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APPROVED PAPERS.

Ordinances, Resolutions, etc., approved by the Mayor during the week ending October 19, 1878.

AN ORDINANCE to provide the necessary means for the support of the government of the City of New York, the Board of Education, and for the payment of the quota of the State tax for the year eighteen hundred and seventy-eight.

The Board of Aldermen, as Supervisors of the County of New York, do ordain as follows:

Section 1. There shall be and hereby is imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation according to law, of and within the City and County of New York, to be raised, collected, and paid according to law, for the support of the city government and the Board of Education, and for the purpose of paying the quota of the State tax imposed upon the City and County of New York for the year eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, the sum of twenty-seven million five hundred and seventy-nine thousand and seventy-seven dollars and twelve cents, which is the amount certified by the Comptroller of the City of New York to the Board of Supervisors, in pursuance of the provisions of section 112 of chapter 335, Laws of 1873, as the sum to be raised and collected in the year eighteen hundred and seventy-eight by tax upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation within the City and County of New York, which will more fully appear by the communication from the Comptroller transmitting his certificate of the aggregate amount of the Final Estimate made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the year eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, of which said communication, certificate, and Final Estimate the following are copies:

To the Board of Supervisors of the County of New York:

In pursuance of the provisions of section 112 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, I herewith transmit to you the Comptroller's certificate of the aggregate amount of the Final Estimate made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 29th day of December, 1877, for the year eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, to wit: the sum of twenty-seven million five hundred and seventy-nine thousand and seventy-seven dollars and twelve cents; which amount, so estimated and certified as aforesaid, the Board of Supervisors of the County of New York is "empowered and directed to cause to be raised, according to law, and collected by tax upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, within the said City and County of New York."

### FINAL ESTIMATE FOR THE YEAR 1878.

Made pursuant to section 112 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, on December 29, 1877, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York.

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment have considered the objections to, and rectifications of, the Provisional Estimate made by said Board on the 31st day of October, 1877, of the amounts required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, in each Department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the next ensuing financial year, to wit, for the year eighteen hundred and seventy-eight (1878); in which estimate is included such sum as is necessary for the payment of the interest on the bonds of the said city and county, which become due and payable within said year, and also such sum as is necessary to pay the principal of any bonds and stocks which become due and payable from taxes during the said year; and also so much as may be necessary to pay the proportion of the State tax required to be paid by the City and County of New York, in said year, which objections to, and rectifications of, said Provisional Estimate made by the Board of Aldermen, were transmitted by the Clerk of said Board, under date of November 14, 1877, and presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 20th day of November, 1877; therefore

Resolved, That after such consideration of the said objections to, and rectifications of, said Provisional Estimate, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment does hereby make this a

#### FINAL ESTIMATE

of the amount required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, in each Department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the next ensuing financial year, viz., the year 1878, in which is included such sum as is necessary for the payment of the interest on the bonds of the said city and county, which become due and payable within said year, and also such sum as is necessary to pay the principal of any bonds and stocks which become due and payable from taxes during the said year, and also so much as may be necessary to pay the proportion of the State tax required to be paid by the City and County of New York, in said year, as follows:

In addition to the sum imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, according to law, of and within the City and County of New York, in and by the first section of this ordinance, there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation according to law, of and within the City and County of New York, and to be raised, collected, and paid according to law, the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars, being the amount of an additional appropriation for the year 1878 made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment pursuant to the provisions of chapter 417, Laws of 1878, as appears by the following certificate of the Comptroller of the City of New York:

COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, August 30, 1878.

To the Board of Supervisors of the County of New York:

Chapter 417 of the Laws of 1878 authorizes the Board of Estimate and Apportionment "to appropriate and raise by tax, in the year 1878, twenty-five thousand dollars, to be expended by the Department of Public Parks in improving and regulating the several public squares or places laid out and established within the lines of Fourth avenue, between Sixty-seventh and Ninety-sixth streets."

In accordance with the provisions of said act, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at a meeting held on July 12, 1878, adopted a resolution appropriating the sum of \$25,000, "for the



purpose of improving and regulating the public squares and places on Fourth avenue, between Sixty-seventh and Ninety-sixth streets, and directed that the said amount be added to and included in the Final Estimate for the year 1878, and authorized and directed the Comptroller to certify the said appropriation to the Board of Supervisors.

I therefore certify to your Honorable Board that, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 417 of the Laws of 1878, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has appropriated the sum of \$25,000 for the purposes named in said act, and that the aggregate amount of the Final Estimate for the year 1878, after adding and including the said appropriation, is twenty-seven million six hundred and four thousand and seventy-seven dollars and twelve cents (\$27,604,077.12).

Sec. 4. The assessment rolls of the real and personal estates of the City and County of New York for the year eighteen hundred and seventy-eight are hereby approved and confirmed, and the aggregate amount of the assessed valuations thereof is hereby fixed at the sum of one thousand and ninety-eight million three hundred and eighty-seven thousand seven hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$1,098,387,775), in accordance with the returns of the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments for the year 1878, as follows:

## DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

*Abstract of the Proceedings of the Department of Public Parks for the week ending Saturday, October 5, 1878.*

MEETING HELD OCTOBER 2, 1878.

Present—Commissioners Wenman (President), Wetmore, Conover, and Lane.

The following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That James F. Wenman, the President of, and who is also one of the members of the Board of Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, be and he is hereby designated and directed to certify and file, as provided by law, the three similar maps or plans entitled "Plan and Profiles showing Sedgwick avenue, from about 500 feet south of Fordham landing road to Bailey avenue, and Bailey avenue, from Sedgwick avenue to the Kingsbridge road, in the Twenty-fourth Ward of the City of New York, as laid out and altered, established, and classified by the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 604 of the Laws of 1874, and chapter 436 of the Laws of 1876," dated "New York, October 1, 1878," and signed "Julius Munckwitz, Superintending Architect, Department of Public Parks," and "E. Van Winkle, Topographical Engineer, Department of Public Parks."

Resolved, That it be referred to the Topographical Engineer to survey and report upon the size, elevation, and location for the bridge over the Bronx river, at Woodlawn station, and also that it be referred to the Engineer of Construction to report plans and specifications for the bridge, the abutments, and the approaches. That the Supervisors of Westchester County and the Trustees of Woodlawn Cemetery be invited to confer with the Department as to the location, plans, etc., of the bridge as above ordered. That the Committee on Bronx river bridges be requested to report an agreement with the said Supervisors and said Trustees for the construction of the work and the division of the expense thereof.

Resolved, That the penalties for the non-completion of the work of improving and constructing Riverside avenue, on or before the 31st October, 1877, the time stipulated in the contract, be and hereby be remitted up to the 1st day of October, 1878.

Resolved, That the lease of the three upper floors of No. 36 Union square, made by the New York Mutual Gas-light Company to the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty, by this Department, for eight months, from May 1, 1878, at the rent of \$2,500 per annum, be and hereby is approved, and that the President of the Department be and hereby is authorized to execute the same, in duplicate, for and on behalf of this Department.

Resolved, That Jerome avenue be watered each day during the coming race meeting at Jerome Park, from Central bridge to the entrance to said park, and that eight double teams be employed for that purpose.

Resolved, That one gas-lamp be lighted at the Farmers' Gate, Central Park, situate at Sixth avenue and One Hundred and Tenth street.

Resolved, That all the mowers employed on the parks be discharged from and after Saturday, October 5, 1878.

The Departmental estimates of the Department for the year 1879, of which the following is a summary, were transmitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen.

Accompanying said Departmental Estimates, the following communication was transmitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS,  
NEW YORK, October 2, 1878.

Hon. SMITH ELY, Jr., Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—I have the honor to transmit herewith the Departmental Estimate of the Department of Public Parks for the year 1879.

In connection therewith, I beg leave to submit a general statement in regard to the condition and requirements of the works with which this Department is specifically charged.

It is not unknown to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the present administration of this Department has been conducted in the interest of severe economy in expenditure, in accordance not only with the best judgment of the Commission, but made necessary as well by the limited amount placed at their disposal.

In furtherance of this economical management, it has been found necessary to reduce the administrative force of the Department to the minimum limit of efficiency, by the discharge of a large number of employees, resulting in a very great reduction in expenditures for salaries, these expenditures being still further diminished by a reduction in the amounts paid to those employees that were retained.

It must, however, be borne in mind that the supervision and responsibilities of this Department embrace a wide area of territory, and a very large amount of public property.

The embellishment of the metropolis by the improvement and adornment of its public parks, has been accomplished in accordance with a unanimous public sentiment, and has been a wise measure of public policy, both as regards the health of the population as well as their rational enjoyment; while it has seemed to render the city an object of attraction and resort for the people of the entire country, of which it is the commercial and financial centre.

These improvements have not been achieved without the expenditure of enormous sums of money; whether this expenditure has been at all times judicious or economical, it is not at this moment necessary to discuss; but one of the results has been the erection of a large number of artificial constructions, which being of perishable materials, and in some instances of imperfect design, are liable to and have undergone a considerable amount of dilapidation, necessitating renewal and repairs.

To allow these structures to fall into decay would be to surround ourselves with ruins, and to give to the entire city an air of decadence inconsistent with its general prosperity and private wealth.

Hence, it is absolutely essential that a sufficient sum should be appropriated for the maintenance of the works as constructed, or their entire removal.

Several of the bridges have been materially injured by the percolation of water, which, from being frozen in the winter season, has caused the displacement of the masonry to such an extent as to render their immediate repair an absolute necessity.

The architectural structure, known as The Terrace, the most costly one in the park, has become so much dilapidated that much of the stone work will have to be replaced, and other portions of it reset.

The present condition of these structures, as well as of the roads and walks in nearly all the public parks, is the result of circumstances preceding the present administration of this Department, and so far has the dilapidation and destruction progressed, for want of proper maintenance, that the matter of walks and roads has, in many instances, become a question of construction and not of maintenance, as a complete reconstruction is now a matter of necessity.

More especially is this the case with a large portion of the walks in the public ground surrounding the City Hall, Reservoir and Washington Squares, and East River Park; the maintenance of the drives in Central Park is a matter of the very first necessity, that cannot possibly be avoided. Two millions of vehicles pass over these roads annually, and together with the bridle paths, require a constant supply of gravel to keep them in a proper condition.

Much has been accomplished during the past year to remedy serious, and in some cases dangerous defects in the plan and construction of Central Park; the two most prominent evils that had to be met by the present administration were the malarious atmosphere engendered by the mal-arrangement of the several artificial bodies of water within the park, and the injudicious laying out of some of the drives.

The one producing a wide-spread malarious influence, resulting in much sickness; the other productive of numerous and sometimes fatal accidents.

Both of these defects have been happily and entirely removed by a proper arrangement of the water-flow, and by an artistic and skillful re-arrangement of roads and planting, by which blind curves have been avoided at the places where accidents were the most frequent.

Many other minor defects have been remedied, while many yet remain for want of adequate means to remove them.

While the appropriations asked for are confined entirely to the purpose of maintenance, it is proper that the fact should not be overlooked, that, notwithstanding the expenditure under previous administrations of this Department of over \$10,000,000 in works of construction, a very large area of the park remains in an utterly crude and unfinished condition, which gives to certain portions of the grounds, notwithstanding the utmost care bestowed upon their maintenance, an air of ruin and desolation.

In the present condition of affairs, it is not deemed proper to suggest any expenditures for purposes of construction in connection with these uncompleted portions of the park.

Another subject of importance to the proper administration of this Department, is that of the police force. The large increase of crime and violence in the neighborhood of the park, especially in and near the dark and sunken transverse roads, seems to demand an immediate increase of the Police Force for the protection of the public. Idleness, which is the parent of vice and crime, is unfortunately at the present time the condition of a very large class of the community, and it is not a matter of surprise that the large free domain in and around the Central Park should be the resort of evil disposed persons.

The peaceful enjoyment of the natural beauties of the Park, as well as the security of life within its limits, is of the first necessity, but with the present insufficient number of Patrolmen, this cannot be assured.

Public attention has become seriously aroused on this subject, and the Department feel that it cannot express itself too strongly in the matter.

In this connection it is proper to refer to the subject of lighting the Central Park. There is no doubt that the utter darkness in which the Park is shrouded at night is a very great temptation to crime, while it is at the same time a shield against its detection. Experiments are proposed for the purpose of determining the effect within the Park, and capacity for illumination, of the electric light, which has been recently brought to a high degree of perfection. If this light proves to be as adequate and as economical as is now claimed for it, the entire Park can be lighted for a comparatively small sum, and it is recommended that a sufficient amount be appropriated for conducting these experiments.

A separate estimate for the amounts required to repair the walks in and around the Central and other Parks and public places, is herewith submitted, in accordance with a resolution of the Board of Aldermen, approved by the Mayor.

The maintenance of the bridge over the Harlem river at McComb's Dam, in a proper state of repair, has been for years, and is still, a constant source of expense.

The inferior character of this structure, and the very perishable nature of the material of which it is composed, renders it almost impossible, even with a larger expenditure of money, to keep it in such a state of repair as insures its perfect safety.

Within a very short period it will become a matter of necessity to replace this bridge with a more substantial one, or by a tunnel under the bed of the river, which last will have the additional advantage of facilitating the navigation of the river, a question of no little moment, when it is considered that the general government, in pursuance of a wise liberality, is taking measures for the permanent improvement of this navigation.

It is earnestly hoped that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment will recognize the importance of the subjects which have thus been briefly brought to its notice in connection with the administration of this Department, and will deem it proper to make the full amount of appropriations asked, as they have been already reduced to the minimum demanded by the necessities of the Department.

If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines, received from those who, for business or other reasons, are unable to serve at the time selected, pay the expenses of this office, and if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
