### APPROVED PAPERS.

*Ordinances, Resolutions, etc., approved by the Mayor during the week ending April 3, 1875, respectively.*

Resolved, That Amity street, from Broadway to Sixth avenue, shall hereafter be known and designated as West Third street; and be it further Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and is hereby authorized and directed to carry into effect the provisions of the foregoing resolution.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, March 25, 1875.  
Approved by the Mayor, April 2, 1875.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to James Mooney, to erect a watering-trough in front of his premises, corner of Greenwich and Beach streets, the same to be on Beach street; the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, March 25, 1875.  
Approved by the Mayor, April 2, 1875.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to John Krisel to erect a watering-trough in front of his premises No. 134 Cedar street, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

\* Resolved, That the Department of Public Parks be and is hereby directed to cause the public urinal located in Eighth street, opposite the Mercantile Library building, to be kept open and sufficiently lighted every night until 12 o'clock P. M.

Resolved, That One Hundred and Thirteenth street, from Second avenue to Harlem river, be paved with Belgian or trap-block pavement, and that at the several intersecting streets and avenues crosswalks be laid where not now laid, and relaid where those now laid are, in the opinion of the Commissioner of Public Works, not in good repair, or are not upon a grade adapted to the grade of the proposed new pavement, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Resolved, That three lamps be placed and lighted in front of the Memorial Chapel of Madison Square Presbyterian Church on Thirtieth street, east of Third avenue, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Resolved, That the vacant lot on the southeast corner of Third avenue and Eighty-seventh street be fenced in, under the direction of the Commis-

Resolved, That Henry Steinert be and he is hereby reappointed a Commissioner of Deeds in and for the City and County of New York.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to John Carroll to place a watering-trough on the southeast corner of Eleventh avenue and Fifty-first street; the same to be done at his own expense, and to remain only during the pleasure of the Common Council, and under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, March 25, 1875.  
Approved by the Mayor, April 2, 1875.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Charles H. Pheips, to retain the clock now on the sidewalk in front of his premises, No. 677 Sixth avenue; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, March 25, 1875.  
Approved by the Mayor, April 2, 1875.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Chamberlain Brothers to erect a storm-door in front of entrance to premises No. 217 Duane street, as shown in the annexed diagram; the work to be done at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, March 25, 1875.  
Approved by the Mayor, April 2, 1875.

Resolved, That the three sunken lots on the north side of One Hundred and Nineteenth street, commencing three hundred and twenty-three feet east of Avenue A, be filled in and fenced, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, March 25, 1875.  
Approved by the Mayor, April 2, 1875.

Whereas, Chapter 593, Laws of 1866, diverted the uses of Tompkins square from a public park to that of a parade ground, thereby inflicting upon the dense population resident in the immediate vicinity, and who formerly used the square for purposes of recreation, a great wrong, as it deprived them—particularly the children, who to the number of thousands occupied it during the summer months—of all opportunity for open-air exercise, and, in consequence, militated against the health of the entire neighborhood; and

Whereas, The necessity for continuing Tompkins square as a parade ground for the uses of the military does not now, if it ever did, exist, as other and more enlarged accommodations for drill purposes have been elsewhere provided; be it therefore

Resolved, That the Legislature of the State be and is hereby respectfully requested to repeal chapter 593, Laws of 1866, thereby restoring Tompkins square, in this city, to the uses for which it was originally intended; also to provide the means necessary to again lay out, improve, plant trees, etc., etc., in said Tompkins square.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, March 25, 1875.  
Approved by the Mayor, April 2, 1875.

Resolved, That the Common Council, as provided in section 49 of chapter 335, Laws of 1873, authorize and approve of the action taken by the Board of Police of the Police Department of the City of New York in leasing premises for the Police of the Thirtieth Precinct from John Theiss, for a period of five years, from May 1, 1875, at an annual rent of one thousand four hundred and fifty dollars (\$1,450.00), and hereby directs that such authorization and approval be indorsed upon the copy of lease hereto annexed, and then transmitted to the Board of Police of the Police Department of the City of New York.

Approved by the Mayor, April 2, 1875.

Resolved, That this Common Council, as provided in section 49 of chapter 335, Laws of 1873, authorize and approve of the action taken by the Board of Police of the Police Department of the City of New York, in renewal of lease of premises Nos. 52 and 54 New street, for a period of five years from May 1, 1875, at an annual rental of four thousand five hundred dollars (\$4,500), as a station-house for the police force of the First

Precinct, and hereby directs that such authorization and approval be indorsed upon the copy of renewal of lease, hereto annexed, and then transmitted to the Board of Police of the Police Department of the City of New York.

### DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS, 346 & 348 BROADWAY.

At meetings of the Board governing this Department, held March 25th, 27th, 29th, and 30th—present, all the Commissioners—the following action was had:

#### Organization, Appointments, etc.

March 25.—Seth C. Douglass, Assistant Clerk, resigned; to take effect the 27th instant.

March 25.—Article VIII. of the By-laws, in relation to the floating property of the Department, upon which action was suspended January 21, 1875, accepted and adopted in accordance with report of Commissioners Wales and Budd, Committee on Revision of By-laws.

#### Applications for Leases, etc.

March 25.—William H. Brown, lessee of parts of Piers Nos. 56 and 57, informed, in reply to his application for a renewal of leases of said premises, that this and other wharf property will shortly be put up at public auction.

March 25.—Counsel to the Corporation informed that pier foot of Ninety-sixth street, North river, has been almost totally destroyed by floating ice, a suit having been commenced by this Department against the sureties to the lease of said pier for arrearages of rent, and one of said sureties requested to call at this office.

March 25.—Action of the officers of the Board in executing lease with Dillon Ransom, for privilege of keeping floats at the steps foot of Harlem Bridge, head of Third avenue, for one year from February 1, 1875, at a rent of \$780, approved.

March 25.—Counsel to the Corporation requested to prepare a lease, in triplicate, with David Tracy, of the pier foot of Twenty-fifth street, East river, for one year from February 1, 1875, at a rent of \$1,950.

March 29.—Draft of terms and conditions of sale of piers and bulkheads, to be held 31st instant, at Exchange Salesroom, 111 Broadway, by William Kennelly, Auctioneer, as prepared by the Secretary. Approved.

March 30.—Resolution adopted December 12, 1874, granting lease to Associates Houston Street Ferry of ferry premises foot of Houston street, East river, amended so that if said Company shall be required to pay, during the entire term of said lease, instead of during the two renewal terms, to the Corporation any other amount than the rent stipulated for in said lease, for the purpose of operating said ferry, then such sum shall be deducted from the amount of rent agreed to be paid to this Department.

#### Repairs Ordered, etc.

March 25.—Engineer-in-Chief directed to repair pier foot of Twenty-fourth street, North river, and Commissioner of Public Works requested to cause pavement at foot of the street to be repaired.

March 25.—Resolution adopted 4th inst., ordering from J. S. Mundy friction drum, to be applied to the ten-ton derrick, at a cost of \$250, rescinded in accordance with recommendation of Engineer-in-Chief.

March 25.—Action of the Commissioners in directing Engineer-in-Chief to repair piers foot of Forty-sixth and Fifty-first streets, North river, damaged by floating ice, approved.

March 25.—Action of the Commissioners in directing Engineer-in-Chief to take measures for the protection of piers foot of Ninety-sixth and One Hundred and Twenty-ninth streets, North river, damaged by floating ice, approved.

#### Dredging Ordered, etc.

March 25.—Engineer-in-Chief directed to proceed with dredging at slip foot of Twenty-fifth street, East river, as soon as weather will permit, and to inform the Board when the work is commenced; and copy of communication and permit received from Board of Commissioners of Pilots relative to said dredging transmitted to the Engineer-in-Chief.

March 25.—Action of Commissioner Budd, in making arrangements with Board of Commissioners of Pilots, to allow a deposit to be made of 3,500 cubic yards of mud, to be dredged from slip foot of Twenty-fifth street, East river, approved.

#### Miscellaneous.

March 25.—Engineer-in-Chief directed to have raft of timber and pile-drivers removed from Pier 40, East river, if work thereat is completed.

March 25.—Action of Commissioners in offering John G. Dale \$250,000 for Pier 44, North river, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and the title to be approved by the Counsel to the Corporation, approved.

March 25.—Henderson Bros. informed that the Counsel to the Corporation has advised that, under existing statutes, this Department has not the right to widen Pier 21, North river, but that the Department will endeavor to procure favorable legislation for the authorization of this and similar work.

March 25.—Report presented by the Secretary which had been prepared by direction of the Commissioners, in reply to a concurrent resolution of the Legislature as to why no survey had been made of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards as requested by the Legislature of 1874, approved and adopted and directed to be transmitted to Hon. J. N. McGuire, Speaker of the Assembly.

March 25.—Action of the Commissioners in forwarding papers served on the Department, in the matter of the application of W. F. Morgan, to restrain the Department from building sheds on new Piers 43 and 46, North river, to the Counsel to the Corporation that the interests of the city may be protected, approved.

March 27.—Draft of an act to fix and determine bulkhead and pier lines on the East river, returned to His Honor the Mayor, approved.

March 30.—Engineer in Chief directed to proceed to Albany to represent the Board respecting certain bills before the Legislature affecting this Department.

March 25.—Thirty-five communications were received and read, of which twenty-five were placed on file, no further action therein being deemed necessary; four were laid on the table, four referred to the Executive Committee, and two to the Auditing Committee for consideration and report.
