The rate charged for steam-vessels taking water daily or belonging to daily lines, is one-half cent. per ton (Custom House measurement) for each time they take water.

Stamers taking water other than daily, one cent per ton (Custom House measurement).

Water supplied to sailing vessels and put on board, twenty-five cents per hundred gallons.

All matters not hereinbefore embraced are reserved for special contract by and with the Commissioner of Public Works.

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS,

No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to another person or persons.
All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all waste of mater.

The use or other vehicles or horses, cannot mitted.

No horse-troughs or horse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures.

No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urmals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced. Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly probibited.

Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eatingsaloons, confectioners or other buildings are strictly
prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas,
house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about
stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided
with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of
hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the
use of Croton water.

Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other
vessels will not be allowed.

The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding
rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense,
and if not paid when imposed will become a lein on the
premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid
water rates.
