

BOARD OF PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS.

The Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York met at the office of the Board, No. 21 Park row, on Wednesday, October 10, 1900, at 2 o'clock P. M., pursuant to notice.

The roll was called, and the following members were present and answered to their names:

The Comptroller (Deputy Comptroller Levey), the Commissioner of Water Supply, the Commissioner of Highways, the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, the Commissioner of Bridges, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond. The President, Hon. Maurice F. Holahan, presided.

The minutes of the meeting of October 3, 1900, were approved as printed.

PARK BOUNDED BY BERRY, NASSAU, LEONARD AND NORTH TWELFTH STREETS AND UNION AVENUE, BROOKLYN.

In the matter of the proposed laying out of a public park bounded by Berry street, Nassau street, Leonard street, Union avenue and North Twelfth street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, the report of the Secretary was read, showing that the matter had been duly advertised for a hearing

as required by law.

After hearing Senator McCarren, Mr. Palmer, the Commissioner of Bridges and the President of the borough in favor of the proposed park, nobody appearing in opposition, the following reso-

After hearing Senator McCarren, Mr. Palmer, the Commissioner of Bridges and the President of the borough in favor of the proposed park, nobody appearing in opposition, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board, held on the 14th day of September, 1900, resolutions were adopted proposing to alter the map or plan of The City of New York, by laying out as a public park the territory bounded by Berry street, Nassau street, Leonard street, Bayard street, Union avenue and North Twelfth street, in the Fourteenth, Fifteenth and Seventeenth Wards, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, and for a meeting of this Board to be held in the office of this Board on the 10th day of October, 1900, at 2 o'clock P. M., at which meeting such proposed laying out would be considered by this Board, and for a notice to all persons affected thereby, of the aforesaid time and place, at which such proposed laying out would be considered, to be published in the CITY RECORD and the corporation newspapers for at least ten days continuously, exclusive of Sundays and legal holidays, prior to the 10th day of October, 1900; and Whereas, It appears from the affidavit of the Supervisor of the City Record, and of the publishers of the corporation newspapers, that the aforesaid resolutions and notice have been published in the CITY RECORD and the corporation newspapers for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 10th day of October, 1900; and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place a public hearing was given to all persons affected by such proposed laying out who have appeared, and such proposed laying out was duly considered by this Board; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out as a public park the territory bounded by Berry street, Nassau street, Leonard

together with a statement of its reasons therefor, be transmitted to the Municipal Assembly for its action thereon.

Affirmative—Comptroller, Commissioner of Water Supply, Commissioner of Highways, Commissioner of Street Cleaning, Commissioner of Bridges, President of the Borough of Brooklyn and President of the Board.

Negative-None.

In connection with the foregoing resolution, the following form of ordinance was approved for transmission to the Municipal Assembly:

IN MUNICIPAL ASSEMBLY.

Be it Ordained by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, as follows:

That, in pursuance of section 436 of the Greater New York Charter, the following resolution of the Board of Public Improvements, adopted by that Board on the 10th day of October, 1900, be and the same hereby is approved, viz.:

Sir—In reply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements, referring for report a communication from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, recommending that the map or plan of The City of New York be altered by changing the grade of Seventy-fifth street (known also as Bay Ridge parkway), between Seventh avenue and Tenth avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, the accompanying map was prepared for public hearing and adoption, and is entitled "Plan and Profile showing change of grades in Seventy-fifth street, from Sixth avenue to Eleventh avenue, in the Thirtieth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn."

The recommendation of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn limits the change of grade to Seventh avenue and Tenth avenue, and since the block between Seventh avenue and Sixth avenue.

Seventh avenue and Tenth avenue, and since the block between Seventh avenue and Sixth avenue and from Tenth avenue to Eleventh avenue are also affected, the map was extended to Sixth

avenue and to Eleventh avenue. Seventy-fifth street is 100 feet wide and has been graded between Seventh and Tenth avenues, and the sidewalks are laid from Seventh avenue to about 200 feet west of Tenth avenue.

There seems to have been some attempt to grade according to official grades between Seventh avenue and Fort Hamilton avenue, but between Fort Hamilton avenue and Tenth avenue the roadway and sidewalk are on the natural surface.

The purport of this map of change of the grades of Seventy-fifth street is to adopt the grades

more to existing conditions, and is therefore recommended.
