#### AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 78 Tribune Building, Wednesday, January 28, 1885, at 3 o'clock P.M.

Commissioners present—The Mayor, the Comptroller, Commissioner of Public Works, Commissioners James C. Spencer, William Dowd, and C. C. Baldwin.

SIR—There were 677 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, January 31, 1885, which is an increase of 27, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 93 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1884. The actual mortality for the week ending January 24, 1885, was 654, which is 6.4 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.64 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,379,987.
