Report of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn for the Week Ending March 29, 1902.

OFFICE OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOROUGH.

At the joint meeting of the Flatbush and Bushwick Local Improvement Boards, held March 26, 1902, the following resolution for improvements was adopted:

Dean Street—Grading and paving Dean street with asphalt pavement, between Sackman street and Rockaway avenue.

At the meeting of the Flatbush District Local Improvement Board, held March 26, 1902, resolutions for the following improvements were adopted:

Playground—Altering the map of The City of New York by acquiring the property in the block bounded by Avenues I and J and East Thirty-eighth and East Thirty-ninth streets, in the Thirty-second Ward, for a public park and playground.

Sterling Place—Regulating and grading Sterling place, between Troy and Schenectady avenues.

East Seventh Street—Opening East Seventh street, between Church avenue and Caton place.

New York Avenue—Opening New York avenue, from Canarsie road, or avenue, to Newkirk avenue.

East Fourteenth Street—Altering the map of The City of New York by changing the grade of East Fourteenth street, between Caton and Church avenues.

Kingston Avenue—Regulating and grading Kingston avenue, between Douglass street and Eastern parkway.

Kingston Avenue—Regulating and grading Kingston avenue from Eastern parkway to Malbone street.

Kingston Avenue—Opening Kingston avenue from Eastern parkway to Malbone street.

Fulton Street—Flagging sidewalk on the south side of Fulton street, between Eastern parkway and Sackman street, in front of Lots Nos. 3 and 4, Block 135, Twenty-fifth Ward map.

Marion Street—Flagging sidewalk on the north side of Marion street, between Reid and Patchen avenues, in front of Lots Nos. 5, 6, 7 and 8, Block 17, Twenty-fifth Ward map.

Bergen Street—Flagging sidewalk on the south side of Bergen street, between Buffalo and Rochester avenues, known as Lots Nos. 113, 114 and 100, Block 185, Twenty-fourth Ward map.

Bergen Street—Flagging sidewalk on the north side of Bergen street, between Hopkinson and Rockaway avenues, in front of Lots Nos. 71, 73, 84, 81, 68, 69, 55, 56 and 94, Block 231, Twenty-fourth Ward map.

Bergen Street—Flagging sidewalk on the south side of Bergen street, between Hopkinson and Rockaway avenues, in front of Lots Nos. 90, 17 and 20, Block 229, Twenty-fourth Ward map.

Rockaway Avenue—Flagging sidewalk on the east side of Rockaway avenue, between Dean and Bergen streets, in front of Lot No. 4, Block 234, Twenty-fourth Ward map.

Linden Avenue—Flagging sidewalk on the north side of Linden avenue, between Flatbush and Bedford avenues, in front of Lots Nos. 11 and 15, Block 371, Twenty-ninth Ward map.

Hull Street—Flagging sidewalk on the north side of Hull street, between Rockaway and Stone avenues, known as Lot No. 15, Block 122, Twenty-fifth Ward map.

Hull Street—Fencing vacant lot on the north side of Hull street, between Rockaway and Stone avenues, known as Lots Nos. 15 and 17, Block 122, Twenty-fifth Ward map.

Greene Avenue—Fencing vacant lots on the south side of Greene avenue, between Marcy and Tompkins avenues, known as Lots Nos. 37 to 43, inclusive, Block 38, Twenty-third Ward map.

Marion Street—Fencing vacant lots on the north side of Marion street, between Saratoga and Hopkinson avenues, known as Lot No. 82, Block 95, Twenty-fifth Ward map.

Chauncey Street—Fencing vacant lots on the south side of Chauncey street, between Hopkinson and Saratoga avenues, and on the west side of Hopkinson avenue, between Chauncey and Marion streets, known as Lots Nos. 1 and 79, Block 95, Twenty-fifth Ward map.

Herkimer Street—Fencing vacant lots on the north side of Herkimer street, between Ralph and Howard avenues, known as Lots Nos. 9 and 10, Block 65, Twenty-fifth Ward map.

Jefferson Avenue—Fencing vacant lots on the south side of Jefferson avenue, between Sumner and Lewis avenues; and on the east side of Sumner avenue, between Jefferson avenue and Hancock street, known as Lot No. 102, Block 96, Twenty-third Ward map.

Pacific Street—Fencing vacant lot on the south side of Pacific street, between Brooklyn and Kingston avenues, known as Lot No. 85, Block 95, Twenty-fourth Ward map.

Lexington Avenue—Fencing vacant lots on the north side of Lexington avenue, between Sumner and Lewis avenues, known as Lots Nos. 18 to 21, Block 89; also, Lots Nos. 114 to 118, inclusive, Block 80, Twenty-third Ward map.

Jefferson Avenue—Fencing vacant lots on the north side of Jefferson avenue, between Throop and Sumner avenues, 200 feet from the corner of Throop and Jefferson avenues, and extending 200 feet easterly along Jefferson avenue, known as Lots Nos. 41 and 42, Block 9, Twenty-third Ward map.

Resolutions for the following improvements were laid over:
