

Whereas, The necessity for continuing Tomp-kins square as a parade ground for the uses of the military does not now, if it ever did, exist, as other and more enlarged accommodations for drill purposes have been elsewhere provided ; be it therefore

therefore Resolved, That the Legislature of the State be and is hereby respectfully requested to repeal chapter 593, Laws of 1866, thereby restoring Tompkins square, in this city, to the uses for which it was originally intended; also to provide the means necessary to again lay out, improve, plant trees, etc., etc., in said Tompkins square.


