fat, old rubber, photographic plates, laundry machinery, etc. Authorization for transmittal of such a list, and to advertise the proposed sale, is requested.

I am in receipt of a statement from the Contract Clerk and Auditor that appropriation for other than personal service for the year 1918 are not sufficient to meet the needs for the entire year. Authorization to request issuance of special revenue bonds to meet this deficit is requested. I am in receipt of a request from Mrs. Blagden, Acting President of the Executive Committee of the Social Service Department, for permission to supplement the salary of certain workers by \$5 a month. I am also in receipt of a request from Miss Wadley to make use of the services of a young man (to be paid for privately) to work with the alcoholic and insane.

For your information I would report that the amount of subscriptions obtained in the Department for the Third Liberty Loan was \$55,950, distributed as follows: Bellevue Hospital, \$30,250; Gouverneur, \$9,850; Harlem, \$7,900; Fordham, \$5,800; Neponsit, \$2,150. The subscriptions for the First Loan amounted to \$32,200 and for the second, \$39,700.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows: The transmittal to the Sinking Fund Commission of the list of waste materials to be accumulated during the twelve months ending May 31, 1918, and of the wornout equipment of no further use to the Department and the advertisement for sale at public auction of the items for which the Sinking Fund Commission has no further use was authorized. After consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried to request the Board of Aldermen to authorize an issue of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$238,500 to meet the anticipated deficits in the supply authorizations of the Department. The request of the Acting President of the Executive Committee of the Social Service Department for permission to supplement the salary of certain workers by \$5 a month was approved.

COMMITTEE REPORTS.

The Finance and Building Committees presented estimates of corporate stock requirements of the Department as follows: 1918, \$1,717,000; 1919, \$2,315,000; 1920, \$1,275,000; 1921, \$2,900,000.

In accordance with the request from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment under date of March 20 1918. The estimates are made up as follows:

(1918) Bellevue—New wing, F and G (kitchen and service building), shell, \$1,250,000; additional wing, nurses' residence, \$350,000; additional boilers, \$40,000. Gouverneur—Enlarging vault for coal storage, \$5,000; bridge, \$12,000. Harlem—Additional story to nurses' home, \$60,000. Total, \$1,717,000.

(1919) Bellevue—New wing, F and G (kitchen and service building), interior and equipment, \$750,000. Gouverneur—New power plant, \$60,000. Harlem—Building for the Out-Patient Department, \$275,000. Fordham—Additional wing, \$980,000. Neponsit Beach—New wing, \$250,000. Total, \$2,315,000.

(1920) Bellevue—Building for the Out-Patient Department, \$1,055,000; new power plant, \$220,000. Total, \$1,275,000.

(1921) Bellevue—New building for Psychopathic (29th and 30th sts.), \$1,500,000. Gouverneur—Nurses' new residence, \$250,000. Harlem—Building for the staff, \$130,000; building for additional help, \$120,000; equipment in the three new buildings, \$50,000; changing present Out-Patient Department into wards, \$10,000; additions to mechanical plant, laundry, refrigeration, etc., \$150,000; grading, tennis court, planting, etc., \$10,000. Fordham—Laundry and power house, equipment, etc., \$150,000; enlarging nurses' residence, \$300,000; enlarging quarters for employees, \$230,000. Total, \$2,900,000.

Grand total for four years, \$8,207,000. After consideration and discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to present the corporate stock budget for the four years ending 1921 to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment with a statement setting forth in details the reasons for the request.

Reference was made to the legacy of William Washington Cole deposited in the trust fund account in the Department of Finance. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the subject was referred to the Finance Committee for recommendation.

Dr. Brannan and Mr. Farley presented sketches of several plans for the construction of temporary buildings at Fordham Hospital. After discussion, Dr. Brannan and Mr. Farley were requested to meet with Dr. McGowan and Dr. Taylor at Fordham Hospital on the subject. Mr. Farley referred to the need of a new building for the Out-Patient Department of Harlem Hospital, for which provision is made to the extent of \$275,000 in the corporate stock requirements for the year 1919, and referred to the necessity of obtaining land for this as well as other buildings which will be required at Harlem Hospital. After discussion and con-

sideration, it was moved, seconded and carried to request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to take appropriate action for the acquisition, either by purchase or exchange with other City property, of 200 feet of land from 136th to 137th sts., directly east of the hospital.

The following reports of the State Board of Charities of recent inspections were presented: Gouverneur Hospital and Out-Patient Department, Harlem Out-Patient Department, Neponsit Beach Hospital. The General Medical Superintendent was instructed to meet the needs and remedy the defects so far as the funds in the appropriations for the current year will permit and to make provision in the departmental estimate for 1919 to carry out the suggestions contained therein.

Dr. Brannan referred to a letter from Dr. Seymour, under date of April 20, in regard to extending the resources of the "Camp Huddleston" to patients from adjacent clinics who can no longer be cared for at Seaview Hospital and Otisville by reason of the Government taking over the institutions for soldiers and closing them to civilian patients. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to defer action pending the receipt of information from the Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities in regard to what provision he will make for the patients cared for at those hospitals.

Dr. Brannan referred to a meeting of the heads of City departments called at the request of the Mayor and held in the Board of Estimate Council Chambers on May 6 for the purpose of taking appropriate action to make the forthcoming Red Cross Drive a success among City departments. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to request the General Medical Superintendent to appoint a chairman to organize committees among employees for this purpose.

COMMUNICATIONS.

The minutes of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital for April 24 were presented. The resignation of Herman M. Biggs as Visiting Physician on the Third Division was accepted with sincere regret and his appointment as Consulting Physician authorized. The nomination of Dr. Warren Coleman as Visiting Physician in the place of Dr. Biggs was approved.

A letter, dated April 8, 1918, was presented from Mr. Sterling Potter of the Tuberculosis Hospital Admission Bureau to Dr. O'Hanlon, stating that the Corporation Counsel has informed the Department of Health that it has no jurisdiction over the patients from Bellevue and Allied Hospitals and that the Department of Public Charities will hereafter furnish permits to all institutions receiving tuberculosis patients excepting Riverside Hospital and Otisville Sanatorium instead of through the Tuberculosis Hospital Admission Bureau. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this letter was placed on file.

The minutes of the Board of Managers of the Bellevue Training School for Nurses for April 5 and April 19 were presented. It was moved, seconded and carried to inform the Board of Managers that the suggestion regarding the use of temporary buildings at Fordham Hospital was noted, the Department having had the subject under consideration for several weeks. The resolution that the Board of Managers supplement the salary of the cook at Harlem Hospital by \$10 a month was considered and approved. The report regarding the shortage of machinery in the laundry was considered and the Trustees proposed to renew their request to the Board of Estimate for permission to purchase additional laundry machinery, such request having been before that Board for several years and was denied at the meeting of the Board of Estimate on April 26. The report regarding the request to alleviate the situation as to the shortage of Nurses was noted.

A letter, dated May 6, was presented from the Acting President of the Board of Managers of the Bellevue Training School calling attention to the recommendations of the Nurses' Training School regarding the need of increasing the salaries of Nurses and Orderlies and requesting that this be done at once rather than make provision in the budget for the coming year. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this request was referred to the General Medical Superintendent for recommendation in accordance with the rules adopted May 13, 1909.

A communication, dated May 1, was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approving (a) permission to fill vacancies in the Department, (b) denying request to create three new positions of Pathologists in the Allied Hospitals, (c) amending salary schedules Nos. 2027-2029, (d) transfer of funds for the year 1917 from Code 2070 to 2093, which were ordered placed on file. A letter, dated April 25, 1918, was presented from the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, transmitting a certified copy of a resolution adopted that day approving the assigning to the Department of Public Charities of five horse-drawn ambulances,

one hearse, a lot of harness and one bay horse, which communication was ordered placed on file. A communication, dated April 25, 1918, was presented from the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and a certified copy of a resolution adopted that day directing the heads of departments make all requests for leases or renewal of leases of property for the use of City departments to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund and not communicate or negotiate with the owners or agents of the premises proposed to be leased, which was ordered placed on file.

Dr. O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows: The newspapers report the death at the front of Sydney E. Morgan, who had a two-year appointment at Bellevue dating from Jan. 1, 1916, and who left Aug. 8 as a member of the Presbyterian Hospital Unit. We have been unable to learn the particulars. Dr. Stewart, Radiographer at Harlem Hospital, is now in camp. Notice from the Government states the students will be withdrawn from Harlem Hospital. It is desirable that an appointment be made during the absence of Dr. Stewart. Dr. Hirsch, who is in charge of the X-Ray Department for the Hospitals, recommends that Dr. Unger be transferred from Gouverneur to Harlem for this period, and that Dr. Groeschel, who is first on the Civil Service list, be appointed to the temporary vacancy at Gouverneur. Owing to the impossibility of obtaining employees we have been obliged to establish a cafeteria service in the employees' dining room at Bellevue. Within the past few days we have had so many vacancies in the Messenger staff we have been unable to make any transfers of patients and for this reason the work throughout the Department is not being maintained at the usual standard. In accordance with the rules of the Board of Estimate for automatic increases, there are a number of employees entitled to increases which we are able to meet from accruals. Your authorization to make these increases at this time is requested.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows: It was resolved, in making a note in the minutes of the death of Sydney E. Morgan in France, to request the General Medical Superintendent to see that each Hospital of the Department has the customary service flag for the men and women in Government service. Action on filling the place of Radiographer at Harlem Hospital was deferred, the subject being referred to Mr. O'Keeffe for conference with the General Medical Superintendent and report at the next meeting. The difficulty of obtaining employees was discussed, and it was moved, seconded and carried to authorize automatic increases in salaries in accordance with the rules of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in so far as the accruals in the salary and wage appropriations will permit.

COMMITTEE REPORTS.

On the recommendation of the Building Committee it was moved, seconded and carried to authorize the payment of the 2 per cent. retained for repair security on the contract of Edward Fitzpatrick for the construction of roadways around pavilions L and M of Bellevue Hospital. Dr. Brannan and Mr. Farley presented revised sketches of temporary buildings at Fordham Hospital. It was moved, seconded and carried to adopt the plans subject to such minor changes as are necessary in the development of details, for which purpose the subject was referred to the Building Committee, the President and the General Medical Superintendent, with power to proceed with the work to make a request to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for permission to use as much as may be required from the appropriation of \$40,000 granted for the construction of a roof ward at Fordham.

On May 7 the Trustees deferred action on the request of N. Gilbert Seymour to extend the resources of the "Camp Huddleston" to provide for the care of tuberculous patients from Seaview Hospital and Otisville Sanatorium, pending a report from the Department of Public Charities, which was presented under date of May 13 and which was to the effect that the Government had agreed to take over Sea View Hospital and complete the buildings and also to provide 800 beds at Otisville for the duration of the war. Dr. Brannan also reported that at a meeting of the Committee on the Prevention of Tuberculosis it was learned that plenty of beds would be available for the patients and that he so notified Dr. Seymour under date of May 9. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to take no further action on the subject.

Dr. Brannan referred to a letter received that day from Commissioner Copeland of the Department of Health stating that the Mayor has asked him to confer with representatives of the Board of Trustees regarding the construction of pavilions F and G and that he had arranged for an appointment with Commissioner Copeland for Thursday, May 23, at Belle-

vue to show the Commissioner the great need for the additional pavilions.

A communication, dated May 21, was presented from the Department of Public Charities requesting the assignment of three horses to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund. After consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried to assign to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund three horses known as "Tom," "Stockings" and "Chunk." A letter, dated May 15, 1918, was presented from Major John S. Shearer, Sanitary Corps, N. A., reporting that the Surgeon General's Office has decided to discontinue the work of instruction in military roentgenology in New York, furnishing the further instruction required at Camp Greenleaf, Fort Oglethorpe, and expressing on behalf of the School of Roentgenology and the Surgeon General their thanks for the courtesies extended to their men, which communication was ordered placed on file. Two communications, dated May 14, 1918, and May 15, 1918, were presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approving resolutions adopted May 10, 1918, (a) request to fill vacancies, (b) denying request for the transfer of accruals to provide wages for firemen at Gouverneur, (c) modification of salary schedule No. 2026, (d) approving specifications as standards used by different departments for supplies, (e) approving specifications for white potatoes, which communications were ordered placed on file. A letter, dated May 7, 1918, was presented from the Department of Finance transmitting an executed copy of the lease authorized by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for the premises at No. 140 E. 37th st., which communication was ordered placed on file.

On motion, it was moved, seconded and carried to hold the meetings during the summer at the office of Mr. Samuel Sachs, 60 Wall st.

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Tuesday, June 4, 1918, at 2.30 p. m.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. O'Keeffe, Stern, Sachs and Wright, Trustees. Excused—Messrs. Farley and Paulding, Trustees, and Mr. Coler, Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities, Ex-Officio.

Dr. O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

Your authorization for closing the offices at 4 o'clock, as is customary during the summer months, is requested. On May 24 an Italian fete was held on the grounds at Bellevue, under the auspices of Miss Wadley of the Social Service, which was very largely attended by Italians in the neighborhood and very much enjoyed. The Social Service Department requests permission to transfer one of the workers now assigned to the drug cases to the children's clinic. Your approval is requested. In the recent Red Cross Drive \$7,448.74 was pledged by the various officers and employees, making us a 100 per cent. department.

M. Groeschel, first on the Civil Service list as Radiographer, is recommended for appointment at Harlem Hospital during the absence of Dr. Stewart on military service.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

The closing of the clerical offices at 4 o'clock in accordance with the usual custom from the middle of June to the middle of September was approved, provided the work of the respective offices will permit. The request of the Social Service Department for the transfer of one of the workers now assigned to the drug cases to the children's clinic was approved. The appointment of Dr. Groeschel during the absence of Dr. Stewart was approved.

COMMITTEE REPORTS.

Mr. O'Keeffe reported on behalf of the Finance Committee that after a conference with Mr. Sachs he requested the Comptroller on May 31, 1918, to invest the \$10,000 legacy left to Bellevue Hospital by William Washington Cole in New York City 4½ per cent. bonds maturing in 1965 or 1967, on which the market quotation on Wednesday, May 29, was 99½ bid and 99¼ asked; the interest accruing from these bonds to be reinvested in the same way. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this report was approved.

Dr. Brannan reported that recently he received a letter from N. Gilbert Seymour calling attention to the nuisance caused by the box factory at the corner of Gouverneur Slip and Front st. and that he brought the subject to the attention of the Department of Health and Fire Department, which Departments had replied that the matter will be given proper attention. Dr. Brannan also referred to the smoke caused by the factories in Brooklyn, opposite Gouverneur Hospital, and that he had been informed that afternoon that a violation had been placed on these industries by the Department of Health.

Commissioner Copeland having visited Bellevue Hospital on Thursday, May 24, at the request of the Mayor, for the purpose of considering the need for corporate stock for pavilions F and G, Dr. Brannan reported that Commissioner Copeland had before him a report from the Examiners and that he had since been in consultation with Commissioner Copeland on the subject, who now has it under advisement. Dr. Brannan reported that under date of May 18, 1918, he sent a letter to the Secretary of the Mayor setting forth the need of filling the position of Electrocardiographer at Bellevue Hospital, which report was approved. Mr. O'Keeffe referred to the vacancy at Fordham Hospital in the place of Investigator, which he believed should be filled if possible. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to request the General Medical Superintendent to make an appointment to this place if an employee can be found. Mr. Stern referred to the need of constructing awnings on the balconies and roof wards at Fordham Hospital. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to instruct the General Medical Superintendent to have such awnings constructed if possible.

COMMUNICATIONS.

The minutes of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital for May 22 were presented. The request that the General Medical Superintendent communicate with the Committee on Public Health of the Academy of Medicine in regard to physicians who have signified their willingness to accept appointments in the Out-Patient Department, where additional men are required, was confirmed. The suggestion that the house staff be reorganized on a one-year basis to conform with the new ruling from Washington was adopted. The promotion of Hubert V. Guile to the position of Visiting Physician, Fourth Division, during the absence of Alexander Lambert on military duty, was approved.

The minutes of the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital for May 21 were presented. The request that there be appointed in the children's clinic in the Out-Patient Department women Clinical Clerks, as recommended by Dr. Stanley Brady, Pediatricist, was granted.

A letter, dated May 14, was presented from N. Gilbert Seymour, Director of the Tuberculosis Service at Gouverneur Hospital, presenting a request for permission to use in the Gouverneur Clinics the charts suggested in section 7 of the Efficiency Committee report, which was part of the manuscript of the Tuberculosis Report for Gouverneur Hospital for 1917. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this request was referred to the Committee on Clinical Records of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital, who has charge of the standardization of medical records in the hospitals of the Department.

The transmission to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the plans and specifications for screens for pavilions I and K and L and M, Bellevue Hospital, in order that bids may be received for the work, was approved. The estimated cost is \$1,200 and is chargeable against current appropriation No. 2087A, 1918, General Repairs. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, under date of April 29, 1918, called the attention of the City departments to sections 1541 and 1542 of the Charter relating to expenditures chargeable to budget appropriations. The Secretary, under date of May 28, replied that under section 692 of the Charter the Trustees are charged with the care of the patients sent to the hospitals of the Department and at times may find it impossible to comply strictly with sections 1541 and 1542, as it will be necessary to ask for special revenue bonds where the budget appropriations are likely to become exhausted before the end of the year for which the appropriation was made.

A letter, dated May 29, was presented from Dr. J. Alexander Miller, setting forth that he is about to leave for France and that the ward service will be in the hands of Dr. Class in co-operation with Dr. Kelley. As Dr. Miller has an indefinite leave of absence, on account of military service, this letter was placed on file.

Two resolutions, dated May 21, 1918, were presented from the Board of Aldermen: (a) Heads of City Departments requested to give leave of absence to veterans of the Civil War in the employ of the City to attend the annual State Encampment, and (b) extending vacation period by one week to such women in the City employ who are willing to volunteer for farm work, which were ordered placed on file.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was moved, seconded and carried.

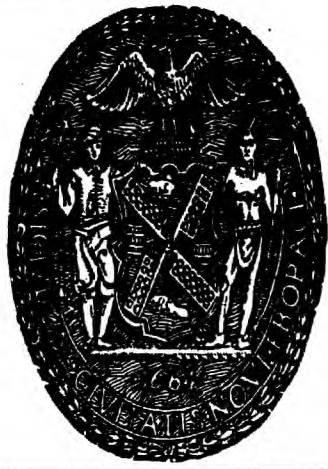

STATE INDUSTRIAL COMMISSION—DEPARTMENT OF LABOR.

Resolutions Adopted.

Whereas, the Division of Factory Inspection has submitted to this Commission appeals from orders issued by said Division against the premises noted by the appellants given herein, the granting of which appeals would necessitate a variation of law; and

Whereas, the said Division of Factory Inspection has had a reinspection made in each case and upon the reports submitted gives the conditions existing and recommends as follows:

1. Premises affected, Carthage, Adelaide st.; appellant, Carthage Silk Mills (Jefferson Silk Mills). Cover roof of building with approved noncombustible material. 2-story and basement nonfireproof building erected since Oct. 1, 1913; no sprinkler; no fire alarm signal system; two interior stairways 42 inches wide, which are enclosed with wood; building used to spin silk yarn, basement and 1st floor being the only floors used; 2d floor used for storage purposes only; the doors to stairway are locked and no one permitted on said floor except to remove or replace goods; occupancy of basement, 1; of 1st floor, 44; no safe egress from roof.

Recommendation: In view of the fact that the 2d floor is not used for manufacturing purposes and no one is permitted to work thereon, waive order to cover roof with incombustible material while conditions and occupancy remain unchanged.

2. Premises affected, Dryden; appellant, Atlantic Woolen Mills. 12—Prohibit occupancy on 2d and 3d floors until two legal means of exit have been provided. One, two- and three-story nonfireproof building erected before Oct. 1, 1913; open lofts; no sprinkler; combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy, 23; above 1st floor, 7; above 2d floor, 4; frame "L"-shaped building with west wing three-story; east wing two-story with one unenclosed stairway; southwest corner of west wing extending from 1st to 3d floors; no egress from roof; one-story section on northerly side.

Recommendation: While not more than 10 are employed above ground floor, accept a substantial wooden stair at northeast corner of west wing from 3d floor to roof of 1-story section; a nonfireproof door not less than 2 by 6 feet from 2d floor at northeast corner of west wing and from northeast corner of east wing to one-story section, with stairway from roof of one-story section to ground.

3. Premises affected, Glens Falls, 47 Warren st.; appellant, James McPhillips. Roof of fireproof material over elevator shaft in new building, same to be provided with skylight. 8—Stairs in new building of incombustible material. 9—Enclose exit stairs in new building with fireproof material. 10—Extend stairs to roof in new building. 11—Self-closing fireproof doors each side of openings from basement of new and old buildings. 12—Two remote means of exit from basement of new building. 3-story nonfireproof factory building, part of which was erected before Oct. 1, 1913, and part after Oct. 1, 1913; open lofts; sprinklers; combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy, 30; above 1st floor, 8 to 16; above 2d floor, none regularly; exits, three unenclosed interior stairways, doors to which open outwardly; exits remote; no egress from roof; imperfect horizontal exit on 2d and 3d floors. Building contains 19,225 square feet, 10,700 of which were erected prior to Oct. 1, 1913, and 8,525 were erected subsequent to Oct. 1, 1913; orders apply to new construction, 3d floor of which is used for automobile storage; no one regularly employed on 3d floor; 2d floor for repair shop with six male employees, and has exit to grade through old portion, distant about 10 feet. Elevator shaft enclosed with fireproof partitions, with wood roof covered with slag; stairs in new section have 11-inch treads, 7 1/2-inch rise and are 48 inches wide; opening to horizontal exit is 11 feet wide, protected by standard fire doors on one side only. Basement has south end door opening to grade; each of the numerous windows at grade along side has unobstructed opening approximately 3 by 4 feet; no one regularly employed on this floor, same being used for storage; cars are washed at end of floor adjacent to door leading to grade.

Recommendation: In view of the existing conditions and occupancy, waive orders 4, 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12.

4. Premises affected, Jamestown, 216 W. 3d st.; appellant, Dr. R. G. Roberts. 1—Prohibit occupancy. 2—At least two legal means of exit. 3—Replace wooden stairs with stairs of incombustible material. 4—Make rear stairs at least 44 inches wide. 5—Enclose stairs fireproof. Variation was heretofore granted; accept present interior stair as now constructed, an exterior screened stairway 44 inches wide to be provided; maximum occupancy of the portion occupied by the International Flag Co. not to exceed 45 persons; orders 3, 4 and 5 were waived. Building is two stories high, erected since Oct. 1, 1913, of brick construction with divided lofts; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy, 52; above 1st floor, 42; exits, two interior stairways enclosed with lath and plaster partitions; exits remote; no safe egress from roof. Subsequent to granting of variation the International Flag Co. removed to another portion of the floor, and the portion occupied by said company is now being used as a printing establishment.

Recommendation: Accept an exterior screened stairway at least 44 inches wide located at northerly side of building at easterly end thereof, same to be equipped with a fireproof door leading from workroom, so constructed as not to obstruct the passageway to stairway; two openings of portion occupied by International Flag Co., one opening to be at easterly end and one at westerly end of said partitions, each opening to be equipped with a swinging door, said door to remain open at all times when any one is at work in the building, and a free and unobstructed passageway to be maintained from said openings to the exterior screened stairway, each such passageway to be at least the width of the doorway, which doorway must be 44 inches wide. Stipulation to be signed by the owner and tenants agreeing to keep said doors open.

5. Premises affected, Jamestown, Allen st.; appellant, Associated Manufacturers and Merchants' Association, for Jamestown Car Parts Mfg. Co. 2—Self-closing fire doors at openings in elevator hoistway, all floors. 2-story fireproof building with three fireproof stairways. The only combustibles carried is benzine, never more than 30 gallons at a time, kept in covered metal receptacles in fireproof storeroom adjoining rear of building. Elevator enclosed in fireproof material from 1st floor to underside of roof; two sections of 1st floor are partitioned off; partitions

are of wood and are so arranged that south side of one section and north side of the other section form a passageway about 20 feet long and width of elevator enclosure and leads to opening in elevator shaft. On 2d floor there are no partitioned sections.

Recommendation: Inasmuch as the wood partitions of enclosed sections are so close to elevator hoistway, proper fire door to be provided on 1st floor; on 2d floor will accept vertical sliding gate 5 feet 6 inches high as at present installed.

6. Premises affected, Rushville, near L. W. R. R.; appellant, Belden & Co. 1—Provide proper toilet room for each sex, same to contain flush bowl waterclosets, two for females and one for males. 2d females and 3 males employed; outside closets of the vault type provided; no sewerage nor water system in village; watercloset for females adjacent to workroom; males' watercloset in yard; both closets in good condition.

Recommendation: Accept present closets while conditions and occupancy remain unchanged.

7. Premises affected, Salamanca, Rochester st.; appellant, Janches Furniture Co. 2—Enclose elevator shaft fireproof, and equip openings with fireproof doors. 3-story nonfireproof sprinklered building, with two exits from each floor; one exit consists of an enclosed fire resisting stairway extending from 1st to 3d floors; at 1st floor are exits at each end of building; on 2d floor a horizontal exit covered with corrugated metal connects with roof of dry kiln; building 1-story high with outside stairway leading from 1-story roof to ground; on 3d floor the other exit is a bridge 8 by 47 feet, covered with corrugated metal, which connects with three feet of nearby 4-story building, constructed of brick and measuring 60 by 160 feet; no one works on top floor of 3-story building; 10 on 2d floor and 5 on 1st floor; building measures 47 by 100 feet; exits remote from each other; elevator has fireproof floor doors fastened back with fusible link on 2d floor; on 3d floor the fireproof floor doors close and open as elevator ascends or descends; elevator located in center of long side of building, and has 6-foot enclosure at all floors, except at sides used for loading, where gates 5 feet 6 inches high are installed.

Recommendation: Inasmuch as the floors are of wood and the enclosure meets the requirements for old buildings, accept same and waive order.

8. Premises affected, Solway, Milton ave.; appellant, Solway Process Co. General office addition. 2—(To occupant)—Prohibit occupancy above 2d floor. (To owner) 1—Prohibit operation of factories, etc. 2—Extend stairway along south wall to 1st floor and enclose same fire resisting. 3—Additional exit. 4—Fire alarm signal system. 5—Fire drills. 4-story building erected prior to Oct. 1, 1913; open lofts except on 4th floor; no automatic sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy, 236; the basement is used as printing establishment; the only other work that can bring the building within the factory law is that being done by the draughtsmen on the 2d floor. Exits, one interior stairway from basement to 3d floor at southwest corner of building; one interior stairway from 2d to 4th floors at southerly side of main portion of building; fire escape along the northerly wall, with stairs 18 inches wide, 6-inch tread, 10-inch rise, 60-degree pitch, extending to 2d floor only; imperfect horizontal exit.

Recommendation: Waiver of order for additional exit, fire alarm signal system and fire drills, also prohibiting occupancy, while the only work being done above the ground floor coming under the provisions of the Labor Law applicable to factories is that being done by the draughtsmen.

9. Premises affected, Schenectady, 177 Jay st.; appellant, L. W. Killen. Provide inside flush watercloset for use of employees. This is a meat market which is not sufficiently heated during the winter months to prevent the regulation watercloset from freezing. Permission is asked to install a long-hopper closet of the anti-freezing type, to be located in rear of store and reached by means of covered passageway; the street sewer line is too high to permit of installation of slush waterclosets in cellar.

Recommendation: Accept installation of anti-freezing long-hopper closet in building located in rear of store, same to be reached by means of covered passageway.

10. Premises affected, Tonawanda, Fremont st.; appellant, Columbus McKinnon Chain Co., Inc. 2—Enclose exit stairs fireproof. 4—Exit to roof of 1-story connecting building, with stairs from roof to ground. 2-story building erected since Oct. 1, 1913; nonfireproof; open lofts; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm system; occupancy, 20, all of whom are on ground floor at present. Exits, one interior stairway not properly enclosed with fireproof partitions, doors to which open outwardly and are self-closing; one perfect fire escape on north-west corner accepted as an exit as per variation granted May 1, 1917; exits remote; no safe egress from roof.

Recommendation: Accept present stairway as an exit if present fireproof enclosure be carried to 2d floor level, all openings on 1st floor to be provided with approved self-closing fire doors equipped with fusible links. When stairway enclosed as stated, No. 2 to be considered complied with, exemption being granted from carrying enclosure to underside of roof and providing fire doors at 2d floor. No. 4 is waived by chapter 627 of the Laws of 1918. Capacity of 2d floor to be limited to capacity of stairway and fire escape.

11. Premises affected, Tonawanda, River rd. (Nail Mill); appellant, Wickwire Steel Co. 8—Make and file with Industrial Commission plans of elevator installed. 9—Enclose elevator shaft fireproof. 10—Openings in elevator shaft to be equipped with fire doors. 11—Grating under overhead sheaves in elevator shaft. 14—Guard projecting ledges of elevator shaft. 15—Guard elevator counterweights. 16—Buffers in elevator pit. At the time of regular inspection (March 25, 1918) elevator was not installed. On compliance visit later elevator was in use. Necessary orders issued on elevator as per special inspection of May 23, 1918. On May 8, 1918, variation granted, accepting this building as a 1-story structure; the stairway is open and there is no good reason in view of this to require the fireproof enclosure of elevator; elevator located in close proximity to wooden stairway provided at northerly end.

Recommendation: Accept enclosure of elevator on all sides not used for loading or unloading with heavy wire mesh braced and secured or of solid material, said enclosure to be 6 feet high and self-closing gates 5 feet 6 inches high to be installed. When work has been done, accept as compliance with orders 8, 9 and 10. Orders 11, 14, 15, 16 to be complied with as issued.

12. Premises affected, Rochester, N. Y.; appellant, Otis Elevator Co. for Beechnut Packing Co. Request for acceptance of swinging hatchway fire doors held open by means of fusible link and counterweights, and an auxiliary gate provided at entrance to elevator shaft. 2-story building erected since Oct. 1, 1913; elevator installed with swinging hatchway fire doors held open by means of fusible link and counterweights, and auxiliary gates installed at opening, it being desired to leave these fire doors open so as to obviate the necessity for a regular elevator operator. If equipped in this manner the auxiliary gate will prevent any one entering the elevator shaft and will also permit any one operating the elevator to gain access to the 2d floor by means of auxiliary gate. If the fire doors were kept closed this would not be possible.

Recommendation: Accept swinging hatchway fire doors held open by means of fusible links and counterweights with auxiliary gate installed at entrance to elevator shaft, this acceptance applying only to the installation in this particular plant.

And it appearing that there are practical difficulties and unnecessary hardship in complying with the strict provisions of the law and the rules and regulations of the Industrial Code on the above premises, and that in granting the variations herein set forth the spirit of the law and of the rules of the Industrial Code will be observed and public safety secured; and

It further appearing that each of the appellants herein has been notified that he would be given an opportunity to appear and be heard at this time and place if he so desired, and such of the appellants who appeared having been given a hearing by the Commission, therefore

Be it resolved by the State Industrial Commission, That each of the appellants herein be and he hereby is granted the variations noted for the premises stated during the time that the conditions remain as of this date.

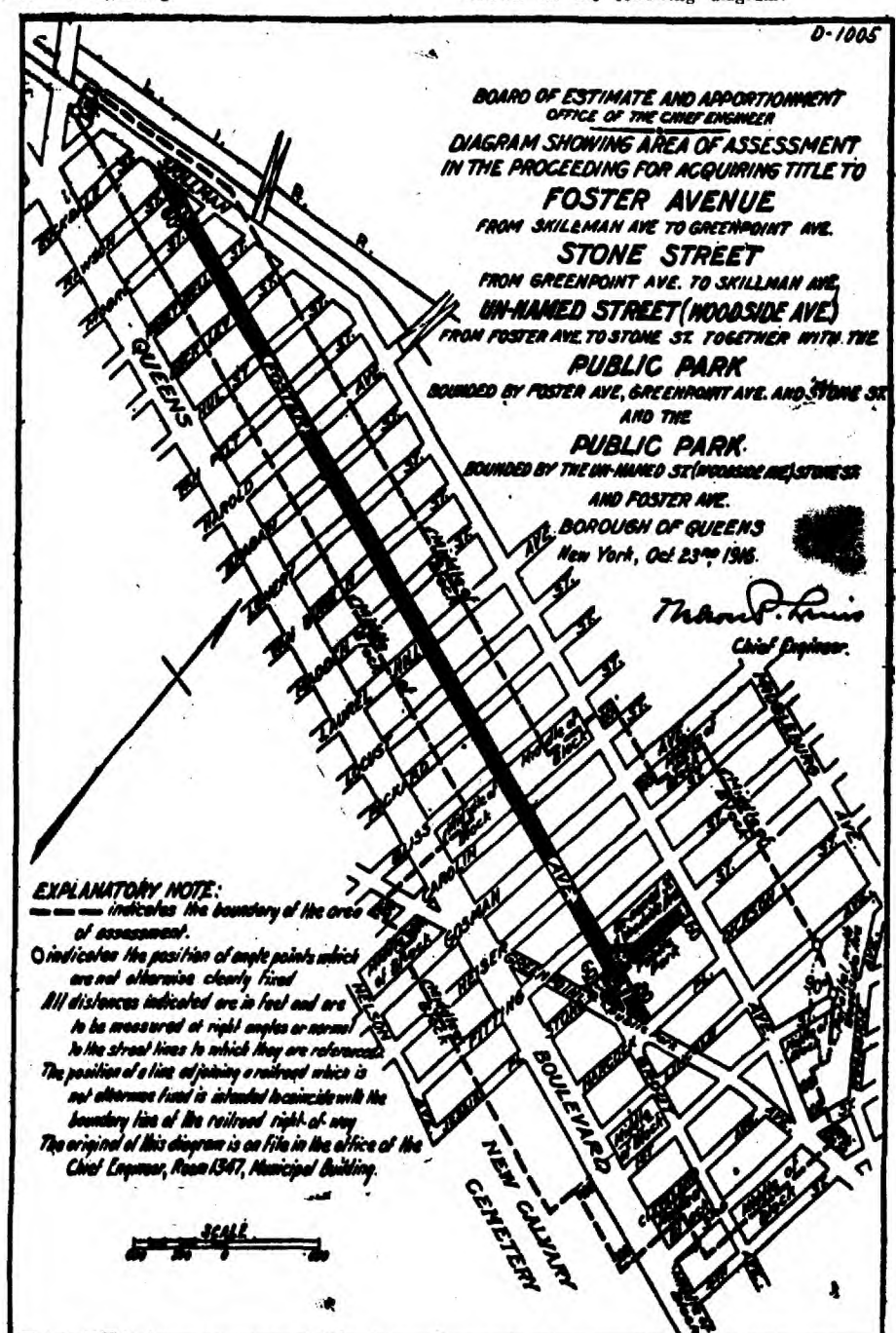

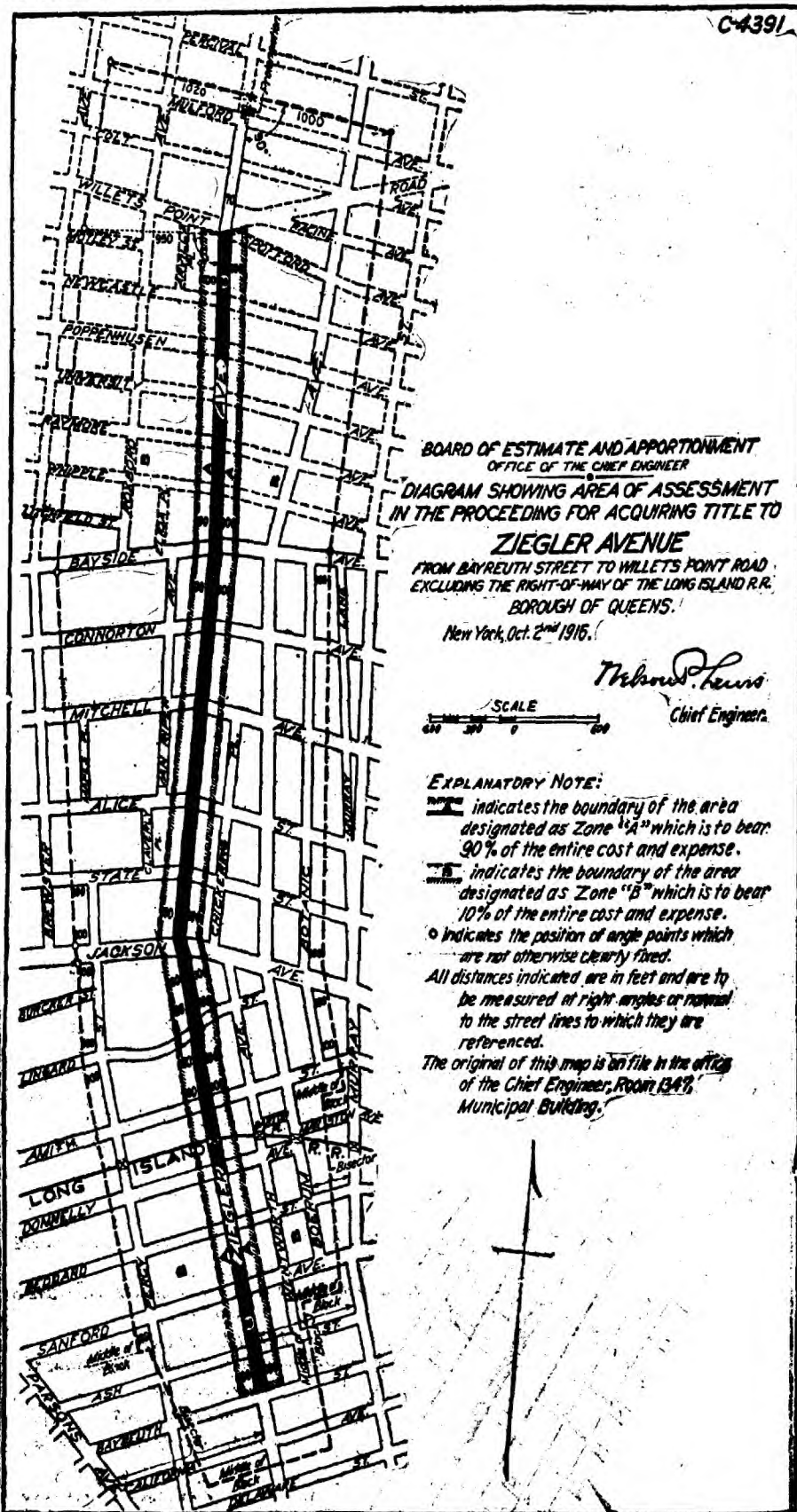
