

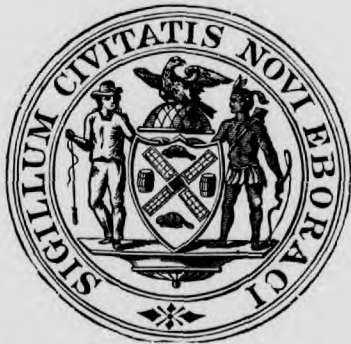

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks of the City of New York, held at the office of the Board, Pier "A," Battery place, Thursday, April 9, 1891.  
Present—President Post.  
" Commissioner Cram.  
Absent—Commissioner Matthews.  
The minutes of the meetings held March 31 and April 2, 1891, were read and approved.  
Richard Lacey, one of the committee who appeared before the Board Thursday, April 2, 1891, was present, and suggested that in preparing the amended plan for the improvement of the Harlem river, between One Hundred and Thirty-fifth and One Hundred and Seventieth streets, the basins proposed to be built thereat be extended as far inshore as practicable.  
On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to examine and report.  
A committee from the Granite Cutters' Union was present and renewed their request respecting the rate of wages to be hereafter paid masons and stone-cutters in the service of the Department.  
On motion of Commissioner Cram, the rate of wages for masons and stone-cutters was fixed at the rate of fifty cents per hour, the same to take effect on and after April 11, 1891.  
The offer of William W. Fogg to sell to the City certain bulkhead property between Perry and West Eleventh streets, North river, as per diagram submitted, was tabled.  
The communication from H. E. Nesmith, Jr., inclosing the consent of the owners of Pier 10, East river, to the erection of a shed upon said pier by J. M. Ceballos & Co. was tabled for one week.  
The following communications were received, read, and  
On motion, ordered to be placed on file, viz.:  
From the Finance Department—Requesting a requisition for two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) for the purchase of certain wharf property between Vesey and Barclay streets, North river. The Secretary directed to draw requisition for said amount.  
From the Department of Street Cleaning—Reporting that orders have been issued for the cleaning of Piers, new 59 and 60, North river.  
From the Department of Public Works:  
1st. Requesting to be advised if the Department approves the substitution of Seventy-sixth for Seventy-eighth street, East river, as the location for a public bath, which,  
On motion, was approved, and the Engineer-in-Chief directed to make provision for the accommodation of the public bath at the foot of Seventy-sixth street, East river.  
2d. Requesting that backing-logs be placed at the bulkhead foot of One Hundred and Fourth street, East river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to do said work.

From the Fire Department—Requesting permission to run a pipe from South street, under Pier 48, East river, for the purpose of establishing telegraphic communication with the fire-boat "Havemeyer." Request granted.  
From Frederick Ward, Laborer—Tendering his resignation. Resignation accepted.  
From the Brooklyn and New York Ferry Company—Requesting a permit to make general repairs to their various ferry premises for the ensuing three months. Permit granted upon the usual terms and conditions.  
From the Compagnie Générale Transatlantique, lessee—Requesting the Department, in the construction of the extension to Pier, new 42, North river, to round the ends of the pier similar to those of Pier, new 45, North River. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to do said work.  
From the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, lessee—Requesting permission to repair and replace fenders on south side of Pier, new 27, North River. Permit granted.  
From Horatio D. Mould—Agreeing to the terms and conditions of the resolution adopted April 2, 1891.  
From John Dorschel—Requesting the privilege of locating a bath-house (now berthed foot of Eighty-first street, North river) at some place within ten blocks of said street; whereupon the following resolution was adopted:  
Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to John Dorschel to locate and maintain a bath-house and appurtenances at the foot of Eighty-third street, North river, or at the foot of Eighty-fourth street, North river, as may be directed by the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department; rate of compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$2 per week, payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master of the District, the same to be and remain only during the pleasure of the Board.  
From the Maine Steamship Company—Requesting permission to drive three piles at the end of Pier 38, East river. Permit granted.  
From Christian Velje—Requesting permission to place a float foot of One Hundred and Tenth street, Harlem river. Permit granted (subject to the approval of the Engineer-in-Chief), the same to be and remain only during the pleasure of the Board.  
From John H. Corrigan—Requesting appointment as Laborer.  
From Charles W. Dayton, attorney—Requesting the leasing of the water-front occupied by the Riverside and Fort Lee Ferry Company, foot of One Hundred and Thirtieth street, North river.  
From Oliver Bryan—Respecting his offer to sell wharf property near the foot of One Hundred and Fourteenth street, Harlem river. Referred to the President.  
From Foster & Thomson, attorneys—Inclosing bond on lease of Pier, new 54, North river. Executed by Solomon Sayles. The Secretary directed to file said bond with the lease.  
From the New York Steam Company—Requesting permission to erect and operate an ash



conveyor for the purpose of loading scows with ashes on the south side of pier foot of Vesey street, North river. Application denied.

From the Catskill and New York Steamboat Company—Requesting temporary use of the south side of Pier, old 33, foot of Jay street, North river; whereupon the following preamble and resolution were adopted:

Whereas, This Department contemplate improving the water-front adjacent to and in front of Pier, old 33, North river; therefore, be it

Resolved, That pending the work of such improvement, permission be and the same is hereby granted to the Catskill and New York Steamboat Company to use and occupy, from and after May 1, 1891, and during the pleasure of the Board, the south side of Pier, old 33, North river, and the bulkhead adjoining, now occupied by them under a lease which expires on the first proximo, the rate of compensation to be the same as that now paid; the said company to make all repairs, and do all other things during their occupancy as required by the conditions of their present lease.

From the Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Report for the week ending April 4, 1891.

2d. Reporting that the canal boat "James H. Cannon" was removed to West Fifty-seventh Street Pier by order of Dock Master Parks, and requesting instructions. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to remove said canal boat to the Timber Basin.

3d. Recommending the removal of that part of the shed on Pier, old 34, North river, which is in a dangerous condition. Recommendation adopted, and the Engineer-in-Chief directed to examine and report whether it would be practicable to also remove that portion of the said pier which belongs to the City.

4th. Recommending the discharge of certain employees, whereupon the following Laborers were discharged:

Thomas Callahan, Dennis Gallagher, William B. Earle.  
John Handy, James Norton.

5th. Recommending that a new backing-log be placed at the foot of Sixteenth street, East river. Recommendation adopted.

6th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 10671, reporting the cost of finishing the work at Pier, new 29, North river. Referred to the President.

7th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 10802, respecting the repairs required to the upper side of Pier foot of West Eleventh street, North river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to repair.

8th. Report on Secretary's Orders Nos. 9597, 10105, 10417, 10628, 10704, 10723, 10764, 10784, 10791, 10799 and 10821, that he had fenced off the bulkhead north of Pier, old 34, North river; superintended piercing bulkhead at Pier 13, North river; repaired bulkhead between Piers 56 and 57, East river; superintended repairing ferry premises at Grand and Twenty-third streets, East river; repaired west end of pier under High Bridge, Harlem river; removed piles at bulkhead between Piers, new 34 and 35, North river; superintended repairing boat landing at south end of the Battery; repaired pavement of the approach to Pier 60, East river; superintended driving piles on the south side of Pier 6, North river, and repairing horizontal sheathing on the south side of Pier, new 27, North river.

The President reported that he had received for the Treasurer the following estimates for furnishing the Department with cement, spikes, bolts, etc., piles, creosoted timber and spruce plank:

Those entitled to exemption are: Clergymen, lawyers, physicians, surgeons, surgeon-dentists, professors or teachers in a college, academy or public school, editors, editorial writers or reporters of daily newspapers, licensed pharmacists or pharmacists, actually engaged in their respective professions and not following any other calling; militiamen, policemen, and firemen; election officers, jury non-residents, and city employees, and United States employees; officers of vessels making regular trips; licensed pilots, actually following that calling; superintendents, conductors and engineers of a railroad company other than a street railroad company; telegraph operators actually doing duty as such; Grand, Sheriff's, and Civil Court jurors; stationary engineers; and persons physically incapable of performing jury duty by reason of severe sickness, deafness, or other physical disorder.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only, under severe penalties. ## TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT Act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
