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## DEPARTMENT OF PARKS.

### Report for the Quarter ending September 30, 1904.

#### BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor:

Sir—I have the honor to transmit herewith quarterly report of the designs for improvement, work accomplished and finances of the Department of Parks, Borough of The Bronx, for the three months ending September 30, 1904.

#### Bronx Park.

On the bridge over the Bronx river, at the crossing of Bronx and Pelham parkway, the concrete arch is finished, the centering has been removed, and the filling is now being done on top of the arch. The stone arch has been spotted on the north side, and has been cut to the required line, so that the north side is now ready for the limestone parapet.

Plans have been prepared for an addition to the greenhouses in Bronx Park, but the work has not yet been started.

All paths and roads in this park were rescreened, rolled and sprinkled, and the gutters repaired and cleaned. A drain was built under Pelham parkway, and a path built on Pelham parkway south of Southern Boulevard.

The lawns were kept in good shape by frequent cutting of the grass; roads, walks and basins were cleaned; trees and shrubs were cultivated; washouts were refilled, and the skating and lily ponds repaired.

The department horses in the stables were cared for, and the wagons, carriages and sprinklers cleaned and kept in repair.

The Herbaceous Garden has been cultivated and seed sown for fall use.

#### Botanical Garden—

At the entrance to the Botanical Garden from Mosholu parkway the fourth abutment has been started, and the work is now progressing satisfactorily.

The two large and four small flights of steps, and two concrete-steel tanks, in the Botanical Garden have been completed and final estimate rendered.

The abutments of the five-arch stone bridge, just north of the Blue Bridge, have been completed; two small arches turned; one 32-foot arch completed. The wing walls on both ends are completed, and the parapet walls and coping are laid on the wing walls on each side.

#### Zoological Park—

The ostrich and small mammal house is very nearly completed.

The bird house is now inclosed and ready for the cages.

The iron fence around the seal pool has been completed, and final estimate rendered.

A contract has been let for the building of a pheasants' aviary. Lines have been given for the building, and ground has been broken.

#### Pelham Bay Park.

The athletic field was completed and formally opened to the public on September 10. The preparation of these grounds entailed an enormous amount of work. Weeds, brush and dead trees were removed, rock blasted, low land filled in and high ground leveled; several thousand feet of roads and paths laid out, and drains constructed. Tennis courts were prepared, nine holes were added to the golf links, and a one-mile steeplechase course laid out. In its present complete condition the athletic field can be considered one of the best in existence, and has been so adjudged by many visiting athletes.

In addition to the work of improvement, the existing lawns were kept in good form, bare places seeded and graded, and roads screened and rolled.

The oat and rye fields were cut; also all hay suitable for use was cut and stacked. A water-service line was carried from the main land across the mud flats to the Hunter House on Hunter Island.

A porch was added to the Hunter House to shelter those who make use of the athletic grounds.

Plans have been prepared for erecting a wooden bridge from the main land to Hunter Island. The present channel between Hunter Island and the main land is gradually filling with mud, because of the old causeway which does not allow the tides to flow freely through the channel. If this present condition should continue, it is feared that this island would be connected with the main land. Furthermore, this mud in the channel is very unsightly, and it is proposed to remove the old causeway to a depth of five feet below water, in the hope that the tide will wash the mud from the channel. In the future it is proposed to erect a permanent bridge at this place.

#### Crotona Parkway.

In the work of grading, paving and regulating this parkway the curb has been laid; all basins have been constructed, and the pipe is all laid with the exception of 200 feet. The asphalt sidewalk is all laid from the south end to One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street. The telford is all in from the Zoological Park entrance to One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, and the roadway is completely finished from the Zoological Park entrance to One Hundred and Eightieth street. Tree holes have been dug, and mould has been placed in the plantations throughout the entire parkway, and the job will probably be completed before the severe weather sets in.

#### Mosholu Parkway.

In the improvement of this parkway all drainage has been laid; nearly all of the excavating and filling has been completed, and a considerable portion of the roadway is ready to receive the telford. Down to this date four payments have been rendered, aggregating \$43,557.32.

#### McComb's Dam Park.

The filling in of the lowlands—the portion of this park lying east of the viaduct, and which is to be used as an athletic field—is progressing satisfactorily. The work was at a standstill for a long time, owing to lack of funds, but is now being rapidly pushed forward. Two scow-loads of ashes have been filled around the piles under the boat houses on the Harlem river.

#### Van Cortlandt Park.

On the work of alteration in the Tremper House the painting is about finished; the cement floor has been laid in the cellar; new plumbing has been installed, and the work will probably be completed within a few weeks.

A topographical survey of the Colonial Garden has been made, it being proposed to raise the Garden about three and one-half feet, so as to get above the water which is destroying the plants. It is also proposed to erect a granite fountain basin, granite steps and bridges, in place of the rubble fountain and rustic steps and bridges.

The entire Colonial Garden is to be remodeled on proper lines, and it is proposed to make it a show garden, its location in Van Cortlandt Park being such that it will probably be visited by many thousands of people during the summer season.

The nursery has been cultivated in a thorough manner.

The golf house and grounds have been kept in excellent condition, and a new bunker and sand hazard have been built. A new golf course, for beginners, is being laid out near Gun Hill road.

The lake has been drained off, and men are at present engaged in removing the sediment and weeds from the bottom.

At the stables the Department horses have been cared for, and wagons, sprinklers and carts kept in repair.

#### Franz Sigel Park.

Plans have been prepared for altering the comfort station in Franz Sigel Park. This building was erected about two years ago, and it is proposed to change the entire exterior, so as to make it more sightly and appropriate to the surroundings of the park.

#### St. Mary's Park.

By making extensive alterations in an old building formerly used as a tool-house in this park, a stable for horses, a shelter for carriages and wagons, space for a tool-room, a toilet for employees and other conveniences were obtained without much cost to the Department. Electric lights were installed, and this building now makes a first-class stable.

New roads and paths were made, leading to the stable.

#### Crotona Park.

Various roads and paths were completed, and the southeast portion of the park filled and graded, and tennis courts and baseball diamonds laid out thereon.

#### Claremont Park.

In this park, the regular work was carried on, consisting of cutting grass, weeding and cleaning gutters, rescreening roads and paths, cultivating shrubs and trees, and caring for the horses and carriages in the stables.

#### Washington Bridge Park.

Lawns, gutters and paths were kept in good condition, trees and shrubs cultivated and such minor improvements made as were necessary from time to time.

#### Fulton Park.

Grass was cut and lawns kept in good form, flower beds taken care of and gutters and walks cleaned.

#### Melrose Park.

Shrubs were cultivated and lawns and paths kept in proper condition.

#### Echo Park.

The work in this park consisted of cutting grass, cultivating shrubs and trees, repairing and cleaning paths and giving the necessary attention to flower beds.

#### Poe Park.

Grass was cut frequently, lawns were raked, tennis courts marked, paths and roads rescreened and rolled, and trees and shrubs cultivated. The road on the south side of the park was raised to grade, and is now passable in rainy weather.

#### St. James Park.

Fifty loads of steam ashes were deposited along the sidewalk on the Creston avenue side of the park. About 700 yards of fill was brought to the northerly portion of the park, and about 200 yards of top-soil distributed in low places, to prevent the formation of pools. A site for new comfort station was prepared by excavating for the foundation and digging a trench for drain-pipes. When the pipes had been laid, the trench was refilled and the surface rolled, seeded and sodded.

#### University Park.

Grass was cut, gutters and paths were cleaned and edged, and all trees and shrubs cultivated.

#### Rose Hill Park.

Flower-beds were maintained, grass was cut, trees and shrubs cultivated, and walks were kept in good condition.

#### Pelham Parkway.

Between Southern Boulevard and White Plains road the work consisted of cleaning the roadway, weeding the gutters and keeping them free from refuse, cutting grass, cleaning road-basins and culverts, repairing washouts, etc. Between White Plains road and Eastchester road, trap-rock and screenings were placed on the roadway and rolled down, the gutters were weeded and repaired and the roadway kept clean.



Between Eastchester road and the bridge crossing the tracks of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad, the roadway was completed for a distance of about five hundred feet, to a depth of 8 inches and over a space of 20 feet in width. A part of the roadway was torn up at the railroad crossing near Eastchester road, for the purpose of filling in the south side of the parkway, and this disturbed portion was afterwards restored. A large washout about 20 by 30 feet was repaired by filling with dirt and stone, covering with trap-rock and rolling same. The roadway east of the railroad bridge was also put in condition by covering a distance of about 75 feet in length and 20 in width with trap-rock and screenings to a depth of 8 inches, and rolling with steam-roller until firm.

#### Spuyten Duyvil Parkway.

On this parkway the roadway was repaired, the gutters were weeded and cleaned and culverts and drains repaired and cleaned.

Four hundred trees were planted along the parkway in holes dug to a depth of from five to six feet. In many instances soil had to be carted to replace that taken out, owing to its poor quality. The earth dug out was used in widening the north side of the drive, to permit of a four-foot sod border and eight-foot walk being made. This has been graded for a distance of one mile. While the work was in progress, about thirty lamp-posts had to be removed and replaced.

#### Miscellaneous.

The regular work of maintenance was carried on in the various small parks and squares, such as McKinley square, Franklin square, Dyer Park, and Horseshoe Park. The grass was cut frequently, papers removed from the lawns, flower-beds cared for, and paths and roads kept in first-class condition. All newly planted trees were pruned and cultivated.

The square at One Hundred and Eighty-third street and Arthur avenue was deeded to this Department, and the same has been seeded and a sod border laid around it.

Twenty-nine oval plots in the centre of Prospect avenue were graded and seeded, and low fences placed around them to prevent children from running over them until the grass has become strong.

The Chief Examiner stated that it had been the custom of the Examiners, who dictated to candidates for Stenographer and Typewriter, to hand in their marks at the close of each examination; that, upon receiving such time slips from the Examiners, he immediately handed them to his Stenographer to be filed in a metal case in his office; that, at the close of the series of examinations, these sheets had been taken from the case and given to Examiner Oppenheim in order that he might compute the percentages of the candidates in speed; that, when said work was completed by Examiner Oppenheim, it was discovered that the marks of thirteen candidates were missing; and, upon investigating the matter further, they were found to be thirteen candidates examined by Miss Upshaw. Miss Upshaw stated that the sheet was handed in promptly at the end of the examination, and neither she nor the Chief Examiner could explain in any way its loss. The Chief Examiner further stated that a new method of keeping such marks was under consideration, and, should the same be adopted, there would be no possibility of such a loss occurring in the future. The examiners then retired.  
 On motion, it was  
 Resolved, That the loss of the sheet containing the speed marks of thirteen applicants for Stenographer and Typewriter being due to an official error, for which the Commission is responsible, it being a hardship that these persons' names should be withheld from the eligible list, the Secretary be and is hereby instructed to proceed at once to re-examine in "dictation" the thirteen candidates, and to place their names upon the eligible list in the order determined by their ascertained percentages.



A letter was presented from the Labor Clerk, presenting affidavits to the effect that one Norman C. Bolton, Laborer in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, was performing the duties of a Foreman of Laborers.

On motion, the matter was referred to the President.

A letter was presented from the Labor Clerk, stating that he had withdrawn certification of the name of Samuel S. Cox, Foreman Paver, appointed in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx on October 11, and directed that he be dismissed from the service for the reason that he had made certain false statements in his application paper.

On motion, the action of the Labor Clerk was approved.

The Secretary presented the application of Walter B. Weaver, candidate for Patrolman, who stated in a former application that the date of his birth was 1877, while in his present application he sets forth the same as 1876. It appearing from the birth certificate furnished that 1876 is the correct date, on motion the application was accepted, and the Secretary was instructed to place his name on the eligible list in the place determined by his percentage.

The Secretary presented the affidavit of Louis Israel, candidate for Clerk, Tenement House Department, and Inspector of Tenements, stating that this is the first time he has applied for a position in the Municipal Civil Service, and that the applications on file in this office, bearing his name, had never been filed by him. In view of the statements contained in his affidavit, on motion, the applications were accepted.

The Secretary presented the request of Dr. Charles E. Pearson that his application for Coroner's Physician, presented after the closing date, be accepted.

On motion, the request was denied.

The Secretary presented the request of John P. Lange that his application for Clerk, Department of Taxes and Assessments, presented after the closing date, be received. The applicant presented a clipping from the "Sunday News" to the effect that applications would be received between September 6 and 16. It appearing that the same was not a regular advertisement of this Commission, but simply a news item, and that, therefore, the error was in no wise the fault of the Commission, on motion, the request was denied.

The Secretary presented the request of Adolph Salmon that he be permitted to change the answer to Question 4 in his application for Topographical Draughtsman, Assistant Engineer and Transitman and Computer.

On motion, the Secretary was instructed to request Mr. Salmon to call at this office to make the correction and reswear to his applications.

The President presented a report on the request of Dr. James P. Warbasse that better facilities be furnished the Medical Examiner for examining candidates for Fireman and Patrolman, recommending that the matter be laid over for the present.

On motion, the matter was left in the President's hands.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of Brooklyn, requesting approval of leave of absence for three months, without pay, granted Lewis J. Schaefer, Junior Clerk, because of illness.

On motion, the Secretary was instructed to inform the Commissioner that the leave of absence would be approved upon presentation of a doctor's certificate.

A letter was presented from the Department of Health, dated October 21, with further reference to their request for approval of leaves of absence granted James T. Gallagher, M. D., and B. Frankel, M. D., Medical Inspectors, which request was denied by the Commission at its meeting of the 15th inst. It appearing from the doctors' certificates transmitted by the Department that such leaves of absence were granted because of illness, on motion, the request was granted.

A letter was presented from J. Waldo Smith, Esq., Chief Engineer of the Aqueduct Commission, stating that the Department is in need of the services of a man qualified to operate the machinery of a pneumatic pumping plant. The Secretary stated that certification had been made from several lists, but that the Department had made no selection, and that one emergency appointment had been approved by the Commission under Rule XIX., paragraph 11, for five days.

On motion, the matter was laid over.

A letter was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Docks and Ferries, requesting approval of the reassignment to duty of Philip Scully, Dock-builder, who has been absent from duty since July 22 because of illness, and Timothy McCarthy, Watchman, who has not worked since August 2 because of illness.

On motion, the Secretary was instructed to inform Secretary Collins that these reassignments would be approved on presentation of doctors' certificates.

Letters were presented from the President of the Borough of Richmond, dated October 1, 7, 13 and 19, requesting approval of the emergency appointment of Warren G. Pearce as a Machinist (automobile repairist), under the provisions of Rule XIX., paragraph 11.

On motion, the matter was referred to the President.

A letter was presented from the Department of Health, dated October 19, requesting that the Commission exempt from examination, under the provisions of Rule XII., paragraph 6, physicians to render services in Baltimore, Philadelphia and Boston, such services being of an occasional and exceptional character.

On motion, the request was denied.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of Correction, dated October 6, stating that he has rescinded his action of September 28, 1904, in dismissing Samuel M. Crane, Clerk, on charges, and requesting the approval of the Commission to the same.

On motion, the request was granted.

The Secretary presented the following letter from the Fire Department:

"Borough of Manhattan, October 14, 1904.

"Hon. BIRD S. COLER, President, Municipal Civil Service Commission, No. 61 Elm street, New York City:

"Sir—Clause 2 of Rule XIII. of the Rules and Classification of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, as prescribed and established December 4, 1903, provides as follows:

"\* \* \* Leaves of absence without pay may be granted by an appointing officer \* \* \* where such absence does not exceed thirty days, or, in case of sickness, six months; but the Commission, in exceptional cases, the circumstances of which should be stated in its minutes and in its annual report, may extend such periods."

"Clerk James J. Carroll, of the Bureau of Combustibles, until stricken with brain trouble about two years since, had served the Department faithfully for seventeen years. He has for several months been in a sanitarium undergoing treatment and his recovery is not at all likely. During the entire period of his connection with the Department he has been a member of the New York Fire Department Life Insurance Fund (see section 792, the Greater New York Charter), paying into its treasury, by way of assessments, several hundred dollars, and if he were to be dropped from the rolls prior to his death his family, which is in destitute circumstances, would forfeit all claim to the payment of the sum of \$1,000, which would otherwise accrue to them from said fund.

"Carroll has been absent without pay since February 15, 1903, with the acquiescence of my predecessor and myself, although no formal written leave was granted him.

"In a communication from the Secretary of your Commission, dated the 29th ult., that officer stated that he would pass the roll of the Bureau of Combustibles, boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, for the month of September, 1904, but that before passing another roll it would be necessary to make the application now made to your Honorable Commission.

"I have therefore the honor to request, under the peculiar circumstances of the case, that Mr. Carroll be allowed a further leave of absence for six months from October 1, 1904.

In view of the statements contained in the letter of the Commissioner, on motion, the request was granted.

A letter was presented from Charlotte E. Coffin, making formal application to be examined for the position of Assistant Secretary.

On motion, the matter was referred to the Secretary for a reply to the letter.

The Secretary presented the request of Thomas D. Ryan, that he be allowed to file an application for the position of Clerk, Department of Taxes and Assessments, he having written for an application within the prescribed dates, but his letter never having reached this office.

On motion, the request was denied.

A letter was presented from John A. Connolly, Jr., requesting that the examination taken by him in February, 1903, for promotion to the position of second grade clerk be construed to qualify him also for the position of fourth grade clerk. The letter having been referred to the Chief Examiner for report and marked "approved," on motion, the Secretary was instructed to communicate with the Chief Examiner and ask him to inform the Commission further on the subject, giving reasons for his recommendation.

A letter was presented from Peter I. Wright, making affidavit that he has changed his address from the Borough of Brooklyn to the Borough of Queens, and requesting that his name be transferred from the eligible list for Court Stenographer, Brooklyn, to that for Court Stenographer, Queens.

On motion, the matter was referred to the President.

On motion, the request of William Peterson for a physical re-examination for the position of Cleaner was granted.

The Secretary presented communications from a number of City Departments in which temporary Clerks were employed, stating that the services of such persons had been satisfactory, and requesting that their names be placed on the preferred list for temporary Clerk, in accordance with the provisions of Rule XII., paragraph 2.

On motion, the request was granted, and the Secretary was instructed to restore the names of temporary Clerks, at the termination of their temporary employment, in all cases where services rendered have been satisfactory, to the preferred list, in accordance with the percentages received in the original examination.

The Secretary presented the applications of Francis William Miller and Albert L. Brown, candidates for the position of Messenger, with the statement that these persons have been granted permission to enter the examination, subject to the receipt of their applications by the Commission.

It appearing that the applications had been rejected for a misstatement in answer to Question 10, and that the candidates have since presented affidavits explaining such misstatements, on motion, the applications were accepted, and the Secretary was instructed to place their names on the eligible list in the order determined by their percentage.

On motion, the requests of Nicholas Coddington, James F. Farrell and Christopher Dooley, for a physical re-examination for the position of Watchman were granted, and the Secretary was instructed to admit them to the mental examination on a conditional notice.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the salary of Mabel L. Bethel, Stenographer and Typewriter in the office of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of \$1,800 per annum, to take effect November 1, 1904.

The Commission then adjourned, to meet on Wednesday, October 26, at 4 P. M.

## BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

The City of New York, November 23, 1904.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held at 12 o'clock M., at the office of the Mayor.

Present—The Acting Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The minutes of the meeting held November 17, 1904, were dispensed with.

The Committee on Armories for Manhattan and The Bronx reported verbally in relation to the proposed lighting and heating plant for the Seventh Regiment armory.

After discussion, the matter was referred to the President of the Board of Aldermen for consideration.

The Committee on Armories for Manhattan and The Bronx, to which was referred the matter of alterations and improvements to the Colonel's room in the Twenty-second Regiment armory, reported verbally, and, after discussion, the matter was referred to the President of the Board of Aldermen.

The Committee on Armories for Brooklyn and Queens, to which was referred the application of Messrs. Lord & Hewlett, architects, for Inspectors of steel work on the armory building of the Second Battalion Naval Militia, reported verbally against the employment of such Inspectors, in addition to the inspection required by the architects, and offered the following preamble and resolution:

Whereas, The Armory Board has heretofore considered the provisions made in their contracts with architects for the inspection and certification of work and materials in the construction of armories were complete and sufficient for the protection of the City's interests; and that, notwithstanding a provision is made in the contract by which additional inspection may be secured, the Armory Board has not considered such additional inspection necessary; therefore be it

Resolved, That it is the sense of the Armory Board that the inspection of the work of constructing the armory building for the Second Battalion Naval Militia is fully provided for in the architects' contract, for their inspection and approval of quantities and qualities of materials furnished and placed in position.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Acting Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Secretary presented, for the action of the Board, the following applications for payments, which were laid over at the last meeting, viz:

By John Kennedy & Son, of date October 6, 1904, on account of work done at Troop "C" armory, \$20,098.25, and of date November 6, 1904, \$15,045.

By Pilcher, Thomas & Tachau, architects, for professional services in connection with Troop "C" armory, of date October 17, 1904, \$502.45, and November 7, 1904, \$376.13.

The Acting Mayor offered the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to pay to John Kennedy & Son, contractors, the sum of twenty thousand and ninety-eight dollars and twenty-five cents (\$20,098.25), as per accompanying voucher, on account of their contract for the erection and completion of an armory for Troop "C," N. The following permits were granted:

September 23. Mott Haven Canal Docks Company—  
To dredge at Ryder avenue, near One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, Mott Haven canal, Borough of The Bronx.

September 23. Robert C. Fisher & Co.—  
To drive fender piles in front of the bulkhead between One Hundred and Thirty-ninth and One Hundred and Fortieth streets, East river, Borough of The Bronx.

To open the granite pavement at the approach to the West Thirty-first and West Thirty-third Street Piers, North river, for the purpose of laying water pipes thereat, the pavement to be restored to proper condition by this Department at the cost of said company.

September 24. F. H. Chapman—

To dredge in the slip on the easterly side of Pier 3, East river.

September 27. Southern Pacific Company—

To extend the second story of the present offices at the inshore end of Pier, new 25, North river, a distance of about 33 feet westerly, the work to be done in accordance with plans submitted as amended, it being understood that any addition or improvement made under this permit will revert to and become the property of the City on the expiration or termination of the lease of the Pier.

September 29. Washburn Wire Company—

To repair the bulkhead platform between One Hundred and Seventeenth and One Hundred and Eighteenth street, Harlem river, and to drive fender piles thereat, the work to be kept within existing lines, it being understood that the granting of this permit will not in any way affect or change the terms of the permit under which the platform was originally constructed.

September 29. Arbuckle Brothers—

To dredge in the slip at the foot of Bridge street, Brooklyn.

September 29. Fire Department—

To berth the fireboat "Abram S. Hewitt" temporarily in the oyster basin at the foot of Bloomfield street, North river, during the progress of repairs to the boat, the permit to continue for a period not longer than ten days.

September 29. Edward J. Chapman—

To place catamaran and weighing scales on the East Twenty-eighth Street Pier, East river, to be used in connection with the unloading and distributing of coal to the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, the same to remain only during the pleasure of the Commissioner.

September 29. New Jersey Steamboat Company—

To berth the steamers "C. W. Morse" and "Adirondack" at the outer ends of the north and south sides of the West Fiftieth Street Pier, North river, during the ensuing winter season, to commence upon the closing of the pier for recreation purposes, rental to be at the rate of \$5 per day for each berth, payable monthly at the end of each month to the Cashier.

On September 27 the permit granted April 26, 1904, to the New York and New Jersey Steamboat Company for berthing the steamer "Holmdel" at the outer end of the south side of Canal Street Pier 33, North river, was amended by making the rental \$5 per day therefor, payable at the end of each week to the Cashier, instead of to the Dock Master of the district.

THE FOLLOWING REGULATIONS FOR STANDPIPE (FIRE LINE) WORK IN BUILDINGS OF CERTAIN CLASSES, REQUIRED UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF SECTION 762, CHAPTER 378, OF THE LAWS OF 1897, AS AMENDED BY CHAPTER 466 OF THE LAWS OF 1901; AND SECTIONS 102 AND 109 OF THE BUILDING CODE, ARE HEREBY APPROVED AND ESTABLISHED, TO TAKE EFFECT IMMEDIATELY.

**REGULATIONS FOR INSTALLATION OF  
STANDPIPES (FIRE LINES).**

STANDPIPES WILL BE REQUIRED IN all buildings exceeding 100 feet in height, erected prior to December 25, 1899, and in all buildings exceeding 85 feet in height erected since same date.

Such buildings as come within above classification, and which do not exceed 150 feet in height, in which standpipes (fire lines) now installed are less than three inches in diameter, must be provided with lines four inches in diameter, and in such buildings as exceed 150 feet in height the fire line must be six inches in diameter, unless the lines already installed are considered satisfactory and approved by the Fire Department.

These standpipes must be of wrought iron or steel of sufficient strength to withstand the necessary pressure (in no case less than 300 pounds to the square inch) to force adequate streams of water to any of the floors of the building, or to the roof, and must extend from cellar to roof and be connected with outside two-way three-inch standard Fire Department connections, with clapper valves and proper caps, placed on street front of buildings, above curb level, in a position accessible for use of Fire Department and arranged so that the clapper valves will hang properly. These standpipes must be provided with proper valves (gate valves preferred) and 2½-inch outlets of the regular Fire Department pattern and thread on each floor level, with sufficient standard 2½-inch hose and nozzles attached thereto to properly cover entire floor area, arranged on proper and approved racks or reels, with approved open or controlling nozzles. Proper check valves shall be placed in top and bottom of such lines as are required to use tank or pump supply, or both. The hose outlets and hose must be located within stairway inclosures, except where impracticable to do so for reasons satisfactory to the department.

Where more than one standpipe is installed, cross connections, preferably in basement, of same size as main risers, with proper gate and check valves, must be provided.

In all buildings over 150 feet in height and in such buildings as come within these regulations as to height and are occupied for living purposes, such as hotels, hospitals, asylums, etc., also in theatres, the standpipe line must have approved tank or pump supply, or both.

Tanks—Bottom of gravity tanks must be elevated at least 20 feet above highest hose outlet, provided with separate feed supply, and such tanks shall be of not less than 3,500 gallons capacity. If used for domestic purposes, feed lines must be properly arranged to insure constant supply.

Pressure tank supply system or direct supply from street mains will be permitted in some cases if circumstances warrant and pressures are adequate.

All wrought iron and steel pipes must be equal in quality to standard.

All joints must be screwed joints, made up with red lead, and be thoroughly water tight.

All standpipes must rest on brick pier foundations or on heavy iron hangers suspended from floor beams at the discretion of officer in charge of bureau.

Horizontal supply lines must be supported by heavy iron hangers from floor beams at intervals of not more than ten feet, and vertical main lines, properly stayed, at each floor level; all to be securely braced to withstand vibration.

The arrangement of lines must be straight and as direct as possible. Offsets will be permitted only when unavoidable and bends must be of a radius not less than five diameters of pipe.

All pipes and connections must be readily accessible for inspection and repairing.

Drawings, showing location, sizes and connections, with duplicate descriptions, must be furnished to the Bureau of Violations and Auxiliary Fire appliances for all fire-line, or standpipe work.

These drawings must be to scale, and shall consist of such floor plans and sections as may be necessary to show clearly all such work to be done, and must show all partitions, stairway inclosures and elevator shafts.

Prints will be accepted.

The said fire line, or standpipe work, shall not be commenced, or proceeded with, until said drawings and descriptions, in detail, shall have been filed and approved by the officer in charge of the Bureau. No modifications of the approved drawings and descriptions will be permitted unless amended drawings and duplicate descriptions covering the proposed change or changes are filed, and approved by the officer in charge of the Bureau.



Any doubt as to the meaning of these regulations, or any obscurity as to the wording of them, will be explained by the officer in charge of the Bureau, on application in writing, and all directions and explanations requisite, proper or necessary to complete or make more definite any of the provisions of said regulations and give them due effect will be given by the officer in charge of the Bureau, and his decision, unless modified, changed or disapproved by the Fire Commissioner, in writing, will be considered final in any dispute that may arise concerning the meaning of any clause of these regulations, or the detail of any plan.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him herein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
