Sir—Pursuant to section 1554, chapter 466, Laws of 1901, the Police Commissioner of the Police Department of The City of New York hereby submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department and Force for the three months ending June 30, 1904.

REPORT.

On the 30th day of June, 1904, the number of the Force of all grades (including those on probation) was 8,176.

Sick Time.

The time lost by the members of the Force by reason of sickness, disability and injuries received, for the quarter, and the details thereof, will be found in Schedule annexed, marked "A," from which it will be seen that the sick time lost was 19,471 days; the sick time paid was 9,735½ days, and the sick time unpaid was 9,735½ days. Total days time of the Force was 736,982. Per cent. of sick to full time was 2.64, and for preceding quarter 3.73.

Arrests.

The total number of arrests by the Police Force during the quarter was: Males, 37,442; females, 9,201; total, 46,643. Number arrested for principal felonies, 3,895. Number discharged without trial, 1,468. Number acquitted, 513. Number convicted, 634. Number sent to other authorities, 60. Number died, 16. Number pending, 1,204.

Lost Children.

Males, 707; females, 325; total, 1,032. Restored to parents or guardians, 994; other dispositions, 38. Of this number there were disposed of from Central Office 699.

Schedule "B" contains a valuable collection of miscellaneous statistics, to which attention is respectfully called.

Note—The discrepancy existing between the number of arrests for particular offences in felony report and general report (in Schedule "B") is accounted for by the fact that the general report is made from the daily returns from the station-houses, and the felony report is made from the quarterly returns. An offence charged in the station-house, at the time of arrest, is liable to be, and often is, changed to a greater or less offence on evidence elicited before the Magistrate.

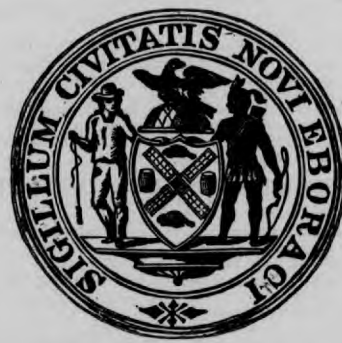

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.
