The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending November 15, 1884 : The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 7,436. The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 870. During the past week 161 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report. There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 39 permits. The certificates of 622 births, 28 still-births, 245 marriages and 659 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, November 15, 1884. This shows an increase of 102 births and 31 deaths, and a decrease of 23 still-births and 6 marriages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when com-pared with the corresponding week of the year 1883, there was an increase of 81 births, 1 mar-riage and 109 deaths, and a decrease of 19 still-births. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from typhoid fever decreased 11; malarial fevers, 2; diar-rheal diseases, 19; heart diseases, 4; marasmus, tabes mesentence and scrolula, 2; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 5; while the deaths from measles increased 7; scarlatina, 1; diph-theria, 3; croup, 9; whooping cough, 1; erysplelas, 1; cerebro spinal fever, 2; puerperal diseases, 1; inanition, 1; alcoholism, 2; rheumatism and gout, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 7; bronchitis, 9; pneumonia, 14; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 7; convulsions, 2; apoplexy, 3; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 4; Bright's disease and nephritis, 1; cyanosis and atelectasis, 5; premature and preternatural births, 6; suicide, 3; drowning, 1. The number of deaths from cancer, aneurism, meningitis and encephallits, gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, and surgical operations was the same in the two successive weeks.
