## AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, May 9, 1888, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Present—Commissioners Spencer, Dowd, the Commissioner of Public Works, and Commissioners Baldwin and Barnes; also Deputy Chief Engineer Rice.

The meeting was opened to receive the bids for the construction of section 16 of the New Aqueduct, being the pipe-line from One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and Convent avenue to the proposed gate-house in the Central Park reservoir, in pursuance to public notice published daily for fifteen consecutive days in the CITY RECORD, "New York Tribune" and "New York Star," and in two weekly issues each of the "Engineering News" and the "Sanitary Engineer." And the following bids, upon which the required deposits had been made, were opened and read aloud by the Secretary:

- No. 1. O'Brien & Clark.
- No. 2. William E. Dean.
- No. 3. Myles Tierney.
- No. 4. Matthew Baird.
- No. 5. M. S. Coleman & Co.

Whereupon Commissioner Dowd offered the following preamble and resolutions, and moved their adoption:

Whereas, The bids for furnishing and delivering and laying 48-inch cast-iron pipes and their appurtenances, from One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and Convent avenue to the proposed gate-house in the Central Park reservoir, and doing all work in connection therewith necessary to complete Section 16 of the New Croton Aqueduct, having been received and publicly opened and read; therefore

Resolved, That the Chief Engineer is hereby directed to have the said bids calculated and tabulated with his estimates of the work, and report the same to the Commissioners for consideration and canvassing by them on the 16th day of May, 1888, at 3 o'clock, P. M.

Resolved, That the bids and checks of the bidders received for furnishing and delivering and laying 48-inch cast-iron pipes and their appurtenances from One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and Convent avenue to the proposed gate-house in the Central Park reservoir, and doing all work in connection therewith necessary to complete Section 16 of the New Croton Aqueduct, are hereby referred to the Committee of Finance and Audit for examination and report to the Commissioners as to their formality and the sufficiency of the sureties proposed by the bidders. Adopted.

The President presented a report on the condition of the work of the construction of the New Aqueduct up to and including the first day of May, 1888; and in connection therewith, Commissioner Baldwin offered the following resolution, and moved its adoption:

Resolved, That the report of the President in regard to defective work upon the Aqueduct is hereby received and approved and filed; and that the President is directed to send a copy of the same to the Hon. Mayor and Comptroller, and to the Counsel of the Senate Investigating Com-

mittee; and the Secretary is hereby directed to cause 250 copies of the said report to be printed for circulation. Adopted.

The minutes of the stated meeting of May 2 were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit submitted the following report:

The Committee of Finance and Audit, to whom was referred the subject matter of accepting the work done for the Commission by Messrs. Coldwell, Wilcox & Co., report:

That the work called for in the contract with said Coldwell, Wilcox & Co., on the 25th day of October, 1887, consisted of iron-work for lining, delivered ready to be put in place, for Shaft No. 20, on Section B, of the New Croton Aqueduct; and that said work was to be paid for when so delivered and accepted by the Chief Engineer.

That the said iron-work has been furnished and delivered in accordance with said contract, and accepted by the Chief Engineer; and inasmuch as the said Coldwell, Wilcox & Co., have furnished satisfactory evidence that the claims of all persons who have done work or furnished materials under said agreement have been paid or satisfactorily secured, we recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Aqueduct Commissioners do accept the work done and materials furnished by Coldwell, Wilcox & Co., under their agreement made with this Commission on the 25th day of October, 1887, for furnishing the iron-work for lining, delivered ready to be put in place, for Shaft No. 20, on Section B, of the New Croton Aqueduct; and that proper voucher for the final payment for work done and material furnished under said agreement be approved by the Commissioners, and certified to the Comptroller for payment. Adopted.

The Committee on Construction recommended the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That Mr. G. W. Whitman is hereby employed to inspect iron pipe and special castings now being cast at Burlington, New Jersey, with compensation at the rate of fifty cents per ton for such pipe and castings. Adopted.

A communication was received from the Secretary, stating that at a meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held on the 14th of September, 1887, the Committee on Construction reported to the Aqueduct Commissioners that applications had been received from Messrs. Brown, Howard & Co., Mr. Heman Clark and Messrs. O'Brien & Clark for an extension of time for the completion of the work embraced in their several contracts on the New Aqueduct; and a resolution was adopted granting the said contractors an extension of time of eight months from that date, as further time for the performance of the work embraced in their said contracts; and that the time so granted had about expired, and that said contractors had asked that a further extension of time be granted to them.

In connection therewith Commissioner Barnes offered the following resolution, and moved its adoption; and the same was adopted:

Whereas, The Committee on Construction of the Aqueduct Commissioners, having had under consideration applications from Messrs. Brown, Howard & Company, Mr. Heman Clark and Messrs. O'Brien & Clark, contractors, for an extension of time for the completion of the work embraced in their several contracts on the New Aqueduct, recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Aqueduct Commissioners hereby grant to Messrs. Brown, Howard & Co., Mr. Heman Clark and Messrs. O'Brien & Clark, contractors, an extension of six months from this date, providing their bondsmen shall within ten days after the passage of this resolution enter into stipulations continuing their obligations for and during the completion of said contracts under said extension of time, which is hereby allowed to them as further time for the performance of said contracts.

The Comptroller, under date of May 5, gave notice of the issue of warrants for the payment of vouchers not certified to by the Aqueduct Commissioners, for

Which were ordered entered upon the books of the Commission and filed.

A communication was received from W. F. Hopper, addressed to the Secretary, declining the appointment of Axeman on the New Aqueduct.

On motion of Commissioner Barnes, the declination was accepted.

The Commissioners then adjourned.
