### BOARD OF CITY RECORD.

City Hall, Monday, 2 p. m., February 3, 1902.

The Hons. Seth Low, Mayor; George L. Rives, Corporation Counsel, and Edward M. Grout, Comptroller, the officers designated by section 1526, chapter 466, Laws of 1901, met this day.

The minutes of the meeting of January 27, 1902, were approved as printed. The Supervisor submitted a report (X.I.) in reference to the list of officials and employees, published January 31, 1902, as a supplement to the "City Record," suggesting the publishing of a supplementary list of the employees who entered the service since December 31, 1901.

Dear Sir—I beg to advise you that Nathaniel S. Leipziger, No. 229 East Fifty-seventh street, New York, has successfully passed the non-competitive examination for the position of Advertising Expert and Examiner in your Department, with 87 per cent., and is eligible for appointment to the said position under the provisions of rule 34, for a period not exceeding one month.

By concurrent action of all the members of the Board the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That Nathaniel S. Leipziger, of No. 229 East Fifty-seventh street, New York, who has been duly certified by the Municipal Civil Service Commission as eligible for such position (under the provisions of rule 34), be and he hereby is appointed Advertising Expert and Examiner in the office of the Supervisor of the City Record; said appointment dating on and after January 30, 1902, for a period not exceeding one month, the rate of compensation for such service to be \$150 per month.

The Supervisor stated that he had sent the following letter to John Cassidy, in answer to a letter of protest received from the International Brotherhood of Book-Binders:

JOHN CASSIDY, Esq., No. 201 Fulton Street, New York City, Manhattan:

Dear Sir—We have received from the International Brotherhood of Book-Binders a notice that you are working in contravention of the Labor Laws of this State. Under this condition of things, it is impossible for you to do work for the City or to collect for work that you may have done under these conditions. We are, therefore, under the necessity of declining to put your office in competition with other book-binders, unless you can prove to us satisfactorily that the charge made against you is untrue. The Supervisor asked for instruction in the matter of printing the Annual Report of the Board of City Magistrates, required under the provisions of chapter 538, Laws of 1873.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he hereby is authorized to publish in the following newspapers an abstract of the advertisement now being published in the "City Record," inviting proposals for three million dollars of three and one-half per cent. Corporate Stock of The City of New York, bids to be opened on the 18th day of February, 1902.
