### APPROVED PAPERS.

*Ordinances, Resolutions, etc., approved by the Mayor during the week ending September 14, 1878.*

Whereas, The dreadful results of the prevalence of yellow fever, which is now depopulating some of the chief cities in the Southern States, admonishes the authorities of this city to take such sanitary precautions as will secure immunity from that dreaded disease, or lessen the liability of its introduction; and as clean streets, and the removal of garbage and other refuse and offensive substances from the street gutters will tend materially to that end, be it

Resolved, That the Departments of Police and Health and the Commissioner of Public Works be and they are hereby earnestly recommended, and as far as this Common Council has the power, directed to cause the gutters in the several streets of this city, where the population is the most dense and the street gutters the most foul, to be thoroughly washed and cleansed every morning, from six until seven o'clock, until November 1, 1878, by opening or causing the several fire-hydrants to be opened, and the full force of the Croton water, now happily abundant, to be discharged into the gutters, in order properly and efficiently to cleanse and purify them, and thereby lessen the liability of yellow fever or any other disease making a lodgment in this city.

## BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS.

REPORTED MORTALITY\* for the week ending September 7, 1878, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending August 31, 1878.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—There were 530 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, September 7, 1878, which is a decrease of 23, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 9 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1877. The actual mortality for the week ending August 31, 1878, was 553, which is 37.6 below the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 26.48 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,085,741.
