DEAR SIR—In compliance with your instructions, I hand you herewith a report of the transactions of the Department of Sewers, Borough of Manhattan, for the quarter ending December 31, 1901.

2,882 linear feet of sewer and 3 basins connecting therewith have been built, making the present total length of the sewerage of this Borough 2,623,868 linear feet (496 $\frac{1}{10}$ miles), with 5,966 basins, which number includes 6 built under special contract, as hereinafter stated.

In the schedule accompanying this report you will find a detailed statement showing the status of the several contracts under charge of this Department.

908,275.86 linear feet, or 172.22 miles, in the regular combined system, according to filed District Drainage Maps for the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, west of the Bronx river, and 51,258.37 linear feet, or 9.708 miles, in the "Separate System" specially designed for the district east of the Bronx river (or Williamsbridge) previous to annexation.

24,627.02 linear feet, or 4.664 miles, of sewers were constructed during the quarter (exclusive of district east of Bronx river), being divided into 4,801.77 linear feet, or .909 miles, of brick sewer, and 19,825.25 linear feet, or 3.755 miles, of pipe sewers.

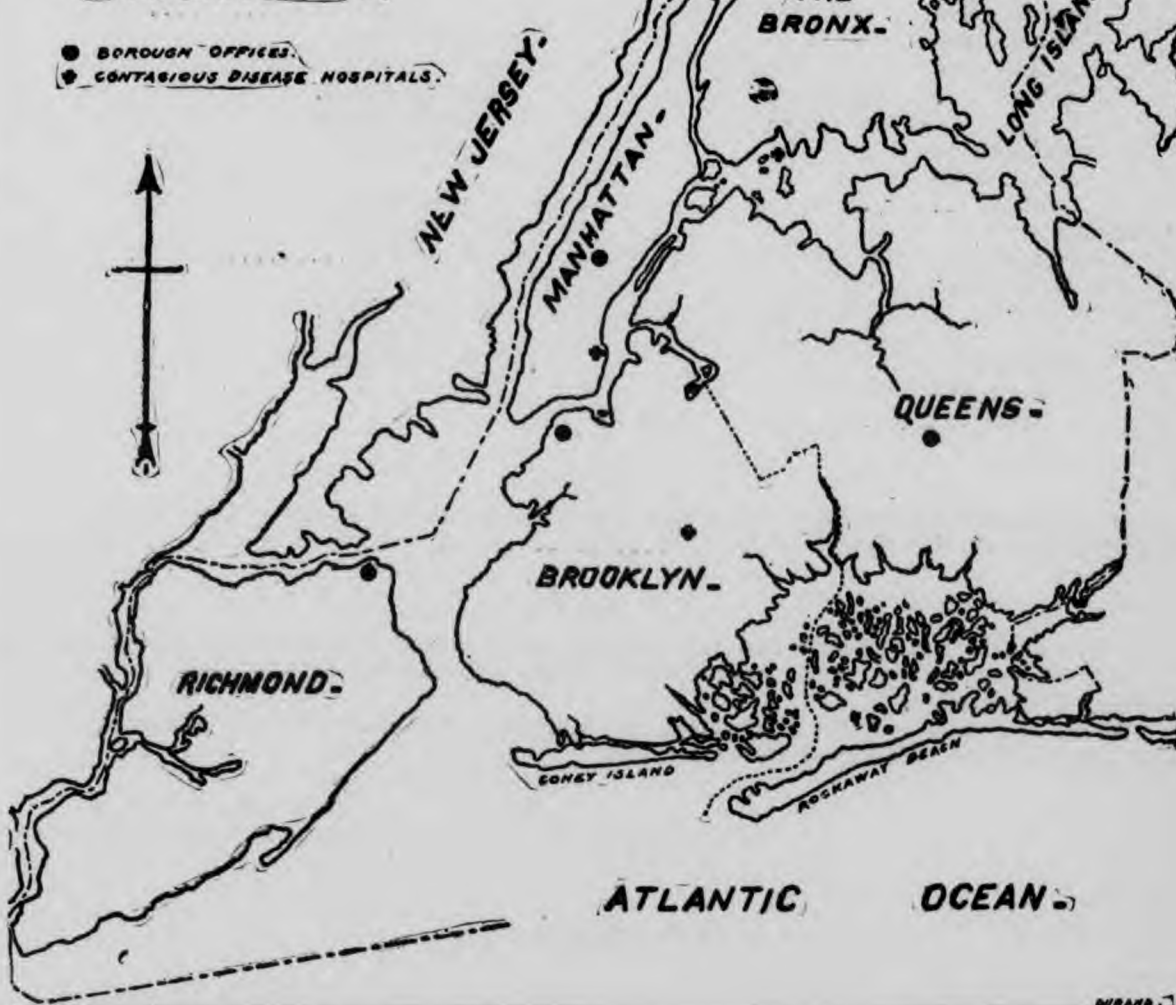

Mr. H. H. Sherman, attorney, representative of Mr. Kaufman, attorney, and Mr. W. H.
