Of the sum of \$3,006,408.39 expended for wharf property during the quarter, \$2,693,762.03 was for upland, water rights, etc., acquired through Condemnation Proceedings, between Eighteenth and Twenty-third streets, North river; \$36,987.50 was paid for the westerly half of Pier (old) 15 at the foot of Wall street, East river and \$268,584.66 was for the purchase of the easterly half of Pier (old) 19, westerly half of Pier (old) 20 and bulkhead between, in the vicinity of Burling slip, East river. The latter parcels were also acquired through Condemnation Proceedings. The remaining \$7,074.20 represents the fees and expenses of Commissioners engaged in acquiring wharf property for The City.

J. A. BENSEL, Esq., Commissioner of Docks:

Sir—I have the honor to submit the following report of work done under my charge and supervision for the quarter ending September 30, 1906.

Battery Wall, North River.

The existing platforms at this locality and the steamboat landing have been maintained during the quarter, and some repairs have been made to the steamboat landing.

Boat Landing, Pier A, North River.

The boat landing has been maintained during the quarter, and the float inside the landing has been repaired from time to time when needed.

Rector Street Section, North River.

The work at this section is being done under authorization of the Commissioner of Docks of December 16, 1903, and is at the cost and expense of the owners of the property to be improved. During the quarter, cobble and rip-rap have been deposited on the wall foundation; piles have been driven and base blocks set. Concrete has been made and placed in rear of the granite, and earth filling is being deposited in rear of that portion of the wall already built.

Piers (New) 7 and (Old) 8, North River.

The old shed on the bulkhead between these two piers has been removed.

Cedar Street Section, North River.

By action of the Commissioner of Docks of December 10, 1902, a section of the bulkhead wall was authorized in the vicinity of Cedar street, extending from the middle of the block between Carlisle and Albany streets northerly to a point about 40 feet southerly of the northerly line of Cedar street. This work includes the removal of the old structures and Piers (old) 13 and 14, together with the sheds thereon. The building of the wall proper was practically completed during a previous quarter, and during the present quarter only some coping has been set on the wall. During the present quarter the Department force has done some further work in the construction of Pier 11.

Chambers Street Section—Piers (New) 20 and 21, North River.

These piers are being extended out to the pierhead line by the force of the Department for the Erie Railroad Company, and the work has been in progress during the quarter. The work done in extending Pier 20 has increased the wharfage room by 391 feet.

Chelsea Section, North River.

On December 28, 1900, the Board of Docks authorized the construction of a section of the bulkhead wall between Bloomfield and West Twenty-third streets. Large property interests in this vicinity have in the past been acquired, and extensive work done in the construction of the wall. The wall is now practically completed for the entire length of the section. Earth filling is being deposited in rear of that portion of the wall built. Between Little West Twelfth and Thirteenth, and between Fourteenth and Fifteenth streets, fire walls have been built across the platforms, and at West Fifteenth street the temporary approach to the pier was built, and when no longer needed, removed. The work of paving along the marginal street, between Twenty-second and Twenty-third streets, and on a part of Twenty-second street, between Eleventh and Thirteenth avenues is in progress under Contract No. 1006.

Pier (New) 54, North River.

The work of constructing a new pier, to be known as Pier 54, at the foot of Thirteenth street, was completed on September 22, 1906, and the work of asphaltting the deck of this pier will soon be begun under Contract No. 996.

Pier (New) 56, North River.

The construction of a new pier to be known as Pier 56, near the foot of Fourteenth street, has been in progress during the quarter under Contract No. 941, and when completed the deck of the pier will be asphalted under Contract No. 996.

Pier (New) 59, North River.

The work of asphaltting the deck of this pier has been done during the quarter under Contract No. 996.

Rebuilding the Terminals of the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad Company and the Central Railroad of New Jersey.

On December 20, 1905, a disastrous fire occurred in these premises, starting at the upper end of the ferry house of the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad Company, and in a short time destroying both the terminals of that company and the Central Railway of New Jersey, adjoining the same on the south. The companies affected by the fire immediately started to rebuild the destroyed structures, and during the quarter the work has been in progress. A temporary approach has been built and repaired from time to time to the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad Company's ferries. A fire wall has been built across the pier at Twenty-second street.

Thirty-second Street, North River.

An extension to the pier at the foot of this street was built during the quarter by the Pennsylvania, New York and Long Island Railroad Company, under a permit from this Department, and 461 linear feet of new wharfage room was made by the work done. This pier has also been extended a distance of 45 feet outshore of the outer line of the extension authorized under permit of March 2, 1906, by the same company. It was found necessary to provide a blanket for the roof of the tunnels of the Pennsylvania, New York and Long Island Railroad Company, and five scow loads of clay were deposited on the river bottom over the area embraced in the pier site.

West Forty-second Street Section, North River.

By an order from the Engineer-in-Chief, dated November 14, 1905, sections originally known as West Forty-second street Section, West Forty-second Street Section Extended, and West Forty-third Street Section were consolidated. The wall was practically completed, with the exception of the coping for all the portion except that extending across the foot of West Forty-second street during a previous quarter. During the present quarter earth filling has been deposited in rear of the bulkhead wall, and joints in the granite have been pointed. A temporary approach has been built to Pier 83, and the granite pavement was taken up and relaid to grade.

Between Fifty-sixth and Fifty-seventh Streets, North River.

The work of building Department storehouse and offices at this locality is in progress under Contract No. 987.

Claremont Section, North River.

The work at this section is being done under resolution of the Board of Docks, passed November 16, 1900. During the present quarter work on the wall proper has been in progress. Rip-rap has been deposited in rear of the wall. Piles have been driven, concrete blocks set in the wall and joints in the granite have been pointed.

One Hundred and Thirty-second Street, North River.

The temporary approach to the pier at this street has been repaired.

One Hundred and Thirty-third Street, North River.

The construction of the extension to the pier at this street was completed during the early part of the quarter, and 4,078 linear feet of new wharfage room was made by the work done.

Between Spuyten Duyvil and Mount St. Vincent.

The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company are widening the present railroad embankment between these two points, and rip-rap is being deposited along the line of the widening under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

Marginal Street, North River.

A contract, No. 993, was awarded during the prior quarter for repairing the asphalt pavement on the North and East rivers, and work has been in progress during the past quarter. Repairs have also been made where necessary to the asphalt pavement already laid, by the Uvalde Asphalt Paving Company, under their various bonds to maintain the pavement in good condition.

Whitehall Terminal, East River.

The work of constructing a new ferry terminal at this point for a Municipal ferry to Staten Island is in progress.

Broad Street Section, East River.

Work at this section, which is being done under resolution of the Board of Docks of December 22, 1899, was completed a few years ago as far as could be done until possession of the inner end of Pier 7 was obtained. During a previous quarter work was resumed at this portion of the section, and the wall proper is being built across the inner end of Pier 7 and to the northerly thereof.

Old Slip Section, East River.

The Commissioner of Docks on the 7th of December, 1904, issued the necessary authorization for the construction of the bulkhead wall from the northerly side of Pier (new) 7, where it joins the Broad street section to the westerly side of Burling slip, East river. This stretch of wall is divided into two sections—the Old slip section and the Maiden lane section.

The Old slip section extends from the northerly or upper end of the Broad street section and runs along the established bulkhead line to a point opposite the southerly line of Wall street. During the past quarter the work of constructing the bulkhead wall proper has been in progress. This section contemplated the erection of four new piers to be known as Piers 8, 9, 10 and 11. Piers 8, 10 and 11 were completed during prior quarters.

Pier 8, East River.

A freight and passenger shed is being constructed on this pier by the Compagnie Transatlantique under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

Pier (New) 9, East River.

The construction of this pier was begun under Contract No. 968 on February 28, 1906, and was suspended on account of the non-completion of the bulkhead wall in rear of the pier site.

Pier (New) 10, East River.

A steel freight shed is being constructed on this pier by the New York and Baltimore Transportation Company under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

Maiden Lane Section, East River.

By authorization of the Commissioner of Docks, dated 7th of December, 1904, the construction of the bulkhead wall along this stretch of water-front has been ordered. The work extends from the southerly line of Wall street, where it joins the Old slip section, to about the southerly line of Burling slip. Work on the bulkhead wall proper has been in progress during the quarter, and earth filling has been placed in rear of that portion of the bulkhead wall built. The granite pavement was taken up and relaid to grade. This section embraces Piers 12, 13, 14 and 15. Pier (new) 12 was built in 1901, Piers (new) 14 and 15 were built in 1905, and Pier 13 in 1906.

Pier (New) 13, East River.

A shed is being erected on this pier by Jas. E. Ward & Co. under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

Between Pier (New) 13 and Wall Street Ferry, East River.

A platform and shed over land under water are being constructed at this locality by the New York and Cuba Mail Steamship Company under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

Pier (New) 14, East River.

A steel freight shed was erected on this pier by Jas. E. Ward & Co. under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

Fulton Section, East River.

This section of the bulkhead wall was authorized by the Board of Docks on the 26th of April, 1901. This resolution was amended by action of the Commissioner of Docks on the 7th of December, 1904. During the past quarter some slight work has been done on the bulkhead wall proper. This section embraces Piers (new) 16, 17 and 18. Pier (new) 16 was built in 1901, Pier (new) 17 was built in 1905, and Pier (new) 18 in 1906.

Between Piers (New) 17 and 18, East River.

The Fulton Market Fishmongers' Association are constructing a bulkhead platform and erecting buildings between these two piers for the use of a fish market under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

Catherine Section, East River.

This section of the bulkhead wall is being constructed under resolution of the Board of Docks of the 24th of February, 1899. During the quarter some work has been done on a portion of the bulkhead wall proper.

Market Section, East River.

The authorization for this section is the resolution of the Board of Docks passed February 23, 1900. During the quarter work has been in progress along the bulkhead wall proper, and about 97 feet of new wharfage room has been made by the work done.

Pier 28, East River.

A shed is being constructed on this pier by the Joy Steamship Company under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. In the meantime a temporary shed has been erected on the pier by the same company.

Peck Slip Section, East River.

The authorization for this section is the action of the Commissioner of Docks of January 14, 1903. No work has been done on the wall proper at this section during the quarter.

Corlears Street, East River.

A pile platform has been constructed in front of the bulkhead at this locality by the Hecker-Jones-Jewell Milling Company under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

Nineteenth Street, East River.

The Department force is removing the existing pier at this street and constructing a new pier in place thereof under new plan and B. O. 3562.

Between Thirty-ninth and Fortieth Streets, East River.

The work of building intake and discharge tunnels, coal and ash handling appliances, and foundations for structures to be hereafter erected by the New York Edison Company have been in progress by that company at this locality under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

Sixtieth and Sixty-second Streets, East River.

A contract No. 1010 was awarded for making necessary repairs to Pier 102, at the foot of Sixtieth street, and for making repairs to bulkhead platform from Sixtieth to Sixty-second streets, East river, and the work has been in progress.

Sixty-first and Sixty-second Streets, East River.

A contract No. 1024 was awarded for making necessary repairs to Pier 103, at the foot of Sixty-first street, and for repairs to Pier 104, foot of Sixty-second street, and the work is in progress.

Yorkville Section, East River.

The authorization for this section is action of the Commissioner of Docks of October 10, 1904, B. O. 2757. A rubble wall was constructed between Sixty-eighth and Sixty-ninth streets, and a temporary platform has been built by the force of the Department between Sixty-ninth and Seventieth streets.

Blackwell Section, East River.

By action of the Commissioner of October 10, 1904, B. O. 2756, the work of improving the water-front, which was being done under resolution of the Board of Docks for the East Seventy-fourth, East Seventy-fifth and East Seventy-seventh streets sections was consolidated in a new section established as Blackwell section, beginning at the southerly line of East Seventy-fourth street and extending to the northerly line of East Eighty-first street, a distance of 1958.03 feet. A portion of the section in the neighborhood of East Seventy-fourth and East Seventy-fifth streets was practically completed for quite a strip of wall during a previous quarter and work was suspended until the work in the other sections made a joint with it. During the present quarter work in that locality has been in progress, and also in the vicinity of East Seventy-seventh, and about 74 linear feet of new wharfage room has been made by that portion of the bulkhead wall built. Filling has been placed in rear of the wall.

Between Ninetieth and Ninety-first Streets, East River.

A timber basin has been established at this locality and during the quarter old material has been rafted and cared for.

Between One Hundred and Seventh and One Hundred and Tenth Streets, Harlem River.

A contract, No. 995, was awarded for laying a new granite pavement upon a sand foundation on the marginal street between these two streets, and the work is in progress.

One Hundred and Seventh Street, Harlem River.

A pier and dumping board has been constructed in this locality for the use of the Street Cleaning Department, under Bureau Order No. 4002. The work was completed during the quarter and 590 linear feet of new wharfage room made by the work done.

Riker's Island, East River.

A dry stone wall on top of the existing stone embankment on the easterly side of Riker's Island has been in progress under Contract No. 963, a total of 3,500 linear feet of wall having been built to date.

North Brother Island, East River.

A contract, No. 1015, was awarded for building a riprap and derrick stone embankment on the north and east sides of North Brother Island, and the work is in progress. A total of 5,204 cubic yards of stone have been deposited to date.

Between One Hundred and Forty-fifth and One Hundred and Forty-sixth Streets, Harlem River.

An addition has been made to the pile platform at this locality by the John P. Kane Company, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun August 1, 1906, and finished August 25, 1906.

Between One Hundred and Eighty-ninth and One Hundred and Ninety-second Streets, Harlem River.

A crib bulkhead is being constructed at this locality by the Kingsbridge Real Estate Company, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun January 29, 1905, and is in progress from time to time.

Government Ship Canal, Spuyten Duyvil.

The work of constructing a crib bulkhead along the Government Ship Canal, and the building of a new roadbed and the laying of new tracks in connection with the Marble Hill cut-off, has been done by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun July 20, 1904, and finished July 15, 1906.

One Hundred and Sixty-seventh Street and Putnam Railroad Bridge, Harlem River. A pile and timber trestle filled with riprap has been built by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company at the above locality, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun July 25, 1904, and finished September 29, 1906.

South of One Hundred and Forty-ninth Street, Harlem River.

The Pioneer Real Estate Company have constructed a ferry slip, transfer bridge and crib bulkhead at this locality, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun February 27, 1906, and finished September 15, 1906. The same company has also built a freight house and freight terminal at the above locality, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun February 27, 1906, and finished September 1, 1906.

South of One Hundred and Thirty-eighth Street, Mott Haven Canal.

Olin J. Stephens has rebuilt the foundation of the coal pocket at the above location in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work begun June 4, 1906, and finished August 30, 1906. A portion of the coal pocket at the above location is being rebuilt by Olin J. Stephens under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun August 30, 1906, and is in progress.

W. W. Tinsley is erecting a coal pocket and tower at the above locality under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun August 15, 1906, and is in progress.

Willis Avenue, Harlem River.

The New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company have replaced the steel transfer bridge No. "C" with a new plate girder bridge at their Harlem river terminal, in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun August 23, 1906, and finished September 15, 1906.

One Hundred and Forty-ninth Street, Port Morris, East River.

The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company are building a power station, pier, slip and concrete bulkhead at the above location, in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun June 1, 1904, and is in progress.

The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company have constructed a discharge tunnel at the above location, in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun January 27, 1905, and finished May 15, 1906.

Cabot Street, East River.

The Rock Plaster Company of New York and New Jersey have erected an iron shed and cooperage shop on the bulkhead at the above location, in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun June 15, 1906, and finished September 1, 1906.

Oak Point and One Hundred and Fiftieth Street, East River.

The Rock Plaster Company of New York and New Jersey have built a crib bulkhead and are filling in behind same from time to time, in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun May 18, 1905, and the work of filling is still in progress.

Between Cabot and Tiffany Streets, East River.

The Oak Point Land and Dock Company are building a bulkhead and four piers at the above location, in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun May 17, 1906, and is in progress.

BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

Foot of Grand Street, Newtown Creek.

A coal pocket and tower is being erected at the above locality by Ezra B. Tuttle, in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun September 20, 1906, and is in progress.

Foot of Huron Street, Brooklyn.

The estate of Henry Steers have constructed a pier 450 feet long and 60 feet wide and are erecting a shed on same at the above location, in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun May 15, 1906, and is in progress.

Foot of India Street, Brooklyn.

The estate of Henry Steers are erecting a pier at the above location, in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun May 1, 1906, and is in progress.

Division Avenue and Bush Street, Wallabout Channel.

The Transit Development Company are building an ash pocket and coal handling tower at the above location in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun May 1, 1906, and is in progress.

Foot of Gold Street, Brooklyn.

The Kings County Electric Light and Power Company are rebuilding the bulkhead wall at the above location, and building foundations, screening walls, etc., in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun April 6, 1905, and is in progress.

Foot of Bridge Street, Brooklyn.

The Jay Street Terminal Company are removing Pier (old) 3 and constructing Pier (new) 2, with bulkheads, at the above location, in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun March 12, 1906, and is in progress.

Montague Street, Brooklyn.

The New York Dock Company are constructing Piers 10, 11, 12 and 13 at this locality, in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun May 8, 1905, and is in progress. The same company is building pier sheds on the above piers, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. This work was begun October 9, 1905, and is in progress.

Pier Between Twenty-fourth and Twenty-fifth Streets, Gowanus Canal.

John H. Mahnken has constructed a frame shed at the above location, in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun August 22, 1906, and finished September 22, 1906. John H. Mahnken has also erected a frame shed at the pier north of Twenty-fourth street, Gowanus canal, in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun August 25, 1906, and finished September 22, 1906.

Twenty-fifth Street, Gowanus Canal.

Two awning shelters have been erected on the pier at the above location by Mrs. Winant B. Wardell, in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun June 20, 1906, and finished July 20, 1906.

Hamilton Avenue, Gowanus Canal, Brooklyn.

F. W. Devoe and C. T. Reynolds Company have constructed a bulkhead wall platform along the west side of Gowanus canal, in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun June 1, 1906, and finished August 30, 1906.

North Side of Gowanus Canal, East of Bond Street, Brooklyn.

The Pure Oil Company are erecting two steel tanks and brick pump house and a barrel shed at the above location in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun August 1, 1906, and is in progress.

Between Sixth and Seventh Street Basin, Gowanus Canal, Brooklyn.

The Bracken-McAveny Company have erected three storage sheds at the above location in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun December 21, 1905, and finished July 25, 1906.

North Side Sixth Street Basin, Gowanus Canal, Brooklyn.

The Brooklyn Builders' Supply Company have erected two one-story sheds at the above location in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun July 9, 1906, and finished July 25, 1906.

South Side Seventh Street Basin, Gowanus Canal, Brooklyn.

The Carter Chemical Company have erected a fire screen wall with foundations for same in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun July 7, 1906, and finished September 15, 1906.

Between Forty-third and Fifty-first Streets, Brooklyn.

The Bush Terminal Company are erecting at the above location bulkheads, five new piers with sheds thereon under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun April 5, 1901, and is in progress.

Between Sixty-third and Sixty-fourth Streets, Brooklyn.

The Long Island Railroad Company are building a pier, bulkhead and transfer bridge at the above location under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun June 11, 1906, and is in progress.

Between Sixty-sixth and Wakeman Streets, Brooklyn.

The Edison Electric Illuminating Company have constructed a pile extension to the breakwater at the above location in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun June 28, 1906, and finished September 4, 1906.

Foot of Seventy-ninth Street, Brooklyn.

A sewer outlet has been constructed at the above location by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced March 30, 1905, and finished July 15, 1906.

Between Bay Thirty-first and Bay Thirty-second Streets, Gravesend.

A crib bulkhead with return is being constructed at the above location by Frederick Simpken in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun June 1, 1906, and is in progress.

BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

Between Third and Fifth Streets, Flushing Bay, College Point.

The American Hard Rubber Company have constructed a crib bulkhead at the above location in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun June 1, 1906, and finished August 10, 1906.

Lawrence Point, Queens.

The Astoria Light, Heat and Power Company are constructing two piers, bulkheads and slips, coal handling tower and plant at the above location under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun October 1, 1903, and is in progress.

Between Pierce and Graham Avenues, Ravenswood.

Foundations and trestle supports have been built for a traveling crane by Edward Shuttleworth under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun May 2, 1906, and finished July 10, 1906.

Between Webster and Washington Avenues, Ravenswood.

The estate of William Nelson are building three bulkheads at the above location under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun June 15, 1906, and is in progress.

North of Webster Avenue, East River, Queens.

A sand and coal storage house and bins have been erected in rear of the bulkhead 210 feet north of Webster avenue by the Bottlers' and Manufacturers' Supply Company in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun July 10, 1906, and finished August 31, 1906.

Between Noble and Worth Streets, Ravenswood.

A shed and runway for traveling crane have been erected by William Bradley & Sons under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun May 10, 1906, and finished August 10, 1906.

Eleventh Street Basin, Long Island City.

A coal pocket, coal tower and coal handling plant is being erected at this locality by Jurgen Rathgen in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun December 16, 1905, and is in progress.

Between Hunter's Point Avenue and Nott Avenue, Long Island City.

The Degnon Contracting Company is constructing a crib bulkhead on piles at this locality under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun March 20, 1906, and is in progress.

East of Dutch Kills, Newtown Creek.

The Long Island Railroad Company have built a crib bulkhead and pier about 485 feet east of Dutch Kills in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun February 16, 1906, and finished August 30, 1906.

Between Clifton and Washington Avenues, Newtown Creek.

A pump house, water cooling tower and sampling shed have been constructed at this locality by the Nichols Copper Company in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun May 25, 1906, and finished August 30, 1906.

Between Waverly and Bond Avenues, Rockaway Beach.

A pier has been constructed at the above location by the New York and Rockaway Beach Transportation Company in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun June 4, 1906, and finished June 26, 1906.

BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

A number of pieces of work have been done by private parties and supervised by the Department of Docks and Ferries in this borough. A crib and close pile bulkhead have been constructed near Van Name street, Mariner's Harbor, by the New Jersey Dock and Bridge Building Company. A pier and extension thereof out to the pier-head line is being constructed between Central and Van Pelt avenues, Mariner's Harbor, by Henry Du Bois & Sons. Piles are being driven near the foot of Andros avenue, Mariner's Harbor, by the Burlee Dry Dock Company, and a railroad track for carrying crane is being built between Andros and Meserole avenues, Mariner's Harbor, by the Burlee Dry Dock Company. At St. George about 200 feet of crib bulkhead and about 300 feet of sheet pile bulkhead are being built at property owned by the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company, and a new pier is being erected for a "McMyler" car dumper at St. George by the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company. At Port Richmond a dry stone retaining wall structure is being constructed outshore of the railroad trestle by the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company, and a pier about 150 feet east of the Bergen Point ferry slip in the vicinity of Richmond avenue, Port Richmond, has been built by the Port Richmond and Bergen Point Ferry Company. At West New Brighton a working platform has been constructed on the westerly side of the foot of Bement avenue by the Frederick A. Verdon Co. At Tottenville a crib or pile bulkhead is being constructed and filling placed behind same, pier constructed and dredging done thereat at the foot of Henry street by Henry Cossey. A pier is being constructed about 65 feet easterly of the foot of Henry street, Tottenville, or Arthur Kills, by Henry Cossey. At New Brighton a crib bulkhead is being erected by J. B. King & Co. At Tompkinsville the American Dock and Trust Company are extending their pier known as Pier 3, near the foot of Arrietta street, and extending shed on said pier. At Stapleton a crib bulkhead is being built at the James D. Leary Long Dock by Bernard Brady. A crib bulkhead and sheet pile bulkhead platform are being built between Elizabeth and Clinton streets, Stapleton, by Thomas Williams, and a runway, platform and boat house are being erected at the foot of Dock street, Stapleton, by the Staten Island Yacht Club. At Arthur Kills a marine railway about 240 feet north of the foot of Amboy road is being constructed by William H. Brown, and a platform dock has been erected near the foot of Old Place creek, Arthur Kills, by the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company. At Howland's Hook two piers and a slip are being built at the foot of Western avenue by Procter & Gamble.

Pavement on Marginal Streets, North and East Rivers.

The asphalt pavement has been repaired at various places along the North and East rivers where necessary to repair pavement already laid, and the work under Contract No. 993 for the repairing of the wearing surface and binder and concrete foundations for the asphalt pavement along the North and East rivers has been in progress.

Pavement on East River.

Pavement has been repaired along the East river waterfront as required.

Pile Basin, Sherman's Creek, Harlem River.

The pile basin at Sherman's Creek, on the Harlem river, has been maintained and cared for.

Department Yards at West Fifty-seventh and East Twenty-fourth Streets.

At the Department yards, the force of the Department has been engaged in the construction of concrete blocks, the handling and cutting of granite, the care of materials and the issue of supplies for various pieces of work. The yards have been maintained in good order and condition. The work of constructing Department storehouse and offices at West Fifty-seventh street is in progress, under Contract No. 987.

Floating Property.

All of the floating property of the Department has been cared for during the quarter and repaired where necessary. The work under Class 1 of Contract No. 907 for building pile drivers was finished on August 17, 1906. Work under Class 4 of the above contract for building derrick is in progress.

Dredging.

All the dredging has been supervised, whether done by the Department or private parties.

Surveying Party.

All the necessary lines, soundings, surveys and examinations have been made and given. Work done by private parties has been supervised, automatic tide gauges have been attended to, and the daily and weekly reports have been made. The records of the anemometer and weather vane, etc., have been compiled. An extensive survey of the waterfronts of Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond is in progress.

Recreation Structures.

The recreation structures have been maintained and cared for during the quarter.

Baths.

Berths have been prepared for the public baths, and the baths have been maintained during the quarter.

New Staten Island Ferry.

The operation of this ferry by the City was begun on the 25th day of October, 1905, and since that time the ferry has been maintained and operated. Contracts have been awarded for the construction of the necessary ferry terminals at the foot of Whitehall street, East river, and at St. George, Staten Island, and the work has been in progress during the quarter. A contract has been prepared and awarded for constructing a new ferry terminal for the Staten Island Ferry at Stapleton, Staten Island. A contract has been awarded for constructing a new pier at the foot of Canal street, Stapleton, Staten Island, to be used in connection with the new ferry terminal at Stapleton, and the work has been in progress during the quarter.

New Thirty-ninth Street Ferry, Brooklyn.

A contract has been prepared and awarded for building a new ferry terminal for the new Thirty-ninth Street Ferry, Brooklyn, at Whitehall street, East river, and a contract is being prepared for building a new terminal for the new Thirty-ninth Street Ferry between Thirty-eighth and Thirty-ninth streets, Brooklyn.

New Ferryboats for the New Thirty-ninth Street Ferry, Brooklyn.

A contract has been prepared and awarded for constructing three steel screw propelling ferryboats, with two two-cylinder compound engines, each for use on the new Thirty-ninth Street Ferry, Brooklyn, which is about to be municipalized, and the work is in progress.

Draughtsmen.

In the office of the Engineer-in-Chief the Draughtsmen have been engaged on plans and studies for contract work, plans for the improvement of the waterfront, plans and specifications for new piers and repairs, change of lines, examination of plans submitted by private parties, solar printing and general routine work.

The total new wharfage room made by the Department of Docks and Ferries for the quarter amounts to 10,447 linear feet. Wharfage room destroyed by the City in

making way for new improvements, 1,054 linear feet. The area of the City's piers has been increased by 154,877 square feet.

The total increase in wharfage room made by private parties under permit from the Department of Docks and Ferries is 8,745 linear feet.

Filed.

From the commanding officers of the Fortieth, Forty-eighth, Seventy-first, Seventy-fourth, Eightieth and Eighty-first Police Precincts, reporting in relation to the investigations made by them, pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 3 of section 32 of the Election Law, of the names of persons registered in the several election districts within their respective precincts. Referred to the Chief Clerk of the Board to notify the several Boards of Election Inspectors of the cases of false registration within their respective election districts as therein reported.

From Martin B. Brown Company, dated the 27th inst., calling the attention of the Board to the fact that by the terms of its contract the official and sample ballots for the general election to be held on November 6, 1906, must be furnished by November 1, 1906, and requesting the necessary instruction and direction to proceed with the work of preparing such ballots. Filed.

From James H. Hardy, dated the 29th inst., stating that he was nominated by the Prohibition party for the office of Member of Assembly for the Thirty-fifth District, New York County, without his consent, and requesting that his name be not printed on the ballot. Filed.

From Henry B. Platt, dated Flushing, October 27, 1906, protesting against the designation of the Queens Borough "Press" as a newspaper to publish the list of nominations for offices to be voted for in said borough at the ensuing general election, on the ground that said newspaper is a weekly, and not a daily, newspaper, as required by law. Filed.

From the Chief Clerk of the Board and the Chief Clerks of The Bronx, Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond Borough offices, dated the 27th inst., and the Chief Clerk of the Manhattan Borough office, dated the 29th inst., reporting in relation to the attendance of the clerical force in their respective offices during the preceding week. Filed.

From the Chairmen of the Executive Committees of the New York County Democratic and Republican Committees and the Kings County Republican Committee requesting the removal of certain election officers therein named, and duly authenticating and filing the names of persons to fill the vacancies created by such removals. On motion, the said communications were ordered on file, the Secretary directed to transmit the names, etc., of the persons proposed for appointment to the Chief Clerks of the proper borough offices for notification of examination, etc., and the following preamble and resolution adopted, viz.:

Whereas, Written requests for the removal of certain election officers heretofore appointed in the Counties of New York and Kings have been filed with the Board of Elections by the Chairmen of the Executive Committees of the New York County Democratic and Republican Committees, and the Kings County Republican Committee, pursuant to section 12, chapter 909, Laws of 1896, as amended; therefore be it

Resolved, That the persons heretofore appointed and qualified as Inspectors of Elections, Poll Clerks and Ballot Clerks in the election and assembly districts specified, be and are each and severally removed and dismissed as such election officers.

Additional original lists of the names of persons proposed for appointment as election officers for the term ending August 31, 1907, were received from the Chief Clerks of the Manhattan and Richmond borough offices and the necessary resolution of appointment adopted.

On motion, the said communications were ordered on file, the Secretary directed to transmit the names, etc., of the persons proposed for appointment to the Chief Clerks of the proper borough offices for notification of examination, etc., and the following preamble and resolution adopted, viz.:

Whereas, Written requests for the removal of certain election officers heretofore appointed in the Counties of New York, Kings and Queens have been filed with the Board of Elections by the Chairmen of the Executive Committees of the New York County Democratic and Republican Committees, the Kings County Republican Committee and the Queens County Democratic Committee, pursuant to section 12, chapter 909, Laws of 1896; therefore be it

Resolved, That the persons heretofore appointed and qualified as Inspectors of Election, Poll Clerks and Ballot Clerks in the Election and Assembly Districts specified, be and are each and severally removed and dismissed as such election officers.

Commissioner Voorhis moved the adoption of the following preamble and resolution:

Whereas, Section 61 of chapter 909 of the Laws of 1896, as amended, requires the Board of Elections of The City of New York to cause to be published in the several boroughs of said City, at least six days before the general election to be held November 6, 1906, a list of all the nominations of candidates for offices to be filled at said election and to be voted for in each of such boroughs respectively; and

Whereas, It appears that it will be impracticable for the Board to cause a list in full of all such nominations to be published within the time required by the statute, for the reason that the question of the legality of many certificates of nomination is awaiting the determination of the Supreme Court and the Court of Appeals; therefore be it

Resolved, That a list of the nominations of candidates for offices to be filled at the general election to be held in The City of New York on November 6, 1906, and to be voted for in the several boroughs of said City, which have been certified to this Board by the Secretary of State, or which have been received and are entitled to be filed by this Board, be and are, for the borough in which the newspaper designated is published, hereby authorized and directed to be published on October 31, and likewise upon the determination of the validity of the nominations pending before said courts, a complete list of nominations so certified or filed for offices to be voted for in the respective boroughs of The City of New York, be published on November 3 and 5, 1906, in the following named newspapers, at rates not exceeding those specified in the proposals recently received therefor from said newspapers.

Commissioner Maguire moved to amend said resolution by substituting the "World" in place of the New York "Daily News."

Lost, Commissioners Voorhis, Page and Dady voting "Nay;" Commissioner Maguire voting "Aye."

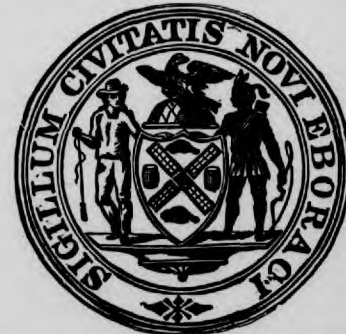

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.

And said CITY RECORD, and the newspapers now by law designated as corporation newspapers in the present City of Brooklyn, shall be the only papers to be included within the term corporation newspapers, as the same is used anywhere in this act; There shall be inserted in said CITY RECORD nothing aside from such official matters as are expressly authorized. . . . All advertising required to be done for the City, except as in this act otherwise specially provided, and all notices required by law or ordinance to be published in corporation papers, shall be inserted at the public expense only in the CITY RECORD, and the publication therein shall be a sufficient compliance with any law or ordinance requiring publication of such matters or notices. . . . The Comptroller shall cause a continuous series of the CITY RECORD to be bound as completed, quarterly, and to be deposited with his certificate thereon in the office of the Register of Deeds of the County of New York in the County Clerk's office of said County, and in the office of the City Clerk, and copies of the contents of any of the same, certified by such Register, County Clerk or City Clerk, shall be received in judicial proceedings as prima facie evidence of the truth of the contents thereof.—§1526, *Greater New York Charter*.
