An Ordinance to Amend Subdivision 1, Section 240 of Article 17 of Chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, Relating to "Vaults."

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: Section 240. Subdivision 1 of article 17 of chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 240. General provisions.

1. Definitions. Whenever used in this article, the term vault shall be deemed to mean every description of opening below the surface of the street that is covered over, as limited by subdivision 8 of this section, in front of any improved or unimproved property, except cesspools and openings which are used exclusively as places for descending to the cellar floor of any building or buildings, by means of steps, and openings over which substantial and safe fixed gratings have been erected in accordance with the provision of article 17, provided said openings be used primarily for light and ventilation.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen January 16, 1917.

Received from his Honor the Mayor January 30, 1917, without his approval or disapproval thereof; therefore, as provided in section 40 of the Greater New York Charter, the same took effect as if he had approved it.

Resolution for Special Revenue Bonds, \$104.16, to Allow Compensation to A. C. Fach for Services Rendered While Acting Surrogate of Richmond County.

Resolved, That in pursuance of the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds to the amount of one hundred and four dollars and sixteen cents (\$104.16), the proceeds whereof to be used by the Comptroller for the purpose of allowing compensation to Albert C. The Federal Bureau of the Census having determined not to use the returns of the State census of 1915 in estimating the population of New York City, notified this Department on February 10, 1916, that until 1920 estimates of the population of cities and states within the United States made by the Federal Bureau would be based upon the Federal censuses of 1900 and 1910. In view of this action of the Federal Bureau of the Census and the purpose for which the State census was taken, which made its results unsuited to our needs, the Department of Health concluded likewise to base its estimates upon the Federal censuses of 1900 and 1910, and since the changes in immigration and emigration wrought by the war have made impractical the continued use of the geometrical method of estimating the population of the city, the Department of Health has, after careful deliberation, decided to adopt the arithmetical method, which is the one used by the Bureau of the Census, and to estimate the population of the city and of the boroughs by this method, at least until the next Federal census becomes available.

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Friday, Jan. 5, 1917, at 3.30 p. m.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. Paulding, O'Keeffe, Sachs, Farley, Robbins and Stern, Trustees. Excused, Mr. Kingsbury, Commissioner of Public Charities.

The minutes of the meetings of Dec. 19 and Dec. 29, 1916, were held as read and approved.

George O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

The daily average census at the various hospitals during the month of December, 1916, was as follows: Bellevue, 1,226; Gouverneur, 184; Harlem, 221; Fordham, 201; Neponsit, 88.

I regret to report the accidental death on Dec. 23, 1916, of Allen McPhee, graduate nurse in the service of the hospital for more than two years.

Charles S. Hunt, Instructor in Anaesthesia at Gouverneur, has tendered his resignation, effective from Dec. 1, 1916.

At Gouverneur Hospital the question of authority and responsibility over cases has arisen between the Attending Surgeon and the Attending Laryngologist, and the Medical Board of Gouverneur asks that a definite ruling be established governing the status of the Laryngologist in the hospital.

Owing to the great difficulty we are having in maintaining sufficient heat and power with No. 3 buckwheat coal, which we are now burning in all of the hospitals, it will be necessary to ask for some additional employees. The exact number cannot be determined for a few days, it will probably be two at Harlem and four at Bellevue. It will also be necessary to employ additional employees for the X-ray Department.

Dr. LaFetra asks permission to make use of the services of a worker supplied by the Huddleston Foundation for the cardiac cases coming to his clinic.

Funds have been provided from private sources for the employment of an additional worker on the Children's Surgical service. Your authorization is requested.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

The resignation of Dr. Hunt as Instructor in Anaesthesia was accepted, effective Dec. 1, 1916.

The question of authority and responsibility of the Visiting Surgeon and Visiting Laryngologist at Gouverneur Hospital has been referred to a special committee, consisting of the President, the Secretary, and Mr. Stern.

After consideration, it was resolved to authorize the General Medical Superintendent to employ such additional help as may be required to maintain the sewer and heating plants of the several hospitals of the department in fit condition to furnish the necessary amount of heat and power; and it was further resolved, That a careful study be

made of the results obtained in the change of the power plant equipment for comparison of the results under the old and the new equipment. This study is to include accurate statistical records of the quantity of coal used; the number of employees; heat produced and such other information that may be necessary for a comprehensive and intensive study of the subject.

The employment of the additional help required in the X-Ray Department was authorized.

The employment of an additional worker for the clinic for cardiac cases and for the children's surgical service, referred to in the report from the General Medical Superintendent was authorized on the condition that the workers abide by the rules of the hospital and are subject to the direction of the administrative executives of the department.

COMMITTEE REPORTS.

Dr. Brannan presented a tabulation of bids received at the office of the Central Purchase Committee on Jan. 4, 1917, for (a) cleaning materials and compounds; (b) paints, oils and varnishes; (c) forage. On the recommendation of the Committee or Supplies, contracts were awarded to the lowest formal bidders on all items, except as hereinafter mentioned. Cleaning materials, lines 1 and 4, were rejected on account of the high prices and the fact that only one bid was received. Item No. 12 was rejected on account of the error in advertising bids to be received. Line No. 52, chip soap, awarded to the Holbrook Manufacturing Company. Forage, items 14, 15, 16, 17 and 18, rejected on account of the high prices. Paints, oils and varnishes, lines Nos. 132 and 175 were rejected on account of the high prices and the fact that only one bid was received. The purchase in the open market was authorized on those items which were rejected.

Dr. Brannan referred to the desirability of appointing a special committee to visit Bellevue Hospital in the same manner as at the allied hospitals. After consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried, to appoint a Committee of the Month to visit Bellevue Hospital, Mr. Sachs and Mr. Stern being made members of that Committee for the month of January.

Mr. O'Keeffe and Mr. Sachs reported that they had inquired into the request of the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital to rearrange the location of the medical wards for men and the surgical wards for women at that hospital. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to defer action on this subject until some time in May.

Dr. Brannan and Mr. Paulding reported that they had considered the plan of organization of the house staff of Bellevue Hospital proposed by the Executive Committee of the Medical Board in their minutes of Dec. 13, 1916, and recommended that the plan be adopted as presented. After consideration, on motion duly seconded and carried, the plan was adopted.

Mr. Sachs reported that he has been unable to meet in person with the Comptroller in regard to the department's application for \$800,000 corporate stock for the construction of Pavilions F and G, but wrote to him the day before suggesting that a committee of the Board of Trustees be permitted to come before the Corporate Stock Budget Committee on this subject. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the subject was continued with the Finance Committee.

Dr. Brannan reported that the Polyclinic Hospital on Dec. 18 finished changes so as to provide two wards to enable that hospital to hold patients over night for transfer to Bellevue. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this report was approved.

Mr. Farley reported that he had inquired into the recommendation of McIlm, Mead and White, as set forth in their letter of Dec. 27, in regard to the gas piping in Pavilions I and K, and the recommendation of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, as set forth in their letter of December 27, suggesting that an open market order be issued to the contractor for the installation of the fixtures. On the recommendation of the Building Committee, it was moved, seconded and carried to direct the General Medical Superintendent to issue an open market order for this purpose in order that the contract for the lighting fixtures may be completed.

Dr. Brannan reported that on Dec. 27 he wrote to the Public Service Commission, calling attention to the accident to Ellen McPhee, referred to in the report of the General Medical Superintendent, being due to the type of car in use. After consideration, in approving the action of the President, it was moved, seconded and carried, to inquire from time to time what the Public Service Commission has done to remedy the situation referred to by the President in his letter.

Mr. Sachs presented a letter, dated Jan. 1934, from A. E. Cohn, of the Hospital of the Rockefeller Institute of Medical Research, recommending two men for ap-

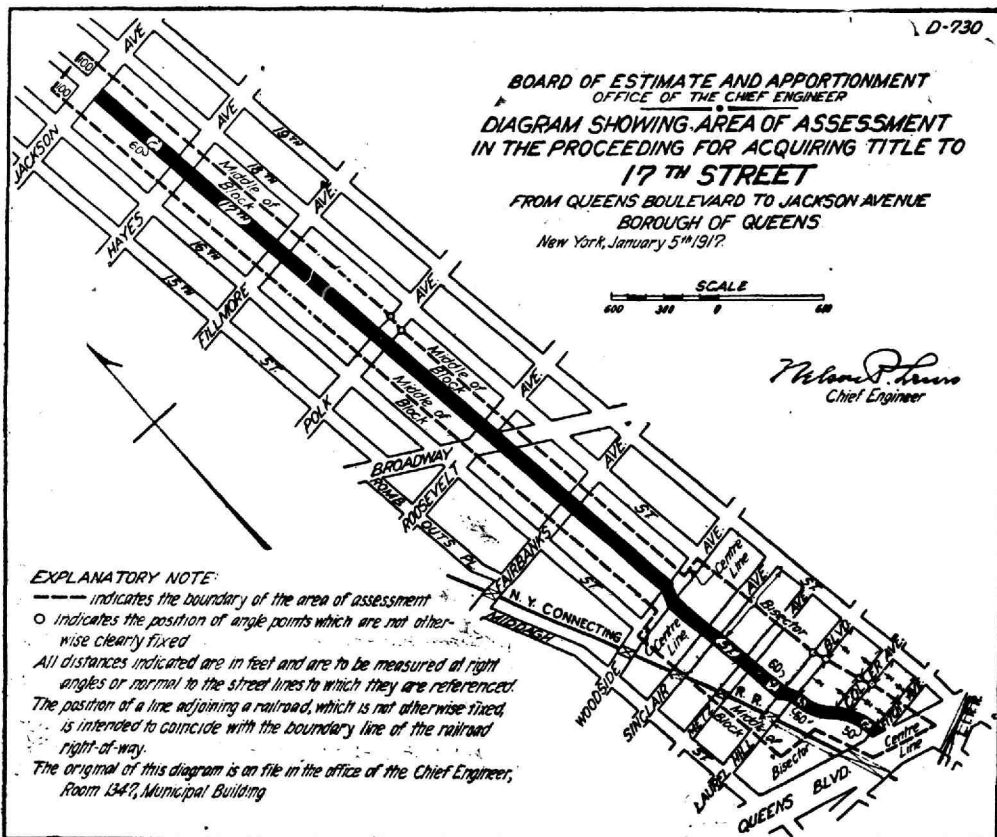

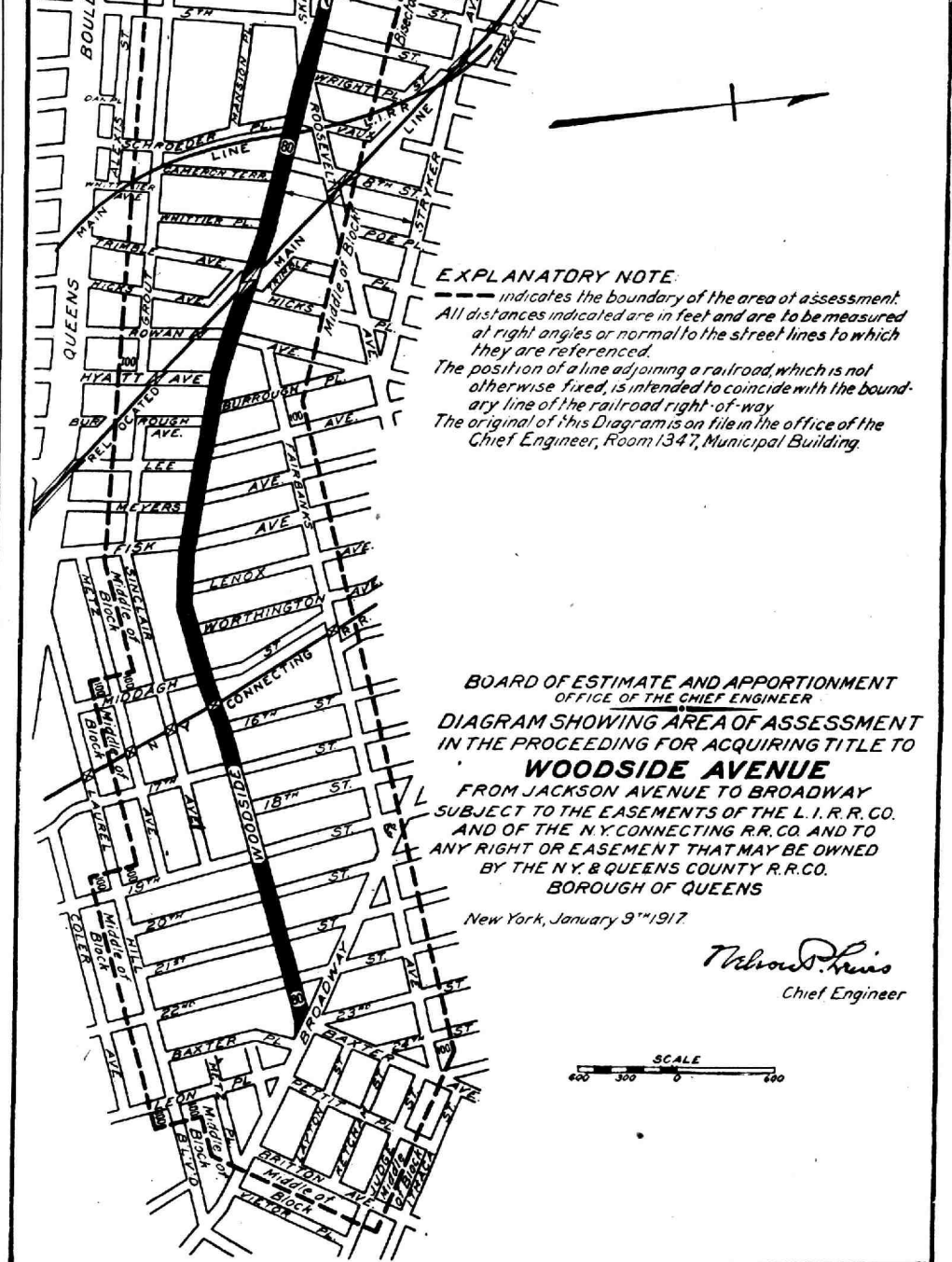
