Report for the Quarter ending December 31, 1883.

Hon. FRANKLIN EDSON, Mayor:

Sir—In accordance with the requirements of section 49, chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, the Department of Public Parks makes the following report of its transactions for the three months ending with December 31, 1883.

On the 14th day of November Salem H. Wales was elected President, and John D. Crimmins was elected Treasurer of the Department.

The operations of the Department during the last quarter have been carried on with great making and more work was done then during any previous quarter of the year.

The operations of the Department during the last quarter have been carried on with great energy, and more work was done than during any previous quarter of the year.

The Trustees of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, in the Central Park, having preferred a request to the Board, that the Comptroller be directed to issue the balance of stock, authorized by section 2 of chapter 290 of the Laws of 1871, for the purpose of the completion or enlargement of the present Museum Building. The Commissioners, in view of conflicting laws on the subject, referred the matter to the Counsel to the Corporation, for an expression of his opinion in regard to their powers and duties in the premises. A communication was received from the Corporation Counsel, reviewing the various statutes affecting the subject-matter, and rendering an opinion that the provisions of the statute of 1871, above mentioned, have been impliedly repealed by later statutes.

The Counsel to the Corporation has been requested to initiate proceedings for acquiring titles to that portion of Juliette street, which lies between Mott and Walton avenues, as shown on the maps of the Department, also for acquiring title to the land included in the Triangular Park, lying on the west side of Central avenue, beginning at the northerly point of the Stebbins farm, where the road from McComb's Dam to Fordham intersects the boundary of the widow Wolf's farm, as shown by

The Board of Health having passed the necessary resolution, the Board has requested the Counsel to the Corporation to acquire the right of way through the lands necessary for constructing drains through the Bound Brook District of the Twenty-third Ward.

Plans have been adopted and filed, according to the requirements of law, establishing grades in that portion of the Central District of the Twenty-third Ward, bounded by the Southern Boulevard, Marion avenue, Summit street, Briggs avenue, Gambrill street and Bainbridge avenue; and for the Sewerage District, in the Twenty-third Ward, bounded on the west by Third avenue, on the north by East One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, on the east by Willis and Brook avenues, and on the south by Harlem river.

Permission has been granted Joseph H. Godwin and Fordham Morris to regulate and grade, curb, gutter, flag and plant a street through their property, in the Twenty-fourth Ward, they agreeing to cede to the city the lands as shown within the lines of said streets, as laid out by the

ing to cede to the city the lands as shown within the lines of said streets, as laid out by the Department.

By permission of the Department, the Rod and Reel Association held their annual tournament on the Harlem Meer, on the Central Park, in October last.

The subject of the construction of a bridge over the Harlem river, not more than a half mile above High Bridge, has received much attention. An opinion has been received from the Counsel to the Corporation, stating that the Commissioners of this Department can construct, at the point mentioned, such a class of bridge as they may deem most suitable. The Commissioners have adopted a resolution to select four engineers to submit plans, with specifications and estimates of the cost of constructing a bridge under their respective plans. When these plans are received the Department will decide upon such plan as may be most desirable. The land on both sides of the river, for the approaches to this bridge, was acquired some years since. It is hoped that early spring will see the commencement of work of its construction.

The gas-holder at the Third Avenue Bridge, over the Harlem river, having been put in complete repair, the Commissioner of Public Works has given directions for the erection of additional lights on this bridge. This will supply a want long felt, and greatly add to the safety of persons passing over this bridge after dark.

The travel on the Harlem river, both for business and for pleasure, is increasing so rapidly that this bridge is taxed to its uttermost. The navigation requires that the draw on this bridge should be opened almost half hourly, from sunrise to sunset, and demands have even been made that it be opened at all hours of the day and night. The duty of this Department in that matter is now the subject of consideration at the Law Department, no statute having as yet been found covering it. The near completion of the Madison Avenue Bridge promises great relief to the Third Avenue Bridge for light travel; but the heavy traffic must naturall

The Department has consented to the assignment by Albert E. Moran to Dennis W. Moran of the contract for regulating and grading, etc., One Hundred and Forty-sixth street, from North Third avenue to St. Ann's avenue.

The following licenses have been granted by the Department:
To J. Clarence Dick to conduct the boat service on the Lake, at the Central Park, for the term of one year, upon the same conditions as the service has been hitherto performed by the late Thomas

To John Lucas to conduct the donkey service on the Central Park, for one year, under such rules and regulations as the Department may prescribe.

To J. P. Ryan to sell refreshments on Battery Park, for one year, from December 19, 1883, he to pay a license fee of five per cent. of his gross receipts, and at the expiration of the license the building used by him on said park to become the property of the Department.

The usual work of maintenance has been steadily prosecuted, and the condition of the Central

and City parks uniformly maintained.

The work remaining to be done on the entrance, drive and walks at Seventy-seventh street and Eighth avenue at the beginning of the quarter, was the superstruction of the walks, and the shaping and planting of the grounds adjoining. This work has been completed, the walks being surfaced with the coal-tar pavement. The park walls to connect with the bridge; Eighth avenue slopes adjoining, and equestrian road and water-way under the bridge still remain to be completed.

The construction of the walks and the shaping of the grounds in connection with the entrance at Eighth avenue and Eighty-first street, have generally been completed. About 4,600 square feet of walks remain to be covered with the coal-tar pavement, and shaping of grounds in connection. The park walls, etc., in connection with the entrance also remain to be constructed. The principal items of work done at the Seventy-seventh and Eighty-first street entrances, drives, and walks are—

800 cubic yards earth and mould furnished and put in place.

130 cubic yards stone furnished and placed in walks.
 10 acres ground shaped.
 260 lineal feet substruction walks built.

10,450 square feet walks surfaced with tar pavement.
74 lineal feet 4-in. and 6-in. drain-pipe laid.
6 walk and road basins built and rebuilt.
1 manhole rebuilt.

Mould has been spread over the unplanted ground, making up levels with the same, together with compost. Trees and shrubs have been planted in vacant spaces of the grove at Eighty-first street, and shrubs planted in the borders of approaches to Seventy-ninth and Eighty-first streets.

The rubbish has been cleared away for the purpose of the approaches and site of the refreshment building at Mount St. Vincent. The excavation for the foundation of the building which was commenced in September last was found to be mostly rock; the excavation has been continued and such stone as are suitable have been reserved for constructing wall in rear of sheds. Work has been done also upon the excavation and construction of the change of the southerly approach.

Working drawings for the different portions of the building have been prepared, and all the cellar walls and the greater part of the frame-work has been erected.

The granite and bronze work for a railing around the obelisk has been set up and completed. Between Seventy-second and Eighty-fifth streets on the westerly or park side of Fifth avenue a pavement of Seyssel rock asphalt, ten (10) feet in width, with one four feet in width to the curb at each street, has been laid, by contract, the quantity being 34,740 square yards.

The Eighth avenue sidewalk of the park, from Sixtieth to Seventy-second street has been graded and 250 elm trees planted thereon.

The nurseries, propagating houses, and greenhouses have been repaired and otherwise attended

The nurseries, propagating houses, and greenhouses have been repaired and otherwise attended to. The pavement sidewalks of Transverse Road No. I have been repaired. The work of removing snow from the parks of the city has been prosecuted with all the facilities at the command of the Department. Care has been given to the drives, walks, lawns, borders, drains, etc., in proper order, and all the basins of the drives, walks, bridle-road, and Transverse road have been cleaned.

Manure has been composted and spread upon the lawns to insure the fresh and vigorous condi-

Manure has been composted and spread upon the lawns to insure the fresh and vigorous condition of the grass in the spring; the dead leaves and brushwood in the park have been raked up and hauled away, dead trees and shrubs taken out, and plots for shrubbery trenched and planted on. The drives have been repaired with gravel where necessary, and the width of the drive north of the Casino has been extended. Stones have been broken and put on the circles at Fifty-ninth street, at Fifth and Eighth avenues. A new cart road around the animal pens has been graded, and sodding has been done around the same. The skate building at Central Park Lake has been put up, painted and calcimined, the heating apparatus and all the gas-pipes therein fitted up, and all deficiencies in the frame-work, platform, flooring, etc., thereof made good.

The necessary repairs have been made upon the tools, rolling stock, cottages and buildings of the Zoological Department.

The Department store-room and the stalls of the stables, at Eighty-fifth street, have been calcimined, and the House on the Hill, the animal buildings, the sashes of the Propagating Houses, the fence at the sheep fold, and the bridges near the North Gate-house, have been painted.

The work prosecuted on the section between Seventy-second and Seventy-ninth streets has been the continuation of the construction of the twelve-feet walk; walls and steps at the entrance at Seventy-second street; the shaping and finishing of the grounds; filling at Seventy-second street and other depressions; and the planting of a strip next adjoining the Hudson River Railroad and other points were prepared.

The large amount of filling which was required at Seventy-second street and other points has

been delivered without cost, except the man on dump to receive and spread.

The total quantity received since the work commenced has been 6,500 cubic yards. The grate

coping, step, posts, and urns, are on the ground and in readiness for setting.

The principal items of work done are: 1,450 cubic yards earth excavated and rehandled. 2,700 "filling delivered.

Between Seventy-ninth and Eighty-first streets no labor has been extended beyond the receiving of the material, which is being dumped in the marshy and low ground without cost, and of which there has been received, since the opening of the dump, 8,500 cubic yards.

On the section between Eighty-seventh and Ninety-sixth streets the work done has been the completion of the walks, except gravel surface, and the shaping, seeding, and planting of the grounds from Eighty-seventh to Ninetieth street.

The excavation for and the substructure of the walks from Ninety-second to Ninety-fifth street, and the excavation of the rock adjoining Riverside avenue, between Ninety-fifth and Ninety-sixth streets, all the earth and top mould required for the finishing south of Ninetieth street, was procured, without cost, from sources outside and near the work, and hauled by the Department teams.

On section between One Hundred and Twentieth and One Hundred and Twenty-ninth streets, the work done has been the continuation of the grading of the fifty (50) feet carriageway, starting from the unfinished terminus of the Riverside avenue, near One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, and located along the top of the high bluff north and west of the old "Claremont" House, and connecting with the Riverside avenue, near One Hundred and Twentieth street; the shaping of the slopes; the removal of the top soil or mould, and placing the same on the newly shaped grounds; and the breaking and preparing the stone for the superstructure of the drive, and the construction of a veranda around the old "Claremont."

The masons', carpenters' and painters' work have been continued for this building in accordance with drawings and directions furnished by the architect, and its completion is looked for in the

The work of taking down and rebuilding the parapet and retaining walls on Riverside avenue, between One Hundred and First and One Hundred and Second streets, and near One Hundred and Third street, which was in progress October I, has been completed; and at One Hundred and Fifteenth street the excavation and masonry to secure the sewer passing under, has also been done, and the wall in part built, and the dressing of stone for its completion is now in progress.

At One Hundred and Fifteenth street the whole wall with parapet was entirely washed out in 1882 for a distance of sixty (60) feet, by the heavy body of water coming down the drive, ride and walk (a width of 168 feet) for a distance of 1,500 feet from the northward, with a fall of about 45 feet, together with the surface water from the grounds and streets extending easterly to the Boulevard, from One Hundred and Nineteenth to One Hundred and Fifteenth street, and southerly to One Hundred and Tenth street. To provide against any emergency of this character in the future, a Hundred and Tenth street. To provide against any emergency of this character in the future, a buttress has been constructed at this point, giving additional strength to the wall and leaving an opening through the parapet wall of ten (10) feet for an outlet for the water in case of stoppage of the basins or sewers. If thought advisable steps may hereafter be built on the buttress, giving an entrance to the park at this point.

The work done is:

100 cubic yards excavation.

15 cubic yards concrete foundation.

645 cubic yards retaining wall rebuilt. 145 lineal feet parapet and coping rebuilt.

Posts and chains have been erected between the drive and the lawns from Seventy-second to Seventy-ninth streets, and the lawns have been planted with shrubbery; the drive has been graveled and packed, and the gutters in many places repaired; the caring for the trees and grass-plats together with the weeding of the walks and laying fine gravel on the same has been attended to.

Considerable work of improvement has been performed during the quarter upon the triangles on the Boulevard, at Sixty-third and Sixty-fifth streets; a drinking fountain has been procured and put in place upon the former, and the iron fountain formerly standing east of the New Court-house in the City Hall Park, has been taken down, removed and put up in the fountain basin of this park, and the entire area of the triangle (except the paved walks) has been graded and sodded, and the improvement of the triangle fully completed. The work done besides the plumbing and setting of the fountains is 488 square yards ground shaped and sodded.

The original design of the triangle at Sixty-fifth street, which had been carried out in part several years ago, was changed and a new design adopted by the Board November 21.

The rock and stone filling have been excavated and removed; the grading and excavating for the curb has been done, the curb set and reset, and the necessary filling and mould furnished and placed thereon.

The surfacing of the sidewalks, shaping and sodding, and planting remains to be done.

The work done is:

190 cubic yards rock excavated. 200 cubic yards stone filling and earth excavation. 250 cubic yards earth filling and mould furnished.

254 lineal feet curb set and reset.

The work done on Morningside Park has been for the bay walls only, and is being done by contract. The excavation for the foundations of the walls at One Hundred and Sixteenth and One Hundred and Seventeenth streets are in progress, and stone for the walls are being dressed and prepared so that the construction of the walls may be prosecuted as early in the spring as the weather

prepared so that the construction of the walls may be prosecuted as early in the spring as the weather will permit.

On Manhattan Square the ground north of the Museum Building has been graded. Several thousand cubic yards of mould have been used in grading the plots, commencing at the north end of the Museum, lying south and west thereof, and at Eighth avenue and Eighty-first street, sloping towards the Museum Building, up to the entrance of the square at Seventy-ninth street, and grading the sloping banks west of the Museum. This bank and the plot at Eighty-first street and Eighth avenue have been seeded with grass seed, gravel has been spread on the drive, from Seventy-seventh street and Eighth avenue to the north end of the Museum Building, also from the south end of the building along Seventy-seventh street to Eighth avenue. The flagging on the Ninth avenue sidewalk, between Seventy-ninth and Eighty-first streets, for a distance of 800 lineal feet, has been regraded and relaid; the shrubs and trees have been trimmed, and the ground about them cultivated.

Approaches have been made to Ladies' Cottage on Mount Morris Park; the walks have been graded all around the hill; all the drain-basins repaired, and bar pavement laid on all the hill walks; the cutting of dead trees and pruning of shrubs in the park has also been attended to.

The City Parks' lawns and walks have had the usual attendance, together with the cutting away of all dead trees and dead limbs.

The Fourth Avenue Parks have been mostly planted, and this work will be continued during the

spring months.

The walks and lawns of the East River Park, at Eighty-fourth street, have also been attended

to, and the condition of the park improved, the buildings on the park having been painted.

Plans, specifications, and drawings have been prepared for laying sleepers and flooring on the sidewalks of the Third Avenue Bridge, over the Harlem river, and the contract for the work awarded, the same being now in progress.

### TWENTY-THIRD AND TWENTY-FOURTH WARDS.

In the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards the demand for public improvements has been steadily growing for two years past. From 1874, the year of annexation, to 1881, there were but 13 ordinances adopted for street improvements; in 1881, there were 10; in 1882, 50; and in 1883, 29. The cause of this increase is undoubtedly largely due to the general prosperity of the community, following the lethargy consequent upon the hard times of 1873-4; it is also equally apparent that it indicated a marked increase of population in these wards, due to the elevated roads, the rapid building up of Harlem, and in no small degree to the sanitary improvements which this Department has persistently and steadily carried out in the district. Prior to the annexation, but 3½ miles of sewers of all kinds had been built; since that time 12½ miles have been built. As the matter of sewerage is entirely within the control of this Department, the above figures are the best answer that can be made to the unwarrantable assertion sometimes made, that the material interests of the district in charge have been neglected by it. While the question of sewerage and drainage has and should continue to receive the first consideration, improvements of the streets have been carried on with an unprecedented degree of activity during the past year. For the eight years from

has and should continue to receive the first consideration, improvements of the streets have been carried on with an unprecedented degree of activity during the past year. For the eight years from annexation to 1882, bit 3 45-100 miles of streets were regulated and graded; in 1882, 96-100 of a mile; and in 1883, 5 6-100 miles.

During the past year, 18,037 square yards of roadways have been paved, against 45,390 square yards laid during the entire preceding nine years.

While there will always be people of narrower views who cannot appreciate public improvements except the same are executed directly in front of their individual property, yet a broad view will clearly show that an immense amount of public work has been initiated and completed by the Department of Public Parks in the two wards in question; but what is a greater subject of congratulation is the fact that what has been done has, as a rule, been well and properly done. Much of the work executed is preliminary, and ordinarily unseen (such as the monumenting, the designing of separate plans for systems of sewerage and drainage, the establishment of street grades, etc.), yet they are the very foundation of every physical improvement. Its scientific character and the immense amount of any detail connected with this preliminary work, as a rule, precludes the layman from examining or appreciating it, and tempts charlatan reformers to endeavor to mislead the public regarding it, with resulting tendency towards insufficient support, yet its latent influence towards the future health, value and development of any district are so apparent when the subject is studied and comprehended in its full scope, that it should take precedence of all other public works.

# LAYING OUT AND MONUMENTING.

This Department has jurisdiction under chapter 604 of the Laws of 1874, of laying out all that portion of the Twelfth Ward north of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, as well as the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, in all some 14,292 acres, or 57½ per cent. of the entire area of the city, as defined in a former report, the general scope of the work being the conversion of this great area from farm land into city property. Prior to 1874 complete topographical maps had been prepared, but with the exception of a portion of Sedgwick avenue and the short portions of other streets, in all less than four miles, all of the Twenty-fourth Ward and some 3,700 acres of the Twenty-third Ward remained to be laid out; since then the following have been adopted and filed by this Department:

During the past quarter a plan for la ing out the High Bridge District, 218 acres, has been under consideration by the Department and property owners, as has also been the case with a plan for laying out the Port Morris District, 305 acres.
With the adoption of plans for these districts, and a revision of a portion of the Twelfth Ward map to conform to the new channel of the Harlem river, as adopted by the United States authorities, the work of laying out will be practically ended.

# Monumenting.

The progress made in this work during the quarter, has continued to be excellent. In the office the calculations necessary to determine the position of monuments, and the dimensions of the blocks established by the monuments, have been completed for about 23,522 lineal feet or 4 32-100 miles of streets; for the preceding three quarters, 1883, 36 miles of streets, or for the year, 40 32-100 miles of streets. In order to reduce all the chances of error in this work to the minimum, the rule for the year past has been to practically test, by survey, the relative position of all monuments set, before filing maps showing their location.

A limit of 15-100 of a foot in 1,000 feet has been adopted as the greatest allowable discrepancy between calculated distances and those actually measured on the ground—that is, if the calculated distance between two monuments was 100 feet, and the actual measurement gave either 100 15-100

feet, or 99 985-1000 feet, the work would be accepted; on the other hand, rejected and revised if the difference exceeds these.

So much skill and care is bestowed upon the instrumental work in the field and the office calculations, that it is very rarely that the above limit of error is exceeded, or that the work has to be revised. Most of the tests show that the variations between measured and calculated distances, are much below the maximum limit of error allowed, and fully sustain the reputation of the Department in this respect for exact and reliable work.

165 monuments have been so tested during the last quarter, viz. the last quarter, viz:

67 in the Hunt's Point District. 98 in the West Farms, Central and Boscobel Districts.

During the past quarter year considerable time has been spent in testing the location of street monuments, set by the town of Morrisania by contract prior to annexation, and the positions of 103 of such monuments were verified or corrected by calculation from data obtained from actual field measurements.

#### ESTABLISHING STREET GRADES.

Maps have been adopted and filed during the quarter, establishing the grade of the following-named streets in the Twenty-fourth Ward:

Summit street, from Marion to Briggs avenue. Gambril street, from Marion to Bainbridge avenue. Southern Boulevard, from Marion to Bainbridge avenue. Marion avenue, from Southern Boulevard to Summit street, Carlin avenue, from Southern Boulevard to Summit street. Briggs avenue, from Southern Boulevard to Summit street. -having an aggregate length of 5,138 feet.

The exact location and dimensions of 320 distinct properties in portions of West Morrisania, Central Morrisania, East Morrisania, Fairmount, West Farms, and Hunt's Point, have been obtained in the field; the aggregate area covered by these surveys is some 254 acres, including unopened streets.

Good progress has been made in the matter of searches in the Register's Office, at White Plains, for conveyances made prior to the annexation of Morrrisania, West Farms and Kingsbridge to the City of New York.

The evidence required to settle boundary lines in Morrisania, is in most cases so incomplete, vague, and contradictory, that it requires a high degree of patience, technical skill and discriminating judgment before a decision can be properly or safely recorded on these official maps.

# BRIDGES.

The southern approach (between One Hundred and Thirty-seventh and One Hundred and Thirty-eighth streets) has had the wall masonry completed during the past quarter, and that for the southern abutment (One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street to the Harlem river) has been nearly completed, about ten days' work only remaining to be done in the spring; the filling-in of the eastern approach and abutment, has been about three-fourths completed, about one-half for the southern approach, and commenced for the southern abutment; stone-cutting for the parapet has been commenced; the iron work for spans 1, 2, 4 and 5 is in place, and work commenced upon span 3 (draw span). span).

During the past year the increase in the population of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards has been great, with a corresponding addition to the business traffic, and to the number of vehicles using the roads and avenues, and these vehicles to a large and increasing extent, belong not merely to the annexed district, but they daily come from business houses in the lower city. The whole city, therefore, is highly interested in the character and permanence of the roads and bridges of the two wards.

bridges of the two wards.

The tollowing table will show the streets, roads and avenues on which necessary improvements have been made during the last three months. When it is considered that most of the streets and roads named have only earth surfaces, which are soon cut up by wheels and damaged by the wash of rains, it will be perceived that the work of repairing is a continually recurring task, and a duty which cannot be neglected without giving good cause for public complaint.

Necessary repairs and improvements have been made on the following roads, streets and

The principle of apportioning the work to be done according to the assessed value of each section, has been applied as near as practicable during the past year, with happy results in the work of macadamizing roads, etc. In connection with this, instead of completing a long stretch of stone surfacing in one locality, without reference to the more urgent needs of others, and without reference to the peculiarities of surface or location, a reasonable latitude of operation has been found to be more satisfactory, and a greater number of points have been improved to the benefit and gratification of a variety of neighborhoods. By this mode the gradual improvement of separate sections has aggregated, and will aggregate in a few years, a desirable completion of the whole plan of macadamizing the former earth roads. Precedence in macadamizing is given to those roads which lead directly through the most busy portions of a district, and from business centres to the most important outlying villages, and those that lead directly from populous centres to important railroad stations.

The roads macadamized in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, during 1883, cost on an average \$4,204.65 a mile, the material used being trap-rock, and the rolling of the stone, and the cost of transportation for a radius of a mile from landings being included.

The Menagerie has received in exchange for fifty common ducks one demoiselle crane from North Africa.

Two guinea pigs, born in the Menagerie, were added to the collection.

The jackdaws, presented by Mr. Schieffelin, were placed at liberty on the park.

The principal deaths occurring were two panthers which had been in the Menagerie for over fifteen years. The death of one was caused by old age, the other by an injury.

During the past three months the aviary and buffalo house have been painted; the roof to the carnivora and herbivora buildings have been repaired, also new gutters and leaders, and a road has been constructed to the rear of the camel sheds.

#### METEOROLOGICAL OBSERVATORY.

During the past quarter two hundred and fifty monthly tables have been printed each month, and distributed to home and foreign observatories and libraries. Weekly reports have been issued to the CITY RECORD. Health Department and newspapers and meteorological information has been supplied to the law courts, Counsel to the Corporation, and also to the engineer in charge of the An officer of the Meteorological office of the Government of India was recently sent to this

observatory to inspect Draper's self-recording instruments and has ordered two sets.

On November 19 a letter was received from the Meteorological Council of the Royal Society of England, inquiring whether severe fluctuations had been recorded by the self-recording barometers

of this observatory on August 27 and 28, 1883, and, if so, whether copies of the registers could be

These fluctuations had been noticed and a record made of them for future study. At the time of their occurrence it was supposed that they were due to the earthquake at the Straits of Sunda, Java. Copies of our registers were made and sent.

At this Observatory the rose-red morning and evening skies during the latter part of November, are supposed to be due to moisture high up in the atmosphere which absorbs all but the red rays from the transmitted and reflected sun-light. The spectroscope confirms this opinion by showing the rain bands very prominently.

The reductions of the hourly temperatures of the self-recording instruments are approaching completion, and it is hoped that they will be ready for printing in the Annual Report of this year.

The tables of these reductions will be 130 in number.

The annexed tables give an abstract of the mean, the maximum, and minimum readings from

the various self-recording instruments in this observatory, and also comparisons with the same quarter of other years.

Abstract of Proceedings for the week ending February 9, 1884.

WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 6, 1884.—REGULAR MEETING-10 A. M.

Present—Commissioners Viele, (President), Crimmins, and Olliffe.

Commissioner Olliffe called the attention of the Board to a petition to the Legislature signed by Jordan L. Mott, Henry Lewis Morris, John S. King and others, property-owners, that this Department be authorized to alter and amend a certain map showing streets and avenues in the Twenty-third Ward, by changing the width of Mott avenue and the location of its westerly line.

AT 9.30 P. M. ON THURSDAY THE 15TH instant, the aqueduct had to be shut off to repair a large leak that could not be repaired in the usual manner from the exterior. This leak had suddenly devoloped in the section south of Yonkers, where smaller fissures had previously occurred.

The examination showed fissures aggregating 2,000 feet in length. The repairs were finished and water was again turned on by 4 F. M., on Saturday, the 17th instant.

While the flow through the aqueduct was interrupted the supply in the Central Park reservor was drawn down five eet.

This loss of supply in the city reservoirs, occurring now, as winter is approaching, makes it necessary to take extra precautions against waste of water. Being aware of the temptation to leave faucets open in cold weather to prevent freezing in the pipes, I specially protest against that practice, and appeal to all citizens to abstain from wasteful use of water in any manner whatever. The present condition of the supply and the possibility of a recurrence of similar leaks in the aqueduct make it my duty to give this public notice that I shall hereimafter resort to the peremptory measure of shutting off the water in all places where persistent waste is discovered.
