On motion, duly seconded, the proceedings of November 13, 1908, as printed on page 12180 of The City Record for November 18, 1908, were corrected in the first paragraph of item No. 13 as follows: "On motion made by Commissioner Bassett, and duly seconded, a Hearing Order (No. 830) was adopted directing a hearing on November 25, 1908, at 2:30 P. M., in the matter of vending and weighing machines in the subway of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company." As corrected, the proceedings were approved.

(2) EXPENSES OF COMMISSION—FINAL ALLOWANCE. 2532

The Secretary stated that the Chairman had written under date of November 11, 1908, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment calling its attention to the possibility that the expenses of the Commission would exceed one million dollars, and that in reply thereto a communication had been received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment enclosing a copy of the Comptroller's report upon which their resolution of October 30, 1908, authorizing an appropriation of \$150,000.00 as a "final allowance" for the expenses of the Commission, was adopted. The communication was ordered filed.

(3) UNION RAILWAY COMPANY—RESUMPTION OF SERVICE TO WAKEFIELD. C-2746

The Secretary presented a resolution, adopted by the Board of Aldermen on November 10, 1908, asking the Commission to take steps looking toward the resumption of street car traffic on the Union Railway Company's lines in the City line in Wakefield, New York. The resolution was referred to Commissioner Eustis.

PELHAM PARK AND CITY ISLAND RAILROAD COMPANIES—CHANGE OF MOTIVE POWER—OPINION AND RESOLUTIONS.

Commissioner Eustis presented the following communication from the Counsel to the Commission:

November 17, 1908.

Public Service Commission for the First District:

Sirs—Answering Commissioner Eustis's oral request for an opinion on the question of whether the Commission has authority to approve a change in motive power from horse power to overhead electric current by the American Monorail System, as perfected by H. H. Tunis, I beg to advise you as follows:

Such approval of change of motive power is governed by Section 100 of the Railroad Law, which reads as follows:

See 100. Motive Power.—Any street surface railroad may operate any portion of its road by animal or horse power or by cable, electricity, or any power other than locomotive steam power, which said locomotive steam power is primarily generated by the locomotive propelling the cars, and in the use of which either escaping steam or smoke is visible, which may be approved by the state board of railroad commissioners, and consented to by the owners of one-half of the property bounded on that portion of the railroad with respect to which a change of motive power is proposed; and if the consent of such property owners cannot be obtained, the determination of three disinterested commissioners, appointed by the appellate division of the supreme court of the department in which such railroad is located, in favor of such motive power, confirmed by the court, shall be taken in lieu of the consent of the property owners. The consent of the property owners shall be obtained and the proceedings for the appointment and the determination of the commissioners and the confirmation of their report shall be conducted in the manner prescribed in sections ninety-one and ninety-four of this article, so far as the same can properly be made applicable thereto. Any railroad corporation making a change in its motive power under this section, may make any change in the construction of its road or roadbed or other property rendered necessary by the change in its motive power.

* * *

It has been held that this section authorizes such changes as from horse power to overhead trolley power and from horse power to underground cable power.

In my opinion the testimony taken at the hearing indicates that the change contemplated in the case of the Pelham Park Railroad Company and City Island Railroad Company is not so essentially different from that of a change to trolley construction as to prevent your granting the power to erect the new structure as part of the equipment necessary to the new motive power, under the provisions of Section 100 of the Railroad Law. The question is one of degree, and as the nature of the structure is not well known it is of course uncertain how great the additional burden on the street will be. If it prove to be similar to trolley construction, I should expect the Courts to hold that your approval is sufficient. If, on the other hand, a structure is erected that is more like an elevated railroad, then I should expect the Courts to hold that the franchise for this should be obtained from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

In any event, your approval of the change of motive power is necessary and proper, and if additional authority is needed from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the railroad companies may apply to that Board.

I can see no reason why your Commission should not grant the approval asked, if in your opinion the change is desirable. The railroad companies in assuming that no application to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is necessary are taking a risk with full knowledge of the facts, and your action can in no way prevent the City of New York from exercising its rights in the matter.

The railroad companies have stated that they have the necessary consents of property owners, and I think your Commission may reasonably require that such consents be submitted for examination before your approval is given.

I send you herewith a proposed resolution approving this change.

The following resolutions were thereupon moved by Commissioner Eustis:
OCTOBER (No. 842).

Whereas, an application, dated October 15, 1908, has been made to the Public Service Commission for the First District by the Pelham Park Railroad Company for approval of change of motive power from horse power to overhead electric power as used by the American Monorail System, and

Whereas, a hearing was held before the Public Service Commission for the First District after due notice given to The City of New York and to the public by advertisement duly had in certain newspapers, to wit, the New York Press and the New York Evening Post, at which hearing testimony was taken, and at which hearing it appeared that the change of motive power as above set forth had been consented to by the owners of more than one-half of the property bounded on the Pelham Park Railroad Company;

Now therefore, it is

Resolved, That the change of motive power from horse power to overhead electric current to be operated in connection with the American Monorail System perfected by Howard Hanson Tunis, as applied for by the Pelham Park Railroad Company, be and the same hereby is in all respects approved upon the route as follows:

Beginning at or near Bartow Station on the Harlem River and Portchester Railroad; thence to, along and through the street known as Third street to the highway known as the Shore road; thence along and across the said Shore road to the highway known as the City Island Road; thence through, along and upon the said City Island Road to a junction with the City Island Railroad at or near Marshall's Corner.

Further Resolved, That this approval take effect only upon the Pelham Park Railroad Company obtaining the local consents and approvals required by law and depositing the same with the Public Service Commission for the First District for examination.

ORDER (No. 843).

Whereas, An application, dated October 15, 1908, has been made to the Public Service Commission for the First District by the City Island Railroad Company for approval of change of motive power from horse power to overhead electric power as used by the American Monorail System, and

Whereas, A hearing was held before the Public Service Commission for the First District after due notice given to The City of New York and to the public by advertisement duly had in certain newspapers, to wit, the New York Press and the New York Evening Post, at which hearing testimony was taken, and at which hearing it appeared that the change of motive power as above set forth had been consented to by the owners of more than one-half of the property bounded on the City Island Railroad Company;

Now therefore, it is

Resolved, That the change of motive power from horse power to overhead electric current to be operated in connection with the American Monorail System perfected by Howard Hanson Tunis, as applied for by the City Island Railroad Company, be and the same hereby is in all respects approved upon the route as follows:

Beginning at a junction with the Pelham Park Railroad at or near Marshall's Corner on the highway known as the City Island Road; thence through, along and upon the said City Island road to and across City Island bridge; thence through, along and upon the street or highway known as Main Street to a point on said street at or near the corner of intersection of Franklin Avenue.

Further Resolved, That this approval take effect only upon the City Island Railroad Company obtaining the local consents and approvals required by law and depositing the same with the Public Service Commission for the First District for examination.

Commissioner Bassett—"In considering this proposition, we act under the powers that were granted to us as successors of the State Railroad Board, and somewhat as when issuing a certificate of public convenience and a necessity. Before a company can change its motive power it must obtain our approval, but that does not mean that all needed rights are perfected any more than when we issue a certificate of public convenience and a necessity; it means that no further rights may be needed. I can easily conceive that a company operating a horse railroad should go through two or three separate cities. It might then apply to the Public Service Commission to make a change of the motive power to electricity. The grant of the certificate would still leave the company where it might need to go to these several cities to procure additional rights. It therefore seems to me that it is not necessary that we should await the action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment before we grant this certificate of change of motive power. It leaves the company free to obtain such additional rights as the law demands, and the municipality is in no way injured. I am therefore in favor of the resolutions and second the motion for their adoption."

Commissioner Maltbie—"I wish to be excused from voting on this motion, not having seen the Engineer's report and not knowing, except by verbal communication, what statements are made therein. Personally, I consider it quite improper to authorize off-hand a change in motive power which involves such a radical change as the adoption of a method which has not been tried in New York nor in any other city in the United States under the conditions which will exist on the two lines running between Bartow and City Island. Until an engineering report has been submitted which states that the plan is safe and proper in the judgment of a competent electrical engineer, I cannot see how one can vote intelligently upon these resolutions."

GAS METERS TESTED—OCTOBER, 1908.

The Secretary stated that during the month ending October 31, 1908, 30,282 gas meters had been tested, and that of this number 6,594 were new meters, 23,739 were repaired meters, and 549 were complaint meters; that of the 549 complaint meters tested, 56, or 10%, were absolutely correct, 328, or 60%, were fast, and 165, or 30%, were slow; that of the 328 fast meters tested, 222, or 68% of the total tested were more than 2% fast; that of the 165 slow meters tested, 60, or 11% of the total tested, were more than 2% slow; and that 277, or 50% were between 2% fast and 2% slow.

ELECTRIC METERS TESTED—OCTOBER, 1908.

The Secretary stated that during the month ending October 31, 1908, 65 electric meters had been tested upon complaint, and that of this number 8, or 12.3%, were over 4% fast, 9, or 13.8% were over 4% slow, and 48, or 73.8% were between 4% fast and 4% slow.

COMPLAINT ORDER (No. 837).

On motion made and duly seconded, a Complaint Order (No. 837) was adopted for satisfaction or answer within ten days by the Brooklyn Union Elevated Railroad Company and the Nassau Electric Railroad Company in the matter of the complaints of Louis Ruprecht with respect to the lack of shelter at 39th Street and Church Avenue.

HEARING ORDER (No. 838).

On motion made and duly seconded, a Hearing Order (No. 838) was adopted, directing a hearing on November 30, 1908, at 3:00 o'clock p. m. in the matter of the complaint of James J. Hunter et al upon which Order No. 734 was adopted, in the matter of the operation of freight cars on Marcy avenue, Brooklyn, N. Y., by the Nassau Electric Railroad Company and the South Brooklyn Railway Company.

The Chairman designated Commissioner Bassett to conduct the hearing.

DISMISSAL ORDER (No. 840).

On motion made and duly seconded, a Dismissal Order (No. 840) was adopted, dismissing the complaint of Alexander Brown against the South Brooklyn Railway Company with respect to the noisy operation of freight and ash cars through Vanderbilt avenue, especially at night, the complainant having expressed his satisfaction with the conditions at present existing.

HUDSON AND MANHATTAN RAILROAD CO.—ACCEPTANCE OF ORDER NO. 768, RESOLUTIONS AND CONSENT.

The Secretary presented a communication from the President of the Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company, under date of November 14, 1908, enclosing formal acceptance of Order No. 768, together with certified copy of resolutions adopted by the Board of Directors of that Company in relation thereto, and also the consent of the United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company, surety on the bond of the New York and New Jersey Railroad Company, to said Order No. 768. RAPID TRANSIT RAILROAD—PROGRESS OF WORK—REPORT OF CHIEF ENGINEER.

The Committee of the Whole presented the following report from the Chief Engineer, which was ordered filed:

November 16, 1908.

Public Service Commission for the First District:

GENTLEMEN—Pursuant to the request of the Committee of the Whole, transmitted to me by the Secretary, I report the progress on the Shuttle Service at South Ferry, additional tracks north of 6th Street, and other construction work.

The construction of an extra track for Shuttle Service at South Ferry is about half completed, and will be ready for operation on May 1, 1909.

The construction of additional tracks north of 6th Street was commenced on October 1, 1908, and in connection therewith three large water mains are now being laid on West End Avenue and will probably be placed in service about January 1, 1909. The main work of construction will then commence, and will require about two years to complete.

The work on 72nd Street station, for additional stairways, marquee and illuminating signs, was commenced a week ago, and will require about three months to complete.

The additional stairway at 145th Street will be completed about December 15, 1908.

The Van Cortlandt Park Extension is at present practically completed and will probably be finished before January 1, 1909.

The work of enclosing the shafts on 18th Street, 181st Street and Mott Avenue stations has been begun at station 181st Street. This work is so unusual that it is intended to complete this station before proceeding with the others in case there should be any developments during construction which might suggest improvement in the plans, and to ascertain the approximate cost.

FOURTH AVENUE SUBWAY—PROGRESS OF WORK—REPORT OF CHIEF ENGINEER.

The Committee of the Whole presented the following report from the Chief Engineer, which was ordered filed:

November 13, 1908.

Public Service Commission for the First District:

GENTLEMEN—Pursuant to the request of the Committee of the Whole, transmitted to me by the Secretary, I submit report on the progress of the Fourth Avenue Subway in Brooklyn.

Contract plans for this Subway were completed to 43d Street, and the contracts were awarded by your Commission on May 22, 1908. These contracts provide for the completion of the work in twenty-four months, or by May 22, 1910. It may be noted that this is only five months after the date of completion of the Loop Lines in Manhattan, and of the proposed opening of Manhattan Bridge. Had the work commenced when the contracts were awarded, it would now be nearly one-fourth done.

The pavement on Flatbush Avenue Extension is awaiting the construction of this Subway.

CONTRACT NO. 2—BROOKLYN LOOP LINES—PROGRESS OF WORK—REPORT OF CHIEF ENGINEER.

The Committee of the Whole presented the following report from the Chief Engineer, which was ordered filed:

November 12, 1908.

Public Service Commission for the First District:

GENTLEMEN—Pursuant to the request of the Committee of the Whole, transmitted to me by the Secretary, I would report the progress on the Brooklyn Loop Lines in Manhattan.

The work on these lines is at present about one-half done, and, with the exception of the Chambers Street station, it should be completed by January, 1910.

At Chambers Street station the work was stopped in accordance with letter of May 12 from Mayor McClellan, requesting that this Commission "direct the Contractors to suspend work in connection with the Subway Station." The six months which have elapsed since that date have been taken up in the preparation of plans by the Department of Bridges for the foundation of the Municipal Office Building, which plans I understand are now completed and the contract about to be let. I am advised that it will take about one year to build these foundations, and probably several months more to bring the work up to the point at which it was stopped six months ago.

It will not be practical to operate the Loop Lines until the Chambers Street station is completed.
