REPORT:

That having examined the subject, they recommend the adoption of the resolution herewith submitted, providing for the adoption of the said Budget for 1906 by the Board of Aldermen.

Resolved, That the Budget for 1906, as submitted to the Board of Aldermen by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, be and the same is hereby adopted and approved.

BUDGET FOR 1906.

The following resolution was offered:

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment makes this the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and six, being, first, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of said City for the said year, including State taxes; and secondly, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the charges and expenses of the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond for the said year, amounting in the aggregate to the sum of one hundred and sixteen million eight hundred and five thousand four hundred and ninety dollars and thirty-seven cents (\$116,805,490.37).

Which was adopted by the following vote:

The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx and Richmond—fifteen votes.

FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

All such appropriations being made subject to the following conditions:

1. The accounts of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be so kept as to show receipts and disbursements in such form as shall be satisfactory to the Comptroller, showing the addresses of the parents, guardians, or nearest relatives of inmates, and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to provide for such inmates.
2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions only for recurring expenses of "care, support and maintenance."
3. All institutions receiving public moneys shall be at all reasonable times open to the visitation and inspection of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Public Charities and the Department of Finance.
4. Upon it appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interests to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an appropriation has been made, he shall give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to so withhold such payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payment should terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon cease.
5. Except where appropriations are made in bulk and not upon a per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the proper Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as a proper charge against the City, and, except in emergency cases, Commissioner of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public institutions. The City shall not become liable for any payment to a charitable institution in excess of the appropriation which may have been made to such institution, notwithstanding any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.
6. All institutions receiving money from the City are required to state specifically the amount so received, as from the City Treasury, in their printed annual reports.
7. "That no money be paid to any private charitable institution which pays any salary to or gives any consideration, financial or of any kind, for services to, or that has any business dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise, directly or indirectly, from any officer or trustee or member of its Board of Managers."
8. Where the City is paying 50 per cent. and upwards of the cost of maintenance of an institution, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment requires representation in the board meetings of that institution, with the right of taking part in all business transactions.
9. This representation shall be through the Comptroller, who may attend any meeting, either in person or through a representative appointed by him, of which appointment the Comptroller will give written notice to the board of the institution.
10. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specially provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows:

For infants under two (2) years of age, and in infants' hospitals also between the ages of two and five, per day.....	\$0 38
For dependent children, from two (2) to sixteen (16) years of age, per week.....	2 00
For delinquent children, per annum.....	110 00
For adult inmates of reformatories, committed by the Courts, per annum.....	110 00

That charitable institutions for children now carried in the Budget and not sending their inmates to the Public Schools, and not sharing in the Corporate School Fund, and not receiving Teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institutions, shall be paid a per capita of 7 cents per day, five school days in the week, for each child receiving such instruction of four years of age and over during ten months in the year. This money to be paid under the authorization of section 230 of the Charter, but under the general conditions relating to institutions receiving Corporate School money, as provided in section 1154.

Notification to institutions carried in this Budget receiving children either from the Courts or through the Charity Department.

* Institutions shall be paid \$12 for the care of the mother and child during fifteen days of her confinement, and for every day thereafter shall be paid at the rate of 38 cents per day for the support of the child, and also \$12 per month for the maintenance of the mother, if she remain in the institution nursing her own infant after the expiration of the fifteen days.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment does not intend to pay for the maintenance of dependent and delinquent children in the same institution after December 31, 1906. To give opportunity for the necessary changes, the institutions caring for both these classes must separate them as soon after January 1, 1906, as is possible, and on such a basis or conditions as shall meet the approval of the Comptroller.

BRIDGES OVER THE EAST RIVER.

NO. 1—BROOKLYN BRIDGE.

Work is progressing upon the extension and partial reconstruction of the westerly or Manhattan terminal of the Bridge Railway, in conformity with plans providing for the temporary relief from overcrowding on the station platforms and for increased switching space for through elevated railway trains. When completed and in service the added facilities will permit a greater distribution of traffic and decrease the possibilities of congestion and overcrowding on the Bridge platforms; it may also be possible to extend the hours of through-train service when such is sufficiently adequate for the passenger travel until further proposed improvements are consummated.

No formal count or estimate has been made of the volume of traffic over the Bridge during the quarter, but it is known that the holiday passenger travel has far surpassed that of the previous summer.

Bridge Railway.

Trains from ten distinct elevated lines crossed the Bridge daily during the summer, except in the morning and evening rush hours of each week day. Such trains varied in length from three to five cars, as the needs of passenger travel required, up to a maximum of sixty-five trains per hour. On holidays, Saturdays and Sundays the heavy traffic continued for many hours almost equal to the ordinary week day rush hour conditions, yet by attention and vigilance rendered by the employees of the railroad company, millions of people were carried without serious or fatal injury to any person through accident to trains and without delay.

Surface Car Service.

The surface car service was maintained free from long interruption or delay; the slight delays which occasionally occur are difficult to avoid by reason of the double use of the Bridge roadways for vehicles and surface cars, and it is notable that delays, accidents or injuries to cars, vehicles or people occur generally when traffic is light. By a rear end collision between two cars on the down grade of the south roadway in the forenoon of August 22, one man was instantly killed and a number of persons severely injured. This accident occurred when it was possible to operate cars at high speed across the structure, and was caused by the carelessness of a motorman.

NO. 2—WILLIAMSBURG BRIDGE.

Footwalk Railing—

This work was fully completed on September 1 and has made travel on the footwalks very much safer.

Electric Lighting Station—

Owing to the delays in securing material for the building and switchboard and to the failure of the engine and dynamo builders to deliver machinery, the Electric Lighting Station is not completed. It is expected that the Station will be completed and the necessary equipment installed so that the operation of this lighting plant may begin some time the latter part of the month of October.

Maintenance—

The riveting gangs have been at work reinforcing the expansion joints on the north roadway in re-erecting the railing removed from the inner side of the footwalks on the north side of the Brooklyn trolley tracks.

The painting gang has finished the Brooklyn Approach and is painting the new footwalk railing.

The roadways and footwalks have been cleaned as usual.

NO. 3—MANHATTAN BRIDGE.

Office Work—

The detail plans of main span stiffening trusses, which were omitted from the plans for the superstructure contract on account of the lack of time for preparation, have been completed and are ready to be furnished to the contractor as soon as the contract has been signed.

Bids were opened on August 10 for furnishing metal work for the anchorages and constructing the towers, cables, suspenders and suspended superstructure, but the contract has not been signed as yet on account of legal restrictions.

The work of arranging the office filing system has been completed and all the plans are filed and indexed.

Studies have been made for both of the approaches and they are in shape to begin detail plans at any time.

Messrs. Carrere and Hastings have been engaged on the architectural features of both terminals and have furnished general plans of same.

The computation of negative moments and shears in the suspended spans has been continued.

A study has been made of the reconstruction of the suspended structure of the Brooklyn Bridge.

The office force has been engaged for some time on plans for the Manhattan terminal of the Williamsburg Bridge, which includes a change of grade of the elevated railroad and Brooklyn trolley tracks on the Manhattan approach from the anchorage to Clinton street.

Construction Work.

Brooklyn Side—

The work done in connection with the anchorage contract has consisted of driving sheet piling around the foundation, excavating for the foundation, driving foundation piles and mixing and placing concrete No. 1 and cyclopean masonry.

About 100 feet, linearly, of sheet piling remains to be driven. The excavation for the foundation has been nearly completed. About 1,400 foundation piles have been driven out of a total of about 2,100 required. The concreting of first section, extending the full width of anchorage and 50 feet from the rear, has been completed to elevation +13 feet, making about 3,300 cubic yards of concrete No. 1 and about 4,100 cubic yards of cyclopean masonry.

Manhattan Side—

The work done in connection with the anchorage contract has consisted of the erection of the contractor's plant, the removal of buildings, excavation for foundation, driving of sheet piles and laying of water main and connection.

The contractor has completed the material trestle with the necessary machinery for operating same, and erected derricks around the outside edge of the excavation for handling materials, and a new centrifugal pump has been installed within the excavation.

All the buildings covering the area of the anchorage have been removed and work is now progressing on the removal of buildings on the south side of Monroe street.

About 31,500 cubic yards of excavation have been removed, and about 470 sheet piles have been driven.

The new water main has been laid and the connections of same made. The driving of foundation piles will be commenced very soon.

NO. 4—BLACKWELL'S ISLAND BRIDGE.

Superstructure.

Plans—During the quarter the contractor for the steel superstructure has submitted 435 shop drawings. Three hundred and seventy-five of these drawings have been checked, 162 receiving preliminary approval and 213 have been approved by the Chief Engineer. All the shop drawings of the island span and its cantilevers have been approved with the exception of the eye-bar diagonals. Most of the shop drawings of the secondary truss members, upper and lower floors and sway bracing of the Manhattan and Queens cantilever arms have received preliminary approval.

Design—Details of the design which have not been worked up satisfactorily are the arrangement of the adjustment at Manhattan and Queens anchor piers, the expansion joints, and the detail of floor covering for the north side conduit trolley track.

Manufacture—A total of 20,866 tons of material has been inspected and delivered at shops, 8,745 tons have been manufactured and shipped to bridge site. Material received at shops during the month of July, 3.2 per cent.; August, 4.1 per cent.; September, 2.6 per cent. Total material received at shops to date, 44.8 per cent. Material manufactured during the month of July, 0.9 per cent.; August, 2.9 per cent.; September, 2.0 per cent. Total material manufactured to date, 16.9 per cent.

Erection—Erection was started the second week in August; 810 tons, or about 1.8 per cent. of the material has been erected to date. Failure of the sub-contractor to deliver the base castings for Tower No. 2 on time has caused delays. Material now received should permit the prosecution of the work of erection without further delay.

Extra Work—The contractor for the superstructure was authorized and directed by the Commissioner August 4, 1905, to do the concreting of the tower bases. The agreed cost of this extra work to be \$12.50 per cubic yard, or a total of \$2,225 for the estimated quantity of 178 cubic yards of concrete and grout. Base castings on Pier 2 have been filled. The steel of the first panel east of Pier 2 has been erected.

Masonry.

Anchor Piers—Work on anchor piers is progressing slowly. On the East or Queens Anchor Pier only 55 cubic yards of granite masonry was laid, 54.4 per cent.

of this pier being completed to date. On the West or Manhattan Anchor Pier, 426 cubic yards of granite masonry was laid, 45.6 per cent. of this pier having been completed to date.

Piers—On Piers 1, 2, 3 and 4 no masonry work can be done until after the steel work is in place.

Elevators—Owing to a probable change in the design of the elevator towers on Blackwell's Island, work has not been started on this part of the masonry contract.

Approaches.
The Consulting Architect is preparing sketches of the Manhattan and Queens approaches.

Stress Sheets—The stress and section sheets for the steel viaduct approach in Queens have been prepared, and detail drawings on paper have been made of the panel-points of the continuous trusses, also a number of sketches showing general detail.

Real Estate—The Board of Estimate and Apportionment ordered the condemnation of the property needed for the approaches June 23, 1905; no further action was taken to acquire this property.

BRIDGES OVER THE HARLEM RIVER AND IN THE BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

Maintenance.

No. 1. Willis Avenue Bridge—

The work of fitting, erecting and painting fascia plates for the whole length of the bridge has been completed, and adds very much to the appearance of the structure.

The non-conducting covering on the exposed water pipes has been wrapped with canvas and painted to protect it from the weather.

No. 3. Third Avenue Bridge—

The inside of the lower chords of draw span have been thoroughly cleaned and painted and covered with a tight-fitting wooden deck which will keep out dirt and weather.

A skylight and ventilator has been built in the roof of the engine room.

Asphalt repairs have been made to the roadway pavements during the quarter to an amount of \$289.32 under our annual contract for repairs.

No. 5. One Hundred and Forty-fifth Street Bridge—

Though not quite completed in all details, the One Hundred and Forty-fifth Street Bridge was opened to public travel at 3.30 p. m., on August 24, 1905, and has been successfully operated since that time. Certain improvements in the convenience and safety of operation, not provided in the contract, have been and are now being added to its equipment. Some of these, worthy of mention, are: Electric signals from ends of draw to engine room, a stairway from deck to engine room, a steam-heating system and water tank, a work shop on the fender pier, lockers, closets and sand boxes. When fully equipped, this bridge should be very easy to operate, and economical to maintain.

No. 6. Macomb's Dam Bridge—

Painting the structure, which was begun one year ago, is now practically completed. It has not been possible to keep the full force of painters on this work continuously without neglecting other bridges, and it has therefore taken longer than might have been expected.

The cost will be computed when the work is entirely finished.

Asphalt repairs to roadways have been made at a cost of \$815.80.

No. 7. New York and Putnam—

The span over the New York Central tracks has been shored up while the railroad company built a retaining-wall on the north side of its property. The wall is not completed, and the north end of the span is supported on timbers projecting beyond the wall, and anchored down on the inside. This is a temporary expedient, and should not continue longer than may be necessary to build a new approach in place of the old one.

No. 8. Washington Bridge—

The New York Interborough Company has continued its work of laying tracks and electric conduits.

The New York Edison Company, under orders from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, has wired the bridge, and it was lighted by arc lamps August 26, 1905. Nine lamps are now in use, and two more will be added when this Department can erect the two additional lamp-posts required. The iron ballustrades have received one coat of paint.

No. 10. Ship Canal—

Light repairs have been made to engine and gearing, and the railings of the draw and approach spans have been painted. The asphalt roadway has been repaired at a cost of \$143.99.

Nos. 11 and 13. Farmers and Kingsbridge—
Railings of both bridges have been painted.

Construction.

No. 1. Willis Avenue—

Construction of the Southern Boulevard approach has been continued during the quarter, and it is now essentially completed except the two stairways at Willis avenue and the Boulevard.

As the appropriation for this work will not all be expended with the completion of the contract, it may be advisable to use a part of the unexpended balance in improving the grounds through which the approach runs, and the office building which stands on them.

No. 4. New Madison Avenue—

The necessary preliminary of providing a temporary bridge for public service during the construction of a new bridge has progressed so far that the Sinking Fund Commission has been requested to permit the lease of a right of way from Booth Brothers and Hurricane Island Granite Company in Manhattan, and from Church E. Gates & Co. in The Bronx.

Plans and specifications have been prepared as far as is advisable pending the action of the Sinking Fund Commission.

No. 5. One Hundred and Forty-fifth Street—

On August 24, 1905, construction under the contract was so far advanced that the bridge was opened to the public. There is still some filling and other items of work to be performed by the contractor before it can be accepted by the City.

No. 9. University Heights—

Under a contract let April 27, 1905, the Snare & Triest Company has been dredging, excavating on Two Hundred and Seventh street, driving piles and laying concrete for retaining walls, to an amount of \$53,933.50 against a total estimated cost of \$595,897.80.

The piers upon which the two approach spans from Ship Canal Bridge will rest are not yet ready, although the contract provides that they shall be built by October 1, 1905. It is evident at this date that the Snare & Triest Company, under its contract, will be obliged to provide for these spans elsewhere, from the time they are moved from their present position until the new piers are completed.

No. 10. Ship Canal—

The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad has moved back the north abutment a distance of twelve feet, to make room for its tracks between the abutment and the river bulkhead.

The Subway Construction Company has built two new approach spans near the bridge, and is about ready to move out the old spans and move in the new ones, and a pile pier has been built at the foot of Two Hundred and Fifteenth street, upon which the new draw span will be erected.

It is not probable that the new bridge will be complete and in use before spring.

Hendrik Hudson Memorial—

Preliminary surveys and borings have been made to determine the proper location of the bridge, and the Consulting Engineer is now preparing plans and an estimate of cost, which will be completed in a few weeks.

BRIDGES IN THE BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

Maintenance and Repairs.

One Hundred and Thirty-fifth Street Bridge Over Mott Haven Canal—

The upper course of planking on the movable and fixed spans was entirely renewed. A few small adjustments were made to the machinery, but no extensive repairs were necessary.

Westchester Avenue Temporary Bridge—

This bridge has not yet been removed, although it has been out of commission since April. The swing span may remain safely in its present location until it is needed at some other crossing.

Westchester Avenue Permanent Bridge—

Some small repairs were made to the machinery and electrical apparatus. As the grading of Westchester avenue, east of the Bronx river, is not yet finished, all through travel to Westchester Village and Unionport crosses the Bronx at another point. Within a few months, however, this bridge will be extensively used.

Unionport Bridge Over Westchester Creek—

Some slight repairs were made to the deck, but no changes of importance will be made until the project of building a modern structure at this point is approved or rejected. If a new bridge be authorized the existing draw span can be used as a temporary crossing at one of the adjacent streets.

Pelham Bridge—

Part of the deck was renewed.

City Island Bridge—

No repairs of importance were made.

Eastchester Bridge—

Part of the deck was renewed. We purpose to overhaul and strengthen this structure at once.

Farmer's and King's Bridges—

These bridges, formerly cared for by The Bronx Branch of the Department, have been transferred to the Harlem River Division, to which they properly belong.

Bridges Projected or Under Construction.

Pelham Bridge—

The following were the principal operations during the quarter:

Abutment I. Finished during the quarter.

Pier II. Finished during the quarter.

Pier III. Finished during the quarter.

Pier IV. Little work was done on this pier, as it was made a wharf and storage place for stone that was to be used in the construction of the other piers.

Pier V. The face masonry was finished and backed up with concrete, and some of the anchorages for the draw span were set. The pier will not be completed until Pier VII. and Abutment VIII. are finished, as it would interfere with the building of that part of the work.

Pier VI. This pier was almost finished during the quarter.

Pier VII. The coffer dam was finished and we are about to start depositing concrete.

Abutment VIII. The rock on which part of this abutment rests was stripped and benched. Piles were driven where possible on the westerly section of the site, and part of the sheet piling is in place.

General. The masons pointed Abutment I. and Piers II., III., V. and VI.

Revised plans for the superstructure were received from the architect and from the consulting engineers. These various plans are now being reconciled, assembled and compiled, and will be the basis of the contract drawings. The contract drawings were partly finished and the contract and specifications are well in hand.

Willis Avenue Bridge—

The Engineers of The Bronx office supervised the construction of the Southern Boulevard approach of the Willis Avenue Bridge over the Harlem river, but the account of the progress of this contract will be found in the report of the Engineer in charge of the Harlem river bridges.

BRIDGES OVER NEWTOWN CREEK AND IN THE BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

Bridges Over Newtown Creek.

No. 1. Vernon Avenue Bridge—Construction:

All the structural steel work has been completed, the hand railing and railings at counterweight openings have also been completed. All the paving of bridge roadways on north side of creek have been finished and about 50 per cent. of granite block pavement of south approach still remains to be laid.

The trolley rails on bridge and stairways at Borden avenue have been completed and the special work at the Brooklyn Plaza has been laid by the Brooklyn Heights Railroad Company and connected with the tracks at Brooklyn terminal.

The grading of Manhattan avenue, between Ash street and the creek, has advanced, and the repaving of this section is about 20 per cent. completed. Vernon avenue, between railroad tracks and creek, has been curbed and repaved, with exception of space occupied by contractor as a storehouse. All the concrete curb and sidewalk have been completed. The draw-span roadway and sidewalks have been completed and a creosinate wood block pavement has been laid on the fixed spans. The use of this pavement in place of planking was ordered as an extra under the contract.

The operators' houses, located on the machinery floor of the fixed spans, ordered as an extra, are well advanced in construction and will be ready when the structure is finally equipped electrically.

The electrical installation has progressed satisfactorily during the quarter, and at its completion the bridge will be ready for traffic. It is expected that the structure will be opened about the middle of October.

The draw-span has been operated with both leaves completed, the alignment is perfect, and slight difference in level at end of Brooklyn leaf has been corrected.

No. 1. Temporary Bridge at East Avenue—

The roadway planking has been removed in places and a cluster of piles has been driven at east end of Brooklyn rest pier to replace a cluster broken by a passing scow in tow of steam tug.

The matter of removing the draw-span of this bridge, to be used as part of a temporary bridge at Borden avenue, has been taken up with the contractor, and satisfactory terms may be made for such removal.

No. 2. Greenpoint Avenue Bridge—

This bridge has been painted, is in good condition, and has required but few repairs during the quarter.

No. 3. Meeker Avenue Bridge—

No repairs of any kind necessary, and bridge is working very satisfactorily and is in good condition.

No. 4. Grand Street Bridge—

Barring a few repairs to centering latch and operating machinery, there is nothing to report in the maintenance of this bridge.

No. 5. Metropolitan Avenue Bridge—

No work required during past quarter.

Borough of Queens Bridges.

No. 6. Borden Avenue Bridge—

Main operating pinion has been again broken and repaired. On September 2 a trolley car, when entering on draw-span in inbound track, jumped the rails and struck the end panel bracing of north truss, damaging so that all traffic had to be suspended and turned to south track. This damage has been repaired temporarily and traffic resumed. Plans are well advanced for a new bridge at this point and the necessary funds for its construction will be available shortly.

No. 7. Flushing Bridge—Construction:

This work has advanced fairly well during the past quarter. The east abutment is complete, with exception of one course of ashlar and granite coping.

The new brick sewer on Broadway, with its connections to old sewers and new receiving basins, has been completed, and the grading of Broadway, between Lawrence street and the creek, is about 25 per cent. completed.

The west abutment piles are all driven and cut to grade, and about 20 per cent. of the concrete base is in place.

The dredging on the site of the east and west rest piers is practically finished, and the driving of piles by water machine for east rest pier will be commenced in a few days.

All the machinery has been delivered at the bridge site with the exception of the cast-iron counterweight. All the steel and iron required for fixed or movable spans is on the ground.

October 1, 1905, was the date fixed for the completion of this contract, but, owing to delay in acquiring property for new bridge, an extension of time has been granted to May 1, 1906, on which date, at the present rate of progress, we may look for its completion.

No. 7. Temporary Bridge at Flushing—

The hand railing and shelter-house have been painted, and slight repairs made to operating machinery. This structure has given very satisfactory service since its opening to traffic on September 27, 1904.

No. 8. Strong's Causeway Bridge—

Bridge is in fair condition and no repairs were necessary during the quarter.

No. 9. Little Neck Bridge—

The entire structure has been painted. Bridge is in fair condition. The necessity for a new bridge at this point is again urged.

BRIDGES IN THE BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN AND RICHMOND.

Borough of Brooklyn.

Hamilton Avenue Bridge—

The construction of the concrete operator's houses has proceeded slowly, only the copings having been completed. The time for completion is September 1, 1905, but the houses will not be completed before November 15. This contract was awarded to John Benny, No. 228 East Eighty-second street, New York City, for \$3,915. The bids were opened on June 22, the contract was certified on July 11, and the contractor ordered on July 12 to commence work.

The new bridge has been operating satisfactorily. Repairs have been made to the pavement on the approaches, and progress made on the new centre locks. Accurate measurements have been made from time to time to determine the movement of the piers and abutments. The surveys made on September 30 show that the movement has stopped.

Ninth Street Bridge—

The new bridge was opened to the public on July 13. The circumstances attending the completion of this bridge were unusual, but were mentioned in the previous report. The bridge works smoothly and quickly. Standards for electric lights have been put up, but no arrangements have been made toward ordering the lights.

Third Street Bridge—

One of the large shafts which worked out of position has been realigned. Otherwise the new bridge has given no trouble.

Carroll Street Bridge—

No repairs have been required during the quarter.

Union Street Bridge—

The new bridge has been operating satisfactorily.

Washington Avenue Bridge—

Only minor repairs have been made during the quarter.

Metropolitan Avenue Bridge—

Surveys have been made by the surveying corps of the Department to furnish information on which to base plans for the new bridge which is needed at this point.

Harway Avenue Bridge—

The roadways of the draw span and approach trestles have been replanked by the Department Carpenters with plank furnished under contract with the Georgia-Florida Lumber Company, and new hoisting cables have been put in.

Third Avenue Bridge—

Repairs have been made to the asphalt roadway.

Borough of Richmond.

Lemon Creek Bridge—

The bulkhead on the east approach was washed out by a heavy rain storm, and eight new piles were driven at this point. At the same time the double planking was removed and one layer of planking put in. New track wheels were also put in.

These repairs have improved this structure considerably, and it will probably last another year. Surveys have been made to furnish information for the new bridge proposed.

Fresh Kills Bridge—

Five hundred plank were put down to replace the worn out planking. The long trestle approaches to this bridge should be filled up and macadamized.

3. Upon the termination of this grant, all rights and privileges hereby granted to cross the said streets shall cease and determine, unless the said railroad company, its successors or assigns, shall have previously procured a new grant for the same from The City of New York.

4. The New York and Port Chester Railroad Company, its successors or assigns, shall pay for this privilege to The City of New York the following sums of money:

During the first ten years, commencing from the day when this contract is signed, an annual sum of eighteen thousand dollars (\$18,000), and during the succeeding fifteen years, an annual sum of thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000).

From the date of the commencement of the operation of any portion of the railroad until the end of the first ten years of this grant, an additional sum of ten cents (10 cents) per linear foot of single track, including all crossovers, switches, turnouts, sidings and stands, and for the succeeding fifteen years an additional sum of twenty cents (20 cents) per linear foot per annum, in lieu of said sum of ten cents (10 cents). All streets now open or in use and streets hereafter opened crossing the line of the railroad shall be carried over or under the said railroad by the grantee at the sole cost and expense of said grantee. The cost of all changes in grades of all approaches to such crossings, and all damages to property injured thereby, or by said railroad crossings, shall likewise be borne and paid by the grantee. All damages to property along the line of said railroad or contiguous thereto, caused by reason of the construction or operation of the said railroad, shall be borne and paid by the grantee, its successors or assigns, and The City of New York shall assume no liability for any damages so caused.

The City shall have the right at any time it so desires, to open across the route of the railroad company, any new streets other than those now open or in use, and the railroad company hereby gives its consent to said opening.

8. All viaducts over streets and all tunnels under streets and all bridges necessary to carry the streets over an open cut, shall be constructed at the expense of the grantee, and in such manner as shall not interfere with the ordinary use of the street as a public highway. All viaducts over streets shall have a height of at least sixteen feet in the clear throughout, and in the case of arch construction not less than sixteen feet in the clear at the centre and ten feet in the clear on the building or side line of said street. In the case of tunnel construction under a street there shall be at least four feet between the grade of the street and the exterior surface of the arch of said tunnel.

9. Any superstructure of the railroad crossing a street and having a length of one hundred (100) feet or less, shall be constructed in a single span; if more than one hundred feet in length, intermediate columns to support the structure may be placed in the street in such manner as may be approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. The width of such superstructure of the railroad shall not exceed sixty (60) feet when measured over all.

10. 14. All abutments or foundations for bridges, viaducts and stations and the stations proper, except intermediate supports for viaducts, as hereinbefore provided, shall be placed on the land of the company.

15. There shall be constructed along the line of the route of the main line of the railroad as proposed, for the accommodation of local passenger traffic, at least six stations between the Harlem river and the Bronx river, and at least six stations between the Bronx river, and the northerly line of The City of New York, as now fixed. On the branch line there shall be constructed at least three stations east of Morris Park Avenue.

16. Said railroad may be operated by electric power or by any other mechanical motive power, which may be lawfully employed upon the same, except locomotive steam power. If electrical power is used the railroad company shall, before the commencement of any of the construction of the electrical line equipment, file with the Board of Estimate and Apportionment plans showing such proposed construction, including all methods of insulation, position of contact conductor and all feed wires, conductors or cables, with method of carrying the same, and said plans must be approved by the said Board before construction thereof shall begin. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby retains the right to make such conditions relative to construction of such line equipment as it may see fit at the time of the approval of such plan.

17. No wires for the transmission of power shall be permitted unless they be placed in conduits or carried in a manner which shall have been approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. The New York and Port Chester Railroad Company shall provide, for the exclusive use of the City, two conduits upon the property of the company which may be used for carrying wires or cables; said conduits to be at least three inches in diameter.

18. The railroad company shall not carry wires or conduct power on its structures or along its right of way for any purpose except for the operation of its railroad and except, as provided above, for the use of the City.

19. The railroad company shall maintain a train schedule on the main and branch lines of at least sixty (60) trains on each line in either direction daily, stopping at all of the stations within the City limits, and at no time, either day or night, shall there be greater headway between such trains than thirty (30) minutes; provided, however, that said railroad company during the first five years after the commencement of the operation of any portion of the railroad shall not be required to operate its trains within the City limits between the hours of 1 o'clock and 4 o'clock a. m., each day, unless the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall determine, after a hearing had thereon, that public convenience requires the operation of its cars during such hours.

20. All cars on said railroad shall be heated during the cold weather in conformity to such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, and any failure to keep the temperature of any of the cars of the company above 50 degrees Fahrenheit, shall make the company liable for a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each offense.

21. All cars operated by the company shall be vestibuled and the system of lighting same shall be adequate and be made satisfactory to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. For any failure to comply herewith the railroad company shall be liable to a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each violation.

22. The grantee shall light the space beneath any superstructure which it shall erect across streets and the approaches to stations, in a manner which shall be satisfactory to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

23. During the term of this grant the rate of fare upon said railroad within the limits of The City of New York, as now fixed, shall not exceed five cents (5c.) for any passenger. The said company shall not charge any passenger more than such sum for one continuous ride from any point on said railroad, or a line or branch operated in connection therewith, and controlled by it, to any point thereof or of any such connecting line or branch thereof, within the limits of The City of New York, as such limits now exist, during such term. The company shall operate cars over the route hereby authorized, and the company shall not operate cars over the route of any other railroad company within the limits of The City of New York until it shall have received authority for such operation from the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and it shall not permit cars of any other company to run over the railroad hereby authorized. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment reserves the right to fix the compensation to be paid by such other company as shall be authorized to run cars over the route hereby authorized for such privilege, and said Board further reserves the right to fix the compensation to be paid to The City of New York by said Port Chester Company for the privilege of operating cars over the route of any other railroad company.

Whenever the "Port Chester Company" shall have entered into a contract with another railroad company, permitting the cars of said company to run over the route hereby authorized, or whenever the said "Port Chester Company" shall receive from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, or its successors in authority, permission to operate cars over the route of said other railroad company, a single fare of five cents (5c.) shall be the maximum charge by either company to a passenger desiring to make a continuous trip in either direction between any two points within the limits of The City of New York on the lines of said companies. For every refusal to comply with the requirements of this section, the corporation so refusing shall forfeit \$50 to the aggrieved party. Two or more penalties may be recovered in one action.

The rates for carrying of property upon the routes of the grantee within the limits of The City of New York shall, in all cases, be reasonable in amount, and shall be subject to the control of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, and may be fixed by such Board after notice and hearing to the grantee, and when so fixed such rate shall be binding upon said grantee, its successor or assigns, and no greater sums shall be charged for such service than provided for by said Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

24. The said railroad company shall carry free within the limits of The City of New York during the existence of this grant all letter carriers of the United States Government and members of the Police and Fire Departments of The City of New York, when such employees are in full uniform.

25. The said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of The City of New York who have jurisdiction in such matters, under the Charter of the City.

26. In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained this grant may be forfeited and avoided by The City of New York by a suit brought by

the Corporation Counsel, provided that in case of any such violation, breach or failure to comply with any of said provisions the said City shall cause notice in writing thereof to be served upon said company, and said company shall remedy such violation, breach or failure within ten (10) days thereafter, and in default thereof, then, and not otherwise, said right of forfeiture shall accrue and may be enforced by the said City; provided, further, that if the said railroad company, grantee hereunder, shall within said ten (10) days commence to remedy said violation, breach or failure, and shall prosecute the work of completing such remedy with diligence and with the utmost practicable dispatch until the same shall be completed, then no right of forfeiture shall accrue.

27. The grant of this privilege shall not affect in any way the right of The City of New York to grant a similar privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions to any other person or corporation.

28. The said railroad company shall commence actual construction within one year from the date of the signing of this contract, and shall complete a four-track railroad upon the main line, from the northern line of the City to the southerly terminus, as hereinbefore described, within five years from said date; otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

The said railroad company shall expend the sum of at least one million dollars (\$1,000,000) for construction within the limits of The City of New York within two years from the date of the signing of this contract, which sum shall be exclusive of any moneys expended for land acquired for the right of way.

A statement of moneys so expended for construction shall be submitted to the Comptroller of The City of New York, who shall, after investigation, report to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment his opinion as to whether such sums have been actually expended, and if in the opinion of the said Board the grantee has not proven an expenditure of the said sum within the time given, then said Board may declare that this grant has ceased and determined, and the said action of said Board shall be prima facie evidence of said forfeiture.

Any portion of the route covered by this grant which shall not be completed and in full operation within seven years from the date of the signing of this contract shall be deemed to have been abandoned, and all rights hereby granted in and to such portions of said railroad shall cease and determine, and The City of New York may exact such sum of money by way of liquidated damages as is hereinafter provided.

A majority vote of the members of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall be prima facie evidence in regard to the forfeiture of any or all the rights under this grant, as provided for in this section. Before action is taken by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, under the provisions of this section, the grantee shall have at least thirty (30) days' notice of the intention of said Board to take action and at such time as is appointed shall be allowed a hearing. In case any or all of the rights hereby granted are forfeited, it is a condition of this grant that all sums theretofore paid to The City of New York, together with the deposit of \$50,000 and the deposit of \$150,000, as provided for in sections 39 and 40 of this contract, and all structures erected by said grantee, its successor or assigns, within the lines of any street, shall be forfeited to and become the property of The City of New York.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall have power to extend the time provided for in this section for the completion of the railroad and for the work to be performed and expenditure to be made, as above, for a period or periods not exceeding in the aggregate two years, but such extension shall not be made unless the reasons given by the grantee for non-fulfillment are, in the opinion of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for causes over which the grantee had no control and was in nowise responsible.

29. The grantee shall assume all liability by reason of the construction and operation of the railway, and the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property by reason of said construction, maintenance or operation.

As a condition of this grant, the grantee, its successor or assigns, hereby agrees to repay to the City any damages which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or defaults of the railroad company, its successor or assigns.

30. Any portion of the right of way of the said railroad company falling within the lines of a street now shown on the map of The City of New York, which it may be necessary for the City to subsequently acquire, shall be ceded to the City, without cost to it, subject to the company's easement therein.

31. Said company shall not operate cars over any extension of any length whatsoever not specifically hereby authorized, and shall not make any connection with any other railroad company either by means of extensions or branches or by means of a platform building, unless it shall have received authority therefor from said Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, or its successors in authority, and upon such terms as shall be fixed by said Board.

32. In case any of the streets as now shown on the map of The City of New York and crossed by the said railroad above grade are altered or widened after the grantee has completed its railroad, and such widening requires the alteration of the superstructure of the railroad, the grantee and The City of New York shall each pay one-half of the cost of such alteration as may be necessary.

33. In case the route as laid out shall make it necessary in the opinion of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to change the map of The City of New York in order to avoid unnecessary or undesirable crossings, or for other reasons purely on account of the location of the railroad, and by such change or alteration additional streets bounding the grantee's right of way are determined upon, then the grantee shall acquire such streets and cede them to the City without cost.

34. Any alterations which may be required to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any sub-surface structures, pipes, etc., laid in the streets, on account of the construction or operation of the railroad, shall be made at the sole cost of the railroad company and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

35. The railroad company shall cede, without cost, to the City a strip of land 50 feet in width, along the side of the right of way; said strip beginning at the easterly side of White Plains road and extending along the right of way to the City line. The railroad company, at its own expense, shall regulate and grade said strip of land to such grade as shall be hereafter fixed by the City authorities, such regulating and grading to be done from time to time as directed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

36. All construction of railroad crossings shall be done in such manner as shall not substantially interfere with the ordinary use of any street as a public highway, and all streets in any way disturbed by such construction shall be restored to their original condition. In case of failure on the part of the grantee to restore such streets within a reasonable length of time, The City of New York shall have the right, under resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished after due notice and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the fund hereinafter provided.

37. The company's property and structures shall not be used for advertising purposes in any way, under a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each offense. Such restriction shall not apply to the interior of stations or cars.

38. The City, the Board and all duly authorized representatives of the City shall have the right at all reasonable times, as well during construction as afterwards, to inspect the railroad and any part thereof, and to enter thereon when necessary for the examination, supervision or care of any property of the City or of abutting property-owners or for any proper purpose. Nothing in this franchise shall be deemed to diminish or affect the sanitary or police jurisdiction which the public authorities shall lawfully have over property in the City.

39. The company shall deposit with the Comptroller, after the date of signing this contract, the sum of \$150,000, which fund shall be security for the construction of the entire road authorized hereby, and said fund shall be repaid to said company only as hereby specified. Whenever and as often as the company shall have actually completed one mile of single track, a certificate showing the completion of construction of such track shall be prepared by the engineer of said company, and such certificate shall be delivered to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. The said Board shall, as soon as practicable thereafter, verify the correctness of such certificate and either accept such certificate as correct, or if it finds it to be incorrect, return said certificate to said company, specifying in writing the respects in which it finds such certificate to be incorrect. Upon the verification of the correctness of any such certificate, or if any such certificate shall be found to be incorrect, upon its being corrected, and subsequently verified, the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall thereupon prepare and certify a voucher for form for payment to said company the sum of \$2,000, and the amount so certified by said Board shall be forthwith paid by said Comptroller from said fund to said company, upon the completion of the work of construction of the said mile of track. This procedure shall be followed by said company as often as it shall complete an additional mile of single track.

Upon the completion of the construction of the entire track authorized hereby, a final certificate shall be prepared by the engineer of said company and approved by the president thereof, showing the fact of such completion and the fact that the road is ready for operation. Such final certificate shall be delivered to the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, and shall be subject to a like verification as the certificate hereinbefore mentioned. Upon the verification of the correctness of such final certificate, or if such final certificate shall be found to be incorrect, upon being corrected, the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall thereupon prepare and certify a voucher in due form for the payment by the Comptroller to the said company of the balance of said fund of \$150,000 remaining in his hands.

If such final certificate, certifying to the completion of the entire construction of the road, shall not be delivered to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on or before the expiration of five (5) years from the date of signing this contract, and if the construction of the entire road authorized hereby shall not have been completed by said date, the balance of said sum of \$150,000 shall be forthwith delivered by the Comptroller to The City of New York, and thereafter said company shall have no claim or cause of action therefor.

The word completion, as used herein, shall include the laying of tracks, conduits and all structures necessary to the operation of trains over the route authorized hereby, and shall include also such street bridges or other structures as the company is required hereby to make, and such final certificate shall include proof that all of the antecedent acts required by this franchise have been performed by said company, in so far as their completion is required hereby.

The parties hereto hereby agree that the statement of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its agent, shall be accepted as final, as to the completion or non-completion of the road or any part thereof.

40. This grant is upon the express condition that the said company, within thirty days after the execution of this contract and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred thereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of The City of New York the sum of \$50,000, either in money or securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by said company of all the terms and conditions of the contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charge for franchise granted; in default of which payment of the annual charge, the Comptroller, acting in behalf of the City, shall collect same with interest from such fund after five days' notice in writing to the president of said company. In case of failure of the said company to comply with the terms of this contract or its neglect or refusal to comply with any demand or direction of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or other municipal officials, made pursuant to the terms of the contract, or under the authority of any laws or ordinances now or hereafter in force, in such case and in any of these events the said company shall pay to the Comptroller of The City of New York a penalty of \$1,000 for each violation; and in case of any violation of the provisions relating to the lighting of cars, watering of roadbed, advertising signs, heating of cars and vestibuling of cars, the said company shall pay to the Comptroller of said City such penalties as are herein provided.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties provided in the grant shall be as follows:

The Comptroller of The City of New York, on complaint made, shall, in writing, notify said company through its president to appear before him on a certain day not less than five days after the date of such notice, to show cause why it should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If said company fail to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appear in the judgment of the Comptroller to be in fault, said Comptroller shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or, where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to him to be just, and without legal procedure withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund, the said company shall, upon ten days' notice in writing, pay to the Comptroller of The City of New York a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of \$50,000, and in default thereof the contract may be revoked at the option of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or rights under the provisions of the grant shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to The City of New York.

The right of the City to collect any penalties imposed for non-compliance with the terms of this grant, or with any law or ordinance now in force or hereafter adopted, shall not be limited to the

said sum of \$50,000, and the enumeration or reservation of any rights by the City herein shall not operate to the exclusion of any other rights belonging to the City, either in law or in equity.

41. That if the said New York and Port Chester Railroad Company, its successor and assigns, shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures, and all street crossings in good condition throughout the full term of its occupancy of said streets, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City may give written notice to said company, specifying any default on the part of said company and requiring said company to remedy the same within a reasonable time, and upon the failure of said company to remedy its said default within a reasonable time, said company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to The City of New York the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) as fixed and liquidated damages, or the said City in case said structures over or under streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the company, in which case the said company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon; all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinbefore provided.

42. This grant shall not become operative until said company shall duly execute, under its corporate seal, an instrument in writing, wherein said company shall promise, covenant and agree on its part and behalf, to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms and conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained, and file the same in the office of the Comptroller of The City of New York within ten days after the adoption of this contract.

43. The said company shall not operate cars over any portion of the route designated herein until it shall have received a certificate from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to the effect that all of the antecedent conditions herein have been complied with, and to the further effect that the road has been constructed satisfactorily to the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and to the further effect that all the parts thereof which it shall have been possible for the grantee to construct have been constructed.

44. This grant shall take effect from the date of the signing of the contract by the Mayor of The City of New York.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement received, which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done.
