of night-soil, be forwarded to the Department of Docks, and that said Department be and is hereby respectfully requested to set apart for the use of this Department, for the removal of night-soil from the upper part of the city, a dock upon the East river, located above Ninety-fifth street.

That Adoniram D. Judson, M. D., be and is hereby appointed Assistant Sanitary Inspector, with salary at the rate of \$1,500 per annum.

That the Sanitary Superintendent be and is hereby directed to report at the next meeting the condition of the manure dumps.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed by the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending May 8, 1875. The number of inspections made by Inspectors was 237, as follows:

1 public building, 1,216 tenement houses, 178 private dwellings, 149 other dwellings, 19 manufactories and workshops, 14 stores and warehouses, 104 stables, 52 slaughter-houses, 18 tidal lands, 1 brewery, 7 fat-rendering establishments, 1 public sewer, 2 head and tripe boiling establishments, 33 sunken and vacant lots, 114 yards, courts, and areas, 63 cellars and basements, 61 waste-pipes and drains, 140 privies and water-closets, 57 street-gutters and sidewalks, 19 dangerous stairways, 2 dangerous chimneys, 2 cisterns and cesspools, 2 piggeries, 9 other nuisances, together with 113 visits of Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 705.

During the past week 72 complaints have been made by citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

100 permits were issued to consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

192 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 101 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 84 houses, 84 privy-sinks, 78 cellars and basements, and 49 yards, courts, and areas. The clothing, bedding, etc., in 84 dwellings were disinfected and fumigated.

62 cases of small-pox were removed to the Hospital, and 2 dead bodies to the Morgue, by the Ambulance Corps.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases was reported during the week ending May 8, 1875:

Typhus fever, 1; typhoid fever, 7; scarlet fever, 48; measles, 16; diphtheria, 64; small-pox, 104; and cerebro-spinal meningitis, 5.

3 tanks and 4,291 cans of night-soil were removed by the scavengers from the privy-vaults of the city.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food: cattle, 1 carcass; calves (bob), 10 carcasses; calves (case), 6 carcasses; sheep, 2 carcasses; hogs, 1 carcass; veal, 117 pounds; and fish, 2,000 pounds.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending May 8, 1875, there were issued from this Bureau 578 burial permits for city deaths, 25 for bodies *in transitu*, and 44 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 578 deaths, 149 marriages, 372 births, 44 still-births, 25 applications for transit permits, and 77 returns from Coroners. There were 18 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 4 transcripts of birth-record, 3 of marriage, and 14 of death were issued from this Bureau.

To the Secretary of the Board of Health:

SIR—There were 578 deaths reported in this city during the week ending May 8, against 556 reported in the previous week. The increase in deaths reported consisted chiefly of cases in the public institutions—their increase showing 107 against 80, while the whole increase was 22 in the week. It consisted of deaths from pneumonia, phthisis, small-pox, and from violence.

The death-rate for the last week in April was equal to 26.35 in the 1,000 living, and last week it rose to 28.90 per 1,000. The mean temperature was 50 degrees Fahr., or 2 degrees warmer than that of the previous week, and nearly 5 degrees colder than that of the corresponding week last year. The reports received from the various cities of the Northern and Middle States, in which there is registration of mortality, shows that high death-rates in most of them have been caused by diseases of the respiratory organs. Twenty-one cities in Great Britain reported an average death-rate equal to 25 per 1,000 living in the week ending April 24; Glasgow reported 31 per 1,000; Dublin, 21; Liverpool, 26; Paris, 30.2 per 1,000.

Of the 32 cases from violent causes last week, 6 were by street and railway casualties; 6 from falls and fractures; 2 from burning (clothing) and 8 from drowning; 4 of which comprised the family that was asphyxiated in the capsized barge on the East river.
