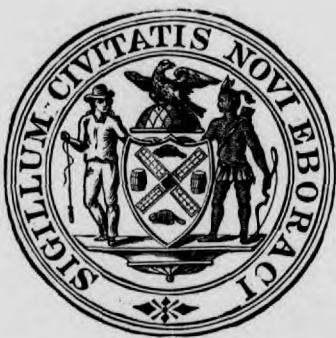

BOARD OF PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS.

The Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York met at the office of the Board, No. 21 Park row, on Wednesday, October 10, 1900, at 2 o'clock P. M., pursuant to notice.

The roll was called, and the following members were present and answered to their names :
The Comptroller (Deputy Comptroller Levey), the Commissioner of Water Supply, the Commissioner of Highways, the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, the Commissioner of Bridges, the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond.

The minutes of the meeting of October 3, 1900, were approved as printed.

PARK BOUNDED BY BERRY, NASSAU, LEONARD AND NORTH TWELFTH STREETS AND UNION AVENUE. BROOKLYN.

In the matter of the proposed laying out of a public park bounded by Berry street, Nassau street, Leonard street, Union avenue and North Twelfth street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, the report of the Secretary was read, showing that the matter had been duly advertised for a hearing as required by law.

After hearing Senator McCarren, Mr. Palmer, the Commissioner of Bridges and the President of the borough in favor of the proposed park, nobody appearing in opposition, the following resolution was adopted :

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board, held on the 14th day of September, 1900, resolutions were adopted proposing to alter the map or plan of The City of New York, by laying out as public park the territory bounded by Berry street, Nassau street, Leonard street, Bayard street, Union avenue and North Twelfth street, in the Fourteenth, Fifteenth and Seventeenth Wards, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, and for a meeting of this Board to be held in the office of this Board on the 10th day of October, 1900, at 2 o'clock P.M., at which meeting such proposed laying out would be considered by this Board, and for a notice to all persons affected thereby, of the aforesaid time and place, at which such proposed laying out would be considered, to be published in the CITY RECORD and the corporation newspapers for at least ten days continuously, exclusive of Sundays and legal holidays, prior to the 10th day of October, 1900; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavit of the Supervisor of the City Record, and of the publishers of the corporation newspapers, that the aforesaid resolutions and notice have been published in the CITY RECORD and the corporation newspapers for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 10th day of October, 1930: and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place a public hearing was given to all persons affected by such proposed laying out who have appeared, and such proposed laying out was duly considered by this Board; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1807, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out as a public park the territory bounded by Berry street, Nassau street, Leonard street, Bayard street, Union avenue and North Twelfth street, in the Fourteenth, Fifteenth and Seventeenth Wards, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same, so as to lay out as a public park the aforesaid territory.

Resolved, That the foregoing resolution, approving of the above-named proposed change in the map or plan of The City of New York, by laying out a public park, adopted by this Board,

together with a statement of its reasons therefor, be transmitted to the Municipal Assembly for its action thereon.

M., at which meeting such proposed closing and laying-out and grades would be considered by this Board, and for a notice to all persons affected thereby of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed closing and laying-out and grades would be considered, to be published in the CITY RECORD and the corporation newspapers for at least ten days continuously, exclusive of Sundays and legal holidays, prior to the 10th day of October, 1900: and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavit of the Supervisor of the City Record, and of the publishers of the corporation newspapers, that the aforesaid resolutions and notice have been published in the CITY RECORD and the corporation newspapers for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 10th day of October, 1900 : and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place a public hearing was given to all persons affected by such proposed closing and laying-out and grades who have appeared, and such proposed closing and laying out and grades was duly considered by this Board ; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by the closing and discontinuing of East Fifteenth street and East Sixteenth street, from Avenue H to Foster avenue, and the laying-out, and the grades of DeKoven court, Waldorf court and Wellington court, from East Fourteenth street to the westerly line of the Brooklyn and Brighton Beach Railroad, and from the easterly line of the Brooklyn and Brighton Beach Railroad to East Seventeenth street, and of Irvington place, from the easterly line of the Brooklyn and Brighton Beach Railroad to East Seventeenth street, in the Thirtieth and Thirty-first Wards, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same, so as to close and lay out and fix the grades of the aforesaid streets, as follows:

First—Change of grade of Hughes avenue, between East One Hundred and Eighty-first street and Kingsbridge road, to conform to the grades on which twenty-five houses are built on both sides of Hughes avenue.

Second—Change of grade of East One Hundred and Eightieth street, between Third avenue and La Fontaine avenue.

Profiles were made in both cases, and if the matter is approved by the Local Board and referred to the Board of Public Improvements, an early report from the Topographical Bureau can be expected.

In relation to the petition of extending East One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street, from Webster avenue to Clay avenue, I wish to say that the proposed extension runs through the land which is not owned by the petitioners, and it would be well to request that the petitioners secure the consent of the owners of the land affected by this extension.

I return the letter of the Secretary of the Local Board of the Borough of the Bronx, also all petitions which were submitted by him.

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out an approach to the Willis Avenue Bridge over the Harlem river, on the block bounded by First and Second avenues and East One Hundred and Twenty-sixth and East One Hundred and Twenty-seventh streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same, so as to lay out an approach to the aforesaid bridge, as follows:

Beginning at the northeast house corner of Second avenue and One Hundred and Twenty-sixth street ;
 1st. Thence northerly along the eastern house-line of Second avenue for 199.83 feet to the southern house-line of East One Hundred and Twenty-seventh street ;
 2d. Thence easterly along the southern house-line of East One Hundred and Twenty-seventh street for 615.0 feet to the western house-line of First avenue ;
 3d. Thence south rly along the western house-line of First avenue for 199.83 feet to the northern house-line of East One Hundred and Twenty-sixth street ;
 4th. Thence westerly along the northern house-line of East One Hundred and Twenty-sixth street for 615.0 feet to the point of beginning.

Adopted by the Council April 3, 1900, two-thirds of all the members elected voting in favor thereof, having been first advertised, as required by law.

CHANGE OF GRADE OF SEVENTY-FIFTH STREET, BROOKLYN.

The following report from the Topographical Engineer was read, and the matter was referred to the Local Board :

TOPOGRAPHICAL BUREAU, October 9, 1900.

Mr. JOHN H. MOONEY, Secretary, Board of Public Improvements :

SIR—In reply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements, referring for report a communication from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, recommending that the map or plan of The City of New York be altered by changing the grade of Seventy-fifth street (known also as Bay Ridge parkway), between Seventh avenue and Tenth avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, the accompanying map was prepared for public hearing and adoption, and is entitled "Plan and Profile showing change of grades in Seventy-fifth street, from Sixth avenue to Eleventh avenue, in the Thirtieth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn."

The recommendation of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn limits the change of grade to Seventh avenue and Tenth avenue, and since the block between Seventh avenue and Sixth avenue and from Tenth avenue to Eleventh avenue are also affected, the map was extended to Sixth avenue and to Eleventh avenue.

Seventy-fifth street is 100 feet wide and has been graded between Seventh and Tenth avenues, and the sidewalks are laid from Seventh avenue to about 200 feet west of Tenth avenue.

There seems to have been some attempt to grade according to official grades between Seventh avenue and Fort Hamilton avenue, but between Fort Hamilton avenue and Tenth avenue the roadway and sidewalk are on the natural surface.

The purport of this map of change of the grades of Seventy-fifth street is to adopt the grades more to existing conditions, and is therefore recommended.

- 12th. Thence southerly for 82.42 feet to the right on the arc of a circle whose radius is 132.22 feet;
- 13th. Thence southerly on a line tangent to the arc of the preceding course at its point of ending for 380.78 feet;
- 14th. Thence easterly deflecting 77 degrees 23 minutes 42 seconds to the left for 122.29 feet;
- 15th. Thence northerly deflecting 101 degrees 06 minutes to the left for 310.33 feet;
- 16th. Thence northerly 95.46 feet to the right on the arc of a circle whose radius is 300 feet;
- 17th. Thence easterly 15.29 feet to the right on the arc of a circle whose radius is 10.21 feet;
- 18th. Thence easterly on a line tangent to the arc of the preceding course at its point of ending 206.91 feet;
- 19th. Thence northerly deflecting 99 degrees 16 minutes 6 seconds to the left for 17.59 feet along the westerly side of Minneford avenue to the point of beginning.

Therefore be it

Resolved, That this Board does hereby select the lands and premises hereinbefore particularly described for the purpose of the construction, maintenance and operation of said bridge and approaches, and does hereby determine to take proceedings for the acquisition of title thereto by The City of New York, for the use of the public, and to acquire title in fee to said parcels of land.

Resolved, That the two similar surveys, maps or plans of said bridge, its approaches and the lands and premises required therefor, as above described, made by the Commissioner of Bridges, be certified by the Chairman of this Board, and that the Secretary of this Board be and he hereby is directed to file said surveys, maps or plans, with the surveys, maps or plans filed on the 19th day of April, 1899, as follows: One in the office of this Board, and one in the office of the Register of the County of New York as required by law, and that the Corporation Counsel be and he hereby is authorized and requested to take such proceedings under the provisions of chapter 21 of the Greater New York Charter as may be necessary or proper for the acquisition and vesting of title to said lands and premises for said purpose, as hereinbefore provided for.

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements, deeming it for the public interest that the title to the lands and premises described in the foregoing resolution and all interests therein, should be acquired by The City of New York at a fixed or specified time, does hereby direct that at a date four months after the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners of Estimate who may be appointed by the Supreme Court in proceedings to acquire title to said lands and premises, the title to said lands and premises, and all interests therein, shall vest in The City of New York.

REPORTS FROM TOPOGRAPHICAL ENGINEER.

The following report from the Topographical Engineer was read :

TOPOGRAPHICAL BUREAU, October 4, 1900.

Mr. JOHN H. MOONEY, Secretary, Board of Public Improvements :

SIR—In reply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements, referring for investigation and report a communication from the Commissioner of Sewers, transmitting amendments to Sewerage District No. 37 U, for sewerage in East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, from the Harlem river to Exterior street, and at the intersection of East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street and Exterior street, the accompanying map entitled “Modified plan of drainage, showing the location, size and grades of sewers in East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, between Exterior Street and the East River, designated Sewerage District No. 37 ‘U,’ is herewith transmitted for adoption by the Board of Public Improvements.

This change of sewerage plans was rendered necessary by the construction of the bridge approach over the Harlem river and the construction of the Rapid Transit Tunnel, which crosses the Harlem river at this point.

The proposed plan agrees substantially with the map submitted by the Commissioner of Sewers, with the exception that such sewers, in which no changes are proposed and which are shown on the submitted map, are left out.

Resolved, That, in pursuance of section 439, chapter 378, Laws of 1897, the Board of Public Improvements does hereby approve of the modified plan of drainage for Sewerage District No. 37 U, providing for sewers in East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, from the Harlem river to Exterior street, and at the intersection of East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street and Exterior street ; and also in One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, between Exterior street and the East river, in the Borough of The Bronx, in accordance with the plan submitted.

Affirmative—Comptroller, Commissioner of Water Supply, Commissioner of Highways, Commissioner of Street Cleaning, Commissioner of Bridges, President of the Borough of The Bronx and President of the Board.

Negative—None.

The following report from the Topographical Engineer was read, and the matter was referred to the Local Board and the Commissioner of Sewers :

TOPOGRAPHICAL BUREAU, October 4, 1900.

Mr. JOHN H. MOONEY, Secretary, Board of Public Improvements :

SIR—In reply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements, referring for report a communication from the President of the Borough of Queens, recommending that a public sewer be constructed in Bartow street, from Flushing avenue to Grand avenue, First Ward, Borough of Queens, I have to state that the existing sewerage plan of Long Island City in that vicinity will have to be altered to suit the recently filed sewerage plan of Flushing avenue, etc., and that a map or plan entitled “Modified plan of drainage showing the location, sizes and grades of sewers in Bartow street (Sixth avenue), from Grand avenue to Flushing avenue ; Van Deventer avenue, from Bartow street (Sixth avenue) to Briell street (Fifth avenue), and Briell street (Fifth avenue), from Van Deventer avenue to Flushing avenue, designated Sewerage District 6 D, in the First Ward (former Long Island City), Borough of Queens,” was therefore prepared and is herewith submitted for adoption.

None of the streets through which the sewer in Bartow street and its connection with the main sewer in Flushing avenue runs are legally opened, and the improvements can therefore not be commenced until title to same is vested in the City.

I recommend therefore that the matter be referred back to the Local Board so that the proper resolutions for opening the streets may be passed.

SIR—In reply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements, referring for report a communication from the President of the Borough of Queens, recommending that Sixth street, between Jackson avenue and Vernon avenue, in the First Ward, Borough of Queens, be regulated and graded, the curbs re-set, and the roadbed paved with belgian-block paving stones, I wish to state that Sixth street is laid down on the map of Long Island City Commissioners of 1874 and that it was improved under chapter 378 of the Laws of 1874.

The title to the street is vested according to a conveyance made November 4, 1874, by the trustees of Union College, in the Town of Schenectady, N. Y., to Long Island City, and there seems to be no legal obstacle against approving the recommendation.
