 27 deaths when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1879, there was a decrease of 69 births, and an increase of 3 still-births, 17 marriages, and 124 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 2; diphtheria, 3; typhoid fever, 2; malarial fevers, 9; puerperal diseases, 4; diarrhoeal diseases, 43; inanition, 4; pneumonia, 3; aneurism 2; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 3; Bright's disease and nephritis, 9; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 1; croup, 6; whooping cough, 3; erysipelas, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; alcoholism, 4; rheumatism and gout, 1; cancer, 7; phthisis pulmonalis, 20; bronchitis, 2; heart diseases, 2; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 4; convulsions, 7; direct effect of solar heat, 3; apoplexy, 1; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 7; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 1; suicide, 1; and drowning 5. The number of deaths from meningitis and encephalitis, cirrhosis and hepatitis, cyanosis and atelectasis, and premature and preterm births, was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 200 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year; 263 under two years; 310 under five years, and 28 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was 27 less than the number reported during last week, and represent 49.44 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 105 were in institutions, 367 in tenement houses, 137 in houses containing three families or less, 5 in hotels and boarding-houses, 12 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 15 were on the basement floor, 135 on the first, 165 on the second, 110 on the third, 66 on the fourth, 16 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth; 624 were stated to be residents of New York City and 3 non-residents; 49 were stated to be single, 133 married, 60 widowed, and the condition of 385 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 627; still-births, 44; bodies in transitu, 36; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 77 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 515 births, 135 marriages, 44 still-births, 627 deaths, 36 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 36 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths were made, and 1 transcripts of the birth record, 5 of marriage, and 26 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending August 14, 1880, was 74.1 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.867, the mean humidity was 70, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1011, and the total amount of rain-fall was 1.68 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 602 deaths and still-births, or 89.72 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 21; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 261; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 79; Greenwood (undenominational), 39; Lutheran (undenominational), 96; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 10; Evergreen (undenominational), 35; Woodlawn (undenominational), 14; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 10; Union (Methodist Protestant), 8; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 11; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 5; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 6; Washington (undenominational), 7.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending August 7, 1880, was in the following Wards, viz.: First, 9; Second, 1; Third, 2; Fourth, 13; Fifth, 10; Sixth, 16; Seventh, 31; Eighth, 22; Ninth, 29; Tenth, 13; Eleventh, 28; Twelfth, 62; Thirteenth, 19; Fourteenth, 23; Fifteenth, 9; Sixteenth, 14; Seventeenth, 45; Eighteenth, 34; Nineteenth, 100; Twentieth, 38; Twenty-first, 37; Twenty-second, 55; Twenty-third, 8; Twenty-fourth, 5.

The actual mortality for the week ending August 7, 1880, was 623; this is 30 less than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1879, and 5.6 less than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 26.70 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,213,278.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons living, of the estimated or enumerated population, according to the most recent weekly returns of Philadelphia was 17.59; Brooklyn, 24.96; Baltimore, 21.13; Boston, 33.62; New Orleans, 21.04; Cleveland, 29.37; Charleston, 23.71; Dayton, 25.33; Lowell, 29.85; Worcester, 34.34; Cambridge, 31.98; Lawrence, 29.67; Lynn, 40.35; Springfield, 26.16; Dubuque, Iowa, 13. Monthly returns—Toledo, 23.28; Nashville, 36.38; Norfolk, 33.44; St. Paul, 67.10. SIR—There were 627 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, August 14, 1880, which is a decrease of 27, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 124 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1879. The actual mortality for the week ending August 7, 1880, was 623, which is 5.6 below the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 26.70 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,213,278.

BOARD OF STREET OPENING AND IMPROVEMENT.

The Board of Street Opening and Improvement met in the Mayor's office, at 2 P. M., on Wednesday, August 4, 1880.

The following members were present, viz.:—Edward Cooper, Mayor; John Kelly, Comptroller; Allan Campbell, Commissioner of Public Works; John J. Morris, President of the Board of Aldermen.

Absent—James F. Wenman, President Department Public Parks.

The minutes of the meeting held May 18, 1880, were read and approved.

A call signed by all the members of the Board for the present meeting was read and ordered on file.

A certified copy of chapter 159, Laws of 1880, was then read and ordered on file.

Messrs. Franklin Edson, Alexander E. Orr, and William R. Foster, Jr., appeared on behalf of the Produce Exchange, and explained the necessity of closing Marketfield street and opening a new street from Beaver street to Marketfield street.

The meeting then adjourned to meet again in the Mayor's office at 2 P. M., August 5, 1880.

The Board of Street Opening and Improvement met pursuant to adjournment in the Mayor's office at 2 P. M., Thursday, August 5, 1880.

All the members were present except James F. Wenman, President of the Department of Public Parks, who was unavoidably absent.

The Mayor offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Board of Street Opening and Improvement deem it to be for the public interest to alter the map or plan of the City of New York by closing all that portion of Marketfield street, on both sides of which the New York Produce Exchange has acquired title to the land to be used by said Exchange for a new building, the said portion of Marketfield street being that part of said street commencing at Broadway and extending easterly from Broadway to a straight line, which is the prolongation in a southerly direction of a straight line drawn through a point on the southerly side of Beaver street, which is one hundred and fifty-four (154) feet two and a half (2½) inches easterly from the southeast corner of Broadway and Beaver street, and through a point on the northerly side of Marketfield street, which is one hundred and forty-seven (147) feet ten (10) inches from the northeast corner of Marketfield street and Broadway, and propose, in accordance with the authority conferred by chapter 159 of the Laws of 1880, passed April 28, 1880, entitled "An act to facilitate the erection of a new building by the New York Produce Exchange in the City of New York by authorizing the closing of Marketfield street and the sale of a lot of land and building on Stone street, in said city, the property of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York," to alter the map or plan of the City of New York so as to close the said portion of Marketfield street, and to close the same.

The Chairman put the question upon the adoption of the said resolution, which was adopted by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, and the President of the Board of Aldermen—4.

The Mayor offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Board of Street Opening and Improvement deem it to be for the public interest to alter the map or plan of the City of New York so as to lay out and open a new street to extend from Beaver street to Marketfield street, the westerly side of said new street to be a straight line extending from a point on the southerly side of Beaver street one hundred and fifty-four (154) feet two and one-half (2½) inches easterly from the southeast corner of Beaver street and Broadway to a point on the northerly side of Marketfield street, one hundred and forty-seven (147) feet ten (10) inches easterly from the northeast corner of Marketfield street and Broadway; the easterly side of said street be parallel with and twenty-five (25) feet easterly from its westerly side so that the said new street will be of the uniform width of twenty-five (25) feet; and the said Board, in pursuance of authority conferred by chapter 159 of the Laws of 1880, passed April 28, 1880, entitled "An Act to facilitate the erection of a new building by the New York Produce Exchange in the City of New York by authorizing the closing of Marketfield street, and the sale of a lot of land and building on Stone street in said city, the property of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York," propose to alter the map or plan of the City of New York so as to lay out and open the said street, and to lay out and open the same.

The Chairman put the question upon the adoption of the said resolution, which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, and the President of the Board of Aldermen.

The Chairman offered for adoption the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the aforesaid resolutions stating the proposed action of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement in respect to closing a portion of Marketfield street, and in respect to opening a new street from Beaver street to Marketfield street, be laid before the Board of Aldermen, and that full notice of the same be published for ten days in the CITY RECORD.

Resolved, That the Mayor be requested to transmit a copy of the aforesaid resolutions to the Board of Aldermen and to cause their publication in the CITY RECORD.

The Chairman put the question upon the adoption of the said resolutions, which were adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, and the President of the Board of Aldermen.

On motion, all future meetings of the Board were directed to be called by order of the Chairman.

The meeting then adjourned.

CHAPTER 125.

AN ACT in relation to the payment of assessments for local improvements in the City of New York.

Passed May 7, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time before the first day of September, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person liable therefor may pay, to the officer authorized to receive the same, the amount of any assessment for any local improvement in the City of New York, heretofore confirmed and now unpaid, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment and at any time on or after said first day of September, and before the first day of December, eighteen hundred and eighty, any such assessment may be paid as aforesaid, with interest at the rate of nine per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment.

Sec. 2. Where any installment or installments of any assessments have been paid under the provisions of chapter one hundred and three of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-six, or of chapter one hundred and fifty-nine of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, or of chapter two hundred and fifty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, the amount of such assessment or assessments remaining unpaid may be paid within the same periods prescribed in the first section of this act and upon the same terms and conditions therein prescribed.

Sec. 3. Upon such payment in full, as hereinbefore provided, such assessment or assessments shall cease to be a lien upon the property, and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged; and there shall be no further interest or penalty by reason of such assessment or assessments not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute heretofore requiring the payment of any penalty or interest over the rate hereinbefore provided for upon any unpaid assessment.

Sec. 4. No provision of this act hereinbefore contained shall be construed as applicable to or affecting any assessment for the collection of which assessment the property has been sold.

Sec. 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

ARREARS OF TAXES.

NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS.

THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW York hereby gives notice to owners of Real Estate in said city, that, as provided by chapter 123 of the Laws of 1880, they may now pay any arrears of taxes and Croton water rents levied prior to the year 1877, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per cent. per annum. If, however, such taxes and Croton water rents are not paid before the first day of October next, the property on which they are due will be sold for taxes immediately thereafter, with the addition of accrued interest thereon at the rate of 12 per cent. per annum from the respective dates on which they were levied.

CHAPTER 123.

AN ACT in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring 12 per centum heretofore of any penalty or interest over seven per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
