Resolved, That in view of the continued and unusual prevalence of small-pox and diphtheria within the City limits, and the necessity of employing additional vaccinators for temporary service and of experts for the investigation of diphtheria and contagious skin diseases, that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby respectfully requested to transfer to the appropriation for health purposes for the current year, the sum of \$5,500 for this work from the unexpended balance for 1874.

SIR—I have the honor to call your attention to the fact that the amount required to pay the clerks and attendants in my office for the month of December, 1874, as appears by the pay-roll, is \$4,570.80. I am informed by the Comptroller that there remains only a balance of \$1,401.02 to the credit of this appropriation, leaving a deficiency of \$3,169.78. I would respectfully request that your Honorable Board, at its next meeting, cause the sum of \$2,250.02 to be taken from the \$3,000, originally appropriated for the payment of the Attorney to the Department of Buildings, but which still remains unexpended (that gentleman having been paid out of the Contingent Fund), and made applicable to the payment of the clerks and attendants in my Department. And I also request that you will cause the further sum of \$919.76 to be transferred from the appropriation for "Contingencies—Corporation Attorney's Office," to the appropriation, "Salaries—Law Department."

PROPOSALS FOR FURNISHING FRESH BURNT ENGLISH PORTLAND CEMENT.

SEALED PROPOSALS FOR FURNISHING THIS material, indorsed as above, and addressed to "Jacob A. Westervelt, President of the Department of Docks," will be received at this office until 11 o'clock A. M., of Monday, February 1, 1875, at which time the bids will be publicly opened and read.

The award of the contract will be made as soon as practicable after the opening of the bids.

Any bidder for this contract must be well prepared for the business, and shall give security for the faithful performance of his contract, in the manner prescribed and required by ordinance.

The Cement required under the contract must be Fresh Burnt English Portland Cement, and fully up to the standard of the best brands imported, and average at least 400 pounds gross weight to the barrel. No cement will be received that shall have been ground or burnt for a longer period than one month prior to the date of the sailing of the vessel on which it is shipped, and the manufacturer's certificate of date of manufacture will be required with each delivery, and said date must be marked on each barrel with a stencil plate.

The quantity to be delivered under the contract is 5,000 barrels, of which at least one-half will be required to be delivered to the Department within 60 days after the date of signing the contract, the delivery to commence within 30 days after said date; and the time allowed for the fulfillment of the contract will be three months from the date of its execution, and a penalty of fifty dollars per day, as liquidated damages, will be exacted for each day the contract may be unfulfilled after the said time has expired, Sundays and holidays only to be excepted.

Bidders will state in their proposals the price for each barrel of cement, by which the bids will be tested. The price is to cover all expenses necessary for the complete fulfillment of the contract.
