The President announced that the opening of bids for supplying ballots for the general election of 1902 was in order.

Mr. John H. Andrews appeared as representing the Comptroller of The City of New York.

The Chief Clerk submitted an affidavit of Henry McMiller, Deputy Supervisor of the City Record, certifying that the advertisement inviting proposals for supplying the ballots required for the general election of the year 1902 had been regularly published in the "City Record" ten days consecutively, commencing September 27, 1902. Filed.

The box containing bids was then opened by the President, and was found to contain the following, viz: A bid for furnishing the ballots required for the general election of 1902, from Messrs. J. J. Little & Company, of Nos. 2 to 20 Astor place for the sum of \$30,171, accompanied by a check signed by J. J. Little & Co., by Joseph J. Little, President, drawn for \$1,000 on the Astor Place Bank, to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and a bid from the Martin B. Brown Company, of No. 49 Park place, for the sum of \$28,995, accompanied by a check for \$1,000, drawn on the New Amsterdam National Bank by the Martin B. Brown Company, to the order of G. Radford Kelso, and by him indorsed to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York. Said proposals appearing to be in due form the Board.

Resolved, That the contract for supplying the Board of Elections of The City of New York with official and sample ballots for election purposes for the year 1902, as per proposals advertised for and this day publicly opened, be and hereby is awarded to the Martin B. Brown Company, of No. 49 Park place, City of New York, they being the lowest bidder, for the sum and price of \$28,995, and that the President be and hereby is authorized to execute such contract for and in behalf of the Board of Elections of The City of New York, on the approval of sureties by the Comptroller.

Resolved, That the Chief Clerk of the Board be and hereby is directed to forthwith transmit for approval to the Comptroller the proposal, with the tender of sureties received from the Martin B. Brown Company; also (for disposal in accordance with law) the security deposits received from the bidders for said contract.

Mr. J. E. Hardenberg appeared, stating that he represented the New York City News Association, who were desirous of ascertaining what measures the Board of Elections would take to afford the newspapers opportunity to obtain the official returns from the coming election as early as possible. The President and the Commissioners present assured Mr. Hardenberg that all would be done if possible to give the newspapers the returns desired.

The hearing in the matter of the charges preferred by Franklin H. Miller against two Republican Inspectors of Election, which was adjourned to this day for the production of further evidence, was taken up, but no further witnesses appearing, the parties in interest submitted their case, and the hearing was declared closed.

A hearing was then had in the matter of charges preferred by Frederick A. Ware against Edward S. Flow, Inspector of Election and Chairman of the Board of Election Inspectors, at the recent primary election, in the Fifth Primary District of the Twenty-fifth Assembly District, Borough of Manhattan. The accused and the accuser were present, with witnesses; their testimony was taken, and the case on both sides having been submitted, the hearing was declared closed.

From William Ricilian, dated October 13, 1902, complaining of the conduct of the Chairman of the Board of Inspectors of the Thirteenth Election District of the Third Assembly District, Borough of Manhattan, toward him on October 10 last. Ordered that the Chief Clerk of said borough office summon said chairman to attend before the Board of Elections on the 15th instant at 12 o'clock m. Filed.

From Ernest F. Distler and other signers, a protest, dated October 13, 1902, against the place designated by the Board of Elections for the purposes of registration in the Twenty-second Election District of the Twenty-first Assembly District, Borough of Brooklyn, as being so inconveniently located that voters hesitate and do not enter it to register, and the registration therein of October 10 and 11 this year had fallen off over one-half. Referred to Commissioner Maguire to investigate and report.

From Charles F. Reilly, dated October 13, 1902, asking for information as to his right to vote from No. 202 West One Hundred and Forty-third street, Borough of Manhattan, which place he had hired on the 3d instant, but did not actually move there until the 7th instant. Referred to the Chief Clerk to answer negatively.

From John J. Murtha, Sergeant in command Sixth Police Precinct, dated October 10, 1902, stating that on the 10th instant Patrick A. Kirman, of No. 9 Chatham square, was arrested without a warrant by Patrolman Lawrence J. McMahon of his command, on the complaint of a Deputy of State Superintendent of Elections John McCallagh, was arraigned before City Magistrate Peter Barlow, and was discharged. Filed.

From Wm. H. Kipp, Chief Clerk, Police Department, giving account of proceedings directed, on said date, by the Police Commissioner, to be taken for the collection and tabulation of election returns at Police Headquarters on election night. Filed.

The Board, on motion, authorized the President to communicate with the Police Department that the general office of the Board will be open on the night of election for the reception of the statements called for by section 110, subdivision 3, of the Election Law. A written request on the part of the Librarian of the American Geographical Society, dated October 10, 1902, was received for a full set of maps of this City to add to their collection. Granted and filed.

W. H. Irving, of the Columbia League Club, sent a written complaint, under date of October 14, 1902, to the effect that the Board of Inspectors of Election of the Fortieth Election District, Twenty-fourth Assembly District, Borough of Manhattan, permitted an unqualified person to assume some of the duties of said election officers. The Chief Clerk of said branch office was directed to notify said Board to appear before the Board of Elections on Wednesday, the 15th inst., at 12:30 o'clock p. m.

From Bernard Bacher, Chairman, and P. J. Gibbons and Harrie A. Stevens, all Inspectors of Election of the Thirtieth Election District of the Twenty-first Assembly District, Borough of Manhattan, certifying that Inspector John Flohr of said Board had been permitted by them to absent himself a few hours on the 11th instant, to enable him to register in a distant polling place, and that said Board had agreed to fill his position until his return, etc. The Chief Clerk in said borough office was directed to explain to said Flohr the cause of his removal from office, which was done. Filed.

A final order of the Hon. Harrison S. Moore, County Judge of Queens County, in the matter of the application of John W. Demarest, to review the action of the Board of Primary Election Inspectors of the Twenty-seventh Election District of the Second Assembly District, County of Queens, was received, and having been duly complied with was filed.

In the matter of objections filed October 13 by John J. McGinniss et al. against the certificate of independent nomination filed on October 10 by Elmer S. White, under the name of the "Fifth Congressional District Liberty Party," under the device or emblem of a Liberty Bell, the hearing was set down for Thursday, the 16th instant, at 12 o'clock noon.

The Board adjourned to Wednesday, October 15, 1902, at 12 o'clock noon.

#### BOARD OF ELECTIONS.

Meeting of the Board of Elections held Wednesday, October 15, 1902, at 12 o'clock noon.

Present—Commissioners Voorhis, Page, Maguire and Dady.

The minutes of the meetings of the Board of Elections on September 25 and 29, and October 2, 1902, were severally read and approved.

In the matter of the charges preferred by the Executive Committee of the Republican County Committee, County of New York, against Thomas J. Organ and Frank Moore, Inspectors of Election in the Ninth Election District, and William McCarthy and Jeremiah J. Coffey, Inspectors of Election in the Tenth Election District, of the Second Assembly District of the Borough of Manhattan, the President announced that the Board of Elections was ready to hear testimony in relation thereto.

The complainants were represented by Charles Comiskey, City Marshal; the accused by Ely Rosenberg, Counsellor at Law. Thomas J. Organ, William McCarthy and Jeremiah J. Coffey were present in person. Frank Moore, the other Inspectors of Election of the Twentieth Election District of the Thirty-first Assembly

The President read to the accused the pending complaint. The accused plead not guilty.

Charles W. Brunett, Police Officer attached to the Ninth Police Precinct, and David Freedman, gave testimony on the part of the complainants. Jeremiah J. Coffey, Thos. J. Organ, Wm. McCarthy and Joseph J. Ehrenstoft testified on the part of the defense.

The hearing was then declared closed, the Board of Elections took the matter under advisement and suspended action thereon.

In the matter of the complaint made by Morris Levy against the Board of Inspectors of Election of the Twentieth Election District of the Thirty-first Assembly District, Borough of Manhattan, a hearing was given to the accuser and accused (all present), witnesses were heard, the case was declared closed and the Board reserved its decision.

A hearing was had by the Board in the matter of the complaint made by W. H. Irving against the Board of Inspectors of Election of the Fortieth Election District of the Twenty-first Assembly District, Borough of Manhattan. The Board of Elections thereupon unanimously decided that a reprimand and caution from the President would be proper in the case, which was accordingly administered by the President.

In the matter of the complaint made by Wm. Ricilian against August "Molter" (August Bittel), Chairman of the Thirteenth Election District of the Third Assembly District, Borough of Manhattan, for putting him to unnecessary trouble, each year, to produce his naturalization papers at the polls, etc., the Inspector of Election appeared and disclaimed any intention to obstruct the complainant in his exercise of his rights as an elector; the complainant was not present, and the President of the Board, as

authorized by the Board of Elections, cautioned said Bittel not to unnecessarily interfere with citizens when they appeared at the polls to register or vote.

A notification was received from Wm. Hepburn Russell, attested by Myer J. Stein (Executive Committee, Greater New York Democracy), to the effect that petitions and certificates are to be presented for filing on the part of said party, and that the only persons entitled to file nominating certificates under the name and emblem of said party are the Chairman and Secretary of said Executive Committee. Said notification was duly sworn to by said Russell and said Stein. Filed.

The Board then adjourned to Thursday, the 16th inst., at 12 o'clock noon.


