Abstract of Proceedings for the Week ending September 18, 1886.

WEDNESDAY, SEPTEMBER 15.—STATED MEETING—11 A. M.

Present—Commissioners Beekman (President), Crammins, Powers, and Borden.

The following communications were received:

From the comptroller, in relation to the practice of a number of City employees of selling and assigning their salaries to money-brokers, and requesting that such practice be prohibited in the Department.

The following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That hereafter, if any member of the Police force or other employee of this Department, shall sell or assign moneys due or to grow due him as salary or compensation for services, without the knowledge and approval of the Board or the President, it shall be deemed sufficient grounds for charges against such employee and punishment.

From Mortimer Landgrebe, John Doorley and others, property-owners, protesting against the proposed closing of College avenue, between Third avenue and One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street. Filed.

From a committee of taxpayers, forwarding a petition of property-owners, asking that action be taken for closing College avenue, from Third avenue to One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street; and From William Cauldwell, Jordan L. Mott and Richard H. Teller, concurring in said petition. Filed.

From Rev. Henry Kimball, asking permission to use cottages and music-stands in the Central, and several of the City parks, for the purpose of distributing food, and holding unsectarian services. Denied.

From E. B. Southwick, reporting upon the work of destroying noxious insects in the parks. Filed.

From the Engineer of Construction, reporting in relation to plans for a bulkhead on Harlem river, between One Hundred and Fifty-fifth and One Hundred and Fifty-seventh streets, proposed to be constructed by James J. Coogan. Laid over.

From the Engineer of Construction in charge of Streets and Sewers in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards:

1st. Reporting in relation to the time taken to complete the sewer in One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, from Washington to Third avenue, with branch, etc., and recommending that the penalty for twenty-nine and one-quarter days' overtime be charged against the contractor. Approved.

2d. Reporting relative to the time for the completion of the contract for grading, etc., East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, between Third and Morris avenues, and recommending that the penalty for five days' overtime be charged against the contractor. Approved.

From the Topographical Engineer, reporting upon the works in progress under his charge. Filed.

From the Acting Superintendent of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, reporting upon the works in progress under his charge. Filed.

The consent of the Board was given to the proposed change in the arrangement of its offices, by the trustees of the Emigrant Industrial Savings Bank, whereby the elevator on the Reade street side of the building may be dispensed with, provided that all such rearrangement of the offices and partitions be done at the expense of the trustees of said bank, and with the approval and to the satisfaction of this Board.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending September 11, 1886:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 4,644.

The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 390.

During the past week 385 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels, to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 67 permits.

There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 4 permits.

There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 2 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy-sinks, 81 permits.

At premises where contagious diseases were reported 115 visits were made, and 12 disinfections and 7 fumigations were performed.

The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital was 2.

The number of vaccinations performed was 42, of which 37 were primary and 5 revaccinations.

There were seized and condemned 11,845 pounds of meat; 115 pounds of candy, and 2 barrels of fruit.

The number of specimens of milk examined was 46; the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 42, and the number of arrests made was 1.

The number of disinfections performed by the Special Disinfecting Corps was, privies, 4,187; yards, 4,151; cellars, 4,017, and thirty miles of street gutters.

The certificates of 682 births, 59 still-births, 202 marriages, and 722 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, September 4, 1886. This shows an increase of 32 births, 5 still-births, 62 marriages and 22 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1885 there was an increase of 90 births, 7 still-births and 57 deaths, and a decrease of 117 marriages. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from diphtheria decreased 8; erysipelas, 2; diarrhoeal diseases, 1; inanition, 4; phthisis pulmonalis, 11; pneumonia, 8; aneurism, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 1; meningitis and encephalitis, 3; convulsions, 1; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 15; Bright's disease and nephritis, 14; cyanosis and atelectasis, 5; drowning, 1; while the deaths from measles increased 3; scarlatina, 1; whooping cough, 4; typhoid fever, 3; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; malarial fevers, 4; puerperal diseases, 5; alcoholism, 4; rheumatism and gout, 4; cancer, 5; bronchitis, 6; heart diseases, 5; direct effect of solar heat, 5; apoplexy, 2; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 10; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; premature and preterm births, 6; suicide, 1. The number of deaths from croup and hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 211 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year; 298 under two years; 331 under five years; and 42 seventy years and over, which shows that the number of deaths of children under five years of age was 9 more than the number reported during the preceding week, and represent 45.84 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 131 were in institutions, 439 in tenement-houses, 137 in houses containing three families or less, 5 in hotels and boarding-houses, 10 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 10 were on the basement floor, 147 on the first, 164 on the second, 140 on the third, 92 on the fourth, 25 on the fifth, 3 on the sixth; 711 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 11 non-residents; 95 were stated to be single, 183 married, 79 widowed, and the condition of 365 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.
