

REPORTED MORTALITY* for the week ending June 12, 1886, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending June 5, 1886

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—There were 597 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, June 12, 1886, which is an increase of 20, as compared with the number reported he preceding week, and 4 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1885. The actual mortality for the week ending June 5, 1886, was 577, which is 53.4 below the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 20.89 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,436,089.
