DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At meetings of the Board of Docks, held November 3, 1875 (present—all the Commissioners, except at meeting for opening proposals for 5,000 barrels of cement, when Commissioner Dimock was absent), the following action was had:

Applications for Leases, etc.

November 3.—S. W. Bowne informed that the Department declines to entertain any claim for damages sustained under lease for the southerly half of Pier 51, North river, consequent upon said premises having been taken possession of by the Department, under written notice served on or about October 9, 1873.

November 3.—Edwin M. Brown notified that the Department will accept the surrender by him of Piers at foot of Fifth and Twenty-eighth streets, and Nos. 46 and 60 and upper half of Pier 62, East river, and relieve him from all liability for rent thereof, if terms and conditions are complied with.

November 3.—Action of the Commissioners in accepting the offer of C. L. Wright & Co., to pay \$60.00 per day for the use and occupancy during the pleasure of the Board, of New Pier 46, North river, and in setting apart said pier for the special kind of business engaged in by Trans-Atlantic Steamships, from and after November 1, 1875. Approved.

November 3.—Action of the Commissioners in declining the offer of Austin Baldwin & Co., to pay \$55 per day for the use and occupancy of New Pier 46, North river, during the pleasure of the Board. Approved.

November 3.—Resolution adopted May 11, 1875, fixing the annual rent to be paid by the New Haven Steamboat Company for the continued occupancy of Pier 25, East river, and half of the bulkhead between Piers 24 and 25, at \$7,000; amended, by making said rent \$5,500 per annum.

November 3.—Consent of the Department given to the substitution of Mr. Broadway as surety on lease to the Oceanic Steam Navigation Company in place of John E. Walsh.

November 3.—Action of the Commissioners in granting permission to Thomas Patten and E. D. Brown to erect a pile platform in front of the bulkhead foot of Forty-sixth street, East river, and also a similar platform extending eastwardly from the dock at foot of said street, to remain during the pleasure of the Board, provided terms and rent of \$50 per annum for use of the land under water, to be covered by said structures, are agreed to. Approved.

Repairs Ordered, etc.

November 3.—Engineer-in-Chief directed to cause the gas-pipe supplying new Pier 43, North river, to be repaired, and the inclosed pile boxes on said pier to be opened.

Dredging Ordered, etc.

November 3.—Action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to cause the necessary dredging to be performed in the slip at Twenty-third street, East river, to accommodate the school ship. Approved.

Contracts.

November 3.—Contract for furnishing the Department with 5,000 barrels of fresh burnt English or Boulogne Portland cement, awarded to Francis Spies & Co., of No. 66 south street. Sureties—Frederick and W. Anderson Waydell.

November 3.—Secretary directed to prepare blank forms of proposals for making repairs to Pier 8, East river, the contract to be entered into jointly with the parties owning one-half of said pier, and to cause the necessary advertisement for receiving said proposals to be inserted in the papers designated by law.

November 3.—Engineer-in-Chief directed to purchase from Handren & Ripley, for tug "Manhattan," an eight-inch right angle screw, Kingston valve, for the sum of \$210.

November 3.—Secretary directed to transmit to the Board of Aldermen, in compliance with resolution adopted by said Board, a copy of the report of the Engineer-in-Chief, on systems proposed for lighting piers, and a list of all piers which are now lighted, and of piers owned by the Corporation, showing those which are leased, and the date of expiration of such leases.

November 3.—Report of the operations and actions of the Department for the three months ending September 30, 1875, accepted and adopted, and Secretary directed to transmit the same to his Honor the Mayor.

November 3.—Action of the President in directing the General Trans-Atlantic Co. to remove the balance of the shed now remaining on Pier 50, North river, on or before November 8, or the same will be removed by this Department and used for its own purposes. Approved.

November 3.—Sixteen communications and five reports were received, and three communications were taken from the table, of which eighteen were placed on file no further action thereon being deemed necessary, and six were laid on the table for consideration and report.
