

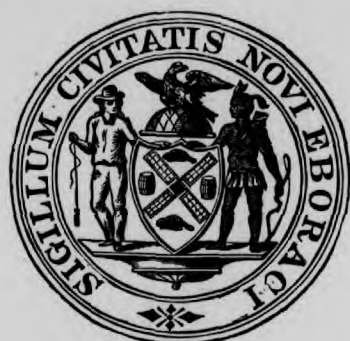

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending February 3, 1883:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,632, as follows: 4 public buildings, 809 tenement-houses, 137 private dwellings, 27 other dwellings, 7 manufactories and work shops, 16 stores and warehouses, 29 stables, 55 slaughter-houses, 1 lodging-house, 2 public sewers, 2 sunken and vacant lots, 72 yards, courts and areas, 96 cellars and basements, 199 waste pipes and drains, 124 privies and water-closets, 36 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 11 dangerous stairways, 3 smoky chimneys, 1 cesspool, and 11 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 433.

During the past week 146 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

47 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

38 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 73 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 73 houses, 73 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

2 cases of contagious disease were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending February 10, 1883:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,387, as follows: 1 public building, 754 tenement-houses, 68 private dwellings, 46 other dwellings, 6 manufactories and workshops, 15 stores and warehouses, 24 stables, 55 slaughter-houses, 2 lodging-houses, 1 asylum, 1 soap factory, 20 sunken and vacant lots, 30 yards, courts and areas, 52 cellars and basements, 174 waste-pipes and drains, 87 privies and water-closets, 23 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 14 dangerous stairways, 3 smoky chimneys, 4 cesspools, and 7 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 385.

During the past week 140 complaints have been received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

40 permits were granted consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

49 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.

The disinfecting corps have visited 89 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 86 houses, 86 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

6 cases of contagious disease were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 577 births, 261 marriages and 589 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, February 3, 1883. This shows an increase of 29 births, and 38 marriages, or a decrease of 7 still-births, and 47 deaths when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1882, there was an increase of 42 births, 9 still-births, and 45 marriages, and a decrease of 208 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 2; scarlatina 4; diphtheria, 4; erysipelas, 2; cerebro spinal fever, 4; alcoholism, 2; rheumatism and gout, 2; cancer, 3; phthisis pulmonalis, 24; heart diseases, 8; aneurism, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 5; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 4; enteritis, gastritis and peritonitis, 12; Bright's disease and nephritis, 2; cyanosis and atelectasis, 6; premature and pretermatural births, 6; suicide, 2; while the deaths from croup increased 1, 6; whooping cough, 7; typhoid fever, 1; diarrhoeal diseases, 5; inanition, 1; bronchitis, 9; pneumonia, 13; meningitis and encephalitis, 5; convulsions, 1; apoplexy, 4; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 8; surgical operations, 1. The number of deaths from malarial fevers, puerperal diseases, and hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 122 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year, 177 under two years, 233 under five years, and 48 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was 18 more than the number reported during the preceding week, and represent 39.56 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

NEW YORK, February 24, 1883.

At a conference between the Mayor and the heads of several departments of the City of New York, this day held at the Mayor's office, there were present the following gentlemen: Franklin Edson, Mayor; Allan Campbell, Comptroller; Hubert O. Thompson, Commissioner of Public Works; John J. Gorman, President of the Fire Department; Stephen B. French, President of the Police Department; Joel W. Mason, Commissioner of the Police Department; William Laimbeer, President of the Dock Department; Henry H. Porter, Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities and Correction; John D. Crimmins, Commissioner of the Park Department; James S. Coleman, Commissioner of the Street Cleaning Department; George P. Andrews, Counsel to the Corporation.

After discussion, the following resolutions were unanimously adopted:

"Resolved, That the consideration, by this conference, of Senate Bill No. 176, 'to provide for the construction, regulation, survey, and inspection of buildings in the City of New York, etc.,' be postponed for one week, with the understanding that the Counsel to the Corporation shall examine the bill in relation to its legal aspect."

"Resolved, That in the opinion of this conference, Assembly Bill No. 40, 'to enable the cities and towns of this State to refund money expended in furnishing substitutes, etc., by men drafted into the military service of the United States,' is an objectionable bill, and should not become a law."

"Resolved, That in the opinion of this conference, Assembly Bill No. 207, 'to prohibit the further use of Pier No. 12, East river, in the City of New York, by the Street Cleaning Department, as a dumping dock,' is an objectionable bill, and should not become a law, for the reason that this is entirely a local matter, and can be attended to by the local authorities without special legislation."

"Resolved, That in the opinion of this conference, Assembly Bill No. 134, 'to provide for a new station-house for the Twenty-eighth Precinct,' is an objectionable bill, and should not become a law, for the reason that the local authorities have ample power in the matter."

"Resolved, That in the opinion of this conference, Senate Bill No. 155, 'to reappropriate money for the erection of an armory in the City of New York,' is a commendable bill, and it is desirable that the same should become a law."

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
