The Board of Health met this day.

Resolved, That cellar of premises No. 312 East Thirty-fourth street be paved instead of cemented.  
Resolved, That order on premises 211 Christie street be and is hereby suspended until May 1, 1880.

Resolved, That order on premises 67 Eldridge street be and is hereby suspended until March 1, 1880.

Resolved, That leave of absence from October 23d to November 3d, 1879, be and is hereby granted to Wm. L. Craig.

Resolved, That a copy of the report of Sanitary Inspector Viele upon the condition of premises bounded by Third and Fourth avenues, Sixty-sixth and Sixty-eighth streets, be forwarded to his Honor the Mayor, to the Comptroller, and to the Board of Education for the necessary action.

Resolved, That the Register of Records be and is hereby authorized and directed to make the following connection in the registry of births; Cecile R. Alix, born April 15, 1879, instead of Ceicile R. Olix, the same being a clerical error.

Resolved, That the Register of Records be and is hereby authorized and directed to make the following corrections in the register of deaths: Edward T. Oakley, died July 25, 1879, born in the

city of New York, instead of Pines Bluff, Arkansas, and resident of the City of New York about 30 years, instead of life, the same being a clerical error.

Resolved, That the premises hereinafter named having been, and being in the opinion of the Board and in fact in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health; and said Board having taken and filed among its records what it regards as being, and what is sufficient proof to authorize its declaration, that the same is a public nuisance, and dangerous to life and health; said Board does hereby enter the same on its records as a nuisance, and makes, in respect thereto, the following order, to wit:

Ordered, That the defective brick drain beneath the surface of the cellar of house at No. 3 East Forty-first street, New York, be removed, and said premises be connected with the street sewer by and through a proper iron pipe, with the joints well caulked with molten lead in lieu of said brick drain, the opening in surface of the cellar connecting with the sewer pipe be properly closed; the defective traps beneath the wash-basins be removed and proper traps be provided in lieu thereof; and the waste-pipes leading from said wash-basins, and the soil-pipe of water-closets be ventilated by extending the same in full calibre to a height of not less than two (2) feet above the roof of the building.

Resolved, That this order be served as the law requires, and that in case this order is not executed by the proper persons, the same be executed by the Sanitary Superintendent; and that its execution be not commenced by the said Sanitary Superintendent until the further order of this Board, of which further order no notice will be given to the parties interested.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 296) for light and ventilation of the tenement-house proposed to be built on the southwest corner of Avenue A and One Hundred and Twenty-first street, submitted to this Board under Laws 1867, chapter 908, and Laws 1879, chapter 504, by John Brandt, be and is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 297) for light and ventilation of the five tenement-houses, proposed to be built on the south side of Fifty-seventh street, 125 feet west of Ninth avenue, submitted to this Board under Laws 1867, chapter 908, and Laws 1879, chapter 504, by T. G. Smith, be and is hereby disapproved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 298) for light and ventilation of the tenement-house proposed to be built at No. 10 St. Mark's place, submitted to this Board under Laws 1867, chapter 908, and Laws 1879, chapter 504, by Jobst Hoffman—the said plan providing for a tenement-house 94 feet deep on a lot 120 feet deep—be and is hereby approved.

### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending October 18, 1879:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 2,119, as follows, viz.: 4 public buildings, 949 tenement-houses, 179 private dwellings, 74 other dwellings, 11 manufactories and workshops, 15 stores and warehouses, 70 stables, 28 slaughter-houses, 1 wool-pulling establishment, 2 lodging-houses, 1 lime kiln, 3 manure dumps, 1 garbage dump, 17 sunken and vacant lots, 65 yards, courts, and areas, 74 cellars and basements, 152 waste-pipes and drains, 303 privies and water-closets, 59 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 11 dangerous stairways, 3 smoky chimneys, 3 cesspools, 2 piggeries, 35 other nuisances, together with 57 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 1,061.

During the past week 158 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 94 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

170 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 47 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 43 houses, 43 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

### Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 563 births, 30 still-births, 185 marriages, and 415 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this bureau during the week ending Saturday, October 18, 1879. This shows an increase of 42 births, and a decrease of 14 still-births, 75 marriages and 78 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1878, there was an increase of 24 births, and 24 marriages, and a decrease of 10 still-births and 90 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased, 1; croup, 10; whooping cough, 4; typhoid fever, 2; malarial fevers, 4; puerperal diseases, 3; diarrhoeal diseases, 4; inanition, 3; alcoholism, 8; rheumatism and gout, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 8; pneumonia, 12; heart diseases, 4; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 10; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 7; premature and pretermatural births, 3; surgical operation, 1; while the deaths from diphtheria increased 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; cancer, 2; bronchitis, 7; meningitis and encephalitis, 2; convulsions, 1; apoplexy, 2; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 3; Bright's disease and nephritis, 6; cyanosis and atelectasis, 3; drowning, 1. The number of deaths from measles, hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, and suicide, was the same as that reported for the preceding week.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 125 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year; 162 under two years; 193 under five years, and 35 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was 34 less than the number reported during last week, and represent 46.51 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 89 were in institutions, 203 in tenement-houses, 114 in houses containing 3 families or less, 3 in hotels and boarding-houses, 4 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 6 were on the basement floor, 89 on the first, 104 on the second, 76 on the third, 36 on the fourth, 8 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth. 415 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 0 non-resident. 54 were stated to be single, 85 married, 43 widowed, and the condition of 233 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 415; still-births, 30; bodies in transitu, 28. Of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 47 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 553 births, 185 marriages, 30 still-births, 415 deaths, 47 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 32 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 2 transcripts of the birth record, 3 of marriage, and 27 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending October 18, 1879, was 66.7 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.032, the mean humidity was 72, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 475, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.02 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 400 deaths and still-births, or 89.89 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 3; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 194; City (pauper burial ground—undenominational), 57; Greenwood (undenominational), 19; Lutheran (undenominational), 57; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 12; Evergreen (undenominational), 17; Woodlawn (undenominational), 15; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 4; Union (Methodist Protestant), 3; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 4; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 3; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 6; Washington (undenominational), 6.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending October 11, 1879, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 8; Second, 0; Third, 2; Fourth, 8; Fifth, 13; Sixth, 13; Seventh, 20; Eighth, 10; Ninth, 23; Tenth, 19; Eleventh, 28; Twelfth, 42; Thirteenth, 12; Fourteenth, 15; Fifteenth, 6; Sixteenth, 15; Seventeenth, 20; Eighteenth, 28; Nineteenth, 60; Twentieth, 40; Twenty-first, 35; Twenty-second, 46; Twenty-third, 8; Twenty-fourth, 9.

The actual mortality for the week ending October 11, 1879, was 480; this is 17 less than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1878, and 11.6 less than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 22.66 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,101,570.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons living, of the estimated or enumerated population, according to the most recent weekly returns, of Philadelphia was 13.10; Brooklyn, 21.92; St. Louis, 10.6; Baltimore, 18.09; Boston, 19.11; Cleveland, 16.23; Cincinnati, 17.32; New Orleans, 21.54; Richmond, 10.40; Charleston, 19.15; Dayton, 16.86; Erie, 13; Lowell, 15.61; Worcester, 19.81; Cambridge, 18.72; Fall River, 19.30; Lynn, 12.06; Lawrence, 16.33; Springfield, 16.51. SIR—There were 415 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, October 18, 1879, which is a decrease of 78, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 94 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1878. The actual mortality for the week ending October 11, 1879, was 480, which is 11.6 below the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 22.66 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,101,570.
