REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER, FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF JOHN NEWTON, COM-MISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

UNDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS 350, 351, 352 and 353, and as amended by chapter 559, Laws 1887, as follows :

UNDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS 350, 351, 352 and 353, and as amended by chapter 559, Laws 1887, as follows: "The commissioner of public works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now provided by law, and which shall be apportioned to different classes of buildings in said city in reference to their dimensions, values, exposure to fires, ordnary uses for dwellings, stores, shops, private stables and other common purposes, number of families or occupants, or modify, alter, amend and increase such scale from time to ime, and extend it to other descriptions of buildings and establishments. All extra charges for water shall be deemed to be included in the regular rents, and shall become a charge and lien upon the buildings upon which they are restectively imposed, and, if not paid, shall be returned as arrars to the clerk of arrars. Such regular rents, including the extra charges above mentioned, shall be collected from the owners or occu-pants of all such buildings respectively, which shall be situated upon lots adjoining any street or avenue in said city in which the distributing water-pipes are or may be laid, and from which they can be supplied with water. Said rents, including the extra charges and lots, respectively, as herein provided, but no charge what-ever shall be me de against any building in which a water-meter may have been, or shall be placed as pro-wided in this act. The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable the seless and un-warrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this ob-ject can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted. Under the law all charges for water supplied througn meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the water a lien against the respective premises, and subscription of the amount of water used or wated. Muther applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water oplumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occu-pants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have o, curred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.
