# Summary Plan Activation Process

The New York City Emergency Management Department (NYCEM) has plans and protocols in place to guide New York City's response to weather emergencies, including plans for winter weather, coastal storms, extreme heat, flash floods, and events causing power outages, damage to structures, and/or significant amounts of debris. The four key weather emergency plans include the Winter Weather Emergency Plan, Coastal Storm Plan, Heat Emergency Plan, and Flash Flood Emergency Plan. Each plan:

- Describes a coordinated, flexible response to the hazardous weather event.
- Defines agency roles and responsibilities.
- Guides agencies through key decisions and actions to mitigate effects on people, critical infrastructure, and City operations
- NYCEM Watch Command tracks New York City weather conditions in real-time in conjunction with the National Weather Service, 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and disseminates related hazard information to agencies.
- When a weather emergency meets one or more of the forecast triggers, NYCEM convenes interagency steering committee conference calls to coordinate preparation for the event and activates relevant plans and operations.
- NYCEM activates the Emergency Operations Center (EOC), when necessary, to prepare for and respond to weather emergencies.
- NYCEM provides public messaging through Notify NYC, NYCEM's website, and the NYC Severe Weather website, as well as social media, emails and calls to elected officials, private and non-profit partners, and other means.
- When a weather emergency exhausts New York City's response resources, NYCEM will work
  with agencies to identify vendors that can provide appropriate resources or will request
  support from the state through the established mission request process.
- If conditions warrant, NYCEM may concurrently activate additional all-hazards and recovery plans and protocols.

Based on forecast triggers and interagency steering committee discussion, NYCEM may convene citywide coordination at one of the following levels:
