Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending November 15, 1884:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 7,436.

The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 870.

During the past week 161 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 39 permits.

There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds) 10 permits.

There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 2 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks, 61 permits.

At premises where contagious diseases were reported 38 visits were made, and 38 disinfections and 2 fumigations were performed.

The number of vaccinations performed was 718, of which 239 were primary, and 479 re-vaccinations.

There were seized and condemned 9,920 pounds of meat and 1,000 pounds of fish.

The number of specimens of milk examined was 106, and the amount of fines imposed was \$25.

The certificates of 622 births, 38 still-births, 245 marriages and 659 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, November 15, 1884. This shows an increase of 102 births and 31 deaths, and a decrease of 23 still-births and 6 marriages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1883, there was an increase of 81 births, 1 marriage and 109 deaths, and a decrease of 19 still-births. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from typhoid fever decreased 11; malarial fevers, 2; diarrhoeal diseases, 19; heart diseases, 4; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 2; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 5; while the deaths from measles increased 7; scarlatina, 1; diphtheria, 3; croup, 9; whooping cough, 1; erysipelas, 1; cerebro spinal fever, 2; puerperal diseases, 1; inanition, 1; alcoholism, 2; rheumatism and gout, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 7; bronchitis, 9; pneumonia, 14; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 7; convulsions, 2; apoplexy, 3; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 4; Bright's disease and nephritis, 1; cyanosis and atelectasis, 5; premature and pretermatural births, 6; suicide, 3; drowning, 1. The number of deaths from cancer, aneurism, meningitis and encephalitis, gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, and surgical operations was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 123 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year, 199 under two years, 262 under five years, and 51 seventy years and over, which shows that the number of deaths of children under five years of age was 28 more than the number reported during the preceding week, and represent 39.76 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 126 were in institutions, 390 in tenement-houses, 133 in houses containing three families or less, 1 in hotels and boarding-houses, 8 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 10 were on the basement floor, 114 on the first, 169 on the second, 127 on the third, 74 on the fourth, 28 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth; 657 were stated to be residents of New York City and 2 non-residents; 35 were stated to be single, 157 married, 67 widowed, and the condition of 350 was not stated—these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 659; still-births, 38; bodies in transit, 11. Of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 79 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 622 births, 245 marriages, 38 still-births; 659 deaths; 11 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated, 134 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 10 transcripts of the birth record, 9 of marriage, and 77 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending November 15, 1884, was 47.7 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.027, the mean humidity was 67, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 920, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0 inch

depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 600 deaths and still-births, or 86.08 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 15; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 256; City pauper burial ground (undenominational), 75; Greenwood (undenominational), 30; Lutheran (undenominational), 115; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 15; Evergreen (undenominational), 35; Woodlawn (undenominational), 18; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 11; Union (Methodist Protestant), 1; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 5; Macphelah, L. I. (Jewish), 4; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 9; Washington (undenominational), 11.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending November 8, 1884, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 11; Second, 1; Third, 1; Fourth, 8; Fifth, 12; Sixth, 10; Seventh, 29; Eighth, 11; Ninth, 30; Tenth, 30; Eleventh, 28; Twelfth, 78; Thirteenth, 18; Fourteenth, 10; Fifteenth, 8; Sixteenth, 21; Seventeenth, 39; Eighteenth, 32; Nineteenth, 110; Twentieth, 28; Twenty-first, 44; Twenty-second, 50; Twenty-third, 16; Twenty-fourth, 6.

The actual mortality for the week ending November 8, 1884, was 631; this is 94 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1883, and 61.4 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.92 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,371,462.
