DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

Transactions of the Department of Docks and Ferries for the Week Ending May 1, 1902.

A conference was held at the office of the Commissioner on Thursday, May 1, 1902, relative to the question of having all of the Hudson river lines stop at the West One Hundred and Twenty-ninth Street Pier for the benefit of the residents of Harlem, at which representatives of the various lines plying between New York and Albany and intermediary points were present.

A hearing was held on May 1, 1902, in relation to the application of Richard P. Coen for permission to place a manure dump on the pier at the foot of East Twenty-ninth street, at which Mr. James Sinclair, of the firm of James Sinclair & Co., appeared and protested against the granting of the privilege to maintain a manure dump at the East Twenty-ninth Street Pier, alleging that the same would cause a nuisance to his granite yard between Twenty-ninth street and Thirtieth street, East river.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Erie Railroad Company, to make general repairs during the ensuing six months to Counties Slip Pier No. 7, East river, and to Chambers Street Pier No. 20, Duane Street Pier No. 21, the West Forty-ninth Street Pier, and the ferry racks at Chambers and West Twenty-third streets, on the North river, the work to be kept within existing lines.

Columbia Engineering Works, to erect a one-story frame and corrugated iron structure on Beard's breakwater, in the Erie basin, Borough of Brooklyn, in accordance with plans submitted as amended.

Belle Wilcox, to repair the breakwater on her property at Weir's Lane, Staten Island Sound, at Tottenville, Borough of Richmond.

Chelsea Jute Mills, to change the location of the condenser and overflow pipes at the foot of Manhattan avenue, Newtown creek, Borough of Brooklyn, so that such pipes shall run entirely through water front property owned by them, the compensation heretofore fixed for the privilege of maintaining the pipes being discontinued from May 1, 1902, upon condition that such pipes will run entirely through water front property owned by private persons.

George Ryan, to erect an ice bridge, scales and tally house on the bulkhead between One Hundred and Seventh street and One Hundred and Eighth street, Harlem river, the consent of lessee having been obtained, the structures not to extend beyond the south side of East One Hundred and Eighth street, and to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Commissioner.

The following permits were granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Commissioner, but not longer than May 1, 1903:

Nicholas J. Carey, to maintain a float at the bulkhead north of Charles street, North river, the consent of J. Wesley Smith having been obtained; compensation to be charged for the privilege at the rate of \$1 per month, payable monthly in advance to the Dockmaster.

John Pierce, to unload granite columns at the bulkhead between Pier "A" and Battery Place Pier South, No. 1, the asphalt pavement thereat to be covered with planking while unloading, and the permittee to repair the pavement if damaged by such unloading; all work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

Willis A. Winne to use and occupy a berth commencing at a point sixty feet north of the northerly line of the Bloomfield Street Pier No. 53, North river, and extending northerly a distance of one hundred and twenty feet, with the privilege of erecting thereon an ice bridge, scales and tally house; compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$195 per month, payable monthly in advance to the Cashier; it being understood that this permit shall be of no force or effect unless the terms thereof are accepted by said Winne and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

The application of John N. Briggs for permission to erect an ice bridge on the bulkhead between West Fiftyth street and West Fifty-first street, or on the south side of the West Fifty-first Street Pier, North river, was denied, the premises in question being required for the Hudson river barge traffic.

The application of the Butchers' Hide and Melting Association for a lease of the land under water between Forty-fourth street and Forty-fifth street, East river, with the privilege of erecting a six-story building thereon, was denied.

Upon the recommendations of the Engineer-in-Chief and the Assistant Dock Superintendent, permission was granted the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity to place pipes on the marginal street, wharf or place extending from the northerly side of East One Hundred and Eighth street to the southerly side of East One Hundred and Tenth street, Harlem river, a strip of fifty feet in width along the bulkhead wall to be reserved for general wharfage; and said Department was requested to remove its pipes from the East Twentieth Street Pier to the new location.

The applications of Thomas F. Quinlan for a grant of land under water at the Kill von Kull in the First Ward of the Borough of Richmond, and of the Town of Hempstead Gas and Electric Light Company for a grant of land under water at Jamaica Bay, Rockaway Beach, in the Fifth Ward of the Borough of Queens, were transmitted to the Corporation Counsel.

The Corporation Counsel was requested to advise whether the Commissioner has power to change the office hours of the employees of the Department.

Upon the application of August C. Nanz, attorney for James W. Scott, the compensation to be charged said Scott for the use of the City property occupied by a portion of the ice platform, scales and tally house on the bulkhead between Broome Street Pier and Delancey Street Pier South, East river, was reduced to \$600 per annum from January 1, 1902.

The American Ice Company was notified that unless it applies for permission to maintain the ice bridge now located on the bulkhead south of Rivington Street Pier No. 50, East river, the portion of the structure situated on City property thereat will be removed by the force of this Department.

The Consolidated Ice Company was directed to remove the float constructed by them for bathing purposes on the southerly side of the East Ninety-first Street Pier, and was notified that in case said structure is not removed within five days it will be removed by the force of this Department.

A report was received from the Assistant Dock Superintendent recommending that, owing to the heretofore enormous expense for sprinkling the water front, that a trial be given the sprinkling of the newly made land by hand sprinklers, which recommendation was approved. A further report was received from the Assistant Dock Superintendent in relation to the existence of four outstanding Treasurer's orders issued by the former Board of Docks, November 30, 1901, for sprinkling the new made land along the water front, on each of which four days' work had been done prior to January 1, 1902, and the Corporation Counsel was requested to advise whether such orders should be cancelled, the aggregate sum of same being nearly \$4,000.

A communication was received from John B. McDonald, contractor for the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, in relation to the proposed lease of the West Fifty-eighth Street Pier, offering a rental of \$12,000 per annum therefor. He was notified in response to said communication that the Department proposes to lease to the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company the northerly side, outer end and entire surface of the West Fifty-eighth Street Pier, the lease contemplating the construction of a new pier by and at the expense of this Department; the pier to be approximately seven hundred feet long and sixty feet wide, the rental to commence upon the completion of the pier or upon the date of its occupancy by the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, or its assignee or assignees, if such occupancy precedes the date of completion; the pier to be constructed in accordance with plans and specifications to be prepared by this Department, and the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department; and the pier to be so constructed as to be suitable for supporting the structures to be placed thereon; the lease of the pier to be assignable only with the approval of the Department of Docks and Ferries. He was also notified that after due consideration of the cost of the proposed pier, it was deemed that the lowest rental that could be

fixed was \$15,000 per annum for the first term of the lease, this amount being deemed by the Commissioner to be a fair and proper rental.

In accordance with the request of the Department of Health that this Department apply to the United States Government for an extension of the pierhead line at North Brother Island, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to prepare plans for transmission to the Secretary of War, showing the desired pierhead line extension.

A communication was received from the New York Central Coal Company stating that it is perfecting a reorganization of its affairs, and requesting permission to assign to Messrs. Curtis & Blaisdell Contract No. 719, for furnishing and delivering coal, and on April 25, 1902, the consent of the Department was granted for such assignment, the consent of the sureties thereto having been given.

In reply to a communication from the Department of Street Cleaning relative to the charges made for services of tug employed to tow dumpers from Sherman's creek, Harlem river, said Department was notified that the bill of \$22.50 will be charged off, and the Chief Clerk was directed to charge off said claim on the books of the Department.

A report was received from the Engineer-in-Chief on Commissioner's Order No. 247, submitting description of the premises at the foot of East Forty-second street, which are owned by the City and are used in connection with the ferry thereat; the franchise of the ferry was, on April 28, 1902, ordered readvertised, subject to the approval of the proposed terms of sale, as amended, by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the description of the property to be sold in connection with the franchise being as follows: "Beginning at a point where the northerly line of East Forty-second street intersects the established bulkhead line at the foot of said street, thence running southerly along said bulkhead line a distance of about one hundred feet to the southerly line of East Forty-second street, thence easterly along said southerly line of East Forty-second street a distance of about one hundred and fifty feet to the pierhead line established by the United States Government, thence northerly a distance of about one hundred feet, and thence westerly a distance of about one hundred and fifty feet, more or less, to the place of beginning."

The specifications and form of contract submitted by the Engineer-in-Chief for dredging on the East and Harlem rivers, in the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, Queens and The Bronx were approved and ordered printed and advertised.

The application of the American Ice Company for permission to repair the sheathing on the south side of the Jackson Street Pier West, East river, was granted, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department; and said company was notified that it is not deemed advisable to grant permission for the erection of a coal pocket on the pier, as it is expected that the City will in a very short time acquire title to the private interests in the pier.

Robert C. Loper, John Murphy, John Walsh and Nicholas Ryan, having been certified by the Municipal Civil Service Commission as eligible, were appointed Pile Driving Enginemen in this Department on probation, April 29, 1902, with compensation at the rate of 44 cents per hour while employed.

The compensation of John T. Havanagh, Thomas Reynolds and Thomas F. O'Rourke, Laborers, was on April 28, 1902, fixed at the rate of twenty-five cents per hour each while employed.

A communication was received from Col. A. S. Kimball, Assistant Quartermaster General, U. S. A., requesting that the lease of the Wall Street Pier No. 12, East river, be modified so as to provide for the insurance of the pier by this Department against total or partial destruction through fire, floating ice, collision or the action of the elements, and that the clause providing that repairs be made by the War Department be eliminated from the lease. He was notified that the lease cannot now be changed, the same having been executed by the Commissioner of Docks in accordance with terms approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and it being against the present policy of the City to insure such property.

The following orders were issued upon the recommendation of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Knickerbocker Steam Towage Company, to repair and repaint the rolling shutters of the shed on Battery Place Pier South No. 1, North river, said company being also notified that unless the work is commenced within fifteen days it will be done by the force of this Department, the cost thereof to be reported for collection in accordance with the terms of the lease.

East Side Settlement, to repair the fence along the top of the wall between Seventy-fifth street and Seventy-sixth street, East river.

The following orders were issued to the Engineer-in-Chief:

To repair the sheathing on Barrow Street Pier No. 43, North river, at a cost not to exceed \$1,000.

To repair Wall Street Pier No. 12, East river, where damaged by tugs "William T. Hart" and "William Leary," the cost of said repairs to be reported for collection from the Berwyck Towing Company, owners of said tugs.

To repair the East Thirty-fifth Street Pier.

To order dredging under Contract No. 707 at the dumping board, foot of Eightieth street, East river, as requested by the Department of Street Cleaning.

To order dredging in front of the bulkhead between One Hundred and Nineteenth street and One Hundred and Twentieth street, Harlem river, under Contract No. 707, the cost of the work to be reported for collection from Curtis & Blaisdell, in accordance with their request.

To fence off from public use the pier at the foot of Bay Ridge avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, in accordance with the request of the Commissioner of Parks of that borough.

In accordance with the request of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the Commissioner on April 29, 1902, submitted to said Board for consideration, the following proposed schedule of graded compensations of employees of the Department:

From the Department of Street Cleaning, requesting the assignment and preparation of a berth for a covered dump in the vicinity of Jackson street, East river.

From John C. Rodgers, expressing his willingness to pay rental for the land under water covered by platform at the foot of Farragut street, in the Borough of The Bronx, if the legality of such charge is determined in a court of law.

From T. G. Patterson, stating that the dumping board erected by the Consolidated Gas Company on the West Twentieth Street Pier is not being used by said company, and requesting that same be removed so as to make the berth available for general wharfage. Consolidated Gas Company requested to advise whether it proposes to use the dump.

From F. W. Valiant, requesting permission to erect an ice bridge at the Wallabout basin, Borough of Brooklyn.

From Snow & Emerson, requesting a berth for the boat "Stuyvesant" on the north side of the East Fifth Street Pier.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Mayor, transmitting communications from John Lynch and from James Taylor & Sons in relation to the loss to property owners on account of the delay of the City in acquiring title to the property at the Chelsea Section, between Bloomfield street and West Twenty-third street, on the North river. Said persons were notified that it is the intention of the Department to take possession of the property and proceed with the improvements as soon as possible.

From the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, transmitting certified copies of resolutions adopted April 25, 1902, approving the terms and conditions of Contracts No. 725, for preparing for and building a new wooden pier, with appurtenances, near the foot of West Forty-third street; No. 732, for preparing for and repairing the pier and approach, with appurtenances, at the foot of West Forty-eighth street; No. 733, for preparing for and building a new wooden platform, with appurtenances, adjoining the approach to Charles Street Pier No. 46, and Perry Street Pier No. 47, North river; and No. 734, for furnishing and delivering sawed yellow pine timber; together with certified copies of resolutions adopted on the same day, as follows:

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 818 of the Amended Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of the establishment by the Commissioner of Docks of a ferry from and to the foot of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, Borough of The Bronx, to and from a point between Eighth avenue and Ninth avenue, in the Third Ward of the Borough of Queens, in the late village of College Point, under the terms offered by Mrs. E. Platt Stratton for the cession of the land at the foot of Eighth avenue, College Point, as shown on the plan and described in the communication of the Commissioner of Docks, dated March 29, 1902."

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution, by the Commissioner of Docks, of a lease to the People's Co-Operative Ice Company of the bulkhead commencing at the centre line of West Eighty-first street and running thence southerly along said bulkhead a distance of one hundred and fifty feet, together with the privilege of erecting and maintaining an ice bridge, scales and tally house thereon, for a term of three years from May 1, 1902, at an annual rental of fifteen hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$1,575), payable quarterly in advance at the office of the Department of Docks and Ferries, as recommended by the Commissioner of Docks in communication dated April 5, 1902. Provided, That this lease at the option of the City is to cease and terminate if at any time during this period the People's Co-Operative Ice Company should become a part

of or be controlled by the American Ice Company or by any holding company which shall control both."

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution, by the Commissioner of Docks, of a lease to the Union Stock Yard and Market Company and the Weehawken Stock Yard Company of the pier at the foot of West Fortieth street, North river, Borough of Manhattan, for a period of five years from May 1, 1902, at an annual rental of four thousand four hundred dollars (\$4,400), payable quarterly in advance, as recommended by the Commissioner of Docks in communication dated March 21, 1902."

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution, by the Commissioner of Docks, of a lease to the Union Stock Yard and Market Company and the Weehawken Stock Yard Company of the pier at the foot of West Fortieth street, North river, Borough of Manhattan, with the privilege of erecting and maintaining thereon an ice bridge and a manure dump, for a term of five years from May 1, 1902, at a rental of eight thousand eight hundred dollars (\$8,800) per annum, payable quarterly in advance at the office of the Department of Docks and Ferries; the terms and conditions of said lease to be fixed by the Commissioner of Docks."

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the granting of a permit to Peter Hale to use and occupy during the pleasure of the Commissioner of Docks, the bulkhead commencing on the southerly side of East One Hundred and Ninth street, and running southerly a distance of 125 feet, with the privilege of erecting and maintaining an ice bridge, scales and tally house thereon, commencing April 15, 1902, subject to the covenants and conditions contained in the usual form of leases now in use in the Department of Docks and Ferries, in regard to repairs, etc., at a rental of \$1,575 per annum, payable quarterly in advance at the office of the Department of Docks and Ferries; the terms and conditions of said permit to be fixed by the Commissioner of Docks."

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the granting of a permit to Thomas Costello, Jr., to use and occupy during the pleasure of the Commissioner of Docks, one hundred and fifty feet of the northerly side, inner end of the pier foot of Fifty-fourth street, North river, with the privilege of erecting and maintaining thereon an ice bridge, scales and tally house, commencing April 18, 1902; compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of fifteen hundred and seventy-five dollars per annum, payable quarterly in advance at the office of the Department of Docks and Ferries, said permit to be subject to all terms and conditions of leases now in use in said Department relative to repairs."

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution, by the Commissioner of Docks, of a lease to Eben E. Olcott of the pier at the foot of West Twenty-second street, in the Borough of Manhattan, The City of New York, together with the right to use the shed thereon, for a term of ten years from May 1, 1902, at a rental of \$18,333.33 per annum, payable quarterly in advance at the office of the Department of Docks and Ferries; the terms and conditions of said lease to be fixed by the Commissioner of Docks."

Russell to the position of Telephone Operator; and advising that a competitive examination for the position of Automobile Engineer will be held May 16, 1902, the application of this Department for permission to make a provisional appointment to such position not being approved.

From the Commissioner of Public Works:

1st. Requesting to be advised as to the lines of jurisdiction of the Department of Docks and Ferries and the Department of Public Works along South street and West street. Notified that that portion of the exterior streets outside of the seventy-foot street line of West street and South street is under the jurisdiction of this Department.

2d. Requesting that the sewer at the foot of One Hundred and Thirtieth street, North river, be extended through the new bulkhead wall thereat. Notified that this Department has left an opening for such sewer through the bulkhead wall, but that the work of building the new sewer outlet should be done by the Commissioner of Public Works.

From the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, stating that it is proposed to place additional hydrants for supplying water to shipping along the water front, and requesting to be advised as to what locations will be the most desirable for the placing of such hydrants. Notified that in the opinion of this Department the most desirable locations for the placing of such supply hydrants, where they would be useful also in cases of fire, would be at the approach to the pier foot of West Thirty-ninth street, at the outer end of the West Fifty-fourth Street Pier, and at the outer end of the West One Hundred and Thirty-first Street Pier, on the North river; at the outer end of the Clinton Street Pier and at the outer ends of the East Fifth, East Twenty-ninth, East Sixtieth and East Ninety-fourth Street Piers, on the East river.

From the Secretary of State, inclosing certified copy of chapter 546 of the Laws of 1902, in relation to the use of the water front between Fifty-first street and Fifty-fourth street, North river, for canal boats and barges.

From the State Engineer and Surveyor, requesting information and maps showing the dimensions of the water front and blocks between Englis street and Webster avenue, Long Island City. Information and maps furnished.

From the Old Dominion Steamship Company, accepting the terms and conditions of the proposed lease of the Beach Street Pier No. 26, North river, with adjoining bulkhead.

From the Interurban Street Railway Company, accepting the terms of the permit for the awning shed on the bulkhead between Watts Street Pier No. 31 and Watts Street Pier North, North river.

From the New York Telephone Company, stating that free telephone service cannot

be granted employees of this Department for official business, owing to the constitutional provision which prohibits the issuance of free telephone passes to officers or employees of the City or State departments.

From the New York Dock Company, transmitting executed agreement that no additional item of value shall be claimed beyond the cost of the shed to be erected on their Pier No. 37, Atlantic basin, Borough of Brooklyn, in the event of the City requiring the premises for the improvement of the water front, and stating that as soon as the shed is constructed this Department will be furnished with a statement of the cost.

From the New York and College Point Ferry Company, submitting statement of ferry receipts for the years 1900 and 1901.

From Charles A. Berrian, auctioneer, reporting that the sale of old material held April 24, 1902, netted the sum of \$167.62.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the board of aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 430 of the Greater New York Charter.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.
