The offs deaths represent a death-rate of 20.24, against 20.06 for the previous week, and 21.25 for the corresponding week of 1888. The deaths varied little in number from those of the previous week. There was a decrease of 5 in the deaths from whooping-cough, of 7 from diarrhoeal diseases, of 7 from cancer, of 24 from diseases of the digestive system, and of 9 from violence. There was an increase of 16 in the deaths from phthisis, and 14 from pneumonia. The decrease of diarrhoeal diseases was most marked in the Twenty-second Ward, and the increase of pneumonia in the same ward.

UNDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS 350, 351, 352 and 353, and as amended by chapter 559, Laws 1887, as follows: "The commissioner of public works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now provided by law, and which shall be apportioned to different classes of buildings in said city in reference to their dimensions, values, exposure to fires, ordnary uses for dwellings, stores, shops, private stables and other common purposes, number of families or occupants, or consumption of water, as near as may be practicable, and modity, alter, amend and increase such scale from time to

time, and extend it to other descriptions of buildings and establishments. All extra charges for touter shall be deemed to be included in the regular rents, and shall become a charge and lien upon the buildings upon which they are restectively imposed, and, if not paid, shall be returned as arrears to the clerk of arrears. Such regular rents, including the extra charges above mentioned, shall be collected from the owners or occu-pants of all such buildings respectively, which shall be stuated upon lots adjoining any street or avenue in said city in which the distributing water-pipes are or may be laid, and from which they can be supplied with water. #### NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or relates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by de-fective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., with-out the knowledge or consent of the owners of the prem-ises.

ises. The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and un-this Department to detect and check the useless and un-warrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this ob-ject can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this ob-ject can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted. Under the law all charges for water supplied througn meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises re-sponsible for the amount of water used or wasted. Notice is therefore invent to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water of water of allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occu-pants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have o, curred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings. House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will he allowed for any portion of one year.
