Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, Held at Their Office, No. 280 Broadway, New York City, on Tuesday, July 28, 1908, at 11 o'clock a. m.

Present—Commissioners Cowan (President), Ten Eyck, Ryan and Windolph, and Acting Chief Engineer Cook.

The minutes of July 7, 1908, were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported the examination and audit of bills contained in vouchers Nos. 10048 to 10072, inclusive, amounting to \$985.74, which were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment by the following vote:
