Hon. LOUIS F. HAFFEN, President:

Dear Sir—In accordance with the usual custom, I beg to submit the report of work done in this office and in the various bureaus under your jurisdiction in the Borough of The Bronx during the three months ending December 31, 1903, with summaries and statements showing the work for the year 1903.

This office has prepared and forwarded reports, miscellaneous communications and recommendations on the various matters affecting the administration of the office and improvements in the borough during the quarter to the number of 2,164, and during the year 7,807.

The conduct of the several bureaus shows generally commendable progress, and the good results of work accomplished are shown in the bureau reports.

Topographical Bureau.

The delay in the adoption of the street system east of the Bronx river made it impossible to make as good showing in the preparation of final maps and sewerage system for that territory as was expected, but it is hoped that 1904 will see a large part of that work completed. Of course, the many special cases of street opening make it necessary to take up the territory involving those streets affected, consequently in some degree retarding the completion of the general system. A large amount of work devolves upon this Bureau in the referencing and replacing of street monuments where highway, sewer and building improvements are in progress. This work must be done with great precision to avoid the disturbance of property lines fixed by these landmarks.

Highways.

This Bureau has accomplished a vast amount of work during the year, and it will be found by looking over the records that, notwithstanding the large volume of work done, the cost of supervision, including engineering and inspection, has been very moderate; running from 5 to 10 per cent. of the contract price generally, depending on the character of the work. It will also be noticed that the relation of actual cost to estimated cost is very close; taking an average of all the contracts completed it will be found that a variation of less than 1 per cent. occurred.

The streets paved and repaved during the year represent 17.3 miles, making a total of paved streets in the borough of 71.46 miles, while about 14 miles are under contract.

These pavements are all first-class block, asphalt or brick pavements, and do not include the macadam streets.

The materials used in the asphalt pavements have been of a high grade and exceedingly uniform in their composition, proven by careful chemical analyses of a great number of specimens cut out of the work after completion.

In connection with the regulating and grading of streets a great amount of difficulty is met with in this borough on account of the fact that about 60 per cent. of the excavation necessary to be done is composed of rock. This causes an excessive cost to the property-owner over the cost in localities where rock in large quantities is not encountered. In most cases the excavation above grade is all required to make the embankments, and it has been the custom to regulate in the specifications the sizes of rock which may be placed in the fill at certain depths below grade. These requirements of the specifications have been enforced to the extent that seemed wise, taking into consideration the interests of property-owners. A rigid enforcement of the specifications for size of rock in fill would probably increase the cost of filling to double the present prices. The use of rock in fill is therefore allowed at all points where it is not likely to make trouble afterwards.

The streets regulated, graded, curbed and flagged during the year amount to 9.95 miles, making a total of 155.4 miles of such streets in the borough. Contracts for about 36 miles additional of this class of work are now in progress.

The bridge and viaduct work has progressed as well as possible in view of the many delays and difficulties encountered.

The results in the Maintenance Department of Highways appear in the detailed report of the Superintendent, and show a large mileage of streets repaired, resurfaced with macadam and macadamized.

The macadamized streets and roads in the borough amount to 103 miles, while the earth and other roads total 350 ± miles.

Sewers.

The Sewer Bureau shows satisfactory progress during the quarter, and for the year the amount of work accomplished is not far below some of the best years, notwithstanding the delays due to the labor strike early in the year.

There were added to the sewers in the borough during the year 16.236 miles of all sizes, making a total at the end of the year of completed sewers of 211.715 miles. In addition to this we have 10½ miles under construction.

The receiving-basins number 2,427.

Extensive surveys and investigations have been made of the Millbrook watershed with a view of determining the necessity for a storm-relief outlet from this section. A report on this project will be submitted early in 1904.

The drainage and sewerage of the upper watersheds of the City, particularly that of the Bronx river, have received considerable attention, and conclusions will be arrived at as soon as all the facts necessary can be obtained.

The Bureau reports show all details, both as to construction and maintenance.

Public Buildings and Offices.

The details of this Bureau will be found in the reports submitted herewith.

Incumbrances.

A record of these matters appear in the reports of the Acting Superintendent.

Mr. JOSIAH A. BRIGGS, Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx:

Sir—I beg to transmit herewith the General Recapitulation of the work done in the Topographical Bureau during the year 1903, compiled from the four quarterly reports.

The Topographical Bureau of the President of the Borough of The Bronx is charged with the following duties:

I.—To make the topographical surveys.
II.—To prepare the design for the street system and to make the maps for adoption and filing.

III.—To define on the ground by stones and bolts the lines of the adopted street system, and to protect the said monuments when improvements are being made in the streets.

IV.—To prepare the design for the drainage and sewerage system and determine the grades of streets and sewers.

V.—To make surveys, searches, technical descriptions and maps for the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessments in the matter of acquiring title to avenues and streets.

VI.—To keep in custody the records and maps of all matters pertaining to the above-mentioned five (5) items.

VII.—To make examinations, maps and reports on miscellaneous matters referred by the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx.

I.—To Make the Topographical Survey.

No special topographical survey is reported under this heading. The surveys, which were made in connection with street opening matters, monumenting, establishing grades, laying out new lines, etc., are recorded under their proper heads.

II.—To Prepare the Design for the Street System and to Make the Maps for Adoption and Filing.

During the latter part of 1902 and the beginning of 1903 the studies for a revision of the street system, east of the Bronx river, were so far completed that on March 20, 1903, a plan, on a scale of 300 feet to the inch, covering the territory bounded on the south by the East river, on the west by the Bronx river, on the north by the northern boundary of the City and on the east by Pelham Bay Park, Eastern Boulevard and Westchester creek, could be presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, which plan was adopted May 29, 1903.

At the same date, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment passed a resolution requesting the President of the Borough of The Bronx to proceed with the preparation of maps for filing, such maps to be made in suitable sections on a larger scale.

The whole territory east of the Bronx river was subdivided into sections, and twenty-six (26) of such sections covered the area for which the street system was adopted.

Skeleton sheets of the size of 31 inches by 52 inches, showing existing streets, filed streets, lot divisions, public buildings, etc., were commenced prior to May 29, 1903, but actual work could not be started until after that date.

Twenty-six (26) of the skeleton sheets were completed during 1903, and of those nineteen (19) have the new adopted street system plotted thereon.

Four copies (one for the office and three for filing) were prepared for seventeen (17) sections during 1903, of which number twelve (12) sections were forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in triplicate for filing.

I may state here, that in 1901, when the Board of Public Improvements filed fourteen (14) sections of the former street system of the Borough of The Bronx, east of the Bronx river, which were amended by the map adopted May 29, 1903, the three copies for filing and the copy for the office of the fourteen (14) sections, were given out by contract, relieving thereby the Topographical Force, so that all efforts could be concentrated on computations for block dimensions and grade studies.

The computations of block dimensions were begun after the first section, which was number 29, could be plotted, and were carried by one Assistant Engineer in charge and four Computers.

The computations being subject to the so-called fixtures which determine the proper location of streets are often very lengthy, because complicated investigations are necessary to establish accurately the lines of old roads and streets; the streets in Williamsbridge and Wakefield sections were extremely difficult because they are retained on the final maps at their old width, as shown on filed property maps and because conditions on the ground differ materially from those on filed maps.

The computations for sections 29 and 30 were completed during 1903, and sections 31 and 34 are well under way, and section 40 was commenced.

Forty-eight (48) maps were prepared and forwarded for adoption.

Fifty-five (55) maps were prepared in triplicate and forwarded for filing.

III.—To Define on the Ground by Stones and Bolts the Lines of the Adopted Street System, and to Protect the Said Monuments When Improvements Are Being Made in the Streets.

During the year 1903, two hundred and ninety-one (291) orders were received for setting, resetting, testing and accurately referencing monuments, and forty-two (42) orders were brought over from 1902, making in all three hundred and thirty-three (333) orders.

Two hundred and thirty-two (232) orders of 1903 were attended to, and thirty-five (35) orders of 1902 were also attended to, making in all two hundred and sixty-seven (267) orders.

IV.—To Prepare the Design for the Drainage and Sewerage System and Determine the Grades of Streets and Avenues.

Sewers.

Thirteen (13) plans and studies for the sewerage and drainage system were made.

Sixteen (16) maps showing changes or establishing of grades were made. Leveling and cross-sectioning were done preparatory to making profiles of avenues and streets for the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessments in street opening matters for fifty (50) proceedings, making a total of 115,292 street lengths.

Profiles in duplicate, showing the present surfaces of the streets at their centre and house lines, and their relation to the intended regulation as well as to any previously established grades, giving the dates of the establishment of the grades as well as the authority under which they are established, were made for nine (9) streets.

Compilations of grades and their relation to any previously established grades, giving dates of filing and authority under which they were filed, were made for the Bureau of Assessors for twenty-seven (27) streets.

V.—To make Surveys, Searches, Technical Descriptions and Maps for the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessments in the Matter of Acquiring Title to Avenues and Streets.

This work consisted of making (a) rule maps, (b) draft damage maps, (c) draft benefit maps, (d) final copies of the damage and benefit maps, (e) surveys for damage maps, (f) inspection and testimony, and (g) auction sale maps and catalogues.

"a"—Rule maps, in quadruplicate, were prepared and forwarded with technical descriptions in twenty-three (23) street opening proceedings.

"b"—Draft Damage Maps were prepared and forwarded in seventeen (17) proceedings, comprising 573 plots, covering 5,135,578 square feet, or 2,054.2312 city lots.

"c"—Draft Benefit Maps were prepared and forwarded in twenty-three (23) proceedings, covering 14,144 plots.

"d"—Final copies of Damage Maps, in triplicate, and Benefit Maps, in quadruplicate, were forwarded in twenty-five (25) proceedings, comprising 1,236 maps.

Franchise maps, showing all the public service corporations occupying streets which are legally being opened were prepared and forwarded in five (5) proceedings, making a total of fifteen (15) maps of various sizes.

"e"—Damage map surveys were made in twenty-eight (28) proceedings.

"f"—During the past year about one-fifth (1-5) of the time of the Assistant Engineer in charge of the street opening matters was consumed in giving testimony before the Commissioners of Estimate and Appraisal.

"g"—Maps and catalogues of the buildings and encroachments on avenues and streets, to which the City has acquired title, were prepared and forwarded in Twenty-eight (28) streets, with 234 pieces of property for the purpose of selling the same.

VII.—To Make Examinations, Maps and Reports of Miscellaneous Matters Referred by the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx:

4. Nineteen (19) sections of the Final Maps, on a scale of 150 feet to the inch, showing the street system adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment May 29, 1903, were prepared, and six (6) more sections are ready in skeleton form.

6. Four copies (office copy and three copies for filing), which were forwarded, were prepared for fourteen (14) sections of the Final Maps, east of the Bronx river.

7. Office copy and three copies for filing were prepared and forwarded in forty-seven (47) special cases.

8. Numerous sketches, studies, prints and other auxiliary maps, preparatory to adopting and filing maps and not included in the above enumerated list, were made, of which no special record was kept.

MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

New York, May 25, 1904.

A meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of The City of New York was held at the Commission's offices, No. 61 Elm street, on Wednesday, May 25, 1904, at 2.30 P. M.

There were present—President McCooey and Commissioners Crowninshield, Siegel and Bell.

A public hearing was held on the request of the Mayor that the position of Chief of the Bureau of Licenses be included in the Exempt Class. John C. Breckenridge, Esq., Assistant Corporation Counsel, appeared in behalf of the request, and Elliot H. Goodwin, Esq., Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, and George McAneny, Esq., representing the City Club, appeared in opposition.

A public hearing was held on the request of the New York City Improvement Commission that the position of Assistant Secretary be included in the Exempt Class. The President read a letter from Francis K. Pendleton, Esq., Chairman of the Commission, in behalf of the request. There was no opposition.

A public hearing was held on the request of the Tenement House Department that the following positions be included in the Exempt Class:

Assistant Superintendent, The Bronx.
Secretary to the Superintendent, The Bronx.
Secretary to the Department.

Hon. Thomas C. T. Crain, Tenement House Commissioner, addressed the Commission in behalf of the request. Elliot H. Goodwin, Esq., Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, and George McAneny, Esq., Secretary of the City Club, opposed the request to include the Assistant Superintendent and the Secretary to the Superintendent in the Exempt Class. There was no opposition to the request to include the position of Secretary to the Department in the Exempt Class.

A public hearing was held on the request of the Commissioner of Licenses that the following positions be included in the Exempt Class:

A public hearing was held on the request of the Park Department that the position of General Inspector be included in the Exempt Class. Jacob Costuma, Esq., representing the Park Board, appeared in behalf of the request, and Elliot H. Goodwin, Esq., Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, and George McAneny, Esq., representing the City Club, in opposition.

A public hearing was held on the proposition to amend Civil Service Rule XIV. by inserting the following paragraph, to be known as paragraph 4:

"A person may be transferred from a position in the service of the State to a position in the service of the City, subject to the other provisions of this rule, provided the written consent of the State-Civil Service Commission is first obtained."

Elliot H. Goodwin, Esq., Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, appeared in opposition to the proposed amendment.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the matter of amending Civil Service Rule XIV by inserting a paragraph, to be known as Paragraph 4, providing that "A person may be transferred from a position in the service of the State to a position in the service of the City, subject to the other provisions of this rule, provided the written consent of the State Civil Service Commission is first obtained," be laid on the table.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.
