

The 643 deaths represent a death-rate of 20.33, against 21.23 for the previous week, and 19.86 for the corresponding week of 1889.

The decrease of 27 deaths was mainly due to a decrease of 9 in the deaths from diarrhoeal diseases, of 25 from phthisis, of 28 from diseases of the nervous system, of 11 from heart diseases, and of 28 from pneumonia, partly offset by an increase of 8 in the deaths from diphtheria, of 10 from bronchitis, of 12 from croup, and of 20 from diseases of the digestive organs.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Nineteenth and Twenty-third Wards.
