Abstract of Proceedings for the Week ending November 21, 1885.

SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 28, 1885.—SPECIAL MEETING—10 A. M.

On motion, the President was authorized to appoint a committee to confer with the Trustees of the American Museum of Natural History in relation to the matter.

The President appointed Commissioners Borden and Crimmins as such committee.

From the President of the New York Cancer Hospital, asking permission to connect said hospital with the sewer in Central Park, at One Hundred and Fifth street and Eighth avenue, for carrying off water only, until such time as a sewer is built in Eighth avenue. Granted.

From Thompson & Dollivar, acknowledging receipt of notice to remove their Lohengrin boats and other property from Central Park, and stating their readiness to comply with the same. Ordered filed.

From the Engineer of Construction:

1st. Reporting in relation to the approaches to the Metropolitan Museum of Art as affected by the proposed enlargement of said museum. Ordered filed.

2d. Reporting that, upon examining the foundations on the south side of the Art Museum Building, he had found that they are not likely to suffer from exposure during the coming winter, but that he would recommend that they be covered with boards to make them entirely secure.

The President was requested to ascertain from the Comptroller, whether the appropriation for the enlargement of the Metropolitan Museum of Art can be made available for the purpose of providing a covering for the exposed foundations during the coming winter, and, if so, to direct the Superintendent of Parks to proceed with the work.

3d. Reporting upon an application for a permit to gather botanical specimens in Central Park, and recommending that the same be denied. Adopted.

4th. Forwarding a bill of Dr. J. R. Stokes, amounting to \$45.50. for veterinary services rendered the Department without a Treasurer's order. Referred to the Treasurer.

5th. Reporting, in accordance with the preamble and resolution adopted on 18th inst., instructing him to furnish such information as he might be able to obtain respecting the disappearance of a quantity of stone from the east side of Conservatory lake, and submitting the evidence taken by him in the investigation of the matter.

The report of the Superintendent of Parks, together with the accompanying evidence, having been read and adopted, Commissioner Beekman offered the following:

Whereas, Commissioner Powers, at a regularly convened session of this Board, and upon his responsibility as a member thereof, did offer a resolution reciting that a large and valuable amount of cut stone belonging to the Department of Public Parks had disappeared, and calling for an investigation and report thereon by the Superintendent of Parks; and

Whereas, The Superintendent has made his report, from which it appears that the preamble containing said charge, and upon which said resolution was based, is utterly talse, and that after diligent inquiry, both of Commissioner Powers and elsewhere, he had been unable to discover the slightest evidence, information, intimation or rumor that there has been any misappropriation, misuse, or disappearance of said property or any other property of the Department; and

Whereas, Commissioner Powers did publicly offer said preamble and resolution in the presence of reporters of the press and with the obvious purpose of giving the same the widest publicity, and of conveying to the public the impression that there had been fraud or mismanagement in the administration of the Department or on the part of some one or more of the Commissioners, but when called upon by the President of the Department, in the proper performance of his duty in that regard, to supply information in aid of an inquiry, declined so to do, and has otherwise failed to show the slightest justification for his conduct; and

Whereas, Charges impeaching the integrity or good management of the business of a Governmental Department, publicly made by one holding a high office in that Department, receive ready credence with

Resolved, That Commissioner Powers be and he hereby is censured by this Board for his conduct in the premises. Adopted.

Commissioner Crimmins, to whom was referred the report of the Engineer of Construction, upon the application of James W. O'Grady for the remission of overtime on his contract for grading and paving the approaches to the Madison Avenue Bridge, presented a report recommending:

Ist. That instead of charging the penalty for overtime at the rate of \$10 per day, it be charged at the rate of \$3.50 per day, the amount of the Inspector's pay.

2d. That from the total amount of eighty-four and one-half days' overtime, an allowance of forty days be made, on account of delays and excessive work, and that the penalty for the remainder be charged against the contractor at \$3.50 per day. Adopted.

The matter of the examination and revision of the regulations of the police powers of the Department was referred to the Committee on Police.

The Counsel to the Corporation was requested to appear on behalf of this Department, before the Railroad Committee of the Board of Aldermen, and oppose the grant to any corporation or persons of the right to construct and maintain any railroad along any street or avenue bounding any of the Parks under the jurisdiction of this Department, or crossing Riverside avenue.

An assessment list for regulating, grading, setting curb and gutter stones flagging the sidewalks four feet wide, and laying crosswalks in One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, between the easterly curb-line of Boston Road and the westerly curb-line of Union avenue, also the statement of the amount and cost of the work therein mentioned, were approved and signed by the Commissioners of the Department, and transmitted to the Board of Assessors.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment was respectfully requested to transfer the sum of \$703.06 from the appropriation for Sprinkling Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, 1885, for which it is not required, to the appropriation for Maintenance of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, 1885, which is insufficient; also to authorize this Department to expend for the Maintenance of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, the sum of \$1,000, to be taken from the amount appropriated for Improvement of Riverdale avenue, for which purpose it will not be required. The President was authorized to grant a permit to Mrs. J. M. Davies for her sick child to ride a tricycle in Central Park, accompanied by an attendant.
