SUPREME COURT.

Frederick Scharmann vs. John McClave, Fitz-John Porter, Stephen B. French and John R. Voorhis, Commissioners composing the Board of Police of the Police Department of the City of New York—Injunction to restrain the police from interfering with the merry-go-round at Oak Point on Sunday.

George Moritz—Personal injuries caused by hole in Ridge street, between Stanton and Rivington streets, December 18, 1884, \$20,000.

People ex rel. Leonard W. Johnson vs. Edward V. Loew, Comptroller of the City of New York—Mandamus directing Comptroller to show cause at Special Term, on August 28, 1885, why he should not accept a return of a certain certified check deposited by the relator on July 20, 1885, with a proposal for paving Fifth avenue.

People ex rel. Leonard W. Johnson vs. Wm. R. Grace, Mayor of the City of New York, Edward V. Loew, Comptroller of the City of New York, and Rollin M. Squire, Commissioner of Public Works—Writ of mandamus requiring the respondents to accept a return of a certified check, deposited July 20, 1885, with a proposal for paving Fifth avenue, and why the Mayor should not act upon the proposal.

SUPERIOR COURT.

Ellen Gallagher—Damages caused to house No. 29 East Forty-sixth street, by overflow of water from the hydrant, \$200.
