AN ORDINANCE fixing the office hours of all public offices in The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Section 1 of an ordinance adopted by the Board of Aldermen, April 22, 1902, and approved by the Mayor April 29, 1902, is hereby amended by adding thereto the words following: "Provided, however, that during the months of July and August all public offices in The City of New York, except as otherwise provided, shall be closed at 3 o'clock p. m., except on Saturdays, when such offices shall be closed at 12 o'clock noon, and further provided that the heads of all Departments may, when public business requires it, keep the said offices open after 3 o'clock."

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

BRIDGES OVER THE EAST RIVER.				
No. 1—Brooklyn Bridge.				
The partial reconstruction of the Manhattan terminal of the bridge railway was completed in February. The new platforms and lengthened switching tracks afford the railway company opportunity to operate freely five-car through elevated railway trains at all hours of the day and night, except the week-day morning and evening rush hours, and permits distribution of passenger traffic over greater platform area. Train service was maintained during the quarter free from serious accident or long delays.				
An unusually large number of delays to surface car travel has resulted from the defective condition of the surface car tracks on the bridge roadways. Necessary repairs thereto have frequently been only partially completed, or deferred, because of public complaint regarding the suspension of surface car service while such repairs were in progress. The railway company has ordered material for a substantial renewal of these tracks, which, when completed, should remove, for a long period, cause for delays.				
Early in January the Police force detailed to the Brooklyn Bridge was augmented by additional officers and patrolmen, and a successful effort made to control and curb the tendency to overcrowding and disorder prevalent at the Bridge terminals during the busy hours of the morning and evening.				
To relieve the overcrowded entrance to the Subway, at Park Row, a passageway under the lower loop surface car terminal is in process of construction.

No. 2—Williamsburg Bridge.				
Construction.				
Toll Houses—Four (4) new toll houses have been placed in position, and have given entire satisfaction. They harmonize well with the general architectural features of the structure.				
Police Shelters—Thirty (30) police shelters have been placed on the bridge at the various posts. All the wooden shelters heretofore used by the Patrolmen being removed from the structure.				
Added Trolley Slips—The construction of the added trolley slips, at the Manhattan end of the Williamsburg Bridge, to provide additional platform space and slips for the cars of the Brooklyn Heights Railroad Company, was commenced on March 28, and is being hastened to completion.				
Manhattan Subway Station—The work of planning the proposed subway station in Manhattan is about completed, and the contract for this construction should be let in the near future. All the plans for the alteration of the bridge structure itself, necessary in order to permit access to this subway station, are completed, and a contract for this work will be let before the end of the spring. The plans for the necessary elevated railway structure on the Brooklyn plaza, connecting the bridge elevated rail-				

way tracks with the elevated railway structure of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit System on Broadway, are being made, and a contract for this work will be let early in the coming summer.

Maintenance.

Electric Lighting.—The construction of the intake chamber for supplying water to the condenser pumps has been completed, and the engines are at present running condensing. The supply of steam at present obtainable from the incinerating plant is not sufficient to develop the full engine capacity of the lighting station, but it is understood that the Street Cleaning Department has taken steps to obtain more boilers.

The permanent wiring for the lighting of the main span, approaches and Brooklyn plaza has been put in place, the lighting load being gradually shifted from the Edison Company's service to the bridge station, until at present the entire structure is being lighted by the plant. The ornamental electroliers on the main towers were lighted for the first time Saturday, February 23, and are extinguished at 2 a. m.

Railroads.—The cars of the Tompkins avenue line commenced crossing the bridge on February 1 of this year.

The work of making the trolley road beds safe for passengers who may be obliged to alight from the cars on the structure, from fire and other causes, is being carried on as rapidly as possible.

The pipe railing on the inside of the south trolley tracks is practically completed, and arrangements have been made to floor over the ties, also to erect a railing on the inner side of the New York City Railway Company's tracks. Openings in the railing between the roadway and the trolley tracks will be provided about 200 feet apart on the structure, to facilitate the passengers reaching the roadway in case of a blockade.

Inspection.—A schedule for the inspection of the sub and superstructure has been adopted, which is yielding satisfactory results.

No. 4—Manhattan Bridge.

Office Work.

The office force has been engaged on work in connection with Manhattan Bridge construction. The computations of negative moments and shears in the trusses of suspended spans and the diagrams of the same are now completed.

Field Work.

Brooklyn Side.—In connection with the Brooklyn anchorage contract, work has been continued during the favorable weather of this quarter, laying masonry of various classes and backfilling around the anchorage. At the beginning of this year there had been laid about 34,100 cubic yards of No. 1 concrete and cyclopean masonry and about 520 cubic yards of granite face masonry. At this date there have been laid 43,700 cubic yards of cyclopean masonry and No. 1 concrete and about 1,830 cubic yards of granite face masonry. Some delay to the work has occurred through the winter months on account of inability of contractor to obtain materials of construction and on account of unfavorable weather. The contract is now about 39 per cent. completed.

Manhattan Side.—In connection with the anchorage contract, work has continued on the sheet piling, excavation, bearing piles and laying various classes of masonry.

The sheet piling to enclose the anchorage foundation was completed about the end of January. The excavation to a level where satisfactory foundation is secured is completed except in a small area at the southeasterly corner of anchorage where there remain about 165 bearing piles to be driven and a small amount of excavation to be done. In the rear section of anchorage back of the main archway the concrete and cyclopean masonry foundation has been laid to about elevation +13.8 feet, and the granite face masonry has been laid at the back on courses "C," "D" and "E." In the front section of anchorage, on the easterly side, where the piling is completed and satisfactory foundation has been reached, concreting was begun the 21st day of March, and has continued at intervals since, when there have been materials of construction on hand. To date there have been placed about 9,160 cubic yards of concrete and cyclopean masonry and about 144 cubic yards of granite face masonry. The contract is now about 23½ per cent. completed.

No. 4—Blackwells Island Bridge.

Steel Superstructure.

Drawings.—During the quarter the contractor for the steel superstructure has submitted about 400 drawings and strain sheets. These drawings have been checked, and 249 have received final approval, 51 preliminary approval, 26 have been marked for corrections.

Strain Sheets.—All of the stress sheets have been approved except two. These two are held on account of possible changes in the material of the bottom chords and end posts at Manhattan and Queens anchor piers.

Manufacture.—A total of 38,025 tons of 73 per cent. of the material has been inspected and accepted at the mills. The average rate of speed necessary to complete the work within the specified time has been maintained in the shops, and a large amount of finished material is stored at Steelton and Pottstown.

Strike.—Owing to a strike of the Bridgemen, only about 150 tons of steel castings, 150 tons of nickel steel eye-bars and pins, and no structural steel was delivered at the bridge site. The men struck on January 2, 1906, and the strike is still on, but conditions look favorable for an early settlement of differences.

Erection.—No material has been erected during the last three months. The contractor has in his employ six detectives to watch the erected work and the plant on the island.

The contractor has completed his lay out and plans for the erection of the Manhattan and Queens anchor arms. The building of a dock in Queens has been let, and work on this will be started soon.

The land needed for the erection of the Manhattan anchor arm has been cleared by the removal of the houses east of the anchor pier. This work was done under the supervision of the Finance Department.

Masonry.

Anchor piers.—Work on the anchor piers is progressing slowly. The granite masonry of the south tower of the Manhattan anchor pier was completed March 27, 1906; the granite masonry of the north tower is about 80 per cent. complete. The contractor is laying the inner enameled brick lining. The work on the anchor piers is about 94 per cent. complete.

Piers.—860 cubic yards of granite have been delivered for the attics of piers 2 and 3—of this, 483 cubic yards have been cut. No granite has been received for the attics of piers 1 and 4. Laying masonry for the attics cannot be started until after the steel work is in place.

Elevated towers.—Owing to probable change in the design, work on the elevator shafts of piers 2 and 3 and the power houses on Blackwell's Island cannot be started.

Approaches.

Detail plans for the steel work of the Queens approach are about three-quarters completed; calculations are being made for the steel and masonry parts of the approach in Manhattan. The design is being worked out with the assistance of the consulting architect.

BRIDGES OVER THE HARLEM RIVER AND IN THE BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

Maintenance.

No. 1. Willis Avenue Bridge.—No repairs of great consequence have been required during the quarter. Railings which have been damaged by collision with vessels have been put in order, the main exhaust pipe altered so it will not drip on the centre pier, and new and heavier latches put on the gates.

The cost of removing snow during the quarter, in addition to our usual force of men and horses, was \$901.50.

No. 3. Third Avenue Bridge.—Painting the structure, which was begun early in the last quarter, has been continued, and is now practically finished. The work of rewiring the bridge for electric lighting, which was also begun during the last quarter, has been continued, and the structure is now completely rewired, including new submarine cables to both shores, and it is now in this respect in better condition than it has ever been. A timber fender has been built against the Manhattan rest pier, to protect the cables, and one is now building against the Bronx pier.

The ornamental tops of the electric light poles have been removed, and new ones of a better pattern put in their places.

The cost of removing snow during the quarter was \$603.

No. 4. Madison Avenue Bridge.—The inside of the engine room and the roof and smoke stack have been painted; also some railing repaired.

The cost of removing snow during the quarter was \$36.

No. 5. One Hundred and Forty-fifth Street Bridge.—Fenders of timber have been built against the rest piers to protect the submarine cables where they are likely to be damaged by boats and ice.

The cost of removing snow during the quarter was \$367.25.

No. 6. Macomb's Dam Bridge.—Nothing of moment has occurred on this bridge, except the breaking of a spur gear in the turning engine. Temporary repairs were promptly made and a new gear procured and put in place a few days afterward. No openings were seriously delayed by the accident.

The cost of removing snow during the quarter was \$4.

On the bridges not specifically mentioned, nothing has been done but the usual routine maintenance.

To provide against probable strike of coal miners and consequent scarcity of coal, 700 tons of coal have been stored in bins under Third Avenue Bridge, for distribution as required.

Construction.

No. 1. Willis Avenue Bridge.—As noted in the last quarterly report, the Southern Boulevard approach was opened to the public November 15, 1905, and during this quarter the two stairways at the corners of Willis avenue have been completed and opened.

No. 4. Madison Avenue Bridge.—The contract and specifications for the temporary bridge have been prepared, and it should be possible to advertise for bids in the near future.

No. 7. New York and Putnam.—Work on plans for new approaches to the sidewalk of the railroad bridge has progressed, and it will soon be possible to present them to the railroad company and to the Park Department, whose co-operation is necessary.

No. 9. University Heights Bridge.—Very little work has been done by the contractor during the quarter on account of the difficulty he has experienced in getting supplies of stone, gravel and sand.

No. 10. Ship Canal Bridge.—The situation is the same as formerly reported, except that the stone newel posts have been rebuilt, and granite copings laid on the abutment walls, and the new span now building at Two Hundred and Eighteenth street has been nearly completed.

Henry Hudson Memorial.—An appropriation of \$1,000,000 for beginning work was made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment December 12, 1905; the ordinance passed by the Board of Aldermen February 14, 1906, and approved by the Mayor, February 21, 1906. Preliminary office work is in progress.

BRIDGES IN THE BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

Maintenance and Repairs.

One Hundred and Thirty-fifth Street Bridge over Mott Haven Canal.—No repairs of importance were necessary during the quarter, but the upper course of planking on the deck will shortly be renewed. Incandescent lamps were installed to light the machinery and tail pocket under the street roadway.

An electric winch to warp vessels past the draw was put in operation on March 26. It has been in use for a short time, and its effect in reducing the long delays suffered by street traffic on account of the concentration of canal travel at the times of high water is marked.

Westchester Avenue Temporary Bridge.—The old draw span has been out of use for nearly a year, but has not been dismantled or removed. It may safely be left in its present location until it is needed elsewhere.

Westchester Avenue Permanent Bridge.—This bridge was maintained in good order without much expense. During the quarter the grading of Westchester avenue, from the Bronx river to Westchester Village, was completed, and street traffic that had been diverted from this thoroughfare for over a year was resumed near the end of February. As soon as the street roadway is paved this bridge will probably be the busiest crossing in the borough.

A few changes in the electric equipment will be made when the street railway company lays track on the bridge.

Unionport Bridge.—The roadway planking was repaired, but no extensive renewals were necessary.

Pelham Bridge.—A few repairs were made to the deck. This bridge is on the main highway to New England, and on Saturdays and Sundays is often taxed to its full capacity by automobiles and pleasure vehicles.

City Island Bridge.—No repairs of importance were made. Part of the macadam pavement on the west approach was renewed.

Eastchester Bridge.—This old draw bridge was patched and repaired during the quarter.

BRIDGES PROJECTED OR UNDER CONSTRUCTION.

Pelham Bridge.

The condition of work on the contract for the foundations, piers and abutments at the beginning of the quarter was as follows:

Abutment 1—Finished.

Pier 2—Finished.

Pier 3—Finished.

Pier 4—Foundation finished and the pier built up to the elevation 1.0 above mean high water.

Pier 5—Condition same as noted for Pier 4.

Pier 6—Finished.

Pier 7—Finished.

Abutment 8—Foundation finished and the abutment built up to the elevation 1.0 above mean high water.

The principal operations during the quarter were building the struts under the channel between piers 4 and 5, building the skew backs and setting the ends of the arch ribs and anchors on piers 4, 5 and abutment 8, pointing the finished piers and removing the upper section of the coffer dams. Part of the plant was dismantled and removed.

Office work included the preparation of plans and specifications for the contract for the superstructure and approaches, preliminary estimates of the cost of finishing the bridge and considerable work on the final estimate for the present contract.

Unionport Bridge.

Preliminary studies for a new bridge to replace the existing structure are being made.

Eastchester Bridge.

Surveys have been made by the President of the Borough of The Bronx preparatory to letting contracts for the grading of Boston post road, from Bronx Park to the city line. When this work is finished this old thoroughfare will be the main highway to eastern Westchester County and New England. It now crosses Hutchinson river about 500 yards south of the city limits by means of an old iron pony draw span that will be inadequate if traffic increases to any great extent.

BRIDGES OVER NEWTOWN CREEK AND IN THE BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

Bridges Over Newtown Creek.

No. 1. Vernon Avenue Bridge (Construction)—The contract for the construction of this bridge was completed on March 20, 1906, by the removal of the temporary bridge and the dredging of Newtown creek at the site of this bridge.

The traffic at this bridge continues to increase owing to the great improvement in the service, especially in the matter of time saved in operation of the draw span with the consequent lessening of the delay to traffic. A comparative table of boats passing, the number of openings and delay to traffic over bridge, at the temporary bridge, for January, February and March, 1905, and at the new Vernon Avenue Bridge for the corresponding months of 1906 is interesting:

The roadway of Manhattan avenue, from Ash street to the creek, has been repaved as far as the old blocks would go, and there remain about 1,500 square yards of the avenue unpaved. It is expected to let a contract for this work during the summer.

No. 2. Greenpoint Avenue Bridge—The roadway planking has been renewed by the Brooklyn Heights Railroad Company, and our force of carpenters has renewed the hatches over the operating machinery. This bridge is in good condition.

No. 3. Meeker Avenue Bridge—End panel of bottom chord damaged by vessel has been straightened. Additional bolts to support motor have been put in place and the matter of "speeding up" the motor is under consideration.

The three-inch wood block pavement laid by this Department in September, 1903, is in first-class condition, and has required no attention since its laying.

No. 4. Grand Street Bridge—The power operating shaft, with one of its bearings, was broken on February 28, while the drawspan was being opened in the face of a very strong wind.

Vehicle, car and water traffic were delayed 17½ hours; there was no interruption to pedestrian traffic. Bridge was operated by hand power from March 1 to March 9, while work of repair was in progress.

No. 5. Metropolitan Avenue Bridge—One section of hand railing repaired during quarter. This timber trestle is in good condition.

Bridges in the Borough of Queens.

No. 6. Borden Avenue Bridge—Roadway planking renewed in places. This structure is not in good condition, and a contract for a new bridge at this site will be let shortly.

No. 7. Flushing Bridge (Construction)—The east rest pier has been completed to the bridge seat and coping course. The bolsters with track girders and rack frames have been placed in position.

The west rest pier cofferdam has been built, the concrete below limestone masonry has been placed in position and the first course of limestone with its concrete backing has been laid. The anchors for west leaf have been concreted in place and the anchor rods at bolsters set.

The south concrete wall of west approach has been completed. Rip rap has been deposited in front of west abutment and the filling back of walls removed to permit of work of reinforcement.

The counterweight for movable span has been delivered, which will permit of the erection of the movable span, as all the structural material required is on the ground.

No. 7. Temporary Bridge at Flushing—Railing post damaged by automobile repaired. No further work done during quarter.

No. 8. Strong's Causeway Bridge—Renewed bearing plates on rest piers and lattice bars on struts between these piers.

Bridge is in fair condition.

No. 9. Little Neck Bridge—No repairs required during quarter.

No. 10. Hunter's Point Avenue Bridge—On account of the proposed development of Dutch Kills, above Hunter's Point Avenue, this bridge, which had been maintained by the Borough President of Queens as a bridge over unnavigable water, has passed to the jurisdiction of this Department, and on January 25 was opened by this Department for the first time for navigation purposes.

BRIDGES IN THE BOROUGHS OF BROOKLYN AND RICHMOND.

Borough of Brooklyn.

Hamilton Avenue Bridge—The construction of the concrete operators' houses has proceeded slowly and will probably be completed some time in May.

The bridge has been operating satisfactorily. New set screws were put in collars of main driving shafts and holes bored for additional oil cups and cups placed. This made considerable difference in the power required to operate the bridge.

Ninth Street Bridge—This bridge has given practically no trouble and works well and smoothly. New set screws and oil cups were put in as at Hamilton avenue, and with good results.

Third Street Bridge—No mishaps causing delays to traffic have occurred at this bridge. Set screws and oil cups were placed as at Ninth street, and with good results.

The property owners on the west side of the canal filed claims for damages due to building of approaches to bridge and change of grade of same and were awarded \$40,405.

Carroll Street Bridge—New tubes were put in the boilers at this bridge. While these repairs were being made the bridge was closed to land travel. Bridge was out of commission from 9 a. m., January 2, to 8 p. m., January 3.

Union Street Bridge—This bridge is operating satisfactorily. Set screws and oil cups were placed here as at Hamilton avenue, and with good results. The roadway of this bridge is 35 feet, while the roadway of Union street west of the canal is 30 feet. The Board of Aldermen, on December 26, 1905, authorized the widening of the roadway of Union street from the canal west to Bond street from 30 feet to 35 feet, and when this is done by the Highway Bureau it will make it possible for vehicular traffic to keep off the car tracks, which it cannot do now, as the side pitch of the road is too steep. The roadway and walks were completed rather hurriedly last year, to

permit of use of bridge at an early date, and when the expected roadway changes are made the present conditions of the walks will be improved upon.

Washington Avenue Bridge—The west roadway has been replanked. Studies are being made for new floor and new gates at this bridge.

Metropolitan Avenue Bridge—Plans for a new bridge are now under consideration. The present bridge was repainted in March and new motor pinion put in, driving rack lined up and fastened, and some repairs made on gates and in the floor.

Harway Avenue Bridge—Guard angles were put on fenders; otherwise no repairs were made on this bridge.

Third Avenue Bridge—Repairs to asphalt road surface will shortly be made. Borough of Richmond.

Lemon Creek Bridge—Plans for a new bridge are well under way, and it is expected that construction of a new bridge will be begun this year.

Fresh Kills Bridge—The drawbridge is in fair condition, but the trestle will in another year need extensive repairs.
