COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY, COUNTY AND BOROUGH OFFICERS.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Police Commissioner:

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen:

Sirs—The following proceedings were this day directed by the Police Commissioner:

Whereas, The premises now occupied by the Police Department in Old slip as a station house for the First Police Precinct are inadequate for such purpose, and it is the intention of the Police Commissioner to have the building thereon taken down and a new building erected for such purpose, and it is necessary to rent premises for the occupation of the Police Department as a station house for the First Precinct during the erection of such new building, and application having been made to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to authorize the Comptroller to execute a lease of the building No. 98 John street, running through to No. 17 Platt street, for two years from May 1, 1907, at the rate of \$6,000 per annum, for such purpose,

Ordered, That the Board of Aldermen be and are hereby respectfully requested to authorize the issue of Special Revenue Bonds in the sum of \$12,000, to enable the Police Commissioner to pay the rent of premises No. 98 John street, running through to No. 17 Platt street, for two years from May 1, 1907, at the rate of \$6,000 per annum, to be used by the Police Department temporarily as a station house for the First Police Precinct during the construction of the new building in Old slip.

Ordered, That whenever the Board of Aldermen shall have authorized the issue of Special Revenue Bonds in the sum of \$12,000 for the purposes therein stated, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby respectfully requested to concur therein.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting ordinances:

Hon. PATRICK F. McGOWAN, President, Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—I send you herewith certified copy of resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment March 1, 1907, authorizing an issue of \$750,000 Corporate Stock to provide means for the improvement of the water supply system in the Borough of Brooklyn, together with copy of report of the Comptroller (to whom on February 1, 1907, was referred the request of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for an appropriation of \$1,000,000 for removing and relaying water mains in the Greenpoint and Williamsburg sections of Brooklyn for emergency station and for wells) recommending an authorization of \$750,000 Corporate Stock as above set forth.

I also inclose form of ordinance for adoption by the Board of Aldermen to indicate its concurrence therein.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

Sir—Hon. John H. O'Brien, Commissioner, Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, in communication under date of January 25, 1907, requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize an appropriation of \$1,000,000 for the improvement of the water supply, the money to be expended as follows:

For removing and relaying water mains in the Greenpoint and Williamsburg sections	\$750,000 00
For emergency stations	160,000 00
For wells	90,000 00

I beg to report as follows:

Regarding the first item of removing and relaying water mains, I am informed that the majority of the old mains in the above mentioned sections are 6 inches in diameter, were laid sixty years ago and being at present badly tuberculated and therefore practically worthless, no argument is needed to show the necessity for their replacement.

The average size of the mains to be substituted for these old 6-inch mains is 16 inches, and the locations chosen are such as to form trunk lines for intersecting streets which will later be relaid with larger mains.

The mileage contemplated under this improvement is about 23½ miles of new mains, not including hydrant connections.

Under an agreement with the Board of Fire Underwriters the present insurance rates throughout the district affected by the laying of these new mains are to be reduced about twenty (20) per cent. on the completion of this work.

Anticipating the granting of this request, the Department of Water Supply has advertised and received bids on February 6, 1907, for work amounting to about one-third of the amount requested (the lowest bid being about \$225,000), and as the City is to furnish the hydrants, this item will add about \$10,000, and to this must also be added about \$12,000 more for engineering and inspection expenses, or \$247,000 total cost of this contract.

The other plan, which is now being drawn, will require about \$440,000 to complete. This will make a total amount of \$687,000 for the two contemplated plans, or, with an allowance of \$13,000 for contingencies, a total of \$700,000.

It is the purpose of the Chief Engineer to reserve \$50,000 for replacing mains in intersecting streets, which, during the progress of laying the main lines, may be found to be so badly tuberculated as to be practically worthless.

From all the data that I have been able to obtain, it appears that the estimate of \$700,000 for this item will be eventually required, but I hardly think the Department can expend this amount within the current year; \$500,000, in my opinion, will be sufficient to provide for contracts in the year 1907.

Regarding the second item of \$160,000 for emergency stations, this amount is intended to cover the installation of five emergency stations along the line of the new 72-inch steel pipe line now being constructed, together with the contemplated extension to Milburn.

These stations are to be placed between those already established on this line from Spring Creek to Rockville Centre, the construction to be of reinforced concrete, the equipment to consist of internal combustion engines, using unrefined oil for fuel and driving turbine pumps, each pump being designed to deliver water into the pipe line at the rate of from 3,000,000 to 4,000,000 gallons per twenty-four hours, under a head of about two hundred (200) feet.

It is believed that this type of engine will be more economical in both installation and operation than steam, owing to the elimination of boiler, steam fitting, smoke stack and two-thirds of the engineering force usually required, and also more economical building construction, due to smaller floor space required.

The estimated cost of each station with this equipment, exclusive of wells, is about \$32,000, and the establishment of five stations will insure the introduction of about 15,000,000 gallons each twenty-four (24) hours directly into the distribution system without the intervention of the pumps at Ridgewood Pumping Station, which are at present worked to the limit of their capacity.

The proposed construction of these stations is a continuation of the policy of establishing pumping plants, temporary in character, along the lines of the conduit in Queens and Nassau Counties, which are to be maintained until the permanent system of infiltration galleries will be constructed, when these temporary plants will be discontinued, and the water, collected from a line of from two to three miles in length, will be pumped at one point, permitting the substitution of one large plant of high efficiency for several small plants, the operation of which has heretofore been expensive in proportion to the amount of work performed.

While I am adverse to recommending anything of a temporary character, but in view of the earnest request of the Acting Chief Engineer of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Borough of Brooklyn, that something must be done and at once, I would suggest that these temporary pumping stations be allowed.

Regarding the third item of \$90,000 for wells, this will provide for about twenty (20) wells at each station, with a minimum yield of 150,000 gallons per twenty-four (24) hours for each well, and to cost about \$750 each, or \$15,000 per station. The suction main complete with gates, etc., will amount to about \$3,000 per station, making the total cost of wells and suction main at each station \$18,000, or \$90,000 for the five stations.

I would therefore suggest, if the financial condition of the City warrants the expenditure, that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of section 178 of the Greater New York Charter, authorize the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of \$750,000 to provide means for the improvement of the water supply system of the City of New York, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$750,000) to provide means for the improvement of the water supply system in the Borough of Brooklyn, as set forth in section 178 of the Charter.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment March 1,

1907, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

Sir—At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held February 15, 1907, a communication was presented from the Secretary of the Board of Health transmitting copy of preambles and resolution of said Board, recommending the acquisition of property for departmental purposes located on One Hundred and Thirty-second and One Hundred and Thirty-third streets, near Willow avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, stating that said property had been offered for sale at the sum of \$25,000, and requesting an issue of Corporate Stock in that amount for the purchase of the same, which was referred to the Comptroller for consideration and report.

Gentlemen—Allow me to call your attention to the future need of another bridge across the East river.

The Manhattan Bridge will be finished in about three years. Tunnels will be built in the meantime. These tunnels will accommodate through traffic. The Manhattan Bridge will care for the surface traffic for a few years, but it is reasonable to suppose that within five years after the Manhattan Bridge is opened another era of congestion will occur if no relief is provided. This is especially so, because the use of motors has introduced, and is advancing, a new system of transportation that cannot be taken care of in tunnels, and which may supersede, to a large extent, the present system of transportation.

I do not ask your Board now to approve the construction of a new East river bridge. I request you to authorize an issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$25,000 for the preparation of plans for a new bridge, and with that I expect to have made a thorough study of the trans-borough transportation question by experts, and to have plans for a new bridge prepared.

Sir—Under date of January 24, 1907, the Hon. John F. Ahearn, President of the Borough of Manhattan, asks the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for an appropriation of \$12,000 for the purpose of installing a vacuum cleaning system in the Criminal Courts Building, Centre and Franklin streets, Borough of Manhattan.

I have looked into the matter with some care, I have inspected the premises and have examined the specifications submitted.

I quite approve of this method of cleaning public buildings, and think its installation in a building used to the extent that the Criminal Courts Building is used, both wise and proper.

The specifications as submitted are open to several criticisms. They should be modified so as to allow full competition in the bidding, and the vacuum pump to be installed should be a direct acting pump rather than an electric drain pump.

The steam plant now installed in the building is of sufficient capacity to furnish steam for such a pump, while the electric equipment is already fully loaded.

The estimate seems to be ample for the purpose indicated with a safe margin.

I therefore recommend that, pursuant to section 47 of the Greater New York Charter as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may properly authorize the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of \$12,000 for the purpose of providing funds for the installation of a vacuum cleaning system in the Criminal Courts Building, Centre and Franklin streets, Borough of Manhattan.

Hon. P. F. McGOWAN, President of the Board of Aldermen, City Hall, Manhattan:

Dear Sir—In the contract for furnishing, delivering and constructing suction mains and appurtenances for salt water, to be connected with the high pressure fire service station at northeast corner of Gansevoort and West streets, the Engineer provided in his estimate that 1,000 feet of lumber (B. M.) would be used by the contractor in the excavations extending from the station to the river. This estimate was made after several test pits had been sunk to ascertain the character of the soil. Entirely different conditions have been found than were ascertained by this examination. Large amounts of saturated quicksand have been met with, constituting a semi-fluid material, easily running; also some filling-in west of the New York Central Company's tracks, with crib work and rock, through which the tide water and quicksand find a ready passage.

Under the terms of the contract all sheathing is to be removed, unless ordered to be left in place by the Engineer, and no allowance is to be made for said sheathing unless so left in place by the Engineer's orders.

The contractors have called attention to the character of the soil, as far as their work has advanced, and the Chief Engineer of this Department is satisfied that to remove any of the timber would produce a settlement of the street, which would probably result in considerable damage to adjoining property, and possibly to the Gansevoort Market, which, so far as the official records of the City show, is not built on piles.

The contractor's bid on the 1,000 feet of lumber furnished by the Engineer's estimate was \$75. The amount of lumber required for sheathing, bracing, etc., for the entire trench is 250,000 feet. The bid price of \$75 per 1,000 is considered high when this additional amount of lumber is taken into consideration, and the contractors, the Continental Asphalt Paving Company, have agreed to accept \$50 per 1,000 (B. M.).

The contract in question contains the usual provision that the Commissioner may increase any one item 5 per cent. in excess of the amount originally stated in the estimate. The amount of lumber figured on is so small that 5 per cent. reduces the actual amount of increase which I could order to \$3.75.

I deem it advisable for the proper protection of the work, in view of the character of the soil which has been found, to order the contractor to leave the sheathing, bracing, etc., in place wherever these dangerous conditions exist, the total amount of lumber not to exceed 250,000 feet and the price to be paid for same \$50 per 1,000 (B. M.).

It therefore becomes necessary to obtain authority through your Board to increase this contract to allow of the purchase of 250,000 feet of lumber at \$50 per 1,000 (B. M.), and under this authority I respectfully ask that the attached resolution, drawn in compliance with section 39 of the revised Greater New York Charter, be adopted.

Dear Sir—You have probably learned from the public prints that Public School 86, located at Lexington avenue and Ninety-sixth street, Borough of Manhattan, was seriously damaged by fire yesterday, and in consequence some 2,500 children are temporarily without school accommodations.

The matter of immediate repairs to the building was considered by our Committee on Buildings at its meeting yesterday, and it was found that if the work could be started immediately an expenditure of \$5,000 would put the building, with the exception of the fourth story, in shape for reoccupancy inside of two weeks. In order to commence the work and incur the expenditure of the amount above named at once, it will be necessary for the Board of Education to be authorized by the Board of Aldermen, in pursuance of the provisions of section 419 of the revised Charter, to order the work done without public advertisement and the letting of contracts.

On account of your familiarity with the methods of doing public work, you are well aware that if specifications have to be written, a contract prepared and bids advertised for in the regular way, it would be several weeks before the work could be performed. The Committee on Buildings accordingly adopted a preamble and resolution requesting the necessary authority from the Board of Aldermen, and a certified copy of the same is handed you herewith.

I urgently request that you will use your very best efforts to secure action by the Board of Aldermen at its meeting to be held to-day.

Whereas, The building of Public School 86, located at Lexington avenue and Ninety-sixth street, Borough of Manhattan, was damaged by fire on March 4, 1907, thus depriving 2,500 children of school accommodations temporarily; and

Whereas, The Board of Education states that by the immediate expenditure of \$5,000, temporary repairs can be made so that the building may be reoccupied within two weeks; therefore be it

Resolved, That, in accordance with the provisions of section 419 of the revised Charter, the Board of Education be and it hereby is authorized to expend a sum not exceeding \$5,000 for necessary repairs to the building of Public School 86, Borough of Manhattan, without public advertisement and without entering into contracts therefor.

Whereas, On March 4, 1907, a fire occurred at Public School 86, Manhattan, and damaged the structure to such an extent that occupancy for the time being will be impossible; and

Whereas, About twenty-five hundred pupils will, in consequence, be deprived of school facilities, as, on account of the congested conditions prevailing in the schools in the vicinity, these pupils cannot be accommodated therein; and

Whereas, By putting in a temporary roof and making sundry repairs it will be possible to fit up the first, second and third floors for temporary occupancy, and provide all of the pupils with school accommodations by forming part time classes, pending the permanent renovation of the building; and

Whereas, These repairs can be made in about two weeks, and the school reopened, provided the work is commenced immediately, and the delay incident to advertising for proposals and entering into formal contracts avoided; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen be and it is hereby urgently requested, in accordance with the provisions of section 419 of the revised Charter, to authorize the Board of Education to expend a sum not to exceed \$5,000 for alterations, repairs, etc., at Public School 86, Manhattan, without public advertisement or the letting of contracts; and be it further

The estimated cost is \$3,500. A great saving in time and money can be made if the contractor, who now has the boat in hand, can do the work made imperative by the orders of the United States Inspectors.

The owner of any hack not intending to use the public hack stands and having the written consent of the owner or lessee of any hotel containing fifty rooms or more may, in the discretion of the Mayor or the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses, be specially licensed and permitted to use temporarily a portion of the street in front of any such hotel and not elsewhere, as a stand, and shall be confined to carry passengers from said premises.

(2) Section 3 of article 1 of an ordinance in relation to public hacks and hackmen, adopted by the Board of Aldermen October 31, 1905, and approved by the Mayor November 3, 1905, is hereby amended to read as follows: No hackney coach, carriage or cab which shall be specially licensed by virtue of the provisions of this ordinance shall make, use or come upon any stand that is now, or may be hereafter designated as a hackney coach stand, or at any other place in The City of New York, except in front of or adjacent to any hotel specified in the foregoing section and which may be used as a stand with the approval and consent of the persons occupying the premises in front of which said coaches, carriages or cabs are to be permitted and allowed by the authority of the Mayor, as aforesaid, provided that the owner or driver of any such coach, carriage or cab shall not solicit or take any passenger or passengers on the streets, but shall confine themselves solely to and for the use of the guests of said hotel or hotels.

(3) The owner of hacks specially licensed shall, in addition to the lawful fees provided by law, pay annually an additional fee of \$25 for each hack allowed any stand other than a public hack stand, and no other licensed hackman shall come upon or use said stand.

(4) Sections 456 and 459 of article 8 of the revised ordinances of The City of New York adopted by the Board of Aldermen March 9, 1897, and approved by the Mayor March 15, 1897, in relation to special coaches and carriages; section 12 of title 3 of an ordinance entitled "A general Ordinance in relation to business requiring a license and the regulation thereof in The City of New York" adopted by the Council April 18, 1899, by the Board of Aldermen May 19, 1899, and approved by the Mayor May 22, 1899, and section 2 of article 1 of an ordinance in relation to public hacks and hackmen, adopted by the Board of Aldermen October 31, 1905, and approved by the Mayor November 3, 1905, and all ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent with or in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

REPORTS:

The purpose of the proposed ordinance is praiseworthy.

The exhibition of grotesque and barbarous monstrosities, in the guise of outdoor advertising signs, is becoming an intolerable nuisance, and should be effectively regulated and restrained. Such displays disfigure the City's highways and are an offense to the eye.

Advertisers recognize no limit to their enterprise or to their excesses; the aim of each is to outstrip the other in the unsightly character and size of his display, in violation of all good taste and decency.

The grosser features of such advertising, which are plainly an offense to morality, are prohibited by ordinance; and it seems to be within the power of this Board still further to correct the abuse.

The subject is also governed by the provisions of the Building Code, which is now in the hands of a Committee of this Board for revision; and your Committee feels that the matter should with propriety be left to the consideration of such Committee.

The City of New York is behind many others in the exercise of control over this subject, and should not be satisfied to hold an inferior position with respect to so important a matter.

Your Committee recommends that the Committee on Buildings and the Commission of Revision of the Building Code, when appointed, thoroughly examine this subject, with the view to the enactment of provisions which will remedy this rapidly growing evil consistently with the reasonable requirements and rights of those who advertise.

Your Committee therefore requests that it be discharged from further consideration of the matter, and that the proposed ordinance be referred to the Committee on Buildings of this Board.

AN ORDINANCE regulating the erecting and maintaining of advertising display signs in The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Applications—Except as hereinafter provided, no advertising display sign shall be erected in The City of New York without a written permit, signed and acknowledged by the owner or lessee of the property upon which said sign is intended to be erected, and approved by the Alderman of the District in which said property is located. No permit to run for more than one year from date of issue.

Permits—The Building Department of The City of New York shall issue no permits for the erection of any sign unless said application is signed, acknowledged and approved, as provided in paragraph 1.

Exemptions—This ordinance is not intended to affect and does not affect display signs which advertise any business which is carried on upon the premises upon which said sign is to be erected nor any sign not exceeding in area 12 square feet.

Fees—After the approval of the Alderman, as hereinbefore provided, and before the issuance of any permit by the Building Department of The City of New York, there shall be paid to the License Bureau of The City of New York the fees as follows:

(a) Where the sign area exceeds 12 square feet and is less than 150 square feet, ten dollars.

(b) Where the sign area exceeds 150 square feet and is less than 300 square feet, twenty dollars.

(c) Where the sign area exceeds 300 square feet and is less than 500 square feet, thirty dollars.

(d) Where the sign area exceeds 500 square feet and is less than 1,000 square feet, one hundred dollars.

(e) Where the sign area exceeds 1,000 square feet there shall be paid the sum of five dollars for every 100 square feet or fraction thereof.

Area—In computing the area of any sign all spaces between the portions of said sign shall be measured as area.

Construction—This ordinance is not intended nor does it revoke any ordinance or rule of the Building Department of The City of New York with respect to the manner of construction or materials to be used in the erection of any sign.

Penalties—Any sign now erected for which permits shall not have been procured as hereinbefore provided, shall be removed by the Building Department of The City of New York; and the owner or lessee in possession of the premises upon which said sign is erected or maintained shall be liable to a penalty of one hundred dollars, to be collected in a civil action in the Municipal Court of The City of New York, brought

by The City of New York; provided, however, that the owner or lessee shall have ninety days after the passage of this act.

Appeal—It is further provided that in the event that said approval is withheld by the Alderman of the District in which the sign is intended to be erected, then, within thirty days thereafter, the applicant shall have the right to appeal to the Local Board of the District in which said property is located, and the decision of said Local Board shall be final upon said application.

REPORTS:

The subject matter of this resolution is properly within the province of the Legislature of the State.

Until action shall be taken by the Legislature your Committee is of opinion that this Board is without jurisdiction in the premises.

Your Committee therefore requests that it be discharged from further consideration of the resolution, and that it be placed on file.

Whereas, It is the policy of most of the large cities of this State and of the United States to exact, by ordinance, the payment of a license fee from every person conducting the business of a public auctioneer within their respective boundaries, including the agents and servants of such auctioneers who conduct such business for and in the place of such auctioneers, as instanced by the cities mentioned in the schedule hereto annexed; and

Whereas, Such policy is just and equitable in view of the privileges and immunities enjoyed by such public auctioneers; and

Whereas, The City of New York has no general ordinance requiring the payment of a license fee by persons conducting such business in said City; and

Whereas, It is desirable that ways and means should be provided for enabling the City government of The City of New York to meet its constantly increasing expenditures;

Resolved, That the Committee on Laws and Legislation is requested to consider with care the accompanying proposed ordinance and to report its conclusions to the Board with all convenient speed:

AN ORDINANCE for the licensing of public auctioneers in The City of New York, amendatory of article 23 of the Revised Ordinances and title 1, section 1 of the General Ordinances.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

That on and after the 1st day of May, 1906, no person shall conduct the business of a public auctioneer at any place within The City of New York, nor shall the agents or servants of such auctioneers conduct such business for or on behalf of such auctioneers or transact any such business until they, and each of them, have procured a license as hereinafter provided, to wit:

Every person conducting the business of a public auctioneer of goods, wares or merchandise (not including an auctioneer of real estate or any class of public vendors heretofore required to be licensed) shall procure a license and pay therefor \$50 for the privilege of conducting such business for a period of one year thereafter.

Every auctioneer of real estate shall procure a license and pay therefor \$25 for the privilege of conducting the business of a real estate auctioneer for a period of one year thereafter.

Every agent or servant of any such public auctioneer, who shall conduct the business of a public auctioneer for and in the place of his principal or employer, shall procure a license and pay therefor \$10 for the privilege of conducting such business as such agent or servant for the period of one year thereafter.

Any violation of this ordinance shall be punishable by a penalty of \$10 for every such offense, to be sued for and recovered from the seller, auctioneer or his agent severally and respectively.

All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent with the provisions of the foregoing section are hereby repealed.

The Committee on Laws and Legislation, to which was referred on July 31, 1906 (Minutes, page 699), the annexed ordinance providing for the safety of passengers on the waters within the jurisdiction of New York City, respectfully

REPORTS:

Your Committee has given this matter careful attention, but has been unable to learn of any considerable demand for the proposed ordinance.

The adoption of measures for the protection of those who venture upon the water is commendable, and to this end statutes have been enacted by the Congress of the United States and by the Legislature of this State looking to the safety of travelers by water.

Your committee is of opinion that the subject is more directly within the province of the State Legislature, and that it is not advisable to attempt by Municipal ordinance to supplement such acts or to extend their provisions.

The dangers of travel by water seem to be due mainly to the disregard of existing laws and to their lax enforcement.

Your Committee is also of opinion that the proposed ordinance is too broad in its scope; that it would be impracticable in its application and unnecessarily burdensome in its effect; that the division of responsibility with reference to its enforcement would lead to confusion, and that the penalty for its violation is unduly severe.

Your committee therefore recommends that the proposed ordinance be not enacted

AN ORDINANCE to regulate the safety of persons who sail, row and navigate the waters within the confines and adjacent to The City of New York.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

First—Hereafter all owners, lessees and renters of boats and persons who have boats for hire in The City of New York for the conveyance of passengers, or used for pleasure, shall be equipped with a life preserver for each and every person who occupies said boat.

Second—Said life preservers shall meet the test for safety and efficiency as required by the United States Government.

Third—The life preservers shall be in a convenient and safe place on such boat, or boats, at all times.

Fourth—The Department of the Board of Health of the City of New York, in conjunction with the Police Department of the City of New York, shall enforce this ordinance.

Fifth—For each and every violation of this ordinance, on the conviction of such offenders or offender by a court of competent jurisdiction, he or they shall be fined the sum of one hundred (\$100) dollars and in default of payment of said fine shall be sentenced to the jail for one hundred (100) days.

Sixth—A violation of this ordinance is a misdemeanor.

Seventh—All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance is hereby repealed.

Eighth—This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

From the President of the Borough of Brooklyn (70010)—Stating, in response to communication from this department, that the work of building sewer at the foot of Division avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, will be done in a way that will not conflict with any future improvements at the foot of said avenue. Notified that the arrangement as stated is satisfactory to this department; requested to send plans to this office for approval.

From the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity (70474)—Requesting that the bulkhead between Fifty-fifth and Fifty-sixth streets, North river, be repaired, and that cleats be placed thereon, so as to enable tugboats to obtain water from the hydrant thereat. Engineer-in-Chief of this department directed to make the repairs and place the cleats as requested.

From the Mayor (70553)—Transmitting communication received by him from F. Wilke, complaining of the practice of skipping trips on the Municipal Ferry to Thirty-ninth street, Brooklyn, as well as the disregard for the published schedule. Answered that the City should be given time to initiate a new service by the operation of new boats, with new ferry terminals, before it would be proper to offer criticism of the City's management.

From the Board of Armory Commissioners (70779)—Transmitting copy of amended resolution adopted by the Board, requesting the construction of a dock for the use of the organization on the northerly side of the dividing line halfway between Ninety-seventh and Ninety-eighth streets, North river, 325 feet long by 25 feet wide, and asking action thereon; also requesting to be advised as to the dock at which the Department will permit the berthing of the "Newark" in the vicinity of Ninety-seventh street, North river. Engineer-in-Chief of this Department directed to construct the pier. Board requested to advise this Department as to when it will require berth at West Ninety-seventh street, at which time arrangements will be made for the assignment of a temporary berth at that locality.

From the Scranton and Lehigh Coal Company (70797)—Requesting permission to rebuild crib bulkhead for a distance running about 100 feet easterly from the foot of Degraw street, Gowanus canal, Brooklyn. Permit granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department and to be kept within existing lines.

From the Degnon Contracting Company (70796)—Requesting permission to occupy space on the upland in rear of the bulkhead between Fifty-third and Fifty-fourth streets, North river. Privilege granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Commissioner until April 30, 1907, compensation to be at the rate of \$330 per annum, payable monthly in advance to the Cashier, space of 30 by 100 feet.

From Leopold Prince (70794)—Requesting, on behalf of Fred. M. Solomon, lease of about 100 feet of space of pier foot of East Fifth street, Manhattan, to be used for the purpose of maintaining ice bridge, scales and tally house thereon. Notified that this Department has agreed to lease to the present occupants the ice bridge privilege on the north side of the pier.

From Deonesios Bofelis and Peter Pipiles (70778, 70632)—Requesting an extension until March 1, 1907, of the permit for the maintenance of fruit stand at approach to Fort Lee ferry, foot of West One Hundred and Thirtieth street, North river, which permit was revoked by the Department on December 14, 1906. Extension granted.

From the Munson Steamship Line (70742)—Requesting permission to sublet a portion of Pier (new) 9, East river, to the Atlantic Fruit Company, and another smaller portion to the New York and New Jersey Steamboat Company. Consent granted, it being understood and agreed that the permit shall be of no force or effect unless the Munson Steamship Company and the sureties on the lease shall file in this Department a written agreement that their obligations under the provisions of the said lease and bond shall in no manner be affected or impaired by reason of such subletting; company requested to advise the Department what portion of the pier has been sublet to each company.

From the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company (70741)—Requesting permission to rebuild side track in Twelfth avenue leading to the trestle on the north side of the Fifty-ninth street pier, North river, which track was removed by some of the City Departments, until the question of franchise has been determined. Notified that no action will be taken upon the application as the matter is in the hands of the Law Department.

From Mrs. B. McAndrews (70650)—In relation to her former request for reinstatement to the position of Attendant in this Department. Notified that the Commissioner considers the matter closed.

From the Clyde Steamship Company (70479)—Requesting a new lease for Pier 34, and the easterly side of Pier 33, East river, together with bulkheads and short pier projecting between, for a term of ten years, beginning from May 1, 1907, with privilege of renewal. Notified that the matter will be taken up in the near future.

From the Union Stock Yard and Market Company (70522, 70021)—Requesting renewal of lease of pier foot of West Fortieth street, North river, for one year. Advised that as the company is not in position to use the whole of the premises for its business, and as it is not the policy of the City to lease piers where used other than for the purposes specified in the lease, the department, if desired, will entertain an application for a lease with the privilege of erecting one dumping board on the approach leading to the West Fortieth Street Pier, on the southerly side.

From the New England Navigation Company (70665)—Accepting proposition for a lease of extension to Pier (new) 19, North river, as made by this department on December 28, 1906. Commissioners of the Sinking Fund requested to approve

lease to the company of the extension of Pier (new) 19, North river, outshore to the new pierhead line, a distance of about 145 feet, together with the privilege of erecting a shed on such extension in accordance with plans and specifications to be submitted to and approved by this department, said shed to revert to and become the property of The City of New York at the expiration or sooner termination of the said lease; the lease to be for a term commencing from the date such extension is completed and ready for occupancy, and expiring December 1, 1914, that being the term of the lease of the present pier, at a rental based upon 5½ per cent. of the cost of construction of said extension, and 25 cents per square foot per annum for the use of the land under water covered thereby; the remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in the existing lease of said pier.

From the Clyde Steamship Company (70498)—Accepting department's proposition of December 7, 1906, for a lease of Pier 48, North river, to the company. Commissioners of the Sinking Fund requested to approve lease to the Clyde Steamship Company of Pier 48, North river, together with the bulkhead extending from a point 125 feet south of the southerly side of said pier to a point 125 feet north of the northerly side of said pier; the lease to be for a term of ten years commencing from the date said pier and bulkheads shall be vacated by the Oceanic Steam Navigation Company, Limited (White Star Line); the lessees to have the privilege of using during the term of the lease the sheds and the appliances which may be appurtenant thereto at the time of the commencement of the lease; the rental for said pier and bulkheads and the use of the sheds and appliances to be at the rate of \$85,000 per annum, payable quarterly, in advance, at the office of this department; the lease to provide for one renewal of ten years, rental for the renewal term to be at an advance of 10 per cent. on the rental for the preceding term; the lease to provide that the lessee shall keep said sheds, together with the appliances appurtenant thereto, in good condition and repair, to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Docks; the remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in the printed form of lease now in use by this department.

Provided that the lessees of the following described piers and bulkheads shall agree to and consent to the cancellation of the following leases:

(1) Pier (new) 15, with the adjoining half bulkheads, leased to the New York and Texas Steamship Company by an indenture dated January 10, 1906;

(2) Burling Slip Pier East (otherwise known as Pier (new) 16, East river) and the bulkhead extending from the southerly side of said pier southwardly a distance of 95 feet; excepting and reserving therefrom, however, the northerly side of said pier; leased to the New York and Texas Steamship Company by indenture dated June 17, 1902.

The said cancellation to take effect on the date the Oceanic Steam Navigation Company, Limited (White Star Line), shall surrender and vacate Pier (new) 48, North river, together with the adjoining bulkheads as above described.

From the Hazelwood Ice Company (70248)—Making application for a renewal of its lease of berth on the north side of pier foot of East Fifth street, East river. Commissioners of the Sinking Fund requested to approve lease to the company of the following described property:

That portion of the northerly side of the pier at the foot of East Fifth street commencing at the bulkhead line and running easterly a distance of 130 feet, for a term of five years from January 22, 1907, at a rental of \$1,700 per annum, together with the privilege of erecting and maintaining thereon an ice bridge, scales and tallyhouse.

The lease to contain covenants that the lessee shall not at any time, in any manner, directly or indirectly, assign or sublet the premises demised or any part thereof to any person or persons whomsoever, or in any way charge or encumber the same; that the lessee shall not enter into any combination with any person or corporation for the use or non-use of said premises or in relation to the material landed thereon; that no other person or corporation shall at any time be permitted to use, even temporarily, the premises leased without the consent in writing of the Commissioner of Docks; that if at any time the premises shall not be used for the purposes of the lease the Commissioner of Docks shall have authority to permit the use of said premises by other parties; the remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of wharf property now used by this department.

From Thomas McNally (70793)—Requesting reassignment to duty as Stoker in this department, he having been dropped from the rolls on December 3, 1906, for failure to work. Municipal Civil Service Commission requested to authorize the reinstatement.

From John J. Herrick, Mechanical Engineer (70806)—Recommending that the compensation of Michael Reilly, Foreman Laborer, be increased to \$1,800 per annum. Reilly's compensation fixed at the rate of \$1,500 per annum, to take effect immediately.

From the Engineer-in-Chief (70769)—Reporting that on December 28, 1906, the tug "Buffalo," belonging to the Erie Railroad Company, ran into the southerly outer double row of the extension now in course of construction to Pier (new) 21, North river, damaging same. Engineer-in-Chief directed to make the necessary repairs and report the cost for collection from the company.

The Municipal Civil Service Commission was requested to authorize the reinstatement of James P. Reilly, Dock Laborer, who, on May 16, 1906, resigned of his own volition.

A communication (70587) was received from Mrs. M. K. Simkhovitch, requesting that the Department inclose the upper story of the Barrow Street Recreation Pier, North river, so that same may be utilized for athletic purposes by the boys of the neighborhood. Mrs. Simkhovitch was notified that if she can secure assurance from the Board of Education that they will furnish a physical director and the necessary apparatus for the gymnasium on the pier, this Department will at once inclose the entire upper story of the pier with a wire netting, and arrange to have a room heated as a resting place between the games.

A communication (70713) was received from the Comptroller stating that hereafter payment for telephone service rendered at the residences of heads of Departments and other officials will be made only in instances where an absolute public necessity demands the maintenance of the telephones in private residences as a public convenience, and then only upon the basis of a contract entered into at the minimum rate, and requesting that the Department cancel all outstanding contracts for the residential telephones where the same is not an absolute public necessity. Comptroller was notified as to the number of residential telephones maintained by this Department, with the statement that the same are an absolute public necessity for the proper conduct of the Department and the protection of its properties, and said telephones are maintained upon the basis of a contract at the minimum rate.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.
