BOARD OF REVISION AND CORRECTION OF ASSESSMENTS.

A meeting of the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments was held at the Comptroller's Office, in the New Court-house, on Monday, May 6, 1878, at 2.40 o'clock P. M.
Present—John Kelly, Comptroller; William C. Whitney, Counsel to the Corporation.
Absent—John K. Hackett, Recorder.
The minutes of the meetings held February 25, March 1, and May 4, 1878, were read and approved.

The assessment list for paving with Belgian or trap-block pavement and setting and resetting curb stones in Fourth avenue, from Forty-ninth to Sixty-seventh street, and objections of Mr. Samuel Montgomery, together with a communication from the Commissioner of Public Works relative thereto, were presented by the Comptroller, the same having been received by the Board of Assessors with a communication dated May 4, 1878.

After hearing Mr. Henry A. Cram, in opposition to the mode of the distribution of the expense of the work, on motion, the said assessment list was laid over.

The assessment list for regulating and grading, setting curb and gutter stones, and flagging sidewalks in One Hundred and First street, from Ninth avenue to the Boulevard, with record of awards made by the Board of Assessors, for damages to buildings by reason of change of grade on the line, and petitions and objections of Charles J. Knapp, Margaret A. Coe, Mary E. Barry, George A. Hearn, James Murtaugh, and others, together with copy of a communication from the Counsel to the Corporation to the Board of Assessors, relative to a decision of the General Term of the Supreme Court, rendered in the case of James Murtaugh, were presented to the Board by the Comptroller, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors, with communication dated April 4, 1878.

After hearing Mr. James A. Deering, attorney for James Murtaugh, and Mr. Charles H. Kitchel, attorney for William J. Dwyer, who had filed objections to the assessment, on motion, the said assessment list was laid over.

The assessment list for regulating and grading, and setting and resetting curb and gutter stones, and flagging and reflagging sidewalks on Ninety-first street, from Fourth to Fifth avenue, with record of awards made by the Board of Assessors for damages to buildings by reason of change of grade on the line, and petitions and objections of Jacob Fonger, William J. Kelly, Virginia M. Monroe, Mary P. Taber and others, were presented to the Board by the Comptroller, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors, with communication dated April 24, 1878.

After hearing Mr. James A. Deering, attorney for Mary P. Taber, on motion the objections to the said assessment list were overruled, and the list was confirmed—all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for paving, with Belgian pavement, Lawrence street, from Ninth avenue to Boulevard, and objections of G. R. Schieffelin and St. Mary's Church, by G. R. Schieffelin, attorney, were presented to the Board by the Comptroller, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors, with a communication dated April 24, 1878.

After consideration of the objections, on motion they were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed—all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The Comptroller presented to the Board the assessment list for regulating and grading, paving with granite blocks, laying cross-walks, setting curb-stones and flagging, and repaving and relaying cross-walks and resetting curb-stones in Worth street, from Broadway to Chatham street, and the streets intersecting Worth street for one block on either side of said street, in accordance with chapter 270, Laws of 1874, with record of awards made by the Board of Assessors for damages to buildings by reason of change of grade on the line, and opinions of the Counsel to the Corporation relative to the making of the awards; also petitions and objections of Messrs. W. C. Miller, Charles E. Quackenbush, James Cassin, Charles G. Smith, Curtis and Scudder, estates of Lorillard and others, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors with communication dated April 4, 1878.

After hearing Mr. James A. Deering, attorney, in behalf of Joshua Dyson and others, and Mr. Albon Man, agent of Lorillard estates, who had filed objections in said matter, on motion the said assessment list was laid over for further consideration.

At 3.30 o'clock P. M., on motion, the Board adjourned.

The Board of Health met this day.

Reports Received.

Resolved, That the Sanitary Superintendent be directed to commence the annual inspection of tenement houses.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending May 4, 1878. The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,368, as follows, viz.:

6 public buildings, 467 tenement-houses, 175 private dwellings, 93 other dwellings, 22 manufactories and workshops, 25 stores and warehouses, 45 stables, 1 market, 42 slaughter-houses, 5 soap factories,

16 fat-rendering establishments, 3 manure dumps, 1 glycerine work, 1 public drain, 31 sunken and vacant lots, 54 yards, courts, and areas, 75 cellars and basements, 141 waste-pipes and drains, 110 privies and water-closets, 23 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 3 dangerous stairways, 8 smoky chimneys, 1 violation of the Code, 1 cess-pool, 3 piggeries, 16 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 604.

During the past week 141 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 92 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

126 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 41 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 38 houses, 38 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

1 person sick with measles was removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

During the week ending May 4, 1878, there were issued from this Bureau 467 burial permits for city deaths, 29 for bodies in transitu, and 39 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 467 deaths, 199 marriages, 450 still-births, 29 applications for transit permits, and 50 returns from coroners. There were 29 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 6 transcripts of birth record, 4 of marriage and 19 of death were issued from this Bureau.

The Board of Health will earnestly co-operate in such an investigation and will afford all the assistance in its power to make it complete.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—During the week ending Saturday, May 4, 1878, 467 deaths were reported to have occurred in this city; which is a decrease of 36, as compared with the preceding week, and 5 less than the number reported during the corresponding week of 1877. The actual mortality for the week ending April 27, was 513, which is 22 below the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.68 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,080,835.

The 7 most fatal causes of death during the week, were the following: Phthisis pulmonalis, 82; pneumonia, 61; diseases of the brain and nervous system, 39; bronchitis, 25; Bright's disease and diphtheria, 24 each, and diseases of the heart, 23. The decrease in the mortality during the week, compared with that of the preceding week, was from the following causes, viz.: Measles, 1; scarlatina, 11; croop, 2; malarial fevers, 1; puerperal diseases, 7; diarrhoeal diseases, 1; rheumatism and gout, 3; cancer, 2; bronchitis, 10; pneumonia, 2; diseases of the brain and nervous system, 11; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2, and premature and preterm births, 3; while the following diseases showed an increase: Diphtheria, 5; whooping cough, 1; erysipelas, 1; inanition, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 7; diseases of the heart, 2; marasmus and scrofula, 3; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 2; Bright's disease and nephritis, 3, and drowning, 5.

The number of deaths reported from measles during the month of April was 55, of scarlatina, 98, of diphtheria, 93, of membranous croup, 55, of whooping cough, 18, of cerebro-spinal fever, 10, and of malarial fevers, 33. The number of deaths in tenement-houses from measles was 34, scarlatina 63, diphtheria 53, membranous croup 37, whooping cough 15, cerebro-spinal fever 5, and malarial fevers 17. The number of deaths in houses containing three families and less from measles was 8, scarlatina 33, diphtheria 34, membranous croup 13, whooping cough 3, cerebro-spinal fever 10, and malarial fevers 33; 13 of the deaths from measles, 2 from scarlatina, 4 from diphtheria, and 5 from membranous croup were in institutions, and 2 deaths from diphtheria were in hotels and boarding-houses. The percentage of deaths to the total monthly mortality of measles in tenement-houses was 61.8, of scarlatina 64.5, of diphtheria 56.9, of membranous croup 67.3, of whooping cough 83.3, of cerebro-spinal fever 50, and of malarial fevers 51.5. The wards which had the highest number of deaths from measles were the Nineteenth, 12; Twenty-second, 7, and Seventeenth, 5; from scarlatina were the Seventeenth, 12; Twenty-second, 10, and the Nineteenth, 9; from diphtheria were the Nineteenth and Twentieth, 16 each, and Ninth, 10; from membranous croup were the Nineteenth, 9; Thirtieth, Seventeenth and Twenty-second, 5 each; from whooping cough were the Sixteenth, Eighteenth and Twentieth, 3 each; from cerebro-spinal fever the Eighteenth, 2; from malarial fevers the Twentieth, 4; Eleventh, Twelfth, Seventeenth, Nineteenth and Twenty-fourth Wards, 3 each.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 86 were in institutions, 242 in tenement houses, 123 in houses containing three families or less, 9 in hotels and boarding-houses, 6 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 3 were on the basement floor, 102 on the first, 111 on the second, 91 on the third, 53 on the fourth, 14 on the fifth; 463 were stated to be residents of this city, and 4 non-resident; 58 were stated to be single, 110 married, 48 widowed, and the condition of 251 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The disposition of 449 deaths and still-births, or 88.77 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 12; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 185; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 66; Greenwood (undenominational), 27; Lutheran (undenominational), 71; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 16; Evergreen (undenominational), 34; Woodlawn (undenominational), 18; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 1; Union (Methodist Protestant), 1; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 2; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 6; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 6; Washington (undenominational), 4.

The distribution of deaths for the week ending April 27, 1878, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 6; Second, 0; Third, 1; Fourth, 11; Fifth, 5; Sixth, 7; Seventh, 16; Eighth, 15; Ninth, 23; Tenth, 18; Eleventh, 34; Twelfth, 41; Thirteenth, 15; Fourteenth, 9; Fifteenth, 10; Sixteenth, 17; Seventeenth, 37; Eighteenth, 29; Nineteenth, 88; Twentieth, 43; Twenty-first, 26; Twenty-second, 47; Twenty-third, 6; Twenty-fourth, 9.

The mean temperature for the week ending May 4, was 61 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.738, the mean humidity was 76, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 818, and the total amount of rain-fall was .53 inch of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons living, of the estimated or enumerated population, according to the most recent weekly returns of Philadelphia, was 18.15; Brooklyn, 18.00; St. Louis, 7.88; Chicago, 14.42; Baltimore, 16.55; Boston, 17.68; Cincinnati, 16.76; New Orleans, 20.97; Cleveland, 11.87; Richmond, 18.11; Charleston, 31.86; Dayton, 7.02; Lowell, 18.70; Worcester, 19.06; Cambridge, 17.37; Fall River, 2.72; Lawrence, 13.03; Lynn, 25.28; Springfield, 13.24. Monthly returns, Elmira, 15.14; Yonkers, 10.52; Norfolk, 24.52; Chattanooga, 23.00; Quincy, Ill., 7.50.
