COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 11 o'clock A. M. on Thursday, November 7, 1918.

Present—Robert L. Moran, Acting Mayor; Charles L. Craig, Comptroller; Edward J. Glennon, Deputy and Acting Chamberlain; Francis P. Kenney, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meeting held October 17, 1918, were approved as printed in the City Record October 29, 1918 (Cal. No. 1).

Dock Department—Proposed Construction of a Breakwater Upon Red Hook Shoal at Gowanus Flats (Cal. No. 2).

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks, dated November 1, 1918, with reference to the construction of a breakwater upon Red Hook Shoal at Gowanus Flats, and attaching a plan showing how this shoal could be utilized for commercial development in much the same way as Governor's Island has been.

The title to the land under water upon which this projected island would be created is owned by the State of New York and letters patent therefor could doubtless be obtained from the State without expense to the City, for improvement in co-operation with the Federal Government.

The Dock Commissioner suggests as a first step that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopt a resolution urging the introduction of a bill to secure authority from Congress for a survey by the Engineering Corps of the United States Army, approval thereof by the Secretary of War, and favorable consideration of the same by the Committee on Rivers and Harbors and the Senate and House of Representatives.

A communication was also received from the Comptroller in regard to the above. Laid over.

Dock Department—Request of the New York and Baltimore Transportation Line for Consent to Assignment of a Lease of Pier 10, East River (Cal. No. 3).

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks, dated October 28, 1918, transmitting for consideration a request of the New York and Baltimore Transportation Line for consent to assign to the Munson Steamship Line the lease of Pier 10, East River, and all and singular the wharfage that may arise, accrue and become due, leased, demised and farm-let to the New York and Baltimore Transportation Line by indenture made the 30th day of March, 1906, by and between The City of New York by the Commissioner of Docks, party of the first part, and the New York and Baltimore Transportation Line, party of the second part, and the renewal thereof made on the first day of August, 1916, for the period of ten (10) years, expiring July 31, 1926.

Judge Stapleton, representing the New York and Baltimore Transportation Line, was heard in regard to the matter.

Dock Department—Communication from, with Reference to the Condition of the Pier at the Foot of Canal Street, North River (Cal. No. 4).

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks, dated October 23, 1918, with reference to the condition of the pier at the foot of Canal street, North River.

Laid over at meeting held October 31, 1918.

Which was again laid over.

Joint Meeting with the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to Meet the Regional Director, U. S. Railroad Administration, Eastern Region, and Others (Cal. No. 5).

The following was received:

Hon. JOHN F. HYLAN, Mayor, and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the City of New York, Municipal Building, New York City:

Sir—The undersigned held an informal conference at the above address this afternoon, upon the invitation of the Commissioner of Docks, for the purpose of considering several matters affecting the transportation, including steamship facilities, in the Port of New York.

Its importance to the Port and to the City is so great that we believe a general policy must be laid down, and suggest that progress to this end can best be made by arranging a meeting with your Board at an early date for that purpose.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby fix 2:15 o'clock p. m. on Friday, November 15, 1918, in City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, as the time and place for a joint meeting with the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to meet the Regional Directors, U. S. Railroad Administration, Eastern and Allegheny Regions; Federal Manager, U. S. Railroad Administration, Coastwise Steamship Lines; Director of the Port and Commissioner of Docks, for the purpose of considering a General Policy with respect to steamship transportation facilities at the Port of New York.

Which resolution was adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

Street Cleaning Department—Request of, for a Lease of Premises at No. 2798 Fulton Street, Brooklyn (Cal. No. 6).

A communication was received from the Street Cleaning Department, dated October 30, 1918, requesting approval of a lease of the store premises at No. 2798 Fulton street, Brooklyn, for a period of three years commencing January 1, 1919, at an annual rental of \$300, payable quarterly; the lessor to keep the premises in tenable condition satisfactory to the Department, pay taxes and water rates during the term of the lease and make outside repairs; the lessee to furnish gas and electric light fixtures and widen the front door of the store if required by the Department; the lessee to make inside repairs and furnish heat, light and caretaker.

Which was referred to the Comptroller.

Health Department—Lease for, of Two Vacant Plots of Land at Otisville, N. Y. (Cal. No. 7).

The Comptroller presented the following report:

October 18, 1918.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Dear Sirs—On October 17, 1918 (Calendar No. 14), your Board referred to the Comptroller a communication from the Secretary of the Department of Health, requesting the execution of a lease of two vacant plots of land, each 100 feet in width, located on the southerly side of the Erie Railroad at Otisville, N. Y., to be used for coal pockets for the Department of Health Sanatorium for a period of five years from November 1, 1918, at an annual rental of \$100 for the two plots.

The Department of Health states that in the summer 150 tons and in the winter 300 tons of coal are received and unloaded every month at this station by the Department of Health; at present the coal is shoveled from cars into wagons, an expensive and slow method. As the tracks are about 30 feet above the ground at the proposed leased premises, it will be possible to erect pockets near the railroad and discharge the coal from gondola cars on the railroad directly into the pockets by gravity and unload into the wagons from the pockets by the same method, effecting a saving both in labor and cost of demurrage on cars, as during the past year, owing to a scarcity of labor at this point, it has been impossible to remove the coal promptly from the cars.

There is no City-owned property in the vicinity available for this purpose.

The nearest City-owned property is the Sanatorium located at a distance from the railroad.

There is no property in the vicinity now under lease to the City that is not in use or that could be made available for the purposes of this lease.

There is no other similar property for rent with which comparison may be made.

There is no other privately owned property that could be rented or leased in lieu of the above premises to the advantage of the City.

I respectfully submit the matter for such consideration as your Board may deem proper, and, in the event of favorable consideration, I respectfully recommend the adoption of the attached resolution. Respectfully,

And the following resolution was offered for adoption:

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and is hereby requested to prepare a lease to the City from Charles W. Loomis, of the two plots of land west of the railroad station at Otisville, N. Y., and being located east and west of the highway undercrossing of the Erie Railroad, each plot having a frontage of 100 feet on said railroad and bounded southerly by the northerly side of the highway leading to Otisville Station—for use of the Department of Health for a period of five years from November 1, 1918, with the privilege of renewal for an additional period of five years, upon the same terms and conditions, at an annual rental of one hundred dollars (\$100), payable quarterly—at the expiration of this lease or any renewal thereof, the City to have the right to remove any improvements it may have placed on the leased premises.

The lessor to pay land taxes only. The lessee to pay taxes on improvements placed on the premises by the City—and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute the same when prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel, as provided by sections 149 and 217 of the Greater New York Charter.

The report was accepted and the resolution adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

Health Department—Communication from, with Reference to the Louisa Minturn Hospital (Cal. No. 8).

A communication was received from the Commissioner of the Health Department, dated August 7, 1918, stating that he has had several interviews with the authorities of the Louisa Minturn Hospital, and as a result the Trustees of that institution desire to terminate the lease and return the property to the Sinking Fund Commission in order that it may be turned over to the Health Department for use of the Willard Parker Hospital.

The Louisa Minturn Hospital occupies premises at the foot of East 16th street, Manhattan, under a lease entered into July 1, 1896, for a period of 99 years at a nominal rental.

The Commissioner suggests that such action be taken as will transfer the use of the property to the Health Department on the termination of the lease. The reason the Commissioner asks that this action be taken before the lease is actually terminated is because the Minturn Hospital Trustees have a certain endowment fund that he is urging them to turn over to the City or to use in putting the Minturn Hospital in first class repair before it is turned over to the City. The Trustees are anxious to have the original purposes of the gift and endowment carried out and these can be carried out only by the use of the building for contagious diseases.

Health Department—Request of, for a Renewal of Lease of Premises at 114 Fulton Avenue, Astoria, Queens (Cal. No. 9-A).

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Health, dated October 24, 1918, requesting a renewal of the lease of premises at No. 114 Fulton avenue, Astoria, Queens, for a period of one year from January 15, 1919, at the same rental which is now being paid for the premises and upon the same terms and conditions.

Which was referred to the Comptroller.

Health Department—Request of, for a Renewal of Lease of Premises at No. 689 Bay Street, Stapleton, Richmond (Cal. No. 9-B).

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Health, dated October 24, 1918, requesting a renewal of the lease of premises at No. 689 Bay street, Stapleton, Borough of Richmond, for a period of one year from January 15, 1919, at the same rental which is now being paid for the premises and upon the same terms and conditions.

Which was referred to the Comptroller.

Health Department—Request of, for a Renewal of Lease of Premises at No. 2380 Hughes Avenue, The Bronx (Cal. No. 9-C).

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Health, dated October 24, 1918, requesting a renewal of the lease of premises at No. 2380 Hughes avenue, Borough of The Bronx, for a period of one year from January 1, 1919, at the same rental which is now being paid for the premises and upon the same terms and conditions.

Which was referred to the Comptroller.

Board of Elections—Renewal of Lease for, of Premises at Nos. 28-44 Fulton Street, Brooklyn (Cal. No. 10).

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

October 24, 1918.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—On September 26, 1918 (Calendar No. 28), your Board referred to the Comptroller a communication from the Secretary of the Board of Elections, dated September 16, 1918, in which he states that at a meeting of the Board of Elections held September 10, 1918, a resolution was adopted requesting a renewal of the lease of a room containing about 26,000 cubic feet of storage space in the Eagle Storage Warehouse Building, at 28-44 Fulton street, Brooklyn, for the storage of election material and appurtenances in the care and custody of the Board of Elections of the City of New York, for a period of two years from December 1, 1918, at an annual rental of \$1,500.

Provision is not made in the Budget for leases of the Board of Elections, funds therefore being provided in their own Budget account.

This storage space has been occupied for this purpose under leases made as follows:

There is no City-owned property in the vicinity available for this purpose.

The nearest City-owned property is on Front street, occupied for bridge purposes.

There is no property in the vicinity now under lease to the City that is not in use or that could be made available for the purposes of this lease.

The rent paid by the City for the 26,000 cubic feet of storage space covered by the lease is \$125 a month, or at the rate of approximately one-half cent per cubic foot per month. The regular rate in this building being 1½ cents, this low rate to the City is only obtained by reason of the City having a yearly lease.

There is no other privately owned property that could be rented or used in lieu of the above premises to the advantage of the City.

Under the circumstances the rent appears to me to be reasonable and just.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a renewal of said lease upon the same terms and conditions as the present lease, of 26,000 cubic feet of space in the basement of the Eagle Storage Warehouse Building, at 28-44 Fulton street, Borough of Brooklyn, for the storage of election material and appurtenances in the care and custody of the Board of Elections of the City of New York, for a term of two years from December 1, 1918, at an annual rental of \$1,500, payable quarterly; the lessor to provide facilities at all reasonable hours for the receipt and delivery of such material to and from street to place of storage in said basement; also for inspection of said storage room, when desired, and to furnish required light and permit necessary repairs to said materials to be made in or near said storage room.

Lessor; Eagle Warehouse and Storage Company, 28-44 Fulton street, Brooklyn.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute a renewal of the lease to the City of 26,000 cubic feet of space in the basement of the Eagle Storage Warehouse Building, 28-44 Fulton street, Borough of Brooklyn, for the storage of election material and appurtenances in the care and custody of the Board of Elections of the City of New York, for a term of two years from December 1, 1918, at an annual rental of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500), payable quarterly; the lessor to provide facilities at all reasonable hours for the receipt and delivery of such material to and from street to place of storage in said basement; also for the inspection of said storage room when desired, and to furnish the required light and permit necessary repairs to said materials to be made in or near said storage room; lessor, Eagle Warehouse and Storage Company; the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made.

The report was accepted and the resolution adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

Board of Elections—Renewal of Lease for, of Premises at No. 61 Wyckoff Street, Brooklyn (Cal. No. 11).

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

October 30, 1918.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—On September 26, 1918 (Calendar No. 27), your Board referred to the Comptroller a communication from the Secretary of the Board of Elections, in which he stated that the Board of Elections, at a meeting held September 10, 1918, adopted a resolution requesting a renewal of the lease of about 30,000 cubic feet of storage space for the Board of Elections, in the storage warehouse at No. 61 Wyckoff street, Borough of Brooklyn, for a period of two years from December 1, 1918, at an annual rental of \$1,350.

No provision was made in the Budget for this renewal, the funds being provided by the Board of Elections from their own account.

These premises have been occupied for this purpose under leases made as follows:

There is no City owned property in this vicinity available for this purpose.

The nearest City owned property is on the south side of Warren street, 100 feet east of Smith street, occupied as a public school.

There is no property in this vicinity now under lease to the City that is not in use, or that could be made available for the purpose of this lease.

The premises covered by this lease consist of space, 25 feet by 125 feet, on the second floor, or a total of 2,875 square feet, and, at the rental of \$1,350 a year, the rate per square foot is about 47 cents. The third floor, with 1,840 square feet, is rented to various individuals by the owners for \$1,980 a year, or at the rate of about 90 cents per square foot.

There is no other privately owned property that could be rented or used in lieu of the above premises to the advantage of the City.

Under the circumstances, the rent appears to me to be reasonable and just.

I, therefore, respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a renewal of the lease of 30,000 cubic feet of storage space on the second floor in the storage warehouse of P. Belford & Son, No. 61 Wyckoff street, Borough of Brooklyn, for use of the Board of Elections, for a term of two years from December 1, 1918, at an annual rental of \$1,350, payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes and water rates, make all repairs and provide a watchman for the premises at all times, and furnish all necessary light for the leased premises when required; the lessor to keep the premises in good repair and give the lessee access thereto at all reasonable hours, and permit the election material to be removed to and from the second floor to ground floor by the use of block and fall to be provided by lessor; also to permit the necessary repairs to be made to said election material on the premises by the lessee; lessor, P. Belford & Son, 65 Court street, Brooklyn, N. Y.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute a renewal of the lease to the City of 30,000 cubic feet of storage space on the second floor in the storage warehouse of P. Belford & Son, No. 61 Wyckoff street, Borough of Brooklyn, for use of the Board of Elections, for a term of two years from December 1, 1918, at an annual rental of thirteen hundred and fifty dollars (\$1,350), payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes and water rates, make all repairs and provide a watchman for the premises at all times and furnish all necessary light for the leased premises when required; the lessor to keep the premises in good repair and give the lessee access thereto at all reasonable hours and permit the election material to be removed to and from second floor to ground floor by the use of block and fall to be provided by the lessor; also to permit the necessary repairs to be made to said election material on the premises by the lessee; lessor, P. Belford & Son; the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made.

A communication was received from the Secretary of the Municipal Court of The City of New York, dated October 30, 1918, requesting a renewal of the lease of premises occupied by the Third District Court at 1908-1910 Myrtle avenue, Borough of Queens, on the same terms and conditions as the previous lease, which expired September 1, 1918.

Department of Plant and Structures—Free Transportation Over the Staten Island Ferry to the Motor Service of the New York County Chapter of the American Red Cross Authorized (Cal. No. 13).

The following was received from the Commissioner of Plant and Structures:

October 29, 1918.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—Application has been made to me by Captain Adelaide B. Baylis, in command of the motor corps headquarters of the New York County Chapter of the American Red Cross, 34 Park avenue, Manhattan, asking free transportation over the Staten Island ferry for the Drivers in their motor service.

Captain Baylis states that the motor service is and has been in service in Government relief work and in epidemic relief work.

It is recommended that a resolution be adopted authorizing free transportation to the Motor Service of the New York County Chapter of the American Red Cross.

At the meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held March 14, 1918, a resolution was adopted, authorizing the issuance of free transportation on the municipal ferries to the Red Cross Society for ambulances and motor cars driven by members of the Richmond County Ambulance Corps of the society conveying patients from the service of the army, navy or any other branch of the Federal service, but I do not find any resolution under which free transportation can be allowed to the motor service of the New York County Chapter of the American Red Cross. New York and East River Ferry Company—New Propositions of, Relative to the Astoria Ferry (Cal. No. 14).

A communication was received from the New York and East River Ferry Company, dated October 30, 1918, offering to surrender the lease of the franchise for the ferry between the foot of East 90th street, Manhattan, and Astoria, L. I., and submitted the following proposals:

1. To enter into a new lease of the franchise to operate the ferry for a term of three (3) years, with improved and adequate service if the City will contribute and pay to it seventy-five hundred dollars (\$7,500) per month. All net profits from the operation of the ferry to be divided equally between the City and the Ferry Company.

2. To lease to the City its real and personal property, including three boats, and equipment necessary for operation for a term of three years at \$20 per day per boat and \$30 per day for real estate, racks, floats, bridges and other general equipment.

Which was referred to the Committee of the Whole.

Department of Public Charities—Request of, for a Lease of Premises No. 129 Carlton Avenue, Brooklyn (Cal. No. 15).

A communication was received from the Department of Public Charities, dated November 1, 1918, requesting a lease of premises known as No. 129 Carlton avenue,

Brooklyn, for the purposes of a central garage for the department, for a period of three years with the privilege of renewal, at a rental of \$1,200 per annum. Which was referred to the Comptroller.

Department of Public Charities—Communication from, with Reference to Pier at the Foot of East 29th Street, Manhattan (Cal. No. 16).

The following was received:

October 29, 1918.

Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, City of New York:

Gentlemen—At a conference held this day, at the office of the Commissioner of Docks, between the Commissioner of Docks, the Commissioner of Correction and the Deputy Commissioner of Public Charities, relative to vacating the pier at the foot of East 29th street now under the jurisdiction of the Commissioner of Public Charities, it was agreed between the Commissioners of said Departments, with a view of turning over said pier to the Dock Department for leasing purposes, that, on the completion of the Elevator Storehouse Building on Blackwell's Island, which from present indications will consume about four months' time, the Department of Public Charities would vacate the 29th street pier, providing and with the distinct understanding that the Dock Department would make all necessary repairs to the present 29th street pier and erect a suitable shed and such other facilities required by both the Department of Public Charities and the Department of Correction, according to plans to be submitted by said Departments to the Dock Commissioner.

This communication is forwarded to your honorable Commission for the purpose of allowing sufficient time to the Commissioner of Docks to prepare the 29th street pier for occupancy, the expense of which the Commissioner of Docks states will require corporate stock funds. In order to hasten the completion of the 29th street pier, it was suggested at the conference that I forward this letter to your honorable Commission for such action as you may deem necessary.

Sir—On December 20, 1917, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopted

Gentlemen—At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, held October 24, 1918, a resolution was adopted authorizing a renewal of the lease to the City of nine rooms in the parochial school of St. John Chrysostom's Church, located on the east side of Hoe avenue, 100 feet north of 167th street, Borough of The Bronx, to be used as an annex to Public School 20, for a period from September 1, 1918, to July 1, 1921, at an annual rental of \$6,500, with the privilege of renewal for a further term of three years upon the same terms and conditions; the owners to furnish heat, light and janitor service and make all repairs.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in full of the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unutilized at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, remove, cause, or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary workmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The person or persons making a bid for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presenting to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York, is, shall be, or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business in which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the bid that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.
