Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending November 21, 1885 :

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 6,356. The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 724.

During the past week 280 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 39 permits. There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 4 permits. There were issued under the Sanitary Code, 9 miscellaneous permits. There were issued to scavengers, to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 94 permits. At premises where contagious diseases were reported 49 visits were made, and 13 disinfections, and 11 fumpations were performed. and 11 fumigations were performed.

The number of cases of contagious diseases removed to Riverside Hospital was 9. The number of vaccinations performed was 3,415, of which 1,962 were primary and 1,453. re-vaccinations.

There were seized and condemned 7,935 pounds of meat and 1.850 pounds of fish. The number of specimens of milk examined was 146, the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 7, the number of arrests made was 3, and the amount of fines imposed was \$50.

The certificates of 545 births, 62 still-births, 249 marriages and 557 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bareau during the week ending Saturday, November 21, 1885. This shows a decrease of 56 births, 102 marriages and 5 deaths, and an increase of 5 still-births, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1884, there was a decrease of 62 births, 5 still-births, 19 marriages and 46 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the pre-ceding week, the deaths from diphtheria decreased 2; croup, 3; whooping cough, 8; malarial fevers, 2; inanition, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 9; pneumonia, 17; aneurism, 1; meningitis and encephalitis, 5; convulsions, 8; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 4; Bright's disease and nephritis, 8; cyanosis and atelectasis, 3; premature and preternatural births, 2; drowning, 1; while the deaths from small-pox increased 2; scarlatina, 4; erysipelas, 3; typhus fever, 2; typhoid fever, 4; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; diarthœal diseases, 9; cancer, 4; bronchitis, 3; heart diseases, 9; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 5; apoplexy, 10; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 4; gastritis, enteritis and peretonitis, 2; surgical operations, 1; and suicide, 2. The number of deaths from measles, puerperal diseases, rheumatism and gout, and hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis was the same in the two successive weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 113 were in institutions, 292 in tenement-houses, 135 in houses containing three families or less, 12 in hotels and boarding-houses, 5 in rivers, streets, boats, etc. ; 9 were on the basement floor, 93 on the first, 154 on the second, 107 on the third, 64 on the fourth, 12 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth ; 557 were stated to be residents of New York City and 0 non-resident, 57 were stated to be single, 157 married, 58 widowed, and the condition of 285 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz. : City deaths, 557 ; still-births, 62 ; bodies in transitu, 13 ; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 69 were upon certificates received from the Coroners ; 545 births, 249 marriages, 62 still-births, 557 deaths, 13 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated ; 101 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths were made, and 10 transcripts of the birth record, 7 of marriage and 56 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending November 21, 1885, was 42.7 degrees Fahrenheit, the mean reading of the barometer was 297.50; the mean humidity was 62, saturation being too; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,339, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.01 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.
