THE CITY OF NEW YORK—DEPARTMENT OF PARKS.

By-Laws of the Park Board.

ARTICLE I.

Meetings.

Section 1. All meetings of the Park Board shall be held at the principal office of the Department in the Borough of Manhattan, except as may be otherwise ordered by the Board or by the President from time to time.

Sec. 2. Stated meetings of the Board shall be held on Thursday of each week. Other meetings may be held by adjournment or the call of the President, or on the written request of two of the Commissioners.

At least two days' notice of each meeting, other than an adjourned meeting, shall be given in writing to each Commissioner. Two members of the Board may designate in writing, to be filed with the Secretary, a shorter period for such notice in the case of any meeting other than a stated meeting.

In all cases notices of meetings shall be given by delivering a copy of such notice to each Commissioner personally, or by mailing such copy to him, or leaving the same at his place of residence, or other address that may be given by him to the Secretary for the purpose.

Sec. 3. The hour of meeting shall be 3 o'clock p. m., except as the Board may from time to time otherwise order.

ARTICLE II.

Officers.

Section 1. The officers of the Board shall be:

1. President.
2. Secretary.
3. Assistant Secretary.
4. Landscape Architect.

There shall also be such other employees as the Board may determine.

President.

Sec. 2. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Board. In his absence a Commissioner, selected by the members present, shall preside.

By virtue of his office the President shall be the Executive Officer of the Department, and as such shall be charged with the execution of all contracts awarded by the Board, and with the execution of all orders and directions that may be given by the Board in all matters not falling within the administrative jurisdiction of an individual Commissioner as provided by the Charter.

Whenever it shall appear that the President by reason of sickness or other disability will not be able to perform the functions of his office for a period of more than one week, or whenever he shall declare his inability to perform his duties by reason of contemplated absence from the city, the duties of President shall be performed by another Commissioner whom the Board shall designate during such periods of absence or inability of the President.

In the exercise of all the duties of his office the President shall be subject to the direction, supervision and control of the Board.

Secretary.

Sec. 3. The Secretary of the Board shall keep the minutes and records of the Board, receive all documents, reports, communications or papers which may appertain to the business of the Board, and shall transmit the same immediately to the President, who shall return the same as soon as may be convenient for submission to the Board or filing, as may be required. All papers and records shall be properly indexed by the Secretary. He shall be the custodian of all the books, records and other property of the Board, and shall perform such other duties as from time to time may be required of him by the Board, the President, or the Commissioner of Parks for the Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond.

He shall, as occasion may require, communicate the action of the Board to the persons or bodies affected thereby.

Assistant Secretary.

Sec. 4. The Assistant Secretary shall assist the Secretary in the general work of the Board, and in the absence of the latter shall act in his stead. It shall also be his duty to perform the work incidental to the awarding and execution of contracts, and he shall perform such other duties as may be required of him by the Board.

Landscape Architect.

Sec. 5. It shall be the duty of the Landscape Architect from time to time to prepare and submit to the Board or to any Commissioner as he may deem proper, or as he may be requested by said Board, or by any Commissioner, plans for works or changes thereof respecting the parks, parkways, squares or public places of the City. His assent shall be requisite to all plans and work or changes thereof respecting the conformation, development, or ornamentation of any of the parks, squares, or public places of the City to the end that the same may be uniform and symmetrical at all times.

GENERAL PROVISIONS.

Section 1. No person in the service of the Department shall be absent from duty without leave of the Commissioner having jurisdiction or the officer exercising supervision or control over him, or without a satisfactory excuse therefor. All such absences shall be immediately reported to the Commissioner having jurisdiction, with the reasons for the same.

Sec. 2. No officer or member of the Department of Parks, or person in its employ, shall make any purchase or incur any liability in relation to the Department, its officers or employees, unless in pursuance of power given by a Commissioner within his own jurisdiction or by authority delegated by the Board, or by the act by which it is organized.

Sec. 3. No officer or member of the Department of Parks, or person in its employ, shall sell, loan, appropriate to his own use or otherwise dispose of any property belonging to the Department, except in pursuance of authority given by the Board.

Sec. 4. In case of any emergency in the public service within the jurisdiction of the Department a Commissioner being present may take such action and make such order as may be necessary, provided, however, that no expense shall be thereby incurred unless there be a fund or appropriation chargeable therewith.

ARTICLE III.

Rules of Order.

The order of business at meetings of the Board, except as otherwise ordered, shall be:

- 1st. Opening of bids.
- 2d. Reading of minutes.
- 3d. Communications.
- 4th. Reports.
- 5th. Motions and resolutions.
- 6th. Miscellaneous business.

The ayes and nays shall be called and recorded on all questions.

All resolutions shall be in writing, with the name of the mover thereon.

A resolution offered or motion made by a Commissioner shall not require to be seconded.

All reports shall be in writing, unless otherwise agreed to, and signed by a majority of the Committee to whom the matter was referred, and shall state the facts upon which the same is based and their conclusions thereon.

The Board shall be governed by the common parliamentary law, as far as applicable, as laid down in Cushing's Manual.

No by-law shall be altered, repealed or adopted, without the concurring votes of two Commissioners, and then only after two weeks' notice in writing.

On motion, at 4 p. m., the Board adjourned.

Whereas, Upon each such map or plan so made there has by authority of this Board been placed a memorandum as part thereof, clearly indicating the particular estate or estates, rights, terms, privileges, franchises or easements to be acquired or extinguished for the purposes of such construction and operation in relation to each of such parcels of property, such memorandum being substantially in the form following, to wit:

"Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York. Office of the Chief Engineer.

"Memorandum indicating the particular estate, rights and easements to be acquired for the purposes of the construction and operation of the Rapid Transit Railroad in relation to each piece or parcel of property shown upon this map. September 18, 1902.

"A permanent and perpetual underground right, easement and right of way for the construction, operation and maintenance in perpetuity of a rapid transit railroad in accordance with the routes and general plan prescribed by the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York by resolution adopted on or about the 25th day of January, 1901, and approved by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York on or about the 21st day of May, 1901, and approved by the Mayor of The City of New York on the 1st day of June, 1901, and consented to by an order of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, in the Second Judicial Department, made on or about the 25th day of January, 1902, which railroad, except the loop under the City Hall Park and around the Borough Hall in the Borough of Brooklyn, is further described in the contract for the construction and operation thereof made between The City of New York, acting by the said Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners and Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, the said contract being dated the 21st day of July, 1902, and having been heretofore filed in the office of the Department of Finance of The City of New York on the 11th day of September, 1902. Such right and easement shall include the right to permanently and perpetually maintain and operate a railroad through the said subway so to be constructed in accordance with the provisions of chapter 4 of the Laws of 1891 and its amendments, and the regulations and provisions for the operation of said railroad lawfully made pursuant thereto, and the right at reasonable times and in reasonable manner to enter upon the said premises so far as may be necessary for the construction, maintenance and operation of such railroad. The premises to be subject to such permanent and perpetual underground right, easement and right of way are described as follows:

"Joralemon street, from a point therein between the East river and Furman street, to its intersection with Fulton street; Fulton street, from its intersection with Joralemon street to its intersection with Flatbush avenue; Flatbush avenue, from its intersection with Fulton street, to a point at or near its intersection with Atlantic avenue; Fulton street, from its intersection with Joralemon street to its intersection with Court street; Court street, from its intersection with Joralemon street to its intersection with Fulton street;" now therefore it is

Resolved, That the said maps and plans so made and prepared, and the said memorandum be and the same hereby are approved and adopted; that a certificate of such approval and adoption and of the approval and adoption of the said memorandum be written upon each of the said maps or plans and signed by the members of the said Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, and that one copy thereof (including such memorandum) shall be filed in the Chief Executive Department of The City of New York having principal charge of the streets, there to remain as a public record, and that two of said maps or plans and memoranda be forthwith transmitted to the Counsel to the Corporation, together with a copy of this resolution and the direction of this Board to take legal proceedings to acquire for The City of New York the said permanent and perpetual underground right, easement and right of way and other rights as aforesaid, and one of said maps be kept on record in the office of this Board.

Whereas, The City is now the owner and in possession of such easement; it is, therefore,

Letters of the contractor and President of Interborough Rapid Transit Company, dated 16th inst., on the subject of drainage from streets into cellars and basements of adjacent buildings along the line of the subway, were referred to Counsel and the Comptroller for report. The letters follow:

RAPID TRANSIT SUBWAY CONSTRUCTION COMPANY,

Hon. ALEXANDER E. ORR, President, Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners,
No. 320 Broadway, N. Y. City:

DEAR SIR—I am advised by some of my sub-contractors that complaints have been made by the owners of buildings abutting on the line of the work to the effect that the construction of the subway, with its waterproof roof, floor and walls, is to throw into the abutting buildings water which formerly found its way through the street, and either by natural drainage or absorption passed away and did not affect the adjacent properties. Now it appears that the existence of the subway in the street turns this water into and upon the adjacent properties. In this connection the Degnon-McLean Contracting Company, sub-contractors of Sub-sections 1, 2 and 5A, suggest that investigation be made into the conditions which prevail as to drainage from the roof of the subway around the Post-office, the Times Building and the Potter Building. They inform me that at the Times Building drainage from the roof of the subway will accumulate in the narrow pocket between the vault wall and the subway wall and may cause trouble. They add, that if anything is to be done to avoid this, it should be provided for, as they are closing up a section of the work there.

I am advised by my counsel that I am not responsible for any damage which may result from the condition above described, being specially absolved from such liability by the provision in the contract relieving me from

"Any damage necessarily arising from the proper construction pursuant to this contract for the reasonable use, occupation or obstruction of the streets thereby" (p. 60)

—and counsel is also inclined to the opinion that there may be no legal liability in the City for such damage.

It seems to us, however, that this is a matter which should be considered by your Board, and that you may conclude to take some steps to avert the damage which may otherwise result from construction pursuant to the present plans.

Mr. Wickersham has already written to Mr. Shepard, one of your counsel, on this subject a letter, a copy of which I inclose for your information.

DEAR SIR—Mr. McDonald is addressing a formal communication to you on the subject of leakage into the vaults and cellars along the line of the subway. It seems that one of the inevitable results from the construction of the subway through the streets under the existing plans is to throw the water which was formerly absorbed in the street or percolated through into subterranean passages against the foundation and basement walls of abutting buildings, whence it finds its way into cellars and vaults.

Mr. Wickersham is of the opinion that the contractor is certainly not responsible for this damage, and that probably the City is also free from liability; but your Board may consider it desirable to take some precautions to prevent damage which may be done to some of the abutting buildings and thus avert litigation which might involve liability. We would be glad to co-operate with you in any such plan which you may adopt.

May I ask you to give prompt and early consideration to this matter.

Counsel reported that Justice O'Gorman, in the Supreme Court, had decided that the ducts or vitrified brick chambers in the subway wall are to be considered as equipment.

Counsel reported on letter of the Mayor, dated 10th instant, on the observance of the Eight-Hour Law as follows:

23d October, 1902.

Hon. ALEXANDER E. ORR, President, Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners,
No. 320 Broadway, City:

SIR—The counsel have the letter of the Secretary of the 14th inst., transmitting the letter of his Honor the Mayor, dated the 10th inst., with respect to the manner of observance of the eight-hour law. The Board has already declared its intention that that law shall be strictly observed. The question really is one of what is an emergency in the case of a critical public work of this character, which in the course of construction necessarily obstructs the streets. We venture to suggest that the Board order that the practical suggestions of his Honor the Mayor with respect to the detail of the rapid transit work be sent to the Chief Engineer, with a direction that the same be specifically followed, or that if for any reason it cannot be followed without danger to the public interests, then that a report be forthwith made by the Chief Engineer to the Board of the situation in that respect. We submit herewith a form of resolution for the consideration of the Board if its view shall concur with what we have suggested.

Whereas, His Honor the Mayor has addressed to this Board a communication with respect to the observance of the eight-hour law upon rapid transit work; and, Whereas, In such letter his Honor makes a practical suggestion with respect to the enforcement of the law in the words following:

"I am inclined to propose the following interpretation of the law and to urge its application. In business sections of the City where blasting can be done at night as well as in the daytime, I think the work should be carried forward continuously in three shifts of eight hours each; in residential districts, on the other hand, where blasting cannot be done at night, I think that overtime may be asked, which is, of course, paid for as such, in accordance with the emergency provisions of the law itself. It goes without saying that, when engaged in moving water pipes or other pipes in the streets—the uninterrupted service of which is vital to the community—such details of work are emergencies in the strictest sense, justifying the use of overtime;" and

Whereas, The policy of this Board has been and is to strictly enforce the eight-hour law, and that the manner of such enforcement should concur to the utmost possible with the manner of enforcement in municipal work of The City of New York,

Now, therefore, it is resolved that such suggestion of his Honor the Mayor be hereby referred to the Chief Engineer, who is directed to require the strict observance of the same except in the cases, if any, in which such observance of the law would involve public danger or injury within the emergency provisions of the law, and that if in his opinion such requirement would involve such public danger or

injury, then the Chief Engineer is forthwith directed to report the facts in that respect to this Board.

The contractor, in letter of 21st October, to President Orr, had brought up the matter of the setting out of trees to replace those removed in Broadway, with correspondence with the President of the Department of Parks on the subject, which had been by President Orr referred to counsel for report. The report was presented and read as follows:

October 23, 1902.

Hon. ALEXANDER E. ORR, President, Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners,
No. 320 Broadway, City:

SIR—The counsel have considered the matter of the tree planting on the Boulevard referred to them by you and set forth in the letter of the contractor, Mr. McDonald, addressed to you under date of the 21st inst., together with the correspondence between the Commissioner of Parks and Mr. McDonald. It does not seem to us that any question of law is involved. The requirement of the contract at page 74 is that the contractor shall set out "if required" trees as specified. Such trees are to be "bedded in good soil to be approved by the Engineer." It is plain that under the contract the contractor was in this respect to do what he was required to do within the limitations of the contract.

It therefore seems to us that no question of law is involved, but only the administrative question whether the Chief Engineer properly exercised his discretion in the order given to the contractor and whether the contractor properly carried out the requirements of the Chief Engineer.

The Chief Engineer and contractor state that the work of the tree planting was done under the expert direction of Mr. Samuel Parsons, who is a very distinguished expert and who is now the expert of the Park Department. This expert seems to have approved an importation of trees with a smaller diameter than that specified in the contract. But as the contract did not compel the contractor to set out any trees unless required, it was competent to the Engineer, unless otherwise directed by the Board, to assent to the planting of trees of a less diameter. The Chief Engineer has certified that after personal investigation he found that it was not possible to procure trees of the proper size and that even the trees of less size needed to be imported. The Commissioner of Parks insists that in this respect the Chief Engineer was mistaken. It seems to us that as the difficulty really is simply this, whether practically the best was done which could be done in the tree planting, the whole matter should be referred to the Chief Engineer for his report.

The matter is one particularly within the knowledge of the Chief Engineer himself and the matter cannot be taken up with him until his return about two weeks hence.

Letter received through the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, enclosing request by Bowers & Sands, attorneys, on behalf of owners of premises No. 101 Park avenue, for removal of certain temporary buildings used in construction work at that point, was referred to the Acting Chief Engineer for report.

A communication from Vice-Chairman J. H. McInnes of the Board of Aldermen inclosing petition for extension of Brooklyn-Manhattan Rapid Transit Railroad from proposed terminus, at Flatbush and Atlantic avenues, to Malbone street was presented and referred to the Chief Engineer.

Petition of property owners for the reconsideration of change of location of station from Jennings street to Freeman street was presented.

The City of New York (by its Rapid Transit Board), with John B. McDonald, Contractor—Agreement Modifying Contract for Construction and Operation of Rapid Transit Railroad—Dated July 21, 1902; executed, 1902.

Agreement made this 21st day of July, in the year 1902, between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), acting by the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York (hereinafter called the Board), party of the first part, and John B. McDonald, of The City of New York (hereinafter called the Contractor), party of the second part:

Whereas, Heretofore and on or about the 21st day of February, 1900, the City, acting by the Board, entered into a contract with the Contractor for the construction and operation of a Rapid Transit Railroad in The City of New York and otherwise, as therein mentioned, the said contract being hereinafter styled the Contract for Construction and Operation; and

Whereas, The said Contract and the Routes and General Plan hereinafter mentioned have been since modified by agreement duly made between the City and the Contractor, with the consent of the sureties hereinafter mentioned; and

Whereas, The Contractor has deposited with the Comptroller of the City certain security for the performance of the said Contract for Construction and Operation on his part and has given certain bonds as further security for such performance, and upon such bonds there are sureties as follows: Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, The United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company, The City Trust Safe Deposit and Surety Company of Philadelphia, American Surety Company of New York, National Surety Company and Perry Belmont; and

Whereas, By written instruments bearing date the 10th day of July, 1902, the Contractor, with the written consent of the Board, concurred in by six members thereof, duly assigned the right or obligation to maintain and operate the said Rapid Transit Railroad for the term of years specified in the said contract and all rights included in the leasing provisions of the said contract, together with the obligation to provide equipment for the said railroad, unto Interborough Rapid Transit Company, which Company also guaranteed the performance by the Contractor of the provisions of his said contract not so assigned to it; and

Whereas, The Contractor desires, and the Board approves, a further modification of the Routes and General Plan for the Rapid Transit Railroad referred to in the said Contract for Construction and Operation as set forth in certain resolutions adopted by the Board on 25th June, 1902, a copy of which is hereto annexed;

Now, therefore, in consideration of the premises and subject to the consents hereinafter provided, it is agreed that the said Contract for Construction and Operation and the Routes and General Plan therein mentioned be, and the same hereby are, further modified as follows:

By striking from the said Routes the portion thereof in words as follows, to wit: "thence with a curve to the left and under Third Avenue to a point near its intersection with Westchester Avenue, thence with a curve to the right to and under Westchester Avenue."

And by inserting in the said Routes, instead of the portion thus struck out, the following words, to wit: "thence crossing Third Avenue and under East One Hundred and Forty-ninth Street and Bergen Avenue upon a curve to a point in the triangular block bounded by Bergen Avenue, Gerard Street and East One Hundred and Forty-ninth Street; at that point beginning to emerge from the ground, and thence upon a viaduct across Gerard Street and on or over private property in the block bounded by Westchester Avenue, Brook Avenue, East One Hundred and Forty-ninth Street, Gerard Street and Bergen Avenue (crossing, if necessary, a part of Brook Avenue) to Westchester Avenue."

The general plan of construction of the portion of the route hereby substituted shall be as follows:

The tracks shall be placed in tunnel from the westerly end of such portion to a point on private property or on Gerard street, between Bergen Avenue and East One Hundred and Forty-ninth Street, and easterly over the rest of the portion of the route hereby substituted shall be carried upon a viaduct. The railroad may on the portion of the route between Third Avenue and Westchester Avenue occupy any portion of any of the streets of the route, but the railroad shall not at any place exceed thirty (30) feet in width. There shall be at least two parallel tracks, with the right at any time to add a third track in the discretion of the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners.

And it is further agreed that in all other respects the provisions of the General Plan of Construction set forth in the said Contract for Construction and Operation shall be applicable to the portion of the route hereby substituted; and it is further

agreed that the Contractor shall become entitled to additional payment for such additional work and materials as shall be made necessary by the changes hereby provided, and the City shall become entitled to abatement from the contract price by reason of the diminution in work and materials by reason of such changes, the amounts of such additional payments and such diminutions to be determined as provided in Chapter II. of the said Contract for Construction and Operation;

Provided, however, and it is expressly agreed that this agreement shall take effect when and only when the following consents hereto and approvals hereof shall be duly had, to wit:

1. The consents as subjoined of Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, The United States Fidelity & Guaranty Company, The City Trust Safe Deposit & Surety Company of Philadelphia, The American Surety Company of New York, National Surety Company, Perry Belmont and Interborough Rapid Transit Company.

2. The consent of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York.

3. The consent of the Mayor of The City of New York.

4. The consent of the owners of a majority in value of the property along streets or such portions of streets as are included in the portion of routes by this agreement proposed to be substituted as aforesaid, or if such consent cannot be obtained, then, in lieu thereof, the determination of three commissioners, to be appointed by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, duly confirmed by the said Appellate Division.

The plan hereto annexed is intended to show the modification of the routes as hereby proposed.

And by inserting in the said Routes, instead of the portion thus struck out, the following words, to wit: "thence crossing Third Avenue and under East One Hundred and Forty-ninth Street and Bergen Avenue upon a curve to a point in the triangular block bounded by Bergen Avenue, Gerard Street and East One Hundred and Forty-ninth Street; at that point beginning to emerge from the ground, and thence upon viaduct across Gerard Street and on or over private property in the block bounded by Westchester Avenue, Brook Avenue, East One Hundred and Forty-ninth Street, Gerard Street and Bergen Avenue (crossing, if necessary, a part of Brook Avenue) to Westchester Avenue."

Resolved, That whereas this Board has duly made the inquiries and investigation necessary or proper in the premises, and has determined that the modification aforesaid of the said Routes and General Plan is necessary for the interests of the public and of The City of New York and should be established as hereinafter provided, this Board does hereby determine and establish the said Routes and General Plan as hereby modified, subject to the consents and approvals to be first obtained as hereinafter mentioned; and it is further

The consent of the owners of a majority in value of the property along streets or such portions of streets as are included in the portion of routes by these resolutions proposed to be substituted as aforesaid; or, if such consents cannot be obtained, then, in lieu thereof, the determination of three commissioners to be appointed by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, duly confirmed by the said Appellate Division.

And it is further

Resolved, That this Board hereby adopts the drawing now produced and numbered _____, as showing in substance the modification hereby adopted.

And it is further

Resolved, That the President and Secretary of the Board be, and they hereby are, authorized to execute in the name of and on behalf of the Board a contract with the Contractor providing for the said modification of the Routes and General Plan.

"COPY ROUTES AND GENERAL PLAN."

"January 14, 1897."

"One route as follows: Its centre line shall commence at a point at or near the intersection of Broadway with Park Row; thence under Park Row and Centre street to a point at or near its intersection with New Elm street as proposed; thence under New Elm street, as proposed, to Lafayette Place; thence under Lafayette Place to Eighth street; thence across and under Eighth street, and thence under private

property lying between Eighth and Ninth streets and east of the westerly side or line of Lafayette Place, produced, to Fourth avenue; thence under Fourth avenue and Park avenue to Forty-second street; thence turning from Park avenue into Forty-second street, and taking for the purposes of the curve, if necessary or convenient, private property at the southwest corner of Park avenue and Forty-second street; thence under Forty-second street to Broadway; thence under Broadway to Fifty-ninth street; thence under the Boulevard to a point at or near One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street; thence by viaduct along and over the Boulevard to a point at or near One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street; thence under the Boulevard and Eleventh avenue to a point on Eleventh avenue, situate north of One Hundred and Ninetieth street, and distant therefrom not less than one thousand and not more than one thousand five hundred feet, and thence under or over (as may be most convenient) private property to a point at the southeast end of Ellwood street, near Hillside street, and thence over Ellwood street to Kingsbridge avenue or Broadway; thence over Kingsbridge avenue or Broadway, as now proposed, to Riverdale avenue and thence easterly over Riverdale avenue to a point within five hundred feet of the present Kingsbridge station of the New York and Putnam Railroad Company.

"This route shall include a loop at the City Hall Park which shall connect with the portion of the route aforesaid along Centre street at or near the south end of that street, and thence proceed westerly and southerly under City Hall Park and Broadway, and thence easterly to again connect with the portion of the route aforesaid in Park Row. All of the said loop shall lie under City Hall Park, Park Row, between the south end of Centre street and Ann street, and the portion of Broadway adjoining the City Hall Park lying between Vesey and Murray streets. This route shall also include suitable tracks and connections from the City Hall loop to the Postoffice, such tracks and connections being under the City Hall Park and under the portion of Park Row between the south end of Centre street and Ann street. This route shall also include suitable tracks and connections from the portion of the route near the corner of Park avenue and Forty-second street to the yard and tracks of the Grand Central Station. All of the tracks and connections last mentioned shall be under Park avenue and Forty-second street and private property to be acquired. By private property in this description is meant property not forming part of the streets of The City of New York and not belonging to The City of New York.

"Also a route as follows: Its centre line shall diverge from the route aforesaid on the Boulevard, between a line parallel to and one hundred feet north of One Hundred and Third street and a line parallel to and one hundred feet south of One Hundred and Third street; thence under private property to a point in One Hundred and Fourth street, thence under One Hundred and Fourth street to and across Central Park West; thence under Central Park to the intersection of Lenox avenue and One Hundred and Tenth street; thence under Lenox avenue to a point near One Hundred and Forty-second street; thence curving to the east and passing under private property, One Hundred and Forty-third and One Hundred and Forty-fourth streets to the Harlem river at or near the foot of One Hundred and Forty-fifth street; thence under the Harlem river and private property to East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street at or near its intersection with River avenue; thence under East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street to a point near its intersection with Third avenue; [thence with a curve to the left and under Third avenue to a point near its intersection with Westchester avenue; thence with a curve to the right to and under Westchester avenue;] and thence by viaduct over and along Westchester avenue to the Southern Boulevard; thence over and along the Southern Boulevard to the Boston road, and thence over and along the Boston road to Bronx Park.

"The said General Plan of Construction hereby adopted is as follows:

"For the route under Park row and the said loop at City Hall Park, two parallel tracks; for the route from the point of connection of the City Hall loop with the route aforesaid at the southerly end of Centre street to the junction at or near One Hundred and Third street and the Boulevard, four parallel tracks; for the route from the junction at or near One Hundred and Third street and the Boulevard to the New York and Putnam Railroad Company's station at Kingsbridge, two parallel tracks; for the route from the junction at or near One Hundred and Third street and the Boulevard to Bronx Park, two parallel tracks.

"All of the above-mentioned tracks shall be placed on the same level, except that wherever required by special necessities of surface or sub-surface structures or other special or local necessities and for the purpose of avoiding grade crossings at the southerly end of Centre street and the One Hundred and Third street junction, any one or more of the tracks may be depressed below the level of the other tracks to a depth of not more than twenty feet.

"The tracks shall be of standard gauge, that is to say, of a width of four feet and eight and a half inches between the rails. There shall be twelve and a half feet width in the tunnels and on the viaducts for each track, except that at stations, switches, turnouts, curves and cross overs, the width may be increased to the extent permitted by the width of the tunnel. The tracks wherever passing over or under the streets shall be placed over or under the central part of the street, except that no tunnel or viaduct or any wall or part thereof under or along a street, shall, except at the stations, station approaches, curves and at places of access to sub-surface structures, as hereinafter provided, be within a distance of five feet of the exterior line or side of the street. The tracks shall in all cases be placed in tunnels, except only that on the west side route on the Boulevard at or near One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street the tracks shall emerge from the tunnel and be carried upon a viaduct along the Boulevard to a point at or near One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street and there be taken again into tunnel, and except also that on the west side route at a point at or near One Hundred and Ninetieth street the tracks shall again emerge from the tunnel and be carried upon a viaduct over private property and the above-mentioned streets to the Kingsbridge station, and except also that on the east side from a point on Westchester avenue at or near Bergen avenue the tracks shall emerge from the tunnel and be carried upon a viaduct over and along Westchester avenue and the other streets above mentioned to Bronx Park.

"Wherever the tracks change from tunnel to viaduct, or from viaduct to tunnel, the change shall be so made as to occupy or obstruct the use of the surface of the street to the least possible extent consistent with the proper gradient for the tracks.

"The roof of the tunnel shall be as near the surface of the street as street conditions and grades will permit. The tunnel shall not be less than thirteen feet in height in the clear. The maximum widths of the tunnel in the clear shall be as follows:

"For the route under Park row and the City Hall Park loop, thirty-eight feet; for the route from, at or near the south end of Centre street and to the commencement of New Elm street, fifty feet; for the route from, at or near the commencement of New Elm street to Lafayette place, sixty-eight feet; for the route from, at or near the commencement of Lafayette place to the junction at or near One Hundred and Third street, fifty feet; for the west side route from the junction at or near One Hundred and Third street to Kingsbridge station, twenty-five feet; and for the east side route from, at or near the junction at One Hundred and Third street to Bronx Park, twenty-five feet; except that wherever the nature of the streets necessitates a curve that an additional width of tunnel may be added not exceeding three feet for each track, and except that on Fourth avenue, from Thirty-second to Forty-third street, the permissible width shall be sixty-five feet; and for the tunnel beneath the Harlem river and its approaches, the permissible width shall be thirty-five feet. At each cross street where accommodations for pipes, wires, sewers and other sub-surface structures have been provided within the tunnel, the tunnel may, in order to provide convenient access to such pipes, wires, sewers and other subsurface structures, have, within the limit of the sides or exterior lines of such cross street or such lines produced, an additional width on each side of the route not to exceed fifteen feet, and the area of additional width on either side not to approach nearer than twelve feet to either side or exterior line of such cross street. Footways between the tracks shall be provided the whole length of the line and accommodations arranged for the convenience and protection of employees.

"Whenever necessary for the proper support of the street surface the roof of the tunnel shall be of iron or steel girders, with brick or concrete arches supported by iron or steel columns and masonry walls, or the roof shall be a masonry arch. Viaducts shall be built with a width of twelve and one-half feet for each track and with an additional width of three feet on each side for outside footways. Viaducts may be built of metal or masonry, or of both.

"Adjacent tracks shall be connected by necessary and suitable switches and connections, and an additional track for siding accommodation may be constructed not to exceed in length one-quarter of a mile for each mile of roadway, but provided

always that the side of the tunnel shall not, by the enlargement of the tunnel for that purpose, be brought within five feet of the exterior line or side of the street.

"Along Elm street, wherever the tunnel shall be in the clear not less than sixty-eight feet wide, the pipes, wires, sewers and other sub-surface structures shall be placed in suitable galleries in the tunnel at the outside of the exterior tracks. But any such pipes, wires, sewers and other sub-surface structures may be placed in suitable galleries beneath the tracks, or such pipes, wires, sewers and other sub-surface structures may be placed in the ground above or at the sides of the tunnel, or at the outside of the exterior tracks, and whenever so placed beneath the tracks, or in the ground above or at the sides of the tunnel, the width of the tunnel on New Elm street shall not be more than fifty feet. Pipes, wires, sewers and other sub-surface structures shall, at any part of the said routes, be removed or disturbed only when necessary for the construction and operation of the railway, and, if removed or disturbed, shall be placed under the streets in such manner and in such location that the use and service thereof shall not be impaired. Such pipes, wires, sewers and other sub-surface structures shall be left or shall be so arranged as to give free access for their repair or alteration, or for the placing with them of new pipes, wires, sewers and other like structures, and for making connections between the same and buildings at any time.

"Station and station approaches shall, in general, be at the intersections of streets, and shall be built under, or, if the position of the tracks so require, over, the streets and immediately adjoining private abutting property, or through private property to be acquired for the purpose, or both under or over streets and through private property as aforesaid, except that on the Boulevard stations and station approaches may be in the centre of the street. The streets under or over which stations or station approaches shall be built may include cross streets, but no part of any cross street shall be used for a station or station approach at a distance greater than seventy-five feet from the exterior line or side of the street of the route. The word 'street,' wherever used herein, shall include an avenue or public place.

"Along the Boulevard there may be openings in the surface of the street from the tunnel for the purpose of ventilation and light; such openings shall be guarded by convenient and ornamental inclosures. The openings shall not exceed twenty feet in width and fifty feet in length. No two openings shall be within fifty feet of each other. No opening or part thereof shall be within the limits of, or opposite to, any street intersecting the Boulevard; and within the distance of any one block on the Boulevard between any two adjacent crossing streets there shall not be more than two such openings.

"The general mode of operation shall be by electricity or some other power not requiring combustion within the tunnels or on the viaducts, and the motors shall be capable of moving trains at a speed of not less than forty miles per hour for long distances, exclusive of stops.

"The manner of construction shall be by tunneling or open excavation; it is further

"Resolved, That plans be prepared to show the route and general plan, in so far as they are hereby adopted, which said plans, when formally adopted, shall be deemed to be incorporated herein and to form a part hereof.

"February 4, 1897.

"Resolved, That this Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York hereby adopts the drawings now produced and numbered from 1 to 60, both inclusive, as showing the route and general plan adopted by resolution of this Board on January 14, 1897, and that as provided in the said resolution the said drawings be deemed incorporated in and to form part of the said resolution; and it is further

"Resolved, That the said route and general plan, with the said drawings, and the said resolution of January 14, 1897, be, and they hereby are, adopted by this Board."

Statement by Albert E. Davis, with blue print showing suggestion for location for union station in The Bronx, was presented and referred to Chief Engineer.

The Board then adjourned.

BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

The City of New York, November 3, 1902.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day at the office of the Mayor at eleven o'clock a. m.

Present—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Copies of the minutes of the meetings held September 17 and September 19, 1902, were presented to the members of the Board, and they were adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Communications were received from the Secretary of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, of date September 18, transmitting certified copies of resolutions adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a meeting held September 17, as follows: (1) Concurring in resolution adopted by the Armory Board, accepting the bid of the James Curran Manufacturing Company for material and labor required in the erection and completion of the repairs to the steam-heating plant in the Seventh Regiment Armory; (2) Concurring in the resolution adopted by the Armory Board, accepting the bid of Charles Hart for materials and labor required in the erection and completion of the repairs and alterations to the armory of the First Battalion, Naval Militia, and of date October 22, 1902, authorizing the issue of \$3,000 Corporate Stock, for furnishing the new armory for the Second Battery, N. G. N. Y.

Ordered filed.

A communication was received from the Department of Finance, of date October 16, 1902, advising the Armory Board that \$850 had been deposited in the City Treasury to the credit of "Armories and Sites Therefor."

Ordered filed.

A communication was received from the Corporation Counsel, of date October 3, 1902, inclosing the bill of D. & M. Chauncey Real Estate Company, for appraising thirty-six lots on Bedford avenue, Union and President streets, in the Borough of Brooklyn, which had been selected as a site for Troop "C" Armory, and stating that the bill is reasonable and should be paid.

Brigadier-General James McLeer offered the following:

Resolved, That the Armory Board does hereby approve the bill and expense for appraising thirty-six lots on Bedford avenue, Union and President streets (selected as a site for armory purposes, in the Borough of Brooklyn), by the D. & M. Chauncey Real Estate Company, amounting to one hundred dollars (\$100) and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to concur and the Comptroller be and hereby is authorized to pay the same.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Secretary presented an application for payment to Luke A. Burke, Contractor, on account of his contract for materials and work in the erection and completion of the First Battery Armory, on the southerly side of Sixty-sixth street, 150 feet east of Columbus avenue, Borough of Manhattan, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments offered the following:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to pay to Luke A. Burke, Contractor, the sum of nine thousand four hundred and fifty dollars (\$9,450), as per accompanying voucher, on account of his contract for materials and work required in the erection and completion of the armory building for the First Battery, N. G. N. Y., on the southerly side of Sixty-sixth street, 150 feet east of Columbus avenue, Borough of Manhattan.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Secretary presented an application for payment to Michael J. O'Brien, Contractor, amounting to \$255.50, on account of his contract for materials and work required in the installation of the plumbing and gasfitting in the First Battery Armory, on the southerly side of Sixty-sixth street, 150 feet east of Columbus avenue, Borough of Manhattan, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments offered the following:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to pay to Michael J. O'Brien, Contractor, the sum of two hundred and fifty-five dollars and fifty cents (\$255.50), as per accompanying voucher, on account of his contract for materials and work required in the installation of the plumbing and gasfitting in the armory building for the First Battery, N. G. N. Y., on the southerly side of Sixty-sixth street, 150 feet east of Columbus avenue, Borough of Manhattan.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Secretary presented an application for payment to Cappiello & Hazell, Contractors, amounting to the sum of \$3,842, on account of their contract for materials and work required in the erection and completion of the sheet pile bulkhead platform, excavating and filling in, for the Second Naval Battalion, on the Upper Bay, extending from Fifty-first to Fifty-second streets, in the Borough of Brooklyn, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments offered the following:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to pay to Cappiello & Hazell, Contractors, the sum of three thousand eight hundred and forty-two dollars (\$3,842), as per accompanying voucher, on account of their contract for materials and work required in the erection and completion of the sheet pile bulkhead platform, excavating and filling in, for the Second Battalion Naval Militia, N. G. N. Y., on the Upper Bay, extending from Fifty-first to Fifty-second streets, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Secretary presented a certified copy of resolution of the Board of Aldermen, adopted October 14, 1902, concurring in the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted at a meeting held August 21, 1902, amending the resolution adopted on April 30, 1902, fixing the salaries of officers, clerks and employees of the Board of Armory Commissioners, by omitting one Inspector of Repairs and Supplies, \$1,200, and inserting, in lieu thereof, one Wireman, \$1,200.

Ordered filed, awaiting an eligible list from the Municipal Civil Service Commission.

A communication was received from Katharina Schmuck, owner and lessor of premises Nos. 332 and 344 West Forty-fourth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, which is now occupied by the First Battery, N. G. N. Y., as an armory, consenting and agreeing to continue the lease now existing with The City of New York; also a communication from Horgan & Slatery stating that, in their opinion, the new armory on Sixty-sixth street will not be ready for occupation by the organization before February 1, 1903.

Brigadier-General James McLeer offered the following:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be requested to renew the lease of the premises occupied by the First Battery, N. G. N. Y., as an armory at Nos. 334 to 340 West Forty-fourth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, at the expiration of the present lease, for the term of three months, the other terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to the present lease, and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be respectfully requested to concur in the same.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

A communication from Commander R. P. Forschew, of the Second Battalion Naval Militia, of date October 23, 1902, was received, making requisition for additional quarters for that organization.

The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments offered the following:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be requested to execute a lease with James H. Lane, the owner, for the premises known as No. 255 Sixth avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, for the purpose of headquarters for the Second Battalion Naval Militia, for the term of six months, at a monthly rental of ninety-two dollars and fifty cents (\$92.50); the premises are a three-story basement building, on a lot 20 by 100, 115 feet north of Garfield place, in the Twenty-second Ward; the lease to commence November 1, 1902, and to extend to May 1, 1903, with the privilege of two renewals of six months each, for periods terminating either October 1 or May 1, following. The owner is to make all repairs to plumbing, roofing and heating, and to pay taxes and assessments and water rents. The owner is to furnish light, heat and janitor services; and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to concur in the same.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The secretary reported the receipt of communications from the Inspector of the National Guard, of date September 23, and from the Adjutant-General, of date August 22, giving a list of personal property which had been in the Seventy-first Regiment Armory prior to the fire therein, and requesting that measures be taken for its recovery, and stated that this list had been referred to the Engineer, Colonel J. Hollis Wells, who, under date of October 30, 1902, had presented an amended specification for the care and removal of the debris at the ruins of the armory, and had included in such specification a provision for the search for the missing property. The matter was, on the recommendation of the Mayor, referred to the Committee on New York Armories for consideration and report.

A communication was received from Vincent Colyer Griffith and A. D. F. Hamlin, presenting a plan of competition for the armory for the Second Battalion Naval Militia, in the Borough of Brooklyn, nominating fifteen architects from whom a selection of five should be made.

The Mayor offered the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the following architects, viz., Lord & Hewlett, No. 16 East Twenty-third street, New York; Schickle & Ditmars, No. 111 Fifth avenue, New York; F. R. Hirsch, No. 160 Fifth avenue, New York; Washington Hull, No. 16 East Twenty-third street, and Walter Dickson, Bible House, New York, be invited to offer competitive designs for an armory building for the Second Battalion Naval Militia, N. G. N. Y., to be erected on the site on First avenue, Fifty-first and Fifty-second streets, in the Borough of Brooklyn, in accordance with the scheme of the Advisory Architects.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Resolved, That the amount to be embraced in the programme of competition as the total cost of the armory for the Second Battalion Naval Militia, in the Borough of Brooklyn, exclusive of furniture and decorations, and including the architect's commissions, must not exceed the sum of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000).

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The programme of competition is as follows:

Programme of competition for the selection of an architect for the armory of the Second Battalion, Naval Militia, N. G., N. Y., to be situated in Brooklyn, on First avenue, Fifty-first and Fifty-second streets.

The Board of Armory Commissioners of The City of New York have designated Messrs. V. C. Griffith and A. D. F. Hamlin to serve as their professional advisers, to prepare the programme of a competition for a proposed armory for the Second Battalion Naval Militia, to advise and assist them in the final award, and to render such other services in connection with the competition as may be required.

The following architects have been invited to submit designs under the terms of this competition as herein and hereafter stated:

Lord & Hewlett, No. 16 East Twenty-third street, New York; Schickle & Dittmars, No. 111 Fifth avenue, New York; Washington Hull, No. 16 East Twenty-third street, New York; F. R. Hirsch, No. 160 Fifth avenue, New York; Walter Dickson, Bible House, New York.

To each of these architects submitting designs in accordance with these terms and conditions will be paid, in full for his services in this competition, the sum of \$500. In the case of the architect or firm selected to carry out his design, this sum shall be considered a first installment on account of his commission for professional services to be rendered as architect of the proposed armory. Such commission for full professional services as architect, including local supervision (but exclusive of actual traveling expenses incurred in visiting quarries or other works outside the city limits), shall be at the rate of five per cent. upon all contracts awarded and work done by day labor, for and upon the construction of the proposed armory.

(If a Clerk of Works be appointed, his compensation shall not be a charge upon the architect, but shall be paid by the city).

The fee of the architect shall be paid as the work progresses in the following order:

\$1,250, or one-half of 1 per cent. upon the estimated cost of the building, as a retainer upon his appointment; this sum including the \$500 paid for participation in the competition.

Two and one-half per cent. on the estimated cost of the work, less the \$1,250 paid on account, when the general working drawings and specifications are complete and ready for estimates upon the entire structural work.

And the balance of the total commission of 5 per cent. on the actual cost of the work, in monthly payments, based proportionately upon the vouchers issued in payment for the work performed under the contracts, or by day labor, if any.

The architect to whom the commission is awarded shall revise his competitive drawings to meet any further requirements of the Board of Armory Commissioners. On the basis of such modifications, if any are made, he shall prepare full working drawings and specifications for the building, and from time to time thereafter he shall make such changes in the drawings and specifications as may be directed by the Board of Armory Commissioners, for which changes just compensation shall be allowed, but no changes in the drawings or specifications after their approval shall be made without the written authority of the Board of Armory Commissioners; and the architect chosen shall furthermore, at his own cost and expense, whenever required to do so by the Board of Armory Commissioners, make such revisions and alterations of drawings and specifications as may be necessary to secure proper economy in the construction of the building.

Upon the selection of an architect the designs of unsuccessful competitors will be returned to them, and no use will be made of the drawings not accepted.

Data are furnished herewith with regard to the general requirements of the building.

Each design submitted shall consist of the drawings specified below and no other (no alternate designs will be considered), and shall be mounted on stiff cardboard 24 inches by 36 inches and shall be delivered to Board of Armory Commissioners, care of Vincent C. Griffith, No. 96 Fifth avenue, New York City, on or before Saturday at 6 p. m., December 20, 1902.

A brief description of the building, typewritten on plain legal cap, must accompany each design, calling attention to any points of special interest, materials to be used, and any special details of construction, and describing clearly the provisions made to reduce the danger of spread of fire to a minimum. There shall also be inclosed a plain sealed envelope containing the name of the architect or firm submitting the design.

In the award the relative artistic and practical merits of each design will be carefully considered, and the first place, with the commission to execute the work, will be given to that design which displays the highest total merit, due regard being paid to probable economy of construction. The award will not be affected by the finish or elaboration of the drawings, which it is desired shall be as simple as possible.

Any competitor will forfeit any privilege under this competition who shall violate any of the provisions of this programme, or shall in any way directly or indirectly endeavor to exert influence in his behalf upon any of the Board of Armory Commissioners or their consulting architects.

Inquiries regarding these conditions or the requirements hereto annexed should be addressed to Mr. V. C. Griffith, No. 96 Fifth avenue (none later than December 1), and must in no case be such as to lead to identification of the authorship of the drawings.

All answers to inquiries will be simultaneously communicated to all competitors, as well as any supplementary information which the Board of Armory Commissioners, or their Consulting Architects, may have occasion to communicate.

The drawings required will be:

Plans for all stories to the scale of 1-16 inch to 1 foot.

One longitudinal section, scale of 1-16 inch to 1 foot.

One transverse section, scale of 1-16 inch to 1 foot.

Elevation toward water front, scale of 1/8 inch to 1 foot.

Side elevation on Fifty-second street, scale of 1-16 inch to 1 foot.

Elevation toward First avenue, scale of 1/8 inch to 1 foot.

These drawings must be in black ink on white paper; the solids in plans and sections to be blacked in solid; the shades and shadows on the elevations properly cast at 45 degrees, and rendered in brush washes of India ink, and all openings rendered with flat or graded washes of the same. There shall be no handwriting or signature on any drawing, nor any clouds, foliage or figures, except one to give scale, on one or each elevation and section. On the plans the designation, chief dimensions and area of each room shall be plainly lettered in black or red ink.

Within one week after receipt of the drawings each package and its contents, including the description and sealed envelope, will be marked with a distinguishing number, by which the design will be known until the envelopes are opened by the Mayor or Vice-Chairman of the Board of Armory Commissioners, which will not be until after the final decision has been reached by the Board with the assistance of their consulting architects. After the drawings have been so marked, they will be carefully examined, and any drawing or design which violates the conditions of the competition will be excluded from consideration. The final award will be made as early thereafter as possible, and the result communicated to all the competitors.

Requirements of the Building.

The armory will comprise an Administration Building forming the chief front of the building, towards the bay, and a drill hall extending towards First avenue. The Administration Building will comprise a basement and two stories. There will be no basement or cellar under the Drill Hall, except the Rifle Range, which will extend the whole length under one side of it. The heights of stories are left to the architects' discretion.

A survey of the lot will be furnished each competitor, from which the grades may be obtained.

The position of the building on the lot (which measures 200 feet 4 inches on First avenue, 467 feet 5 inches on Fifty-first street, and 426 feet 6 inches on Fifty-second street), is left to the architects' discretion, provided that it be kept far enough back from the avenue to permit of extension of the Drill Hall at some future time.

The exterior walls of the building and that between the Administration Building and Drill Hall will be of brick; but the basement or lower part of walls may be faced with stone externally. Trimmings and other details may be of stone, brick or terra cotta at discretion.

The sum at disposal—\$250,000—will not permit of the erection of a completely fireproof building; but it is important that the structure be as fire-resisting as possible, and that wooden stud partitions, wooden lathing and other dangerous forms of

construction be avoided as far as possible. The description submitted with the plans should set forth the materials and construction employed and the means and methods proposed for reducing the danger from fire.

Pending the definite estimation of the cost, the professional advisers feel that a comparison of the cubical contents, taken in connection with other data from the written description and the drawings, furnishes the most reliable method of determining the relative cost according to the several designs submitted. It is, therefore, important that the competitors keep the cubical contents as small as practicable.

Basement.

The principal entrance to the Administration Building should be from Fifty-second street, and there should be another entrance from the terrace upon the bay side of the building.

Reception room, 700 square feet.

Rifle range, having at least four targets and provision for marker's pit, smoke chamber, etc. Length of range to be 75 yards, or, if practicable, 100 yards.

Provision for armorer, shell-loading and ammunition storage, adjoining the rifle range, 300 square feet.

Room for the men assembled to shoot, 550 square feet.

Four locker rooms, each to contain eighty lockers and to connect by separate stairs with the corresponding division room immediately above it on the first floor.

Kitchen, 400 square feet, to connect by a dumb-waiter with the ward room.

Kitchen stores.

A room for showers, to contain not less than twenty showers. It is desirable, though not necessary, that the shower room connect with the toilet room, also with a dressing room, 300 square feet.

Toilet room, to contain from twelve (12) to sixteen (16) water closets, sixteen (16) urinals, and at least twenty (20) basins.

Boiler room. This may be placed beneath the drill hall floor, or in any other convenient location, except under the Administration Building.

Storage room, 1,200 square feet.

A small room for the doorkeeper near the entrance.

First Floor.

Drill hall, to have not less than 37,000 square feet of clear floor space. The clear width of the hall should not be less than 160 feet.

Gymnasium, 1,800 square feet.

Four division rooms, each to contain 900 square feet and to have separate stairs to the corresponding division locker room in the basement.

Two division rooms, each to contain 700 square feet, with provision for forty lockers. One of these division rooms should connect with the armorer's shop.

Armorer's shop, 350 square feet, to connect with one of the small division rooms.

Room for the Band, 350 square feet.

Room for the Hospital Corps, 300 square feet.

Storage room for the Hospital Corps, adjoining, 200 square feet.

Room for the Chief Petty Officer, 200 square feet.

Room for the Paymaster's stores, to connect by separate stairs with the room for the Paymaster on the second floor, 200 square feet.

A closet for a slop sink.

A dumb-waiter.

Corridor stairs, access to drill hall, etc.

Second Floor.

Lecture room, 1,000 square feet. This room and the ward room are to be so arranged as to admit of being thrown together to form one large apartment.

Ward room, 900 square feet, to connect by the dumb-waiter with the kitchen and to adjoin the lecture room.

Room 300 square feet, to contain sixteen (16) lockers and five showers, to connect with the ward room.

Captain's office, 300 square feet.

Captain's private office adjoining, 150 square feet.

Room for the Executive Officer, 300 square feet.

Private office for Executive Officer, adjoining, 150 square feet.

Private toilet room for the Captain and the Executive Officer. These rooms for the Captain and Executive Officer are to form a suite, and are to be so ranged that one office and the connecting toilet room may, on occasion, be entered directly from the corridor and used independently of the remaining rooms of the suite.

Room for the Navigator, 275 square feet, including a small private office.

Room for the Ordnance, 275 square feet, including a small private office.

Room for the Surgeons, 275 square feet, including a small private office.

Room for the Paymaster, 200 square feet, with stairs to the Paymaster's stores below.

Officers' toilet room, to contain not less than three water closets, four urinals, and two basins.

A report was received from the advisory architects for the Borough of Manhattan, in relation to the competition for a plan for the Sixty-ninth Regiment Armory, giving a detailed description of the advantages and disadvantages of the five plans received. The Secretary stated that the Board had personally examined these plans, and Brigadier-General Smith reported that he had consulted with the officers of the Sixty-ninth Regiment, who, with him, had particularly examined the plans of Messrs. Hunt & Hunt, of the competition, and in the selection of whom they concurred.

Brigadier-General George Moore Smith offered the following:

Resolved, That, in accordance with the recommendations of the advisory architects, the plans of Messrs. Hunt & Hunt for an armory for the Sixty-ninth Regiment, N. G., N. Y., on the site on the westerly side of Lexington avenue, extending from Twenty-fifth street to Twenty-sixth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, be selected and accepted, subject to such modifications as the Armory Board may recommend, and that the said architects be engaged under the terms of the programme of competition, provided the bids for the erection thereof shall come within the sum or sums to be appropriated by the Armory Board and concurred in by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Beginning at a point on the southerly side of Terrace place, and distant one hundred (100) feet westerly of the westerly side of Nineteenth street; running thence southerly and parallel with Nineteenth street to the northerly side of Vanderbilt street; thence easterly along the northerly side of Vanderbilt street to the centre of the block between Eighteenth street and Nineteenth street; thence northerly along the centre line of the block to the southerly side of Terrace place; thence westerly along the southerly side of Terrace place to the point or place of beginning.

Fourth.—That our report herein will be presented to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, Second Department, at a Special Term thereof for the hearing of motions, to be held in the County Courthouse, in the Borough of Brooklyn, in The City of New York, on the twentieth day of December, 1902, at the opening of the Court on that day, and that then and there, or as soon thereafter as counsel can be heard thereon, a motion will be made that the said report be confirmed.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below. No bid or estimate will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contracts must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which with the proper envelope in which to enclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
