The minutes of the meeting held June 19, 1878, were read and approved.

By unanimous consent the rule adopted at meeting of June 23, 1874, relating to calls of meetings, was suspended in order to act upon the issue of Bonds of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York.

Whereupon the Comptroller presented the following communication:

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Chapter 473 of the Laws of 1877 provides “for the determination and payment of claims for goods, merchandise, and material furnished, and labor performed, in fitting up and furnishing armories and drill-rooms in the City of New York.”

The investigation of the said claims has been made by the Commission created by the act for their determination, and on June 27, 1878, awards were made thereon by the Commissioners, amounting to \$40,463.32, as follows:

For the payment of said awards the sixth section of the act provides as follows:

“Section 6. The comptroller of the city of New York is hereby directed to borrow upon bonds of the mayor, aldermen, and commonalty of the city of New York, bearing interest at the rate of not exceeding seven per cent. per annum, and payable at a period not to exceed three years from the date thereof, an amount not to exceed fifty thousand dollars, to be used exclusive of interest to make all the payments herein provided for.”

A resolution to authorize the issue of bonds for the amount of the awards, is herewith submitted for the action of the Board. Several claims yet remain undetermined, for which the awards will probably be made in a very short time, requiring the authority of the Board for a further issue of bonds, but not exceeding in all the amount authorized to be paid by the act.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

SIR—The following resolution was adopted by the Commissioners governing this Department, at a meeting held yesterday, viz.:

“Resolved, That application be and hereby is made to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to appropriate and raise by tax in the year 1878, twenty-five thousand (\$25,000) dollars, to be expended by the Department of Public Parks in improving and regulating the several public squares or places laid out and established within the lines of Fourth avenue, in the City of New York, between Sixty-seventh and Ninety-sixth streets in said city, as authorized by chapter 417 of the Laws of 1878.”

LAWS OF 1878.

CHAPTER 9.

AN ACT to legalize and confirm the official acts of John W. C. Leveridge, of the city of New York, a Notary Public.

Passed January 26, 1878; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. The official acts and proceedings of John W. C. Leveridge, of the city of New York, performed by him as notary public for the city and county of New York, since the thirtieth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven, are hereby made as legal and shall be held to be of the same force and validity, as if the term of office of the said John W. C. Leveridge, as such notary public, had not expired on the thirtieth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven.

Sec. 2. This act shall not affect any action or legal proceeding now pending.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

Ordered, That all persons in said shanties situated on the east side of Third avenue, south of One Hundred and Seventh street, be required to vacate said buildings on or before July 13, 1878, for the reason that said buildings are dangerous to life by reason of want of repair; and, further, that this order be affixed conspicuously on the front of said buildings and be served as the law requires, under the direction of the Sanitary Superintendent; and, further, that said buildings be not again used as human habitations.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending June 29, 1878:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,741, as follows, viz.: 6 public buildings, 729 tenement houses, 166 private dwellings, 62 other dwellings, 14 manufactories and workshops, 26 stores and warehouses, 36 stables, 39 slaughter-houses, 29 fat-rendering establishments, 1 fertilizing works, 1 lard-rendering establishment, 7 manure dumps, 3 garbage dumps, 1 public sewer, 1 lime kiln, 42 sunken and vacant lots, 1 soap factory, 2 glycerine works, 1 brewery, 1 oil works, 1 stock yard, 1 dumping ground, 1 park, 1 mill, 62 yards, courts, and areas, 70 cellars and basements, 116 waste pipes and drains, 187 privies and water closets, 26 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 2 dangerous stairways, 3 cesspools, 2 smoky chimneys, 5 piggeries, 17 other nuisances, together with 71 visits to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 600.
During the past week 209 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 92 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the port.

131 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.
The Disinfecting Corps have visited 38 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 38 houses, 38 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

During the week ending Saturday, June 29, 554 deaths were reported to have occurred in this city; this is an increase of 85 as compared with the preceding week, and 15 less than the number of deaths reported for the corresponding week of last year. The actual mortality for the week ending June 22, was 460, which is 10.2 below the average number of deaths for the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 22.9 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,082,987.

The increase of the deaths during the week was principally from diarrhoeal diseases, of children under five years of age, and in tenement-houses. The increase of deaths from diarrhoeal diseases, compared with preceding week was 53, of children under five years of age, 72; in tenement-houses, 50; of measles, 3; of scarlatina, 6; of croup, 4; of puerperal diseases, 5; of rheumatism and gout, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 1; diseases of the heart, 15; marasmus and scrofula, 1; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 1; diseases of the nervous system 16; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 8; cyanosis and atelectasis, 3; premature and pretermatural birth, 6; and of persons seventy years and over, 8; while diphtheria decreased, 1; whooping-cough, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; malarial fevers, 1; inanition, 2; alcoholism, 2; cancer, 11; bronchitis, 6; pneumonia, 1; aneurism, 1, and Bright's diseases and nephritis, 5.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 82 were in institutions, 309 in tenement houses, 152 in houses containing 3 families or less, 6 in hotels and boarding houses, 5 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 5 were on the basement floor, 111 were on the first floor, 160 on the second, 124 on the third, 53 on the fourth, 14 on the fifth; 1 on the sixth; 553 were stated to be resident of New York City, and 1 non-resident; 62 were stated to be single, 94 married, 51 widowed, and the condition of 347 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The disposition of 546 deaths and still-births, or 91 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 12; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 242; City (pauper burial-ground, undenominational), 68; Greenwood (undenominational), 31; Lutheran (undenominational), 92; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 15; Evergreen (undenominational), 29; Woodlawn (undenominational), 19; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 11; Union (Methodist Protestant), 3; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 10; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 4; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 4; Washington (undenominational), 6.

The distribution of deaths for the week ending June 22, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 9; Second, 0; Third, 6; Fourth, 14; Fifth, 6; Sixth, 9; Seventh, 18; Eighth, 22; Ninth, 14; Tenth, 18; Eleventh, 27; Twelfth, 30; Thirteenth, 14; Fourteenth, 13; Fifteenth, 7; Sixteenth, 15; Seventeenth, 29; Eighteenth, 24; Nineteenth, 64; Twentieth, 31; Twenty-first, 23; Twenty-second, 53; Twenty-third, 12; Twenty-fourth, 2.

The mean temperature for the week ending June 29, was 75.1 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.883, the mean humidity was 63, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 803, and the total amount of rain-fall was .19 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the N. Y. Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

5,529 births, 1,984 marriages, 514 still-births, and 6,308 deaths were reported to have occurred in this city during the three months ending June 30, 1878. Compared with the preceding three months the deaths show a decrease of 372, still-births 74, and births 1,151; while marriages increased 240. During the quarter small-pox caused 1 death, measles 110, scarlatina 278, diphtheria 250, membranous croup 121, whooping cough 80, cerebro-spinal fever 24, and malarial fevers 85. The number of deaths in tenement-houses from measles was 70, scarlatina 181, diphtheria 152, membranous croup 77, whooping cough 58, cerebro-spinal fever 14, and malarial fevers 38, showing that from the 8 diseases above specified there were 957 deaths; of this number 302 were in houses containing 3 families and less, 590 in tenement houses, 1 on a canal boat, 7 in hotels and boarding-houses, and 57 in institutions.
