

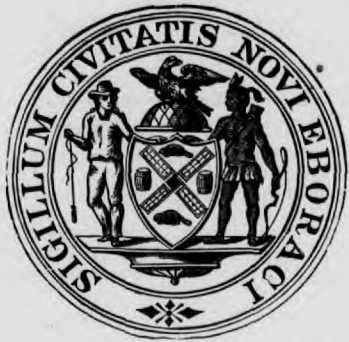

To the Board of Docks:

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to submit the following report of work done under my supervision for the quarter ending October 31, 1894.

#### WORK OF CONSTRUCTION UNDER NEW PLAN.

##### NORTH RIVER.

CLEANING PAVEMENT.—The pavement on new made land between Pier "A" and West Tenth street, North river, has been cleaned, from time to time, as required, under resolution of the Board May 12, 1892.

Dey Street Section—Resolution of the Board, February 21, 1894.

##### BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

STONE FILLING—Cobble and rip-rap stone was discharged on wall, under Contract No. 475. PILING AND WOODWORK—Chocks were placed; longitudinal and transverse caps were placed and fastened, and decking was also laid and fastened.

MASONRY—5 concrete blocks were set on wall; 193 pieces of granite were set and backed up with 484 batches of concrete; chain-holes were filled with concrete, in bags, and joints in granite were cleaned out and pointed.

West Washington Market Section—Resolution of the Board, July 9, 1891.

##### BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

STONE FILLING—Cobble was discharged between caps. PILING AND WOODWORK—Deck planking was laid and fastened.



MASONRY—7 pieces of granite were set and backed up with 18 batches of concrete, and joints in granite were cleaned out and pointed.

EARTH FILLING—1,274 loads of earth filling were received from Thomas Smith and same were placed in rear of wall.

#### PIER, NEW 13, N. R.

The work of building Pier, new 13, North river, was commenced on August 13, 1894, by Mr. John H. Starin. The work done consisted in driving piles for the inner 100 feet of the pier and the placing and fastening of cross and side caps and rangers thereon. In progress.

#### Warren Street Section—Resolution of the Board, May 25, 1893.

##### BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

STONE FILLING—Cobble and rip-rap stone was discharged between caps, under Contract No. 475.

PILING AND WOODWORK—6 vertical and 30 bracing piles were driven and regulated; 2 binding frames were made and sunk to place; longitudinal and transverse caps were placed and fastened, and deck was also laid and fastened.

MASONRY—7 concrete blocks were set on wall, and chain-holes were filled with concrete in bags; 86 pieces of granite were set and backed up with 207½ batches of concrete, and joints in granite were cleaned out and pointed.

Old platform in rear of wall was removed.

EARTH FILLING—6,839 loads of earth filling were received from Brown & Fleming, and same were placed in rear of wall.

#### PIER, NEW 19, N. R.

The work of building Pier, new 19, North river, under resolution of the Board June 1, 1893, is in progress.

#### PAVEMENT BETWEEN PIERS, NEW 24 AND 25, N. R.

The paving of the new made land between Piers, new 24 and 25, North river, under Contract No. 472, commenced on August 21, 1894, was completed on October 4, 1894.

#### PAVING IN VICINITY OF PIERS, NEW 27, 28 AND 29, N. R.

The paving of the new made land in the vicinity of Piers, new 27, 28 and 29, North river, under Contract No. 476, commenced on August 10, 1894, was completed on October 23, 1894.

#### Laight Street Section—Resolution of the Board, September 20, 1889.

EARTH FILLING—671 loads of earth filling were received from Brown & Fleming, and same were placed in rear of wall. Total received to date, 62,314 loads.

#### PIER AT WEST NINETEENTH STREET.

The above pier is being extended, under resolution of the Board April 20, 1894. Is in progress.

#### FERRY-RACK NORTH OF WEST TWENTY-THIRD STREET.

The extension of the above Ferry-rack was completed on September 8, 1894.

#### West Twenty-third Street Section—Resolution of the Board, November 5, 1880.

##### BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

MASONRY—Old joints in granite at foot of West Twenty-fourth street were grouted.

#### PIER, NEW 53, N. R.

The work of building Pier, new 53, North river, under resolution of the Board, February 1, 1894, is in progress.

#### West Twenty-third Street Section, South End—Resolution of the Board, November 5, 1880.

EARTH FILLING—716 loads of earth filling were received from Thomas E. Crimmins, and same were placed in rear of wall. Total received to date, 20,639 loads.

#### PAVING BETWEEN PIERS, NEW 53 AND 54, N. R.

The new made land between Piers, new 53 and 54, North river, is being paved under Contract No. 482.

#### West Twenty-third Street Section, North End—Resolution of the Board, June 28, 1882.

EARTH FILLING—831 loads of earth filling were received from Thomas Smith, and same were placed in rear of wall. Total received to date, 1,496 loads.

#### West Forty-third Street Section—Resolution of the Board, September 3, 1891.

EARTH FILLING—180 loads of earth filling were received from Thomas Smith, and same were placed in rear of wall. Total received to date, 3,655 loads.

#### West Fifty-second Street Section, North End—Resolution of the Board, February 6, 1889.

##### BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

Mud was pumped from rock bottom.

STONE FILLING—Rip-rap was discharged in rear of wall under Contract No. 475; 212½ batches of concrete in bags and 82 batches of concrete in mass were placed; 38 concrete blocks were set and chain-holes between blocks were filled with concrete in bags; 98 pieces of granite were set and backed up with 132 batches of concrete and joints in granite were cleaned out and pointed.

#### EAST RIVER.

#### Stanton Street Section—Resolution of the Board, March 1, 1893.

##### BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

STONE FILLING—Cobble and rip-rap stone were deposited on wall foundation under Treasurer's orders therefor.

MASONRY—22 concrete foundation blocks were set and chain holes between the blocks were filled with concrete in bags; 165 pieces of granite were set and backed up with 258 batches of concrete; 3 pieces of coping-stone were set on "E" course of wall and joints in the granite were cleaned out and pointed.

EARTH FILLING—5,214 loads of earth filling were received from Brown & Fleming, and same were placed in rear of wall under Secretary's Order No. 13926. Total received to date, 22,442 loads.

DREDGING—10,694 cubic yards of mud were excavated and removed from slip between Piers foot of East Twenty-fourth and East Twenty-fifth streets, under Contract No. 477.

#### East Twenty-fifth Street Section—Resolution of the Board, October 27, 1892.

##### BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

DREDGING—1,198 cubic yards of mud were excavated and removed from in front of wall, under Contract No. 477.

STONE FILLING—1,135 cubic yards of rip-rap stone were deposited on wall foundation by Brown & Fleming, under Contract No. 475.

MASONRY—18 pieces of granite were set on wall and backed up with 34 batches of concrete; 13 pieces of coping stone were set on "E" course of wall, and joints in granite were cleaned out and pointed.

EARTH FILLING—2,900 loads of earth filling were received from Thomas Smith, and same were placed in rear of wall.

DREDGING—18,803 cubic yards of mud were excavated and removed from slip foot of East Twenty-fifth and East Twenty-sixth streets, under Contract No. 477.

#### Bellevue Section—Resolution of the Board, April 25, 1889.

##### BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

STONE FILLING—75 cubic yards of rip-rap stone were deposited in front of wall by Brown & Fleming, under Contract No. 475.

#### BETWEEN EAST FORTY-NINTH AND EAST FIFTY-THIRD STREETS.

Test piles were driven to ascertain the nature of the river bottom.

#### PIER AT EAST SIXTIETH STREET.

The work of building a new pier at the foot of East Sixtieth street, under Contract No. 480, is in progress.

#### PIER AT EAST SIXTY-FIRST STREET.

The work of building a new pier at the foot of East Sixty-first street, under Contract No. 481, is in progress.

#### East Ninety-first Street Section—Resolution of the Board, May 25, 1893.

##### BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

STONE FILLING—1,046 cubic yards of rip-rap stone was deposited on wall foundation by Brown & Fleming, under Contract No. 475.

FILLING IN REAR OF WALL—2,261 loads of rip-rap stone were received from John D. Crimmins, and same were placed about close row of piles to hold filling in place.

#### PIER AT EAST NINETY-FIRST STREET.

The work of building a new pier at the foot of East Ninety-first street was completed under Secretary's Order No. 13905, on October 15, 1894.

#### East Ninety-sixth Street Section—Resolution of the Board, October 31, 1889.

EARTH FILLING—50 loads of earth filling were received from McManus & Quinn, and same were placed in rear of wall. Total received to date, 30,106 loads.

#### East Ninety-ninth Street Section—Resolution of the Board, September 1, 1892.

EARTH FILLING—3,621 loads of earth filling were received from William F. Cunningham, under Secretary's Order No. 13700, and same were placed in rear of wall. Total received to date, 6,063 loads.

#### East One Hundred and Second Street Section—Resolution of the Board, May 21, 1891.

##### BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

STONE FILLING—193 cubic yards of rip-rap stone were received from Brown & Fleming, and same were deposited in front of wall, under Contract No. 475.

EARTH FILLING—3,100 loads of earth filling were received from John D. Crimmins, under Secretary's Order No. 13701, and same were placed in rear of wall. Total received to date, 21,650 loads.

TEMPORARY SEWER-BOX—A temporary sewer-box was placed on new made land between East One Hundred and Third and East One Hundred and Fourth streets, to drain off the water.

#### DEPARTMENT YARDS.

##### West Fifty-seventh Street Yard.

The blacksmith has made and repaired iron work for the different sections of the work, for floating property and for general repairs.

Two standard blocks, containing 43.77 cubic yards of concrete; 24 special blocks, containing 912.00 cubic yards; 3 7-foot special base blocks, containing 76.98 cubic yards, and 16 6-foot special base blocks, containing 351.84 cubic yards, were made.

2,500 barrels of Atlas Portland cement, under Contract No. 479, were received and stored, and samples tested and results recorded.

The work of building stone and sand bins has been completed.

The yard has been maintained in good order and condition.

##### East Twenty-fourth Street Yard.

Moulds and cores were set up and taken down, as required, and 19 standard "B" blocks were made, containing 736 cubic yards of concrete.

Iron work was made and repaired by blacksmiths, for construction work on the East river, for Riker's Island, and for maintenance of yard.

2,500 barrels of Portland cement were received and stored for Department use, under Contract No. 479, and samples sent to West Fifty-seventh Street Yard to be tested.

The yard has been maintained in good order and condition.

#### FLOATING PROPERTY.

The Floating Property of the Department consists of the following: 100-ton derrick "City of New York," 12-ton derrick, No. 1, 12-ton derrick, No. 2, 12-ton derrick, No. 3, 10-ton derrick, tug "Manhattan," tug "Pier"; 16 pile-drivers, Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15 and 16; 16 deck scows, "B," "C," "D," "E," "F," "H," "I," "K," "L," "M," "N," "O," "P," "R," "S" and "U"; 5 divers' scows, "A," "G," "N," "S" and "T"; boring-machine "Woodcock"; 2 naphtha engine launches, Nos. 1 and 2; steam launch "Inspector"; 28 yawl boats, 1 skiff, 2 batteaux, 1 row-boat and 6 sounding boats; 2 sets of land-ways, one 30 feet and one 45 feet high; 1 set inclined 50 feet pile-driver ways.

100-ton Derrick "City of New York"—Has handled blocks for the various sections of the bulkhead-wall, as required. 12-ton Derrick No. 1—This derrick has been kept in repair and is at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard. 12-ton Derrick No. 2—This derrick has been kept in repair and is now at work on the East River Sections. 12-ton Derrick No. 3—This derrick has been in commission during the quarter and has been repaired and in use on the various sections of the work. 10-ton Derrick—This derrick has been in commission during the quarter and has been repaired and in use on the various sections of the work.

Tugs "Manhattan" and "Pier"—These tugs have been employed off and on during the quarter in the work of towing for the Department.

Naphtha Engine Launches—These launches have been in use from time to time during the quarter in examinations of the water-front and in carrying tools and small parcels to the different parts of the work.

Steam-launch "Inspector"—Various repairs have been made to the launch "Inspector" from time to time, and she has been in use during the quarter.

The various scows have been kept in good order; the deck scows have been kept in use; the small boats, skiffs, etc., have been kept in good order and condition.

##### Materials and Supplies.

Various materials and supplies for the use of floating property have been received and expended in part, and the remainder has been stored for future use.

##### Miscellaneous.

Various pieces of work have been done at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard for the use of floating property and for other work, such as hanging fenders, straight edges, ladders, pike poles, etc. The force of the Department has also been engaged in filing saws, spinning oakum, pitch, pumping out scows and in general care of floating property.

#### WORK OF CONSTRUCTION NOT UNDER NEW PLAN.

##### Bulkhead, One Hundred and Thirty-eighth to One Hundred and Fortieth Street, H. R.

5,203 loads of earth filling were received under Secretary's Order No. 11226, and same were placed behind the above bulkhead. Total received to date, 76,005 loads.

##### Riker's Island.

Rip-rap stone was delivered and deposited in the crib-work under Contract No. 449. A small pier for landing purposes was completed August 6, 1894.

Test-piles were driven and borings taken to determine the nature of the river bottom for information in preparing plans and specifications for building a crib-bulkhead on the easterly side of the island.

#### SURVEYING PARTY.

In connection with the work of the bulkhead or river wall at the various sections of the North, East and Harlem rivers, bench marks and base lines have been frequently verified, and from them lines, grades, etc., have also been furnished from time to time, as required.

Lines, grades, etc., have been furnished for the work of repairs under contract.

Surveys of the water-front on the North, East and Harlem rivers, and the structures thereon, have been made at various places, as required, and the same have been plotted and placed on file, and tracings therefrom have been prepared and plotted.

1,802 disc soundings, to ascertain the depth of water, have been taken in 76 slips, and 5,079 rod soundings, to ascertain the depth of soft mud, have been taken in 12 slips by the Surveying and Sounding Parties; of which 6,252 disc soundings in 30 slips, and 420 rod soundings in 5 slips were on the North river; and 18,023 disc soundings in 46 slips, and 4,659 rod soundings in 7 slips were on the East and Harlem rivers.

Of the above, 4,899 disc soundings in 6 slips and 4,217 rod soundings in 2 slips were for construction, and 13,124 disc soundings in 80 slips and 862 rod soundings in 10 slips were for general repairs and examinations. Soundings taken before and after dredging.

Of the soundings above reported, 2,566 disc soundings in 11½ slips were taken on the North, East and Harlem rivers.

Most of the soundings have been plotted and placed on file.

All the dredging done by the Department of Docks during the quarter has been supervised. The dredging done by lessees, claimants and others under permit or order of the Board of Docks has been attended to.

The measurements of all material dredged by the Department of Docks has been made.

Reports, estimates, etc., of work done have been prepared and receipts given.

Work other than dredging by lessees, claimants and others by order or permit of the Board of Docks, has been supervised.

The automatic tide-gauges on the Harlem river, Port Morris, Pier "A" and West Fifty-seventh Street Yard, on the North river, and at East Twenty-fourth Street Yard, East river, have been attended to.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Twelfth Ward, from measles in the Nineteenth Ward, and from scarlet fever in the Eighth Ward.

Any person making an estimate for the work shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope to said Board, at said office, on or before the day and hour above named, which envelope shall be indorsed with the name or names of the person or persons presenting the same, the date of its presentation, and a statement of the work to which it relates.

The bidder to whom the award is made shall give security for the faithful performance of the contract, in the manner prescribed and required by ordinance, in the sum of Seventeen Hundred Dollars.

6. Labor of Framing and Carpentry, including all moving of Timber, Jointing, Planing, Bolting, Spiking, Painting, Oiling or Tarring, and furnishing the materials for Painting, Oiling or Tarring, and labor of every description.
7. Labor of removing so much old material from Pier, new 15, North river, near the foot of Vessey street, as is to be removed under this contract, and of removing all the old material from the premises.

N. B.—As the above-mentioned quantities, though stated with as much accuracy as is possible, in advance, are approximate only, bidders are required to submit their estimates upon the following express conditions, which shall apply to and become a part of every estimate received:

No extra compensation, beyond the amount payable for the work before mentioned, which shall be actually performed at the price therefor, to be specified by the lowest bidder, shall be due or payable for the entire work.

The work to be done under the contract is to be commenced within five days after the date of the execution of the contract, and all the work to be done under this contract is to be fully completed on or before the 30th day of April, 1895, and the damages to be paid by the contractor for each day that the contract may be unfulfilled after the time fixed for the fulfillment thereof has expired, are, by a clause in the contract, fixed and liquidated at Fifty Dollars per day.

The person or persons to whom the contract may be awarded will be required to attend at this office with the sureties offered by him or them, and execute the contract within five days from the date of the service of a notice to that effect; and in case of failure or neglect so to do, he or they will be considered as having abandoned it, and as in default to the Corporation, and the contract will be readvertised and relet, and so on until it be accepted and executed.

Where more than one person is interested, it is requisite that the verification be made and subscribed to by all the parties interested.
