For Reconsideration on Account of Cost.

430. Regulating, grading, setting curbstones, flagging sidewalks, laying crosswalks, building approaches and erecting fences and building steps and appurtenances where necessary in W. 238th st., from Cannon place to Bailey ave., together with all work incidental thereto. Laid over until April 15, 1912.

452. Regulating, grading, etc., and building steps and appurtenances in Summit place, from Heath ave. to Bailey ave., and all work incidental thereto.
